

FROM RABBI YOSKOWITZ BEING A GRANDFATHER - SABA

n Shabbat, September 28, 2013 – 24 Tishrei 5774, my son Jeremy and his wife, Lisa, gave me the privilege of publicly naming their first born son, David Lawrence Yoskowitz – Dovid Avraham ben Harav Saadia Yitzhak u'Dvora. The naming was part of the Brit Millah ceremony which included the following blessing to Lisa and Jeremy, said by all

assembled at the conclusion of the Brit ceremony "Just as you have entered your son into the covenant (brit) so may you lead him to the study of Torah, to doing good deeds and to the Chupah."

This is Rachel's and my fifth grandchild. What a blessing! My model for the Biblical Saba – Hebrew for grandfather – who I would like to emulate is the Patriarch Jacob, who is named Israel, too. Unlike the Patriarchs Abraham and Isaac, Jacob was the very first in the Bible to have direct communication with his grandchildren. Jacob gave the same status to his grandchildren, Ephraim and Manasseh, sons of Joseph, as he did to his own children (Genesis 48:5). These grandsons received later portions in Israel, just as Jacob's children did.

Jacob did something with his grandchildren that was exceptional. According to the CONTINUED ON PAGE 6

FROM HAZZAN GROSS CHAG HAHODAYAH



HAZZAN GROSS

n Hebrew, Thanksgiving is translated as *Chag HaHodayah* (the Festival of Thanks). As a child, I never thought of Thanksgiving as any kind of a Jewish holiday. It was first and foremost a vacation from school, and a time for lots of food and great times with family. At this stage of my life, however, I see Thanksgiving differently. I view it through a Jewish lens.

The very first word that we are supposed to utter upon waking up in the morning is *modeh*, which means "thanks." Modeh

comes from the same Hebrew root as the word *todah*. Our tradition is one built on awareness and appreciation and each

FROM RABBI BERGMAN CHANUKAH: PLAIN & SIMPLE

For most of Jewish history we lived on pretty modest means. The average meal was some kind of fried potato dish. Children played with little toys, usually a spinning top. The only light was a small candle.

We celebrate Chanukah by eating fried potatoes and playing with a top, all by candle light. Our celebration of Chanukah looks exactly the same as daily life over the last thousand years.

Why, then, is Chanukah such a big deal if we are doing something exactly the

same as we would already be doing? On Passover we eat special foods. On Sukkot we spend time in a structure completely different from our house. There is no doubting that these are holidays. Chanukah, though, if no one told you it was a holiday, you may not know it was anything special.

I believe that is precisely the point. The real miracle of the Jewish people is ordinary people doing ordinary things under extraordinary circumstances. The story of the Maccabees was the struggle to live normal Jewish lives despite the efforts of our enemies. The Maccabees did not want to conquer the territories of the Assyrian Hellenists or take their possessions. They just wanted their daily lives back.

In the Warsaw ghetto during the Holocaust the Jews set up children's theaters, and literary societies. Under horrifying conditions that would have broken the spirits of so many, the Jews of the ghetto went about their ordinary lives as best they could. They were determined to live as spiritually free human beings as long as they could.

Chanukah celebrates how miraculous it often is just to get through our day. There are so many challenges, whether the economy or illness or even the general anxieties of life. Chanukah is a reminder that every day is worth celebrating.

LATKES & LIBERTY

t seems that everyone is buzzing about this year's rare convergence of Thanksgiving and Chanukah. There are some awesome culinary mash-ups including sweet potato latkes with gravy and sufganiyot filled with cranberry sauce. And then there's the 9-year-old kid in New York who has made nearly \$50,000 selling his invention, the "Menurkey" (a turkey-shaped menorah!).

But what is the spiritual significance of this rare union? I believe it is the opportunity to separate Chanukah from its usual cultural partner, Christmas, and marry it to a holiday with a more similar meaning and purpose.

Just like Thanksgiving isn't about presents but about appreciating what we have, Chanukah, in its origin, has the exact same message. Chanukah celebrates the miracle that a small cruse of oil lasted far longer than expected — that what appeared to be "not enough" turned out to be "more than enough." On Thanksgiving, we sit down with our families, look around the table and realize that





For all our grandchildren - yours and mine - I pray for good health, for appreciation of our great past, and for one day determining to contribute to a dynamic Jewish future.

LAST MONTH I ASKED YOU TO LOOK for the good in everyday occurrences. I hope you did, and I can't wait to hear about how you and your family are looking at the world around you now - please tell me next time you are in shul. This month, I'm asking you to take on a different part of our tradition: argument.

The Rabbis and sages of the Talmud, and our people over the years, have argued a lot about different ideas and concepts in Judaism. Even the way we light our Chanukah meno-

rah (chanukiah) is a debate (machloket) between Hillel and Shammai! Hillel wanted to increase the lights each night, because we should only increase in matters of holiness, and not decrease; Shammai wanted to decrease each night, because we begin with the maximum potential of the mitzvah (and in line with the decreasing sacrifices of the Sukkot holiday, in which the celebration of Chanukah has many roots).

