

FROM RABBI SHERE WELCOMING OUR VERY YOUNGEST

O ne of the greatest moments for me as a rabbi is when I have the opportunity to officiate at a baby naming. The Talmud says, "With the birth of every child, the world begins anew," for with new life comes new possibility.

RABBI SHERE We have, *Baruch Hashem*, many new babies in our community this year, so on Friday, March 23, we began a play group for parents/grandparents with babies and toddlers. Together we sang Shabbat songs and braided fresh challah dough. Some families chose to put raisins, chocolate chips or sprinkles into their challot while others kept them more traditional. Everyone left with Shabbat songs in their heads and challot ready to bake in the oven. The program was so successful that we offered it again on March 30 and are planning to make it a regular happening at Adat Shalom. FROM HAZZAN GROSS Songs of "Song of Songs"

The three pilgrimage festivals, also known as the *Shalosh Regalim*, each have a special sacred text associated with the *chag* (festival). These sacred texts are collectively known as *Megillot* or scrolls and they are a part of the *K'tuvim* (Writings), the third major section of the Hebrew Bible. *Shir HaShirim* (Song of Songs) is associated with Pesach, *Rut*

(The Book of Ruth) with Shavuot, and *Kohelet* (Ecclesiastes) with Sukkot.

There are many connections between *Shir HaShirim* and Pesach. *Shir HaShirim* is a timeless allegory of God's relationship with the Jewish People, told via a passionate love story

FROM RABBI BERGMAN CHARITY FOR THOSE WHO SEEM TO NEED IT LEAST

ne of the central ideas of Passover is that we are to see ourselves as having left Egypt. Some say that this means to visualize that we were actually slaves in Egypt, and were freed in the Exodus. It is meant to give us empathy with those who suffered at the hands of the Egyptians.

I think there is another way to make this a more personal experience. The Hebrew word for Egypt is *Mitzraiim*, which means the narrow place, the place that blocks us. We need to think about what is our personal *Mitzraiim*, the thing that is holding us back from being the kind of person we want to be.

This requires being really honest with ourselves. We are often comfortable with our most destructive habits, whether anger and temper problems, eating issues, jealousy, or inattentiveness to others. What is important is to figure out what our own particular habit is, and work on that. Passover is the six month alert that Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are coming. Now is the time to get to work.

The seder provides a powerful model on how to start the work. The very first seder actually took place during the

FROM RABBI YOSKOWITZ Making the Haggadah Clear & Interesting

When you write for the public, the historian Barbara Tuchman affirmed "you have to be clear and you have to be interesting and these are the two criteria which make for good writing."

Does the Passover Haggadah pass Tuchman's criteria? Is the writing clear and interesting? Does it skillfully tell the story of the slavery of our people in Egypt and of what led up to that slavery as well as Tuchman told the story of World War I in

The Guns of August and its prequel The Proud Tower.

Here are some suggestions based on what I plan to do at our Sedarim to make the messages of Passover interesting and clear.

Before our oldest grandchildren are at our Seder table, I will ask the oldest among them to prepare a skit for the Sedarim using puppets in which two imaginary crocodiles in the river Nile discuss the words that God spoke instructing them not to harm the baby in the wicker basket... "among the reeds by the bank of the Nile" [Exodus 2.3].

When the children open the door for Elijah, I will remove some of the wine from Elijah's cup and ask the children when they return to the Seder table what happened to the wine.

For the adults at our Sedarim, I will prepare talking points about how essential is the messianic idea in the Jewish way of life. It is for me as I envision a different and better world.

We will explore why the Exodus from Egypt is our most important Jewish story. In the month of April, 2012, we need to work hard to prepare for the

Because of the cost of postage, the Men's Club will not be doing a general mailing of Yom Hashoah candles. There will be a limited mailing to those who have participated in the program in the past. If you do not receive a candle, we will have them available for you in the syna-

Please note that Yom HaShoah candles should be lit this year on Wednesday night, April 18. Please support the Men's Club by picking up a candle, making a donation, and lighting it on that evening in memory of those who died in the Holocaust.

Candles surrounding our Holocaust Torah in the Main Sanctuary will be lit after evening minyan on Wednesday, April 18.

OUR HOLOCAUST TORAH

A dat Shalom's Holocaust Memorial Torah, which was placed in our Main Sanctuary in 1986, was irreparably damaged during the Holocaust. It was rescued from Czechoslovakia by the Westminster Synagogue in London and entrusted by that congregation to Adat Shalom.

The Torah was written in 1890 in the town of Kyjov, one of the only "royal cities" in which Jews were allowed to live. Several hundred Jews lived in

were allowed to live. Several hundred Jews lived in Kyjov as early as 1506. Nearly 3,000 from the immediate area were transported to Theresienstadt in 1943.

Artist Elsa Wachs designed and crafted the Torah Mantel. She has written, "The charred and burned Tallit encircles and clothes this Torah Mantel making the Torah and man seared into one being. The soul of the Jew and the Torah cannot be parted. The Tfillin here are binding the Jew's arm and encircling the Torah...representing the surrealistic events of that time period and a way of showing our inability to comprehend "man's inhumanity to man." The Torah support was created by sculptor Morris Brose, who was born in Poland and came to Detroit in 1932.

The Holocaust Torah was dedicated by Eleanor & Saul Bluestone in 1986 in memory of Morris, Sarah & Sydney Bluestone.

