FROM THE PRESIDENT, JOYCE BERLIN WEINGARTEN

I watch thirty minutes of world news almost daily. For some time I have found it distressing on so many levels that I find myself wondering why I continue watching. The newspaper is equally upsetting but it is important to know what is going on in the world. This has led me to wonder what kind of world I want for my children,

grandchildren, and all current and future generations.

I have been reading articles about core Jewish values. I find these values a way of life that, if practiced by people of all denominations, could make our world a better place. Tikkun Olam, repairing the world, has become an important phrase exemplifying social justice and caring for others. It is not enough to study or pray for Tikkun Olam; it requires action and empowers us to bring healing to a world that is currently facing so much turbulence. Think about the brave men and women who join the Peace Corps or Doctors Without Borders. These people are extending themselves in a heroic capacity. We do not have to do something global to perform Tikkun Olam. We can help make the world a better place by extending ourselves in our own communities.

Tzedakah is generally known as meaning charity but the literal meaning of tzedakah is "righteous behavior" or "justice." Tzedakah is not just about writing a check; there are requirements and expectations that involve taking action. Biblical laws require farmers to leave some of their harvest for those who are hungry. Today, the Hebrew Free Loan organization and Jewish Family Service help many people improve their lives. Yad Ezra, our local Jewish food bank, helps people who are experiencing food insecurity while at the same time maintaining their dignity and confidentiality.

Chesed, loving-kindness, is a core value in Judaism and mentioned in the Torah many times. Chesed is an action; it is about supporting someone who is in need. Chesed empowers us to respect the uniqueness and diversity in others. Our world is desperate for Chesed and there are many ways to act. Evva Hepner, our Social Action chairperson, initiated Adat Shalom's participation in collecting items for SHARE Ukraine, a subsidiary of SHARE Detroit. We are collecting new warm socks and underwear which will be shipped to Ukraine. You can also make a contribution of \$18.00 through the synagogue that will be directed to this project.

I invited Dr. Melissa Ser, Director of Education, and Jodi Gross, Director of Adult Learning and Youth Engagement, to speak at our November Board of Trustees meeting. They reported on how Adat Shalom's educational programming cultivates development of Jewish knowledge and values for youth in pre-kindergarten through high school. We have many inspiring classes for adults to learn more about Judaism and socialize together. There are opportunities to practice Tikkun Olam, Tzedakah, and Chesed, such as Volunteer Day on Sunday, January 15 from 10:30 a.m. -12 p.m. at Adat Shalom. There are many organizations in our community who will benefit from our efforts. Please contact Melissa and Jodi to find out how you can participate.

What kind of world do I want for future generations? One that includes Tikkun Olam, Tzedakah, and Chesed as a way of life for everyone.

FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN

I visited the kindergarten class recently, expecting to read a couple of stories, and instead found myself in a graduate level seminar in theology. The teacher asked me if I could answer a question or two before reading the story. Unsuspecting the depth of their questions I, of course, said yes. They asked,

"Who created God and what was there before God existed?" I answered them the best I could, but they all kind of looked at me with great compassion and patience, knowing that I did not really know. I did, at least, tell them, that their opinions about God were just as good as mine, and that I don't know anything more about God than they do, just more what other people have said and written about God.

There was one question that I did try to answer, and that was "Why is God invisible?" I told them I thought it was so nobody could say that some people were created in God's image, and some were not. No one can say only some kinds of people are loved and celebrated and other kinds are not. God loves each person for exactly who they are. A person can be surprising, but they cannot be a mistake.

On Tu B'Shvat we celebrate the infinite variety of creation, not just the trees and plants, but people, too. The Kabbalists, the Jewish mystics, of Tzfat created a Tu B'Shvat seder that celebrated different kinds of people. They used fruit as a metaphor. There are many, many different kinds of fruits, all with different colors, tastes and shapes. Bananas, almonds and cactus, which are inedible and even hard on the outside, but sweet in the middle symbolized people who were maybe closed off or defensive or just plain ornery but were sweet on the inside. Apricots, which are sweet on the outside, but have a hard interior, symbolize people who are very kind, but maybe had a difficult life, but face things the best they can. Grapes are sweet inside and out. Some people have been blessed with lovely dispositions, but we also need to make sure to not take advantage of them. Each kind of person is necessary to make our perfectly imperfect communities.

Jim Henson said, "The attitude you have as a parent is what your kids will learn from more than what you tell them. They don't remember what you try to teach them. They remember what you are."

God created all of us differently so we would find joy in each other's differences, knowing that each person represents a different aspect of God. We have to make sure the children and young people in our lives know that this is a deep value of ours.

Let's find sweetness in each other and in ourselves and rejoice in all of creation.

Kabbalat Shabbat

Kabbalat Shabbat is a beautiful and unique service that occurs at the very beginning of Shabbat on Friday evenings. Kabbalat Shabbat is a relatively new service in the context of Jewish prayer. It was compiled in the 16th century in the small town of Tzfat (Safed in English), located in the mountains of Galilee in northern Israel, and a center of Kabbalah, Jewish mysticism. The service was created in order to have a consistent ritual and, therefore, a sacred way of formally ushering in Shabbat.

