David attended the University of Michigan and is a graduate of Oberlin College. He earned his law degree at Cornell University. He became the Senior Vice President, General Counsel, Secretary and Chief Compliance Officer of Delphi Automotive in 2005. During his tenure at Delphi, David led the legal effort to reorganize the company through its chapter 11 bankruptcy reorganization and its subsequent initial public offering. He previously served as the Senior Vice President and General Counsel at both PulteGroup, Inc. in Bloomfield Hills and Federal-Mogul Corporation in Southfield.

David started his legal career in private practice in Chicago before moving back to the Detroit area in 1997. He and Abbe became members of Adat Shalom in 2003. He joined the Board of Trustees at Adat Shalom in 2005 and became a

Meet Melissa Ser... Our New Director of Congregational Learning

"We decided to look at Jewish education in a new way," says Rabbi Aaron Bergman, "and Melissa Ser fits the bill perfectly as the individual who will guide us in this 'cutting-edge' approach."



Melissa grew up primarily in North Miami Beach, Florida. She attended Florida State University, where she earned a BA in English and minored in Communications and Classics. During her undergraduate work, she was on the boards of both the Jewish Student Union and Hillel. She went on to earn her MA and PhD in English at the University of Rochester.

While in graduate school Melissa got a part-time job teaching Hebrew school, and thus began her transition into a full-time youth director and Jewish educator, even as Interim Religious School director, for Temple B'rith

what have you read this summer?" is a question others ask us or one we ask ourselves as we prepare for the High Holidays. Summer is fast approaching and many of us are planning not only which books we will read in the coming months, but to where we will travel.

Allow me to make two suggestions for your summer reading: one, a new piece of fiction, and the other, an older non-fiction book.

Topping the *Hadassah Magazine* Fiction Best-Seller List and having received outstanding critical reviews in the secular press is the recently published *What We Talk About When We Talk About Anne Frank*, an intriguing group of short stories by Nathan Englander. At the focus of the opening story, which is the title of the book, are two young Jewish couples, one living in Jerusalem and the other residing in the United States. After a wide-ranging discussion about religious practices and politics, the two couples play what they call the "Anne Frank and the Righteous Gentile Game," wondering who among their Christian friends, who

FROM RABBI BERGMAN AZAMRA

Judaism for me is a home, a religion and an identity. At the most crucial times of my life, those moments that it seemed darkness would reign over me, Judaism has been my refuge and salvation. This is not the easiest thing to share, but I feel that it is important that people know that even rabbis face crises of faith and purpose. Judaism means so much to me, precisely in these moments.



RABBI BERGMAN

I want to share a teaching that has meant a great deal to me, and has been a comfort in some difficult moments. It is one of the most famous of Rabbi Nachman of Breslov, who is one of my primary spiritual guides.

The teaching is taken from the second half of a verse from Psalm 146. In Hebrew, it is "Azamra Leilohei B'odi." This is normally translated as "I will sing to God with all of my strength," implying that we should serve God with all of our might and ability. This is a good thought when you are feeling strong and confident. It is not as helpful when you are feeling weak, or depressed, when you feel as though you have nothing left.

Rabbi Nachman was concerned that we never give into despair, something he struggled with himself his entire life. He translates the verse from Psalms differently. He said, "We should sing to God with what CONTINUED ON PAGE 16



FROM RABBI SHERE RELAY FOR LIFE

As a rabbi, I am frequently asked questions that revolve around the challenge of believing in God in a world filled with so much injustice, tragedy and grief. Why doesn't God do something? I don't know the full answer to that question, but I do believe that God looks at humanity and asks us the very same question: Why don't we do something?

RABBI SHERE

Someone who answered God's call is Dr. Gordy Klatt. In 1985, Dr. Klatt was tired of seeing so many of his patients suffering with cancer and set out to do something about the disease. He enjoyed running and committed to running for 24 straight hours in an effort to raise money for cancer research. At the end of the day, he had run more than 83 miles and raised \$27,000. During those 24 hours of circling the track, Dr. Klatt came up with the idea for what has now become The American Cancer Society's largest fundraiser, The Relay for Life.