Siyum HaB'khor Friday Morning, April 6

The "Concluding Study Session"

Led by Rabbi Shere
7:30 a.m. Shacharit Service and Siyum

Jews commemorate the sparing of the Hebrew first-born sons in the Pesach story by concluding the study of a section of Jewish text the morning of the first Seder (or the previous day if the Seder will fall on Shabbat).

This year Rabbi Shere will conclude *Masechet Pesachim* and then focus on the mitzvah of *Bedikat Chametz*, working to understand both the practical and spiritual elements of this pre-Seder ritual. *What are we searching for tonight?*

From the Middle Ages on, prominent Rabbis have stated that first-born daughters should attend the siyum as well. At Adat Shalom all members of your family, whatever their birth order, are invited to join in the siyum and the deluxe *chametz* breakfast to follow.

BRING YOUR BAR/BAT MITZVAH TO ADAT SHALOM

ADAT SHALOM SYNAGOGUE is a wonderful place for your children or grandchildren to celebrate becoming Bar/Bat Mitzvah. Our professional staff works with our candidates to prepare them and provide them with a meaningful experience that can influence their entire adult lives. Bar/Bat Mitzvah instruction in chanting our sacred texts and leading our prayer services, which are privileges conferred upon becoming Bar/Bat Mitzvah, seeks to teach lifetime skills that will make our students valued members of any congregation, and make them confident and comfortable when they attend services.

Bar/Bat Mitzvah dates can be booked 5 years in advance for members, and 2 years for non-members.

Also, consider having your party or a luncheon for family here at the synagogue. Our great new caterer, Matt Prentice, will work with you to make your simcha an unforgettable experience.

During our Weekly Torah Services, we usually recite the *Eil Malei Rachamim* prayer and recall *yahrzeits* from that day through the next day we read Torah. We include names listed by our members. We read the departed's Hebrew name (and that of his/her father) when these are available. We do not have the Hebrew (or Yiddish) names in our records for many of the people on our list.

Please help us update our *yahrzeit* records. Please give us the names of all those relatives you would like us to remember when we recite this prayer, along with their Hebrew (or Yiddish) names and their fathers' Hebrew (or Yiddish) names, along with the date of death (we can look up the Hebrew date from the civil date; just let us know whether the death was before or after sundown on the civil date), and their relationship to you.

We also use this list to generate the list of names on our weekly Shabbat sheet and to prepare the cards for family to give to the ushers, in order for a name to be included in the list that the rabbi reads each week near the end of the service.

To get a list of names currently associated with you, please call Denise in the synagogue office.

I AM IN THE PROCESS of compiling a list of our members' Bar and Bat Mitzvah *sedrot* and *haftarot*, so that we can offer you the opportunity to read a haftarah on a week when we have no scheduled Bar or Bat Mitzvah, or to receive an aliyah on the anniversary. 
YOUTH SCOOP FROM JODI

us to Passover parodies of songs. Our "playlist" grows every year. Rabbi Shere gave us a great idea to talk about the plagues. So, our guests now share something of personal significance or interest about their assigned plague. Our children, Perry and Zara, have directed us to articles of social consciousness that are of particular relevance to the Passover story.

We have used different Haggadahs over the years. I think back to my father reading from the Maxwell House Haggadah (and now think "How strange that a Haggadah was published by a coffee company").

The young kids at the table were always up to some minor mischief, probably induced from boredom. As a child or young adult I never realized what a challenge it was to make the Seder relevant to everyone at the table. We have been through a series of different Haggadahs: those that were themed toward the Civil Rights movement, those that the grandchildren brought home from early religious school, and those that are fairly contemporary, filled with commentary and readings rooted in the broader Jewish experience.

Every year we look forward to expanding our understanding and enjoyment of Passover. However you conduct your Seder, I hope that you have a wonderful Passover.

Our destructive habits took a long time to form; they will take a long time to conquer. Look for small changes. You will start noticing them soon and will start feeling better about yourself. 

JALEPENO RED BEAN BURGER (12 servings)

Ingredients: 2-1/4 t 80/20 olive oil

Dried Bay Leaf

3 C toasted Panko crumbs 1/2 C barbecue sauce

1/4 C minced seeded jalapenos 2-1/2 # cooked kidney beans 1/8 C beaten egg whites 1/2 oz. fresh minced cilantro 1-1/2 C roasted corn kernals

3/4 C sm. Spanish onion diced 3/4 t minced fresh garlic Sm. diced/seeded Roma 1-1/2 t dry mild chili powder



Directions:

- 1. Measure dry kidney beans into a small stock pot and cover with double the water and bay leaf. Bring to a rolling simmer for approx. 2 hours, or until beans are tender. Chill.
- 2. Heat 1-1/2 t olive oil and saute onions over medium heat until transluscent.
- 3. Toss corn with salt, black pepper and remaining clive oil and spread on baking sheet. Roast at I 350 deg. for approx. 15 minutes or until golden brown.
- 4. Add tomatoes, jalapenos, garlic and chili powder to the onion mixture and continue to cook until veru fragrant.
 - 5. Put the chilled beans into a mixing bowl and mash for 3 minutes.
 - 6. When onion mixture has cooled slightly, add it to the mashed beans, followed by the BBQ sauce, the egg whites and the crumbs.
- 7. Pour the mix into a pan and chill for 4 hours. After it is completely chilled, the mixture can be scooped into the ground crumbs. Sear (do not grill) and serve. Enjoy!