Investigate a machloket or two this month. Part of being Jewish is engaging with our texts, traditions, and ideas so after you have a chance to talk about the following debates, see if you can think of a great debate among Jews today. I'd love to hear a bit about your discussions and the ideas that came out of them - so feel free to shoot me an email at mser@adatshalom.org with some of your or your family's thoughts.

- GREAT DEBATES -

THE ISSUE: In 168 BCE, Antiochus, the king of the Syrian-Greek Empire, turns the Temple into a pagan house of worship and decrees that Jews cannot keep their religion. He was very cruel and even ordered Jews to eat pork and worship idols. How should the Jews react?

On one side, the Hellenizers, or Jews who embraced Greek culture, believed that Greek culture had a lot to offer - philosophy, art, and more. They wanted to assimi-

late into the Greek customs. On the other side, the Hasmonean family (you know them as the Maccabees) wanted to preserve their religious freedom and regain control of the Temple. They believed that in the land of Israel, Jewish Law should reign, and they chose to fight. With whom would you side, and why?

> THE ISSUE: Generations of sages and rabbis created the Oral Law, explanations and commentaries on the Torah. It has come down to us as Mishnah and Gemara, or the

Talmud. Should Jews follow this Oral Law, or should Jews only follow the Torah?

On one side are the Sadducees, made up of the Jewish priests (Kohanim) and the upper class. They believe that the Oral Law is unnecessary and that the priests alone should be able to make interpretations of the Torah.

On the other side are the Pharisees, the scribes and sages and the lower and middle classes. They believe that both the Written Law (Torah) and the Oral Law (Talmud) were given to Moses at Mount Sinai. They believe that one cannot separate the two things, and that the Oral Law is crucial to understanding the Written Law. With whom would you side, and why?

WE ARE SO EXCITED when teens who have grown up at Adat Shalom go on to apply their years of learning and celebrating Judaism to the greater world. Pre-B'nai Mitzvah students have an amazing opportunity to work with such a teen, as they prepare for a lifetime of giving back to the community. Daphne Logan, a junior at Bloomfield Hills High School and a student at ATID: Alliance for Teens in Detroit, is one of just ten high school students from around Metro Detroit chosen to participate in a new program called PeerCorps Detroit, a yearlong mentorship program. Daphne has been a member of Adat Shalom since birth, attends Camp Ramah in Canada, and feels passionately about our Jewish community.

In addition to participating in leadership development experiences, she will mentor and volunteer with a group of B'nai Mitzvah students from Adat Shalom at the Isaac Agree Downtown Synagogue, the only synagogue in the city of Detroit, and a microcosm of young, energetic Jews working to revive and revitalize the city's Jewish community.

The purpose of PeerCorps is to provide meaningful, fun, and relevant community service projects for students prior to becoming a Bar or Bat Mitzvah, boost youth involvement in synagogues in Metro Detroit, and to enhance the relationship between our suburbs and our city.

Daphne excitedly shares, "after spending a week in August living in Southwest Detroit with the other PeerCorps mentors, I can guarantee that this is going to be an absolutely phenomenal experience for the mentees." (pre-B'nai Mitzyah students)

Daphne is enjoying getting to know and volunteer with the first cohort of mentees, Ali Randel, Izzy Randel and Jack Randel. She is currently looking for mentees for the last two cycles, January 1 to March 14 and March 16 to May 30. "What we learned from Parashat Noah"

This month we celebrate something that occurs once in a lifetime. Actually, once in a lot of lifetimes: it won't hap-

pen again for another some 70,000 years. Our eight day celebration of Chanukah begins on Thanksgiving turkey and latkes, anyone? Many people are now calling this unique circumstance "Thanksgivukkah" - and while that's cute, there is a lot of meaning in the two days' coming together into one joint celebration.

Thanksgiving marks the successful transformation of a group of disparate colonists into a fledgling nation - all because they sought the freedom to practice their religion free of critique. Some people even see con-

nections between Thanksgiving's focus on harvest and the biblical Jewish holiday of Sukkot, which we celebrated in September. On this national holiday today, though, we now think about what we are grateful for - hakarat hatov, or the recognition of the good. That opens the door to virtually anything. Some people are thankful for having a job, their families, a new toy or a sweet puppy.

Chanukah's messages are not so different from those of Thanksgiving. The Jewish people were oppressed and told that they could not practice Judaism (the colonists were unable to practice their religion, so they left!). A small band of Jews led by Judah Maccabee fought against their oppressors and recaptured the holy Temple in Jerusalem, rededicating it for its purposes so that they could celebrate again. And the first thing they did, of course, was rededicate the menorah for its purposes.

