FROM THE PRESIDENT, JOAN CHERNOFF EPSTEIN

FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN

I am very lucky that I get to meet so many people. I am always impressed by how many people there are who started with so little in life, whether money or affection or opportunity, and were able to give so much in so many ways.

Greatness can come from surprising and unexpected places. This is one of the deep messages of Shavuot.

On Shavuot we read the Book of Ruth, the first person who was not born Jewish who asked to join the Jewish people. The Torah says that it is forbidden to marry Moabites, because of the disturbing story of Lot and his daughters. Ruth, though, is a Moabite. Her kindness, strength, and compassion overcome any issues of her background. She becomes the direct ancestor of King David and according to tradition, of the messiah, as well.

Rabbi Meir was one of the greatest rabbis of the Talmud. He was a brilliant scholar and a successful and generous business leader, despite his parents being such miserable people we do not even use their names when talking about him.

Our birth is not our destiny. We can recreate ourselves. This is one of the most important teachings of the Torah. We always have an opportunity to be the best version of ourselves.

I think this idea is particularly important on Shavuot. The Giving of Torah is a symbol that God believes we can live happier and better lives, if we wish.

Each one of us has the potential to overcome the things that torment us, the habits that hold us back. It does not matter where we came from, but what we are willing to do every day to live by our better natures.

FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS JEWISH MUSIC LIKE NO OTHER

You may have previously heard me up on my soapbox stating that there is only one type of music that is uniquely "Jewish." Klezmer? Hazzanut? Nope — both of those genres are combinations of various musical styles from different geographic regions and

ethnic backgrounds. What I hypothesize as the only kind of true Jewish music is what we refer to as trope. Also known as cantillation marks, or *ta'amei hamikra* in Hebrew, trope form a unique system of both punctuation and melody.

The system of cantillation was codified by the end of the tenth century by rabbis of the Ben Asher school in Tiberias. These scholars not only devised this system of trope but also created the phonetic symbols that provide the vowel symbols for the Hebrew language. (The Torah has no vowels as the Hebrew language originally developed without them.) The scholars from the Ben Asher school were called Masoretes, *masoret* referring to the transmission of a tradition. The system of vowels and trope was created by the Masoretes in order to aid in the study of the holy texts by standardizing spelling, pronunciation, and cantillation. This is why the text of the Tanach (the books of Torah, Prophets, and Writings) with vowels and trope is frequently referred to as the Masoretic Text.

The Masoretes created over twenty different trope symbols, each one representing a different musical motif (that is, a group of notes which together create a short and distinctive melody). They also created the rules for their usage. Depending on the specific trope symbol, it will be placed either above or below the word. Moreover, the trope's placement within a word is crucial because it denotes where the word should be accented — certain Hebrew words can change meaning depending on which syllable is accented. The combination of various trope symbols together aid in understanding the grammatical structure of the text.

In modern Ashkenazic Jewish practice, there are six different cantillation styles. It is important to note that the trope symbols remain the same regardless of the style being chanted. The two most common cantillation styles are Torah and Haftarah, which are heard on a weekly basis. The four other cantillation styles are used on 1) the High Holidays for the Torah readings, 2) the Three Festivals for the specific books/megillot that are used (Ecclesiastes/Kohelet on Sukkot; Song of Songs/Shir Hashirim on Pesach; and the Book of Ruth/Megillat Ruth on Shavuot), 3) Tisha B'Av for the Book of Lamentations/Eicha, and 4) Purim for the Book of Esther/Megillat Esther.

The differentiation of the trope styles is a beautiful way to highlight the different holidays by giving them a unique and special sound that is associated with the holiday-specific readings. The next chance to hear one of these special "uniquely Jewish" trope styles will be during Shavuot morning services on May 17, when we have several of our very talented congregants chant excerpts from the Book of Ruth. Please plan to join us!

DIRECTOR OF SPIRITUALITY AND OUTREACH

I read an article about what I can do for 20 minutes a day that will make my life better in 30 days. There were a variety of answers including - stop being so myopic and quit looking for a quick fix! Here's one written by author Doug Armey:

Gratitude. When you get up in the morning you have two choices. Do you start your day positively or negatively? If the first thing you do is listen to or read the news you're going to be depressed. It's all bad, all the time. Instead, while you're getting ready, give thanks for every blessing you have. But warn people. Your new attitude will shock them. He concludes by saying - "A great life isn't built by doing great things. Just ordinary things greatly."

Which is a great segue to my *Voice* article - how does one go about writing an article when it feels like you are basically living in the movie *Groundhog's Day?* I log on to Zoom services 10 minutes before the morning service and 10 minutes before the afternoon/evening service. 20 minutes of my day - every day - for the past year...

