

The evening will begin with a 7:30 p.m. Seudah Shelishit, followed by Minchah and teaching at 8:30 p.m. At 9:45 p.m. Maariv will begin, which will include reading of the *Book of Eikhah* (Lamentations).



There will be a Sunday morning service for Tisha B'Av at 8:30 a.m. at Adat Shalom.

Tisha B'Av commemorates the destruction of the Temple and other tragic events throughout the history of the Jewish people.

FROM THE PRESIDENT Our "House of Gathering"

Even THOUGH KAREN AND I did not grow up at Adat Shalom, when we joined and first started attending Shabbat services, I immediately felt a special *connection*, a warm *haimish* feeling. Adat Shalom offered something unique, the special benefits of a large synagogue:

youth programs, adult education, multiple services, social action, Israel advocacy and much more. But it felt to us like a small *shul*, like the one where I grew up.

We are both products of the Conservative movement. I grew up in a suburb of Los Angeles near Pasadena. When my grandparents moved to California from the Bronx and landed in the San Gabriel valley, they wanted to ensure a Jewish experience for their two children. So they founded the first Conservative congregation in the area, and my grandfather became the first president. As time went on, my parents also took on leadership positions, serving as role models for me and my four siblings. I want to think that I listened and learned from my parents both lessons and actions. One lesson that comes to mind: my father held every office in the shul, except one ...that of president. "Too many bosses," he said.

However, I can honestly say that he would not have made that statement about Adat Shalom. In my time on the Board and then the Executive Committee, CONTINUED ON PAGE 16

FROM HAZZAN GROSS Observing Tisha B'Av

ONE OF THE POWERFUL THINGS about Jewish holidays is how we alter our daily routine in order to bring intention and meaning to these special days. Tisha B'Av, or literally the 9th day of the Hebrew month Av, commemorates the destruction of the two holy temples as well as several other calamities that have befallen the Jewish people. Aside from Yom Kippur, this is

the only "major fast" of the year, meaning that the fast lasts from sundown to sundown. (There are five "minor fasts" that last from *sunrise* to sundown).

On Tisha B'Av as on Yom Kippur, people refrain from wearing leather shoes as these are a sign of comfort and luxury. The Tisha B'Av morning service (this year on Sunday, August 14) is the only morning service of the year when we do not wear a Tallit. Neither do we wear Tefillin, as both Tallit and Tefillin are considered to be beautifying ornaments and are not fitting for the sorrowful tone of the day. Just as

WORDS FROM ELIE WEISEL ז"ל



BERGMAN

ELIE WEISEL GAVE WORDS to the most unspeakable tragedy of our people. He became the voice of conscience to so many in the world. He was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize thirty years ago. The paragraphs below are taken from his acceptance speech on December 10, 1986.

I swore never to be silent whenever and wherever human beings endure suffering and humiliation. We must always take sides. Neutrality helps the oppressor, never the victim. Silence encourages the tormentor,

never the tormented. Sometimes we must interfere. When human lives are endangered, when human dignity is in jeopardy, national borders and sensitivities become irrelevant. Wherever men or women are persecuted because of their race, religion, or political views, that place must – at that moment – become the center of the universe.

Of course, since I am a Jew profoundly rooted in my peoples' memory

FROM RABBI SHERE Hello Again, Hello

As I THINK BACK UPON the summer, I am particularly grateful for the moments spent reconnecting with old friends. There is something really special about getting back in touch with people who knew us at earlier points in our lives. Since there is a blessing to be said upon nearly every aspect of Jewish life, it should come as no surprise that the Talmud gives us a prayer to be

said upon reconnecting with a friend we have not seen in a year of more. That blessing is "*Baruch Atah Adonai M'chayeh*," which means "Blessed are You God for giving life to the dead." At first look, this may seem like a peculiar blessing to say upon reuniting with an old friend.

However, Jewish tradition explains that each of our friends breathe life into a specific part of who we are. When we aren't in touch with a particular friend, the unique aspect of our personality that can only be brought to life by that friend becomes dormant; it makes sense, then, that upon seeing a long-lost friend, we express gratitude for "giving life to the dead."

