# FROM HAZZAN GROSS HIGH HOLIDAY CREEP

**Do I HAVE YOUR ATTENTION?** Good! That is exactly what this column is about. In the retail

world, the displaying of holiday merchandise far in advance of the holiday is called "creeping" (good examples of this are Halloween and Christmas creep). Our version of High Holiday creep takes place during Elul, the Hebrew month which precedes Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. What I'm referring to is the blowing of the shofar, the ultimate attention-getter.

At the end of every weekday morning minyan during the month of Elul, beginning with Sunday, August 16, the shofar will sound. Many people are unfamiliar with this ritual and think that the only time to hear the shofar is during Rosh Hashanah morning services and at the very end of Yom Kippur. The ritual blowing of the shofar originated in the Temple and later transferred to the synagogue. Sounding the shofar during the month of Elul, however, only dates back to the Middle Ages. Various explanations exist for the origins of this custom.

in the land of the living."

What other land is there? We do not think of the afterlife as a land. Only this world has a land. I think it means that we live, but we are rarely really alive. We go through the motions of our lives, and then feel that everything is kind of unsatisfactory. We have missed so much even though we were supposedly there.

# FROM RABBI SHERE RABBINIC MISSION TO ISRAEL

AS I WRITE THIS ARTICLE, I am excitedly counting down the hours until I board my flight. Yes, in just three days, I will be joining 19 other rabbis from across the country and denominational spectrum on an educational mission to Israel. It has been five years since I have been to Israel and I am deeply looking forward to going back.

During this trip we will be meeting with members of the Knesset, Israeli Army officials, humanitarian relief workers, Arab Israelis and Palestinians. Throughout the week, we will be looking at Israel through the lens of social justice, exploring the question: In what ways has Israel succeeded in building a country which serves as a "light unto the nations" (Isaiah 42:6)? As we delve deeper into this question, we will be challenged to ask ourselves how Israel can continue to grow in this role. Through each day's educational seminars, we will take an in-depth look at some of the challenges Israel faces, both internally and externally.

Our group will remain in Jerusalem for most of the week, but we will spend one day visiting patients in hospitals on the Syrian border. Upon my return, I look forward to sharing with you all that I learn.

S I WRITE TO YOU on this Jewish Fast Day – Shivah Asar B'Tammuz, July 5, I am in the midst of ten days of intensive Jewish study at the Sholom Hartman Rabbinic Institute in Jerusalem. Our days of studying Jewish texts and discussion usually begin at 8:30 a.m. and conclude at 9:30 p.m. with a 1-1/2 hour break in the afternoon.

Every teacher has been an inspiration. With three colleagues, who are my *chevrutah* (friends in study), I prepare for each day's major lecture by studying for two hours the main texts to be included in the lecture.



#### - TICKETS -

The Synagogue is now processing High Holy Day tickets. Extra tickets for the Main Service for adult children over age 30 or parents of members may be purchased for \$275 per ticket. Please fill out request forms for extra seats with names of unmarried children and/or dependent parents. Checks must accompany your extra seat requests.

Tickets will be mailed to all members in good standing (current year's dues, building fund installment, and miscellaneous charges paid). Please take care of unpaid obligations *now* so that your tickets can be processed and mailed. If you have questions in regard to your current balance, please consult our controller, Carma Gargaro, 248-851-5100.

#### - RECIPROCITY -

Adat Shalom participates in a reciprocity program whereby members in good standing of other Conservative congregations *outside* Michigan may attend High Holy Day services at our synagogue. Please understand that reciprocity can be extended for a maximum of three consecutive years. For details, contact Alan Yost.

#### - SEATING -

In order to be assured of your choice of seats, we urge all congregants to arrive as early as possible for both Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. You may save seats only up until 10:15 a.m. Please follow this rule so that all congregants may be seated in an orderly manner. We have many wonderful volunteer ushers who are eager to help you in any way possible. If you have any questions while you are in the building during the holidays, please stop at the membership information table located in the main foyer.

#### - PARKING -

Attendants will be on duty to direct you to a parking space. We realize that parking will be tight. WHEN LEAVING THE LOT, PLEASE WAIT UNTIL THE CAR AHEAD OF YOU PULLS OUT. WE MUST HAVE YOUR COOPERATION.

Please note that worshipers **will not be permitted** to park in the Beztak Companies parking lot directly adjacent to the Synagogue at 31371 Northwestern Highway because the High Holidays fall during the week this year. Summit Apartments on Northwestern Highway has requested that worshipers do not use their parking lots.


## Empty Nesters Looking For New Coordinator



A Message from Melissa Ser

**Director of Education** 

**MANY PEOPLE STILL SPEAK** of our program as a "Hebrew School" or "Religious School." What we do in the Adat Shalom-Beth Achim Learning Community, however, is anything but the traditional Hebrew school that you may remember from your childhood.

