FROM RABBI YOSKOWITZ Ma'ayın Yavoh Ezri From Where Will My Help Come?

n Megillat Esther 9:1, we read, "And in the twelfth month which is the month of Adar." These words clearly indicate that counting foward from Nisan, Adar is the last month of the year. In a leap year such as this one, we have Adar 1 and Adar 2

Adar shares the same root - *shoresh* - as Adir, which means powerful. At a difficult time in world and Jewish history, such as the current one, this concept of a month of being powerful should be encouraging to us.

It is now 20 years since a "new" Haman, Sadam Hussein, was defeated on Purim 1991. This Haman tried to destroy Israel with Scud missiles and also financed suicide bombers. His defeat in Adar exemplifies the words of the Megillah: "This month was reversed for them from grief to joy and from mourning to a festival day." *Esther* 9:22.

Let us not forget that while the scuds were falling, Jews still looked to the future. Both immediately before the War and during the scud attacks, Russian immigrants continued to arrive to build the country. I saw this with my own eyes. Some were big, strapping young men who would soon join the Israel Armed Forces to defend Israel from other Saddam Husseins. These young men exemplified God's promise to us in *Megillat Esther* 4:14, that God would send help to the Jewish People *Mimakom Acher* – from another place.

Again Israelis are facing danger with the rising revolution in the Arab world. In the past, help has come from unexpected places – *Makom Acher*.

With faith in God, we wonder from where help will come – *Ma'ayin yavoh*

The Psalmist answers his rhetorical question with "Ezri me'im Hashem – My help comes from GOD." In time, we will learn how and when GOD will help the State of Israel and the Israeli People.

FROM RABBI BERGMAN KEEPING OUR VOICES HEARD

or two thousand years, the Holiday of Purim was mostly a lighthearted day, with costumes and mandatory pastries. The story takes place in Persia, a country that had been largely friendly to Jews since the third century BCE. Persia was a relatively open society, far more than most European countries. Jews thrived in many different ways there. They could even celebrate Purim without worry of

For most of us, Purim is largely a metaphor for making sure that we do not forget our identity or ignore our heritage. It was a time to celebrate Jewish ingenuity and resourcefulness when we had no real power in the world.

It seems the world has flipped back upside down. Persia became Iran, and Iran has become one of the biggest threats to the world. From their nuclear program to their Holocaust denial to their attempt to dominate the entire Muslim world, Iran is no longer a metaphor, but a real issue.

I will tell you that I do not know what the political solution is, and I am not advocating a particular course of action. I just pray that the people we look to for protection are capable of solving, if not at least managing, the situation.

I think, though, that our sages were always worried that threats which seem to be a part of the past are never completely gone, but rise up again if we are not vigilant. This is why we are required to listen to the megillah twice on Purim. It is interesting to note that the megillah, the Scroll of Esther, is the only book of the Bible that everyone is obligated to hear. There is no obligation on an individual basis to hear the Torah read each week, though the community itself has an obligation to provide that reading.

Our sages wanted us to enjoy our lives, to have fun on Purim, but also to never forget that we have an obligation to fight for freedom and against oppression in every generation. We have a duty to demand that our government involve itself in this struggle, and that our country strengthens those who wish to join in. Again, I do not have specific policy recommendations, neither diplomatic nor military, but we can keep a light shining on Iran. We can make our voices heard.

I look forward to the day when the threat of Persia is only a metaphor again, and that all people in that region and in the world feel safe.



FROM RABBI SHERE ESHET CHAYIL, A WOMAN OF VALOR

f any of us were to ask children, "How often does your father stand up and recite love poetry to your mother?," they would most likely laugh at the absurdity of the question. After all, parents talk about schedules, bills and work; they don't recite love poetry.

The antidote to this problem is found in the tradi-RABBI SHERE tional Shabbat dinner prayers. Jewish tradition asks that every Friday night, no matter what has happened over the course of the week, men get up and recite the beautiful love poetry of Proverbs 31 to their wives. This section of proverbs, often referred to as "A Woman of Valor," praises the woman and expresses gratitude for all the things she has done for her fami-

ly throughout the week. "A Woman of Valor" was written approximately three thousand years ago and, as you might expect, the woman is praised for her cooking, cleaning and charity work. What might be surprising, however, is that she is also praised for business acuity, courage and strength.

From the Beth Achim Religious School...

ELISSA BERG, DIRECTOR, EDUCATION & YOUTH

WE ARE ALWAYS LOOKING for new ways to deliver Jewish education and Jewish experiences to your children.

- We began offering our Wednesday Capoeira classes. Ninety-five per cent of the kids love it. That's high praise.
- We began having Shabbat school once a month. On Shabbat morning we have about 55% of our population in attendance; on Friday evenings 45-50%. Although we feel badly that everyone isn't there to experience Shabbat with us, it is great to have that many students in the building on Shabbat. It is so important for Jewish children to experience Shabbat in the synagogue that we are working on new innovations for Shabbat morning. Plan a 'Destination Shabbat' with us!
- We have a new art teacher, Marla Schram-Wolfe, who is doing very creative work with your students, everything connected to the curriculum and everything designed with careful thought and attention to detail. I hope that you have seen the beautiful work that your children have been doing.

Last year, with the support of the Alliance for Jewish Education's Artists-in-the-Schools grant, our then fifth graders created this Tzedakah cabinet. It is designed like tzedekah collection pushkas were set up in some synagogues of years ago, where you could put your money in the slot for the need you wanted to address. Our students brainstormed what needs the current community might have and then designed drawers for each of these needs. Families are invited to bring money or items to feed the hungry, help with medical needs, educational supplies, pets, and more. Our art teacher, local artist Marla Wolfe, took the kids through this project. They did wonderful work together.