Kabbalat Shabbat means “the receiving of Shabbat” and its simple structure consists of psalms and piyyutim (liturgical poems). The opening piyyut, *Yedid Nefesh*, is a love poem to God. It is followed by six psalms. Psalms 95 through 99 correspond to the first five days of the week, Sunday through Thursday. Psalm 29 follows, representing Friday, for which we rise in anticipation of Shabbat. Following the six psalms is the well-known piyyut *Lecha Dodi* in which Shabbat is equated to a bride and we (the congregation) represent the groom; thus, we welcome the Sabbath bride (also referred to as the Sabbath queen) with the same excitement and anticipation as at a wedding, turning to face the approaching bride. Following *Lecha Dodi* are the two psalms that correspond to Shabbat, Psalms 92 and 93. There are numerous things that occur in duplicate on Shabbat (e.g., two candles, two challahs, the additional service (Musaf), and receiving a *neshama yetera* - an “additional soul”) and, therefore, we designate two psalms to represent Shabbat. The Kabbalat Shabbat service then concludes with Mourner’s Kaddish and is followed by the separate evening service, Maariv.

Kabbalat Shabbat is an uplifting service as the majority of it is sung out loud together with upbeat and catchy melodies. If you have never experienced a Friday night service, I highly encourage you to do so. On January 6, the first Friday of 2023, we have planned a special “Shabbat Rocks” service in which I will be joined by the rabbis and others in harmony. Please come and add your voice as we welcome Shabbat together!



In December we enjoyed a Shabbat dinner followed by Shabbat Rocks, our Kabbalat Shabbat service. Join us the first Friday night of each month as we rock Shabbat together.



FROM RABBI DANIEL S. HORWITZ

I’m going to start this column with a bold statement, and hope that you can forgive me for being so blunt:

Challah is delicious.

Truly. No joke. Whoever the first person was to say, “You know what would make this bread even better? An egg wash!” deserves all the dollars. Pure genius!

And in these cold winter months, where carbo-loading comes naturally, what better way is there to indulge than with Challah? Plain, with margarine or cream cheese or peanut butter, in French Toast or bread pudding or stuffing form, you really can’t go wrong. (Did I mention the chocolate chip variety?)

Now that I have your (and your stomach’s) attention, here are a few Challah fun facts you might not have known:

Why Do We Bless 2 Challahs on Shabbat?

Traditionally, the Friday night Shabbat meal begins with two complete loaves of challah bread. This “double loaf” is meant to remind us of the fact that when the children of Israel wandered in the desert for 40 years post-Exodus from Egypt, manna did not fall from the heavens on Shabbat. Rather, a double portion would fall on Fridays to cover both Friday and Saturday – hence, on Friday night we bless 2 loaves!

Where Does the Name “Challah” Come From?

The name “Challah” come from the Hebrew word meaning “portion.” There is a Biblical instruction that says: “Of the first of your dough, you shall give unto God a portion (‘Challah’), as a gift throughout your generations.” (Numbers 15:21) As a result, following Rashi’s interpretation, Jews were instructed to separate 1/24 of their dough and give it to the ancient priests, with this designated portion being referred to as “Challah.” It wasn’t until the late 1400s that a Jewish text describes Shabbat loaves of bread as “Challah,” and the custom of braiding loaves begins!

Speaking of Braids... How Many Strands Should I Braid?

There are different customs when it comes to braiding Challah, with no associated halachic (Jewish legal) requirements. So, we can get creative! Some have ascribed symbolic meanings to different numbers of strands.

For example:

Three strands = truth, peace and justice.

Six strands = the unity in Shabbat of disparate parts (6 days of the week).

Twelve strands = the 12 ancient tribes of Israel.

Most importantly, bread in general (including Challah) is a beautiful symbol of the partnership between God and humankind. Bread doesn’t grow from the ground in its finished form. Grain does. It takes human hands to cultivate that grain into bread, using the 4 core natural elements: earth (where the grain grows), water (mixed with flour to make dough), wind (kneading air into the dough), and fire (to bake it).

So, in these dark cold months, however you choose to consume your Challah, I pray that your braids are plentiful, and that our appreciation for how spiritually profound something as simple as egg-washed bread can be only continues to grow.



FROM RABBI BLAIR NOSANWISCH
**"MORE THAN JEWS HAVE KEPT SHABBAT,
 SHABBAT HAS KEPT THE JEWS."**

This statement from Ahad Ha'am, pre-state Zionist thinker and cultural Zionist, captures an experience that I have lived in my own life. I didn't grow up keeping Shabbat. In my family of origin, Saturday was Saturday, largely indistinguishable from any other day of the week. In my early twenties, I became involved in a Conservative synagogue, the Isaac Agree Downtown Synagogue, where I started attending services every Friday night.

At first, I attended the services because I loved the singing. At the conclusion of the service, I would rush out of the sanctuary and find a corner hidden from view. There I would eagerly text my friends in hopes of finding something more fun than eating dinner with the Friday night regulars. Returning to the same place and people on a weekly basis was a very different rhythm from how I had lived the first 23 years of my life. I was used to feeling pulled in many directions and had learned to always try to maximize my time to be ever more productive and ever more connected.