We have three main goals for our program: to make Judaism accessible, meaningful, and relevant:

#### - Accessible -

We bring Jewish values to our students in language they understand. We celebrate holidays together. We learn Jewish

texts in modern, grade-appropriate language. Each child learns Hebrew at his or her own pace. We all learn prayers by praying together and talking about prayer and God in our classrooms. We work closely with *Opening the Doors*, a

project of the Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Detroit, that enables us to have a full inclusion program for students with special learning needs.

#### - MEANINGFUL -

After we ensure that students have access to the material, we are then able to help them find personal and communal meaning in our shared history and culture, celebrations, language, and values. Through family programs and experiential education, concepts go beyond the textbook and become personal.

#### - RELEVANT -

It is not enough to make meaning. It is crucial that we help our students connect their Judaism to their everyday lives. We do not have *Jewish* lives and *Everyday* lives; rather, we live our secular lives Jewishly through our actions, beliefs, and values. We bring secular challenges to our Jewish lives as well, and together, especially in our upper grades, we learn to navigate the world together.

So, how do we know we are successful? As I walk the halls of our Learning Community, these are the kinds of questions and comments I hear:

When God brought the plagues to the Egyptians, why did he make even the innocent people suffer? Was God wrong?

Does God hear my prayers? How do I know?

How do I stay Jewish and still visit my non-Jewish relatives and friends for Christmas and Easter?

Accessible, meaningful, and relevant. Register your Pre-K through 7th grader now! Registration forms are available on our website and in the school office. New students are always welcome.



Hartman scholar Yossi Klein Halevi. "It's a different kind of pluralism (in Israel) than in American Jewry. In American Jewry you have religious pluralism. Here we have ethnic pluralism. We have Jews from dozens of countries." In Congregation Zion, the service combined Turkish Sephardic melodies with modern Ashkenazic melodies. Hundreds of Israelis joined with Hartman Rabbinic participants in enthusiastically singing the Shabbat Tefillot – prayers.

In Elul, which begins in this month of August, we recite Psalm 27 in our morning and evening prayers. This psalm ends with "Hope in Adonai, be strong,

take courage, and hope in Adonai." At our Rabbinic Institute, through Jewish texts we learn that although our attempts to achieve peace and to significantly improve our world may never be achieved to our satisfaction, we should not diminish our hopes and our efforts.

This period of intense Jewish study is a highlight of my year. To do this study of Jewish texts in Israel, where some of the texts were written in the modern day and others in ancient and medieval periods, is a tremendous privilege, for which I am very grateful.

entire purpose of the high holidays is to make us alive to the world we live in, and the way to do that is take away our barriers that prevent us from living happy lives and having good relationships with other people.

We often think that the reason we are supposed to take care of our relationships *before* the High Holidays is because we want God to forgive us for our transgressions to God. I think this is actually backwards. We cannot hurt God, so we really cannot sin against God.

I think what God is saying is that if God did not hold out the promise of forgiving our alleged spiritual sins, then we would not heal our relationships with other people in the way that we should. In many ways, *preparing* for the holidays is more important than the holidays.

This of course is not easy, but it is worthwhile. The process can start with some questions. Ask yourself if there is even one good thing about the person with whom you are not too happy. We should ask the same about ourselves. What did we do last year that we really did not pay attention to, but if we had, we would have really liked it?

What were the things we thought were terrible, outside of tragedies, that turned out to be not so bad? Can we approach these things differently? These sound like relatively small things, but can make a huge difference.

I believe that the more we create happier individuals, families and communities, the more we will create a more compassionate and healthy world.

We may not be able to change the world to be exactly the way we want it to be, but perhaps we can make our own place in the world an *eretz chaim*, a land of those who are truly alive, and bring some joy and appreciation into the rest of a world that really needs it. That is what God is waiting for.

A biblical explanation is that on the first day of Elul, Moses ascended Mount Sinai for the second time and blew the shofar as a reminder to the Israelites not to commit another Golden Calf-like sin.

A second reason is that during Temple times, the shofar was blown at the beginning of every month, heralding Rosh Chodesh. The sounding of the shofar at the beginning of Elul is the only example of this monthly proclamation that remains today.

A third interpretation is that the blowing of the shofar every weekday morning during Elul is to confuse Satan as to when Rosh Hashanah actually falls. By doing so, the evil adversary, therefore, will not be able to affect God's judgment of people.

A fourth and more spiritual explanation is that the Hebrew month of Elul is an acronym of the verse from Song of Songs, "Ani I'dodi v'dodi Ii," and that this time period is not only one of reflection and repentance but also the time of year when one's relationship with God may feel strongest. The sound of the shofar alerts us to that special divine relationship.