Every year Adat Shalom has a significant number of people and teams that participate in and raise tremendous

yricist Sheldon Harnick said it best in *Fiddler on the Roof*:

HOUSING THE HOMELESS XVI

DURING THE WEEK OF JULY 15-22, we will again host participants from the South Oakland Shelter (SOS) in Lathrup Village. The mission of SOS is to break the cycle of homelessness by providing lodging, food, and transportation as well as a variety of services. These include case management, counseling, career services, and educational classes. Adat Shalom supports their goals by providing a safe place to sleep, three meals a day and so much more!

It has been a tragic year for many families in the community: foreclosures and the tight job market devastated people who never dreamed they would ever be homeless. As you can imagine, the need for these services continues to increase during these difficult economic times. During this past year, SOS saw more displaced families and needy individuals seeking their support and services. They served 469 individuals, 35% women, 42% men, and 23% children. In an effort to prevent future occurrences of homelessness, SOS has established a follow-up care program to assist for a full year. Ninety-five percent of the clients who participated in follow-up obtained housing. Our participation in this Tikun Olam project helps to ease the burden of homelessness for this at-risk population.

Please watch your mail for details about how and when you can volunteer and/or make a monetary contribution to support our efforts. Our costs are very high and we desperately need our members to provide overnight supervision at the synagogue and "on call" members to provide transportation for those who are employed. In past years our Adat Shalom family has been very generous and we need your continued support!

Kodesh. Determined to make this love into her career, she went on to attend the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion for two years. Shortly thereafter, this path led her to Jerusalem, Israel, where she met her husband, Sam.

For the past eight years, Melissa has lived in Jerusalem, serving as the Academic Coordinator for the Ramah Jerusalem High School and the Director of the Ramah Jerusalem Day Camp for most of that time. Her husband, Sam, is a journalist and a personal trainer. They have two boys, Ariel, 5, and Yonatan, 2, as well as a calico cat, Sweetie.

Teaching comes naturally to Melissa, who has been working in formal and informal education for about twenty years. MAKING TISHA B'AV MEANINGFUL BY MELISSA SER

DIRECTOR OF CONGREGATIONAL LEARNING

AS WE BEGIN the period of traditional mourning associated with the Three Weeks leading up to Tisha B'Av (July 22), we are faced with the challenge of making this experience meaningful for our younger children and grandchildren, those who aren't necessarily learning about it at summer camp. It's not easy, especially when we often don't feel that connection ourselves – how can we grasp what it might have been like for our ancestors living in Jerusalem at the time of the Temple's destruction, and what lessons can we take from it to discourage senseless hatred today?

For this activity, you need a child (age two and up) and a large quantity of building blocks. Build the biggest tower you can – and while you do so, implore your child not to knock it down. Beg, cajole, and plead with your child – this is such a beautiful tower, please don't destroy it! Then watch as your child knocks it down anyway. Pretend to be upset. Cry if you can. Then switch roles – have your child build, and you knock the construction down.

1. How does it feel to break something that someone else built? 2. How does it feel to have something you've worked hard on ruined? 3. How do you think the Jews in Jerusalem felt when their Temple was burned down? 4. How do you think the Babylonians or Romans felt when they burned down the Temple?

This should lead into a discussion of how when people don't work together they can often destroy the things they love through *sinat chinam*, senseless hatred (like knocking down your brother's tower for no reason). I hope that after you've talked about this, you and your child will sit down to build the biggest and most beautiful "Temple" that you can. 

SUMMER IS HERE, which means that most weeks there are opportunities for our congregants to read Torah and chant Haftarah. If you would like to be part of our summer plans, please send me an email or leave me a message.

Similarly, I am trying to build a database listing the bar/bat mitzvah parshiyot and haftarot for our congregants. Please send me an email so I can add you to the list (if you don't remember the reading, just send me the date, including year of your bar/bat mitzvah and we'll look it up). After we start putting this information together, we'll be able to invite you to have an aliyah on the anniversary, or ask you to read Haftarah when we have no bar/bat mitzvah scheduled.

SUMMER ALSO PRESENTS US with an occasional challenge on a Saturday evening; our services to mark the end of Shabbat usually begin at 9:00 p.m. through most of June, July and August. Please join us for end of Shabbat services when you have no other plans on a Saturday evening (and, please come to our 3rd Sabbath meal beforehand, scheduled one hour before the time of services – we're working on enhancing our summer menu for this meal).