Now, whether the little vial of oil lasted for eight days (Talmud Shabbat 21b) or the Maccabees found eight Hasmonean spears in the Temple and repurposed them (Megillat Taanit 9) - or whether they were, in fact, finally celebrating the eight days of Sukkot and Shemini Atzeret (Maccabees 2) - the overall idea was the same. They rededicated the Temple and celebrated freedom of religion and the things they were thankful for!

Thanksgivukkah may be a silly name but the idea is wonderful, and we have the unique opportunity in our lifetime to combine the two into one incredibly special day.

We will kick off Thanksqivukkah at the West Bloomfield Barnes & Noble on Sunday, November 24 at 4 p.m. Come listen to a story or




two read by our own Rabbi Bergman, do a fun craft geared to children six and younger, and enjoy a PJ Library event on the road.

day's foundation is built with gratitude. In fact, one of the words used to describe the Jewish people, Yeduhim, comes from the very same root of the word "thankful." Yehudah literally means "gratitude to God." Therefore, wouldn't that make Thanksgiving the ultimate Jewish holiday? Even though it is not prescribed in the Torah, nor are there any sacrifices associated with this day (gobble gobble), it is a holiday that all should embrace.

Speaking of the turkey, the Hebrew word for this martyred creature is tarnegol hodu or "Indian rooster." Hodu coincidentally also translates as "thanks." I find it highly meaningful that the food that so many people eat on Thanksgiving contains the word "thanks." I'd be remiss if I didn't mention the special concurrence of Thanksgiving and Chanukah this year, even more reason to be a grateful Jew at this time of the year. So whether you have turkey, tofurkey, turducken or latkes on your Thanksgiving table, I wish you all a Chag HaHodayah Sameach!

utes, memorial plaques, Tree of Life, program sponsorships, scrip cards and other ideas. The Congregational Learning Committee will focus on the development of programs and speakers to maximize outreach to and connection with our members and increase participation in educational programs offered by the Synagogue. what we have, though perhaps different or less than what we hoped for, is truly enough.

In addition to this similarity, both holidays reflect the values of religious freedom and liberty. Those of us who have lived in America our whole lives rarely stop to reflect on the miracle of our religious freedom. Rarely, in Jewish history, have we been free to practice and observe our religion in the ways we are today. "Coincidence," said Albert Einstein, "is God's way of remaining anonymous." Thanksgivukkah is far more than a coincidence. It is an opportunity to rethink the meaning of both holidays. We have both the calendar and God to thank for that.

Minyan Musings

FROM BARRY L. LIPPITT, RITUAL DIRECTOR & COORDINATOR, BAR/BAT MITZVAH INSTRUCTION

EACH YEAR PEOPLE MAKE RESOLUTIONS to guide them through the days. I hope that everyone will add one simple resolution to this years' set that will be mutually beneficial to both you and the synagogue: Resolve to attend our daily minyan.

A synagogue has several core missions and values. The most basic is to provide an opportunity for Jews to come together and pray in a minyan (a group of 10). The rabbis have always taught that group prayer is preferred over individual prayer. Joining our daily minyan is the easiest way to provide a service to the synagogue and our community.

In 5773 a number of our "regular" participants experienced changes in their lives which has resulted in fewer congregants able to attend on a daily basis. In the fall and winter, this number dwindles further when many leave Michigan temporarily for warmer climates.

Help us continue our outstanding record of providing a minyan experience (particularly for those who need to sav kaddish) by becoming a regular or semi-regular. Please join us at least one morning each week. Others will benefit and so will you, nourishing your body (with one of Marvin's famous breakfasts) and nourishing your soul.

Speaking of breakfast, we serve breakfast each weekday morning after services (except on holidays and fast days). Continuing this tradition needs the financial support of those who enjoy breaking bread with us, just as do all of our other synagogue-provided services. If you have a yahrzeit or other special occasion, consider sponsoring a breakfast (be sure to call Denise in the office to arrange this at least two days in advance). You can also make the Minyan Breakfast Fund the beneficiary of your regular donations to the synagogue, or just because you enjoy eating with us.

With changes in the composition of our minyan, we always welcome and encourage new service leaders for our services, par-

ticularly at the afternoon minyan. The minyan blog (adatshalomminyan.wordpress.com) has many pages devoted to minyan practices and ritual, and access to recordings that will help you learn the nusach to lead the service. Both Hazzan Gross and I are always happy to meet with congregants who would like to learn these melodies. Leading the service when you are observing vahrzeit or during the 11-month mourning period is a particular mitzvah to perform.

Opportunities are available on November 16 & 23, every Shabbat in December, January 1 & 25, and February 15. Whoever first approaches me will receive the honor.

Finally, for the last time in many, many years, Chanukah will begin over Thanksgiving weekend. Remember our Adat Shalom tradition of inviting our youngest congregants to lead us in lighting the Chanukah candles after our evening services. Join us for Mincha/Ma'ariv services during Chanukah (beginning at 5 p.m. throughout the festival) and bring your children and grandchildren with you. 

THE ISSUE: The year is 70 CE and Jerusalem is under siege by the Romans. Should the Jews surrender?
