FROM THE PRESIDENT, JOAN CHERNOFF EPSTEIN

A few weeks ago, my family—including my husband, children and grandchildren—all gathered in Connecticut to celebrate my grandson's birthday weekend. Following our Shabbat meal, our son Brandon brought out a family game for all to participate. It had cards with a series of questions for all to reply to. After

we had answered several questions, the final one was, "If you were an ice cream flavor, what would you be?" My first inclination was to say vanilla, but it only took a moment to realize that wasn't the case at all.... I thought that vanilla with a chocolate swirl represented me better! Not everything has a clear answer, not everything is as simple as black and white. My ice cream is a blend of opposing elements, but in such a way as to preserve their individual parts. You get different versions when you blend things in different ways, and in life, when you blend different people, ideas, or cultures, you get many different and enriching results. As you blend things, you get a different perspective of things— and isn't that what we've been doing over the last two years?

I cannot believe how quickly two years of serving as your president have flown by. When I began, it seemed like my duties were well outlined, and I inherited a synagogue in good order. My responsibilities appeared as clear as black and white. But then, with the addition of different ingredients, boy did things get mixed up! We were thrust into a time where we didn't know what tomorrow would bring, or even what we were doing today. There were no guidelines or rulebooks to follow to know how things should be done or handled. It felt like we were all in the Dairy Queen Blizzard machine, with all kinds of bits and pieces thrown into the mix. The complexity and intensity of the challenges we have faced together over these two years never could have been anticipated. There were many changes to our lives: there was fear and anxiety; there was confusion, loneliness, and uncertainty. But we prevailed through it all, while learning new ways to communicate and connect. We have grown stronger as a synagogue, and our community is thriving.

Much of our success is due to the foresight, calmness and steady hand of Rabbi Bergman's leadership. He constantly motivates, inspires and enhances all of us. Just recently he spoke at the bat mitzvah of a young girl, Eliana, whose family fled Belarus, where they did not have the freedom to practice Judaism. And the day before her bat mitzvah, Adat Shalom received an ugly threat. This coincidence was not lost on Rabbi Bergman. Fortunately, the threat was just a phone call without substance, and the synagogue was deemed safe after a thorough inspection. Such things remind us of our vulnerability, at the same time as we are uplifted by Eliana's family. They endured much to come here, requiring great strength and perseverance to be able to practice their faith openly. We are a resilient and welcoming community that can handle the changes and challenges put before us. We all want there to be certainty in our lives, but we know things can change in a second. As I write this a month before it will be published, the news of the war on Ukraine brings more uncertainty. At this time, we don't know when, or how, the conflict will end, but we do all we can to support Ukraine and its people. We are inspired by the strength and courage shown by President Zelenskyy.

Some happier changes we have seen lately include being able to return to worship in person; to have a Purim party again and share delicious hamantaschen together; to hold a joyful Daddy Daughter Dance; and to attend Shabbat Shalom Hey on Friday mornings.

FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN

We all know there are holidays, Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, that we ask each other and God for forgiveness. What moves and amazes me, though, is that there is also a holiday that God asks us for forgiveness. Shavuot, the time of the giving of the Torah, is when God acknowledges that the world that was created

is an absolute chaotic mess and can only be fixed by us.

Let me give you the context of Shavuot. It is the only holiday that does not have its own date. It is effectively the 50th day of the counting of the Omer, which begins at the second Pesach seder.

Rabbi Nachman of Breslov says that the first 49 days of the counting of the Omer are about our repenting, our *teshuva*. Day 50 of the Omer is God repenting.

He has an extraordinary approach to a verse from the prophet Malachi who says, "From the very days of your ancestors you have turned away from My laws and have not observed them. Turn back to Me, and I will turn back to you—said the LORD of Hosts."

Rabbi Nachman wrote, "The person who would like to merit teshuva (repentance) should say *Tehillim* (Psalms) regularly, for Tehillim enabalizes teshuva. There are 50 gates of teshuva and every person is able to enter 49 of these gates and to grasp them; however the 50th gate is the idea of "God's personal teshuva. "Because also by God we find an aspect of teshuva, as it is written, "Return to Me and I will return to you."

The Omer is a daily reminder that we suffered horribly in Egypt and even though God eventually took us out, the suffering was real and painful and emotionally damaging.

Matan Torah, the giving of Torah, is a form of God's repentance. It is an admission that God needs us to keep the world from falling into chaos. Yet Matan Torah is not just the giving, but the gift itself, the *matanah*, to help heal the relationship between God and humanity.

The world feels chaotic and challenging in every way. Shavuot tells us that we are not always the cause of suffering, but we can be the cure, we can be the ones who help take away some of the world's pain when we work with each other in helping to fix the divine mess that is our lives.