Next I Google - "what can you do in 10 minutes" and have found a lot of suggestions including (but not limited to): unload the dishwasher, fold one load of laundry, put away one load of folded laundry, vacuum our main living area, clear off/declutter your desk, call and make an appointment, sort through the mail, make your bed, write down friends and family member birthdays for the year in my planner, shower and get ready, respond to several email, write several thank-you notes, brainstorm blog post ideas, call a friend (a short talk is better than no talk!), make a shopping list, purchase needed items online.

Here's what I do for those 10 minutes before services - I play music (except on Shabbat - always Jewish and usually thematic - relating to our liturgy) - the music is played softly so those entering our Zoom community can talk and catch up - like our fixed liturgy - we have our 'go to' conversation starters - sharing the weather in Michigan, Florida, New York, and Toronto, where we are in the process of obtaining our vaccines, how much longer till we gather again in the synagogue - then just catching up - just being together - whether our cameras are on or off - some even communicate with the symbols Zoom provides to us so people know we are present (Charlotte - we see you and so appreciate you!). I am sure I could find more productive ways to spend 10 minutes - but I am positive that I don't want to - and I am so grateful to those who find (no - MAKE) the time to help ensure we have a minyan on Zoom!

Oh, and if you are looking for a great way to spend 20 minutes a day (that I believe will truly make your life better) - log on at exactly 6:00 PM for minchah/maariv and One Minute Of Fun (FOMO backward) by 6:20ish you can get back to whatever "it" is - or please stay on for another 2 minutes if you're not in a rush...

In addition to having the chance to work alongside world-class colleagues and committed lay leaders, as someone who thrives on being in meaningful relationship with others, I'm excited to connect (and in some cases, reconnect) deeply with those who make up the Adat Shalom family.

There are three core Jewish teachings that I hope to model day in and day out as your rabbi:

- * In Bereshit (18:2), we learn of our patriarch Abraham's devotion to welcoming guests, to the point where he actually runs out of his tent (while God was visiting him to pay a Bikur Cholim visit 3 days after Abraham's adult circumcision no less!) in order to greet strangers passing by. You can always count on me to bring intention to creating welcoming environments, with a willingness to run out in order to connect with and meet people wherever they are
- * R' Shammai teaches in Pirkei Avot (1:15) that we should receive all people with a cheerful countenance. You will always be able to count on me greeting you with a smile!
- * In Kohelet (3:1), we read that "To everything there is a season; and a time for every purpose under heaven." In moments of extreme joy, intense sorrow, and every time in between, you can count on me to show up being there to celebrate, mourn, and to walk through this life together.

It is with these teachings in mind and in heart that I look forward to serving and growing with the Adat Shalom community!







As this crazy school year comes to a close, I'm optimistic about what next year's learning will look like. We are planning for a hybrid approach: in person classes following CDC guidelines on Sunday mornings (PK-6) and Monday evenings (7-12), and online learning midweek for grades 2-7. In order to keep children in smaller groups as much as possible and reduce transmission risk, we will be maintaining our individualized Hebrew program, allowing families to choose the times and days that work best for their children. We are also excited to continue with *chuggim* (electives) for children, which will take place online during the week. These extra opportunities to connect and grow are so important! Pedagogy of Partnership Midwest Fellowship

I've had the pleasure of learning with the Pedagogy of Partnership program this year, and look forward to continuing to do so in 2021-2022 as well. Among the things we have learned are some conversation prompts that help us learn together. What's so interesting, though, is that these conversation prompts are proving crucial to re-teach social skills to teens and upper elementary students (and, perhaps, to adults too!).

After over a year in relative isolation, many of our students are having trouble articulating their thoughts, listening to others, and responding appropriately. We all struggle sometimes to have ourselves heard - and how often do we walk away from a conversation wondering if it went according to plan? Something as simple as "tell me more about what you mean" or "I want to build on what you just said" can be the difference between a worthwhile conversation and a diatribe or monologue. "Is there another way to understand that" is much more effective than "No, you're wrong!" or "Okay, whatever!" These skills are taught, through text study and conversational practice, during our weekly Nosh & Drash sessions; next year, they will become a more formal part of our upper elementary classes as well.




As the youth engagement programming season is concluding and before I start working with our dedicated team of youth leaders to plan next year's calendar of community building and fun events, it is my pleasure to share a few highlights from this year.

The kids had a blast laughing, exploring, and being part of our caring community. They had fun stretching their bodies and making a name art project during "Move n' Groove" in partnership with PJ Library and JFamily. They also had a blast creating one of a kind desserts during "Kids Take Over the Kitchen" co-led by Sam Vieder.

