

FROM THE PRESIDENT Making Connections

THE RECENT PUBLICATION of the Pew Survey has generated a great deal of discussion and debate about the state of American Judaism and the concern with assimilation. I think the Survey's results can be interpreted in many different ways, and people will cite various statistics to support their preconceived opinions.

One clear take away from the survey is that many of those who identify as Jews are not highly engaged in Jewish life or formal Jewish organizations. Intermarriage rates seem to be rising; more Jews are not raising their children in Jewish homes; and, as the argument goes assimilation will lead to the demise of American Jewry. Nevertheless, one commentator, J.J. Goldberg, a columnist for *The Forward* and a fellow former member of Habonim, offered a few thoughts that are cause for **CONTINUED ON PAGE 10**

FROM RABBI YOSKOWITZ FDR, THE MONUMENTS MEN, AND THE JEWS

WHILE STUDYING IN THE graduate history department at Rice University in Houston in the late 70s and early 80s, three words that were said by one of my professors, Francis Loewenheim, made me sit up and take notice: "I hate war!" They sound innocuous, don't they? Don't all of us hate war?

These were the words that President Franklin Roosevelt told an audience in Chautauqua, New York in August, 1936. They were heard by Hitler, who, according to Professor Loewenheim, then told his generals, "Now we can march."

In Chautauqua, President Roosevelt pledged, "We are not isolationists except in so far as we seek to isolate ourselves completely from war."

FROM HAZZAN GROSS Don't Worry, Be Happy...It's Adar!



HAZZAN GROSS

"Don't Worry, BE HAPPY." These four simple words comprise the title of one of the most endearing songs of the late 1980s, sung by Bobby McFerrin. The lyrics were written by McFerrin himself and the title's popular saying was based on an expression by the Indian mystic Meher Baba. This song always comes to my mind during this time of year because of the phrase, "Mishenichnas Adar Marbim B'Simcha," which means "When Adar arrives, our joy increases."

This year, the year 5774, happens to be a Hebrew leap year. A Hebrew leap year is somewhat different from the civil calendar's leap year. Based on the lunar cycle, the Hebrew calendar has 354 and 1/3 days, which makes it more than 11 days shorter than the solar year. It is biblically mandated that

N PURIM WE CELEBRATE the courage of our ancestors to live their lives in dignity and freedom from fear and oppression. We also recognize that the dangers they faced were never eliminated, but appear again throughout history. The Holocaust was the worst manifestation of the spirit of Haman, the enemy of the Purim

story. Hitler, Haman's spiritual descendant, wanted to destroy Jews and Jewish memory for all time. He failed, and we are still here.

We have an obligation to remember those who perished, not just because of the way they died, but because their lives were so precious. Their memory enhances our humanity.

Otto Dube of Hebrew Memorial Chapel, and a child of a survivor, has started an extraordinary program to help remember the victims of the Holocaust. It is called the **Adopt-A-Kaddish Program.** Individuals and institutions can make a pledge to say Kaddish on the Yahrzeit of those who have no one to say Kaddish for them. If you would like to participate, please contact Otto at www.hebrewmemorial.org/adopt-a-kaddish.

At Adat Shalom, we will be saying Kaddish in the fall for a brother and sister, Assia and Monia Levinski. This is their story.

Assia, born in 1928 and Monia, born in 1931, were the children of Leon and Chaja Levinski. They lived in a small village of Kazlu-Ruda in Lithuania. Their father was a lumber dealer. They were members of a large, loving, close-knit extended family.

THIS WEEK, JEWS all over the world mark the beginning of the new moon with the celebration of Rosh Chodesh (the new month) Adar II. If you look up into the sky during Rosh Chodesh you will see only the tiniest sliver of the moon. How strange it is to celebrate the new moon when there is virtually nothing at all to see in the sky! This celebration, however, is indicative of our nature as a

Jewish people. When we look up at the sky and see only darkness, we celebrate the hope of light soon to emerge. We are a people who know from our own narrative that light can follow darkness and dignity can follow degradation. Our holidays reflect this, our national anthem *Hatikvah* ("The Hope") reflects this, and even the means to becoming Jewish – immersion in the mikveh (from the Hebrew root of the word "hope") – reflects this essential Jewish value.