Then one Friday it occurred to me that my Jewish tradition was pushing back on this habit of "always searching for something more." Shabbat was an invitation to learn how to be present and to become accustomed to appreciating what we have in real time. Shabbat was not just a time of boundaries and arbitrary rules; those rules were created in order to liberate me from the feeling of needing to be productive all day, every day.

I started to take on some small Shabbat observances. At first, only a little bit. I would turn off my phone exclusively on Friday nights, or ride my bike, instead of driving, to do my Saturday morning Eastern Market shopping. These small changes started to change me in turn, and I became enamored of the subtle way that Jewish living was working on my soul. It wasn't the spiritual journey of a typical 23-year-old in 2013. There was no yoga involved, no meditation, no wellness retreats, not even an explicit call to spirituality. But the effect for me was profound. The more I kept Shabbat, Shabbat kept me.

These days, I keep Shabbat in the community of Adat Shalom. The music of the sanctuary, the hum of Torah study in the chapel, the shrieks, and shouts of MiniMinyan, and the Shabbat Shalom of Soulful Yoga. These are all spaces that hold the magic of Shabbat for all those spiritual seekers looking to connect more deeply — both to themselves and to the Jewish people.

In *The Joys and Oys of Parenting*, we learn that the routines we set with our children (and ourselves) create a sense of comfort. When things interrupt the predictable nature of our lives (think COVID-19), it's harder for us to feel a sense of comfort. "Ultimately," the authors suggest, "routines are about how we use our time... Jewish traditions give us guidance about how we can create predictability, sanctify the passage of time through Shabbat, and establish memorable traditions" (p. 41). As you read the following excerpts, think about how you can implement rituals to help your household run on Jewish time:

A child's sense of identity (and thus their self-esteem) develops early in life, and what goes on at home makes a deep early impression. Keep in mind that celebrating Shabbat does not need to be "all or nothing" and can be tailored to our own families and lives. The purpose is to connect us to each other and to our heritage.

The purpose of Shabbat is to take a break and focus on the blessings of what we have. We set aside one day – from sunset on Friday to sunset on Saturday – to enjoy our Jewish heritage and traditions. Hopefully, this is always a day our children cherish and in which they eagerly participate. For that to happen, Shabbat should feel special. Here are some traditional Jewish ideas that can be used in or adapted for your own home.

- Light candles
- Have a Shabbat meal together
- Keep it "doable"
- Give children ownership of the day
- Be patient
- Introduce a special Shabbat activity for Saturday afternoon

Shabbat does not need to be a major production or become such an exhausting routine that there's no joy in it. That isn't sustainable, and it will not create the predictability and positive memories we want to instill. A Shabbat celebration looks very different for families with young children than it does for a family with teenagers. Do what works for you. If it's hard for young children to sit through an entire Shabbat meal, let them leave the table.

Shabbat is a privilege, a treasure, a journey. It offers us at least one moment, one meal, one day a week for intimate family connection. Each family member can understand who he or she is and the joy that family provides. Shabbat also produces a sense of community with other Jews and lets our children feel connected to friends who are practicing the same thing.

By sharing Shabbat with our children, we let them know, in a way that goes beyond words, that there are some things more important than our own personal comfort zones (like singing out loud in front of people), while celebrating who we are and where we come from.

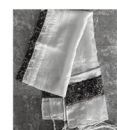

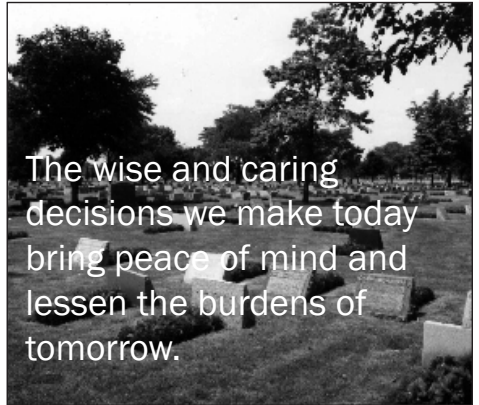

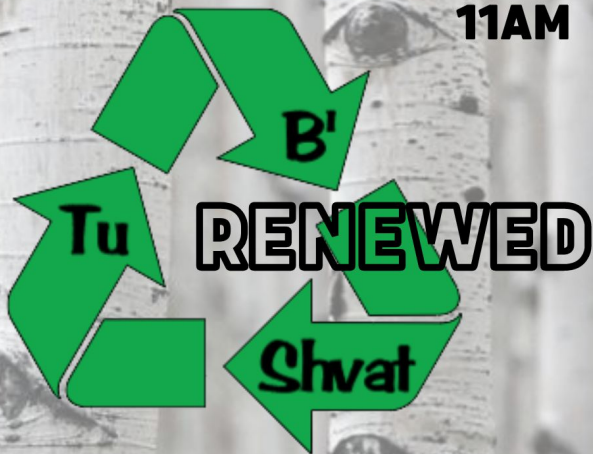