God gave us the gift of Torah, but also the gift of admitting that even God needs help. Let us be that help. Find a cause that matters to you and work at it. You won't solve it, but you might just be the person who makes a world of difference.

FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS Bows and Arrows

In Jewish tradition, there are many well-known pairings. To name a few, there are the lulav and etrog, apples and honey, challah and wine, matzah and maror, and gefilte fish and horseradish. Did you know that the bow and arrow is also a significant duo connected to Lag BaOmer? The association of a weapon with a

holiday seems quite odd. Like most customs in Judaism, various reasons have been proffered in explanation. I will focus on two of the primary traditional explanations behind this intriguing connection.

According to kabbalistic tradition, Lag BaOmer celebrates the yahrzeit of the venerated 2nd century Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai, known as "the Rashbi." Rashbi was a Mishnaic sage whose kabbalistic teachings are said to form the foundation of the Zohar. On Lag BaOmer it is customary for many thousands of people to make a pilgrimage to Rashbi's burial place in Meron, Israel, and to celebrate the occasion with bonfires and feasts. There is a midrash that claims that no rainbows appeared during the Rashbi's life. The Hebrew word for rainbow and an archer's bow is one and the same — *keshet*. Therefore, in celebration of the great sage's life and to make up for the lack of rainbows, children are given toy bows and arrows to play with.

Rashbi was a leading disciple of the exalted teacher, Rabbi Akiva, who himself is connected to a second traditional explanation linking Lag BaOmer to the bow and arrow. During the 2nd century there was a great plague that was said to have taken the lives of 24,000 of Rabbi Akiva's disciples. The plague allegedly ended on the 33rd day of the Omer. In a semi-historical sidenote, an interesting if somewhat unsupported 19th century hypothesis suggested that the word "plague" was not a mysterious illness but rather a veiled allusion to the Roman rule over Judea. Akiva's thousands of disciple "soldiers" may have been killed during the 2nd century period of the Bar Kochba revolt against the Romans. The end of the "plague" on Lag BaOmer may have coincided with a brief period of victory for Rabbi Bar Kochba, after which the revolt was finally crushed. The bow and arrow usage on Lag BaOmer is symbolic of the weaponry that would have been utilized during the revolt.

In the Middle Ages, Lag BaOmer became a special holiday for students and it took on the nickname "Scholars' Day," a day of rejoicing and celebrating by playing outdoor sports. This depiction of the holiday is the one most familiar to us in modern times. Regardless of how you personally connect to Lag BaOmer and whether or not you were aware of the bow and arrow connection, participating in outdoor activities provides a tangible family-friendly way to observe a rather mystifying holiday. I like to think of the bow and arrow not with regard to ancient warfare but as it connects to modern-day sports (including archery!) and the positive aspects of this springtime holiday.

This year, Lag BaOmer begins the night of Wednesday, May 18, and ends the following evening, May 19. May you find inspiration and joy in celebrating Lag BaOmer!





FROM RABBI DANIEL S. HORWITZ



Of all the ways one could mark a Jewish holiday, eating dairy foods – as we do on Shavuot – is not usually what comes to mind. Generally, we associate Jewish holidays with meat eating! Think about the Rosh Hashanah brisket. The chicken soup for Shabbat. The kreplach for Purim. (That's a real thing by the way! Esther

had a secret that she was Jewish that she kept inside, just like kreplach has a secret filling inside. Others say that the Purim miracle was hidden, just like kreplach's filling is hidden. Heaven forbid we should ever agree on anything!).

The Torah states that we shall rejoice in our festivals (Deut. 16:14), and there is a Talmudic teaching that says that there is no joy without meat (Bab. Tal. Pesachim 109a). So, for many traditional Jews, meat is considered a requirement as part of any holiday, Shabbat or lifecycle feast!

So, why on Shavuot do we traditionally eat dairy foods? After all, Shavuot is one of our major holidays! Is it some sort of cruel joke? After all, according to a report in Haaretz a handful of years ago, a full 75% of Jews of Ashkenazi descent are lactose intolerant! Is there something more to it?

Just as with kreplach above, there are a number of answers that address this question, and we're going to have the chance to explore many of them together on Tuesday evening May 24th, while also getting to sample and learn about a number of luxury kosher cheeses courtesy of cheesemonger extraordinaire Zach Berg of Mongers' Provisions. It will be an excellent way to get in the mood for the Shavuot holiday which begins just over a week later, and I hope you'll join me!

FROM RABBI BLAIR NOSANWISCH DIRECTOR OF SPIRITUAL CARE

On the second day of Pesach, we begin a process called "Sefirat HaOmer" meaning "Counting the Omer." The Omer was a barley offering that was made in the Temple on the second day of Pesach. The Torah commands that after the Omer is offered, we count 49 days

(7 cycles of 7) until Shavuot, when we offer wheat.