Celebrating Rosh Chodesh each month provides an opportunity to reflect and to renew. It is traditional for Jewish women to get together on Rosh Chodesh to talk, study, pray (or meditate) and enjoy food together. Several women at Adat Shalom have approached me about starting a Rosh Chodesh group. I am very excited by this idea and would love to hear from anyone who is interested. This isn't a long term commitment of any sort. You can come once, each month or whenev-

Their grandparents lived on a large farm a few miles outside of town. Both of their parents had attended high school in Marijampole, the closest city, with a population of 2,545 Jews. The family earned their livelihood from trading in agricultural produce and from small industry.

The Jews of Marijampole established the first Hebrew high school in Lithuania. A small farm which trained youth interested in pioneering in Palestine was established outside the city.

Assia was a thirteen year-old schoolgirl and Monia was a ten-year old in the summer of 1941, when the Germans invaded Lithuania. The family was forced to leave their home. Along with all the Jews of the surrounding area, they were confined to an overcrowded, sealed-off ghetto in Marijampole. Over 7,000 people endured great hardship. There was inadequate food, medicine and sanitation.

At the beginning of September 1941. Jews were forced to leave the ghetto. In groups of 500, they were marched by members of the Einsatzgruppen (special mobile killing squads) and their Lithuanian collaborators, to a few miles outside the city. Assia was thirteen years old. Monia was only

Now, because of us, our belief in the infinite value of life, and our participation in the Kaddish project Assia, Monia and so many others will not be forgotten.

optimism and bear repeating.

He argues that despite decades of warnings about the demise of American Jewry, the Jewish community is actually growing more robustly than even the optimists had expected. Intermarriage actually leveled off in the late 1990s and has remained stable for the past 15 years. Surprisingly, the rates of Passover Seder attendance, fasting on Yom Kippur and Sabbath candle lighting are on the rise. Goldberg even points out that in a 1990 survey, 28% of intermarried couples said they weren't raising their children as Jews, but just one generation later, 43% of those children identified as Jewish.

I'm fascinated by demographic surveys and always interested in the seemingly conflicting conclusions people can reach from an identical set of facts. Trying to relate the results of the Pew Survey to our own Adat Shalom community and coming up with an action plan to continually energize and grow our membership is the biggest challenge we face.

One statement that I believe everyone would agree with is that the human connections we form with one another and with our clergy are what draw us to Adat Shalom. The stronger the connection one feels, the more frequently that congregant will attend Synagogue events.

We live in an era in which most of us spend significant portions of our day staring at computer screens and communicating with family, friends and colleagues via social media, smart phones or other similar devices. People have strong needs to stay connected electronically, whether they're at home, in a car or airplane or out socially. I believe that people also have a strong need to stay connected interpersonally, not just electronically. We feel great after we've had a good conversation, face to face or by phone with a friend. That same satisfaction doesn't occur after a series of text messages, emails or Facebook postings.

At Adat Shalom, we strive to provide that meaningful and deeply satisfying personal connection. That's a key reason, I believe, for our continued existence. We encourage you to attend more services and programs this year. We have never had the breadth of programming we now offer. And, please join me at our Missebaba fundraiser, rather than simply purchasing your ticket. The party will be fun and a great time to meet and chat with old friends or establish new connections.

Connections? That's where I believe our future lies, and I don't believe any survey results will challenge that belief.

holidays take place in their appropriate season. Therefore, without some sort of "fix" to every now and then synchronize our lunar calendar with the solar cycle, the holidays would start rotating rapidly through the seasons, 11 days earlier each year. Pesach would quickly end up in the middle of winter and then later in the heat of summer, instead of, as the Torah decrees, "in the month of spring." The "fix" is accomplished by adding an additional month to 7 of the years within a 19 year cycle. This 13th month that is added is called Adar II (also called Adar Sheini and Adar Bet). which begins this year at sunset on March 2. How great is it that the Hebrew month that is doubled is Adar, the month of happiness!

Many philosophers have stated that the secret to life is being happy. It's often easy to feel down from the grind of daily life, so how can one be happy? Gandhi had a great way of putting it: "Happiness is when what you think, what you say, and what you do are in harmony." A way to bring a smile to your face during this season of happiness might be to watch McFerrin's official music video for "Don't Worry, Be Happy." Not only does this video feature the talented Robin Williams, but the song itself is entirely a cappella; all the "instrumental" effects are voiced by McFerrin. Another fitting thing about the song is that McFerrin incorporates an ancient Hebrew proverb: Gam zeh ya'avor ("this too shall pass") when he advises at the end of the song, "It will soon pass."