By design, our teen engagement program is an a la carte menu of opportunities for teens to engage, connect, and learn with other teens, and develop meaningful relationships. Teens made a difference during their involvement in the Teen Volunteer Corps. They also enriched their minds during Nosh n' Drash. Shavuot is one of the three festival holidays which focuses on the spring grain harvest and our receiving of the Torah. We traditionally celebrate this holiday by reading the book of Ruth, studying all night, and eating dairy. An added custom is to elaborately decorate spaces with flowers. If you are looking for an easy and delicious cheesecake recipe do a Google search for "King Arthur Baking Easy Cheesecake". For family fun, make it in a cupcake pan and each family member can make their own flavors (raspberry swirl, sprinkles, lemon...just a few ideas).

Want to keep the kids busy? Try making craft stick flowers.

What you need: craft sticks (regular or jumbo, any color*), liquid glue, jewel or stone or button

*Paint or markers can be used on plain craft sticks

- 1. Take 4-6 craft sticks regular or jumbo sized
- 2. Lay one stick on a table and put a dab of glue in the center
- 3. Place a stick on top of the first so it resembles a wide X
- 4. Place another dab of glue in the center and lay another stick across the middle of the X
- 5. Continue gluing on 1-3 more sticks so that the joined sticks look like a full flower
- 6. Place a dab of glue on the top stick and stick a button or jewel on top.
- 7. Continue until you have made as many flowers as you like
- 8. Once dry attach a green stick to the back of the flower for the stem


Our 6th grade students participating in the Better Together program were invited to compete in the Better 2 Write essay-writing contest.

On the first gorgeous day of spring, a handful of Nosh & Drash students, along with our Shinshinit Noa Lumbroso, joined Dr. Melissa Ser in her backyard for a discussion about Passover and some informal socializing. This was the first in-person gathering in over a year, and it was truly wonderful to see friends so genuinely happy to be together. It's not easy to return to any in-person gathering, even outdoors and with masks on! We are supposed to see ourselves as if we were slaves in Egypt - and as if we were freed from slavery. This year, we shared a profound observation about what it must have felt like for the former slaves to suddenly not know what they were supposed to do each day. The transition from slavery to freedom must have been as frightening as it was liberating. As teens reflected on the transition from total lockdown to gradual easing of restrictions (on the way toward full freedom), they shared that it's much easier when things are clear-cut than when you have some leniencies.





Rabbi Nosanwisch is passionate about building loving and nourishing communities through care, prayer, Torah, and food. She is committed to re-imagining how kashrut operates beyond industrialized food systems, and how God operates in our lives. She is excited to bring her caregiving skills and her creativity to Adat Shalom. Rabbi Nosanwisch hopes to ask big questions about the world and how we live in it as humans and as Jews, and to foster a sense that we are responsible for ourselves and for each other.

Lighthouse South Oakland Shelter - Housing the Homeless Sunday, June 20 - June 27

Kaddish During COVID-19

My beloved father's passing from COVID-19 on April 24, 2020 during the stay at home order was a nightmare. It would have been a nightmare whenever he passed but these circumstances certainly made it worse.

My heart is broken. Will it ever heal? I can't stop crying.

Ten people allowed at the cemetery all in masks and social distanced. Ten people who do not include my children or siblings. They live out of town and it is too dangerous to travel during COVID. They are watching the funeral on livestream as is everyone else.

It is surreal. I can't stop crying.

I am grateful for my husband who is by my side, my niece, my cousins, and my wonderful clergy.

On the way home from the cemetery, my husband says, "That was crazy."

"The funeral?" I ask, "Or did you see something on the road just now?"

"The funeral," he says.

Brunch is waiting on our porch from friends when we return and we begin a week of shiva. Just the two of us and our dog. We have virtual shiva visits via Facetime and phone calls and I am grateful. Dinner is delivered every day by family and friends. I don't believe I have ever felt so grateful for food in my life.

The morning after the funeral, I click on the link to Adat Shalom's ZOOMinyan and there you all are—my beloved minyan family. There you all are in your Zoom windows offering me words of condolence. There you all are just as you were for me and my father in our synagogue chapel when my beloved mother passed. There you all are and we begin again. Eleven months less one day. The only thing missing for me is your hugs.

I turn my kitchen into shul twice a day to say Kaddish with my minyan family and it soon becomes a new normal. We are able to be together virtually to daven and to allow mourners to say Kaddish. I am so grateful to be part of this community. I need to be part of this community. My reasons for saying Kaddish now are the same as they were when I said Kaddish for my mother. It is my responsibility as a child, it gives honor and memory to my father's name, and it is part of my own personal therapy. And when the heart slowly, slowly begins to heal, it allows you to be a light to other people as well. I hold these reasons to still be truth. Even on Zoom.

There will be a time when we can gather in person again. Until then, our community will continue to meet like this every day, twice a day, and we will continue to support each other during these challenging times.