DURING TAMMUZ AND AV, we observe the three-week mourning period between the daytime public fast of Shiv'ah-Asar b'Tammuz (17 Tammuz) and the 25-hour fast of Tisha B'Av (9 Av). On 17 Tammuz in 70 C.E., the Roman army broke through the walls of Jerusalem, and on 9 Av, the Second Temple was destroyed. During this mourning period, public celebrations, such as weddings and concerts, are avoided, and some refrain from haircuts. Both fast days fall on Shabbat this year, so their observances are delayed until the next day.

17 Tammuz is a half-day fast, from dawn until dark, observed on Sunday, July 8.

9 Av is a 25-hour fast (as on Yom Kippur), beginning after Shabbat ends on Saturday, July 28, and continuing on Sunday, July 29. We will have our own service that evening, following Havdalah. There will not be a community-wide service as in some years past.

If you are interested in reading part of Megillat Eichah (Lamentations) at the evening service on Tisha b'Av, please contact me.

Remember - IF YOUR TEEN WOULD LIKE TO BE PART OF OUR TORAH-READING CORPS FOR THE HIGH HOLIDAYS, ask them to send me an email or leave me a phone message as soon as possible. The schedule of readers is nearly complete.

profess to care about each of the four friends, would put themselves at risk and hide them in the event of another Holocaust. In this game, each of the four hold up their acquaintances to scrutiny. A reader may ask: With a State of Israel as well as a strong United States of America, why are young Jews still playing the Anne Frank game?

Phillip Hallie's *Lest Innocent Blood Be Shed: The Story of the Village of Le Chambon and How Goodness Happened There* was published in 1979. It is the story of Jewish rescue that was of no political or military interest, but was a strong ethical move on the part of simple French villagers. This book is a fine companion piece to Englander's stories because it explores what makes good people "good." Hallie's book ends with the words of Rabbi Hillel that are included in *The Ethics of the Fathers*: "If I am not for myself, who is for me? If I am only for myself, what am I? If not now, when?" Why can't all people be as good as those of Le Chambon, when being good is so vitally important?

As for summer travel, please read the enthusiastic words of Jay Yoskowitz Israel Scholarship Award Winner Max Farkas (See letter below). His description of time well spent in Israel should encourage us to visit Israel whenever we can. It is a gift that we live at a time when a State of Israel exists. May it continue to be a place to visit and to live so that our children and theirs can experience wonderful moments such as those about which Max writes.

Greetings from Israel



WORDS CAN'T DESCRIBE MY EXPERIENCE while being here in Israel. Especially, this past week during Yom Ha'shoah, Yom Ha'zikaron and Yom Ha'atzmaut. Those three days alone may be the most meaningful I have had studying abroad. Each evokes a feeling of sorrow and pride in the struggles and accomplishments of Jews and the State of Israel that people do not experience at home. It was amazing to be here for each.

I attended a ceremony at the Kotel on erev Yom Ha'zikaron. Shimon Peres was scheduled to speak, and I went with a group of friends to hear him. When I walked past security into the forum in front of the Kotel, I was in shock. This was the first time I had ever seen the Kotel without a single person davening. The feeling was overwhelming. Before Peres spoke, the Israel flag was placed at half mast, and the crowd (which filled the entire forum) was silent. When the ceremony ended, we sang *Hatikvah*, just as they do at every Israeli ceremony, but when I turned and saw a woman crying, I realized this time was different. It was something I will probably remember for my entire life.

I have many more stories to tell in the weeks to come. Right now I am off to the shuk to buy some things to make Shabbat dinner with friends. *Shabbat Shalom* and my best to everyone at Adat Shalom.

we have left." That is to say that even when we are feeling at our worst, and that we do not have anything to offer God or anyone else, God will count what little we have and what little we can do as a complete prayer and offering. God will view us as 100% worthwhile even when we feel worthless.

This is particularly important to remember when so many people are going through difficult times, not just financially, but emotionally. So many of our identities are wrapped in our professions or our ability to provide for our loved ones and the community. We feel bad about ourselves, because we may not be able to do what we used to.

Rabbi Nachman said that we should never give up on ourselves, because God never does. We can always find what is eternally valuable within ourselves. Even one kind deed to another person can change their world, and maybe the whole world for the better.

This teaching has helped me find myself when I felt lost. I hope you never need it, but if you do, that it gives you comfort and hope.