FROM BARRY L. LIPPITT, RITUAL DIRECTOR

RECENTLY SEVERAL PEOPLE HAVE ASKED ME about the synagogue's procedures for recalling the names of the departed over the course of the year. This month, I'll explain our approach.

YAHRZEIT NOTICES

The Synagogue sends out yahrzeit notices to members for deceased relatives. To add a relative to the list, please provide the person's English name, Hebrew/Yiddish name if known (including father's name and indication if a Kohen or Levi), and date of death. If you do not know the date of death on the Hebrew calendar, provide the civil date, and we will look it up. If you give us the civil date, remember to let us know the time of death, or if the death was before or after sunset, so we can find the correct Hebrew date. Please send this information to Caren Harwood at the synagogue.

If family names and notices have gone to a relative who is no longer a member of the congregation (due to death or other circumstances), reminders are not transferred automatically to another relative. To transfer listings, please contact Denise Gallagher at the synagogue.

If your loved one's name is on a memorial plaque in the sanctuary, you should ask Denise to associate the name with your yahrzeit listing.

READING OF THE YAHRZEIT LIST

Each week, we prepare a list of names listing those yahrzeits associated with our members. On weekdays, between the minchah and ma'ariv services, we read the English names from the yahrzeit list from both the day ending and the day beginning. The names on our weekly list are also printed on that week's Shabbat morning handout. To have the name read out loud during Shabbat morning services, please select the card with the name from the file box at the back of the sanctuary and hand it to an usher; those names will be read by the Rabbi before the Mourner's Kaddish at the conclusion of services. If you will not be able to attend services, please call Denise during the week before, and ask to have the card pulled for you.

EIL MALEH RACHAMIM

The memorial prayer is generally recited along with the Monday, Thursday, and Shabbat afternoon Torah readings. We read names (in Hebrew/Yiddish when available) for that day or the days following until the next time Torah is read. For example, on Saturday afternoon we read the names for Shabbat and Sunday, because we will next read Torah on Monday. We include all names provided by current members, plus all names on our memorial plaques. When the subsequent Torah reading day would fall on a day when we would not say the *Eil Maleh* prayer, we read additional days of names up through the next day when Torah is read.

Yızkor

Before the High Holy Days each year, we solicit names you would like to have included (for a donation) in the synagogue's *Book of Remembrance*. This permits one to identify people specifically associated with your names. In addition, we have also included the names of each person with a memorial plaque in the sanctuary. These books are available for congregational use on the four times during the year when we recite Yizkor during the Torah Service: Yom Kippur, Shemini Atzeret, the 8th day of Passover, and the 2nd day of Shavuot.



Remember, if you'd like to receive an *aliyah* on Shabbat morning or on a festival morning, please be at services no later than 9:30 a.m. to make your request.



1940, wrote that the U.S. State Department "made it clear that despite the fact that Italian troops as well as Nazi bombers, tanks and advisors were supporting the military uprising against the Republican government of Spain, the United States would remain completely neutral in the Spanish civil war."

What effect did the President's policy have on the Jews?

What was FDR's relationship to the Jews?

Why in 1943 did the President "prioritize, preserving historical monuments and paintings over saving Jews," asked Rafael Medoff, Director of the David S. Wyman Institute for Holocaust Studies. As depicted in the current film, *The Monuments Men*, the administration created a program to protect monuments but "couldn't divert any resources to help refugees."

There is new research illuminating the President's support and lack of support for Jews, and views of this relationship keep changing. Felix Frankfurter got it right when he wrote two weeks after the President's death: "Fluctuations of historic judgment are the lot of great men, and Roosevelt will not escape."

Professor Francis Loewenheim and two colleagues published *Roosevelt & Churchill: Their Secret Wartime Correspondence*. In that 805-page book, Jews are mentioned only nine times. What does that tell us about these two great leaders' relationships with the Jews?

These questions, among others, will be explored and discussed in our upcoming Lunchtime Learning series beginning March 19. In the first two sessions we will learn about two great leaders "who are credited with saving Western Civilization from the greatest menace it has ever known" (Jacob Heilbrunn, NY Times, July 28, 2013, p. 5). The final session, in April, will focus on the Jews and President Harry Truman.