This process, now metaphorical, was once an actual wait for the wheat crop to ripen. Barley was the crop for livestock, but wheat was prized for our own direct human consumption. So while Pesach marked the beginning of the first harvest, the barley harvest, it is 50 days later on Shavuot that we begin to enjoy the fruits of our labors in the first wheat harvest of the year.

The wisdom of our tradition lies in knowing that all transformations and transitions are a process.

What we initiated with Pesach is the intention to be free, but it is through the hard work of counting the Omer, of confronting our fears, anxieties, and uncertainties, that we can really emerge 50 days later ready to receive. At Shavuot we celebrate the communal experience of standing at Mt. Sinai together to receive the Torah.

I have been thinking about this teaching as Adat Shalom transitions from our mask mandate to a "mask optional" community. We have each had our own unique experience of this pandemic and, no doubt, we have each had many changing opinions and experiences through the last 2+ years of pandemic life. But change, no matter how much we are open to it, is hard.

The journey from the relative freedom of Pesach to the embodied freedom of Shavuot is unique to each human who lives it. For anyone who is finding themselves struggling with the question of how, or whether, to come back to shul in person because of the pandemic, please consider letting one of our clergy or staff know. We would love to talk to you and support you in your own journey. We have in our tradition the idea that *Kol Yisrael arevim zeh bazeh* (Talmud Bavli, Shavuot 39a) meaning that all Jewish people are responsible for one another. We have spent the pandemic keeping ourselves and one another safe by keeping our distance. What could it look like to draw close together again in ways that honor each of

our needs for safety and security?

I hope we will have the opportunity to stand together at Mt. Sinai this Shavuot.

FROM MICHAEL WOLF EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Our exodus from Egypt made us physically free, but our spiritual freedom takes place at Sinai - when we receive the Torah - on Shavuot. We learn in Pirkei Avot (6:2) "Only someone involved with Torah is free."

We can pray on our own, and there are many *mitzvot* we can perform individually, but the true essence of Torah, of freedom, is when we join together to celebrate Torah and *mitzvot*. This is why we pray with a minyan. This is why we celebrate the holidays (*chagim*) as a community. This is why we give *tzedekah* collectively, to a communal campaign. When we do so, we give life to Torah. We celebrate our freedom by choice. The choices we make individually and collectively to connect with Torah and *mitzvot*, to actively participate in the life of synagogue and community, are what feed our souls. The more we do so, the louder our soul speaks to us.

I want to take this opportunity to thank you for choosing Adat Shalom – we very much appreciate your support – especially during the past two years (plus).

Zoom has kept us together and extended our community to reach people all over North America, Israel, and even Mexico! We will continue to use Zoom to learn together safely (it's pretty awesome to learn together from home in the winter whether from MI or FL) – but we are grateful to be able to welcome everyone back into our building for services and programming. We look forward to many opportunities to meet outdoors during the summer as well.



Let's talk about kugel. We all know and love kugel and you probably have your favorite variation: dairy, sweet, savory. But have you ever wondered about the history of kugel? I think about food origins probably more than I should. Thankfully, there's already a lot of research compiled on the subject and My Jewish Learning and the Nosher have a lot to share with us. In Yiddish, kugel translates into "sphere" referring to when dough was added into cholents and stews and then, later, on top of the stew. Now, the kugel is cooked completely on its own and is reminiscent of a bread pudding. The noodles are soaked in an eggy custard and can be sweet or savory. (https://www.myjewishlearning.com/the-nosher/what-is-kugel/).

What type of kugel does your family like? Is there something divisive (raisins!)? Should you have a kugel cook-off and answer these questions once and for all? I certainly don't think we will ever come to a consensus on what is the best kugel but we can explore different options together. What's your family's go-to kugel? Want to organize a kugel swap? I'll talk kugel or any type of food any day.

I believe that cooking helps us connect to each other and our intricate traditions. It's a great way to engage the whole family and talk about family history (especially if you have a family recipe!). I know for Shavuot this year, I'll be cooking my favorite dairy kugel with my son. My favorite recipe happens to come from my friend's Nana and is the most perfectly creamy, cheesy, and sweet kugel ever. Bonusthere are no raisins (but you could add them if you were so inclined)! This recipe comes together perfectly every time and is, in my opinion, the best.

Nana's Noodle Kugel

This recipe is shared with permission from the Banks/Lynn Family.

16 oz large egg noodles 2 cups small curd cottage cheese

1 teaspoon salt 4 eggs ½ cup milk 2 tablespoons sugar 3/4 cup sour cream 1 bag butterscotch chips

Preheat oven to 350. Boil noodles until tender. Mix everything except the butterscotch together. Butter pyrex. Add noodle mixture. Sprinkle top with butterscotch chips. Cover with foil. Bake for 1 hour. Uncover for the last few minutes so top gets melted.