The Hebrew word for friend is chaver. The root of the Hebrew word

DURING MY CHILDHOOD, I read *MAD Magazine* whose fictitious mascot and cover boy was Alfred E. Neuman. "What, Me Worry?" was the famous motto of the intellectually uncurious Neuman. Only in one issue was "What, Me Worry?" changed to "Yes, Me Worry" – in 1979 after the Three Mile Island nuclear reactor accident.



MOST OF US ASSUME that the need for shelter decreases during the summer months. However, with warming centers closed for the season, the need for South Oakland Shelter clients actually increases in the summer.



Adat Shalom's hard-working volunteers welcomed 32 guests for the week beginning May 29 - including four family units with six children. Our guests arrived by bus each day from the shelter, but many of them are employed, and we tried to provide for their special transportation needs each morning. The SOS clients were so appreciative of all that we did for them to make their stay comfortable. It was a touching moment when, on the last night, we were given a beautiful thank you card, and each guest had taken the time to write a personal note.

This enormous project could not have been accomplished without all of our many volunteers and supporters. Beds were picked up and made on Day 1, early morning breakfasts were served, lunches assembled each day, and delicious dinners awaited the guests each evening upon their arrival.

A special thank you to Ilana Woronoff and Seth Pufahl, who were there each day to make sure everything ran smoothly. (Congratulations to Ilana, who has accepted a position at the South Oakland Shelter through the AmeriCorps VISTA program and will continue to make a difference in this program.







Family Education programs are endowed in memory of Jeanette & Oscar Cook

I am often told that I easily get ahead of myself; considering how things work in the Family Education Department, that may not be such a bad thing. I have been talking to members who have very young children and 'dreaming' about what new programs we could create for Adat Shalom.

Sometimes dreams come true. *JBaby* is a program of the Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Detroit that focuses on connecting, engaging and inspiring Jewish families from "bump to birth and beyond..." In order to offer more Jewish enrichment to families with children from birth to 3 years of age, *JBaby* has provided grant opportunities to agencies throughout the community. Organizations that applied are eligible for up to two grants, worth up to \$500 each, and I am very excited to tell you that Adat Shalom was awarded both grants in full.

as individuals and strengthens us as Jews. I believe that our study of Jewish texts as well as the safety of the State of Israel will ensure Jewish survival. The insights derived from studying Jewish texts will benefit liberal democratic states, too.

Studying Jewish texts can help us to reflect on who we are, why we are on this earth, and how we shall live. The secular society of which we should be a vital part celebrates achievements in science and technology. However, it does not have answers to life's serious questions found in a Judaism that advocates a religion that is gentle, quietist and ecumenical. In this void has stepped a religion that is adversarial, aggressive and intolerant of views that differ from its own. When I teach most effectively, I give students the temptation to try the main course, the great texts of Judaism. But I worry that I do not meet this goal as often as I would like.

"What, Me Worry?" My worry is that not enough of us will pick up a sacred Jewish text this month and try to learn from that text how to answer life's most demanding questions.

the Jewish day transitions from night to day, darkness to light, so does the tone of Tisha B'Av. As the day progresses, the mournful mood changes to one of consolation and comfort. This is evident during the Minchah service at which time we don our Tallit and Tefillin. This is the only afternoon service of the year when these both are worn. At the Minchah service we also recite a special Haftarah that contains the prophet Isaiah's message of hope which transitions from admonition to encouragement and finally to comfort and optimism.

Please join us when Adat Shalom hosts this year's community Erev Tisha B'Av commemoration on Saturday night, August 13. (See page 2) Our community's unity on this day of remembrance constitutes a powerful gesture that despite destruction and calamity throughout the ages, the Jewish people continue to live on. and tradition, my first response is to Jewish fears, Jewish needs, Jewish crises. For I belong to a traumatized generation, one that experienced the abandonment and solitude of our people. It would be unnatural for me not to make Jewish priorities my own: Israel, Soviet Jewry, Jews in Arab lands ... But there are others as important to me. Apartheid is, in my view, as abhorrent as anti-Semitism. To me, Andrei Sakharov's isolation is as much of a disgrace as Josef Biegun's imprisonment. As is the denial of Solidarity and its leader Lech Walesa's right to dissent. And Nelson Mandela's interminable imprisonment.

There is so much injustice and suffering crying out for our attention: victims of hunger, of racism, and political persecution, writers and poets, prisoners in so many lands governed by the Left and by the Right. Human rights are being violated on every continent. More people are oppressed than free. And then, too, there are the Palestinians to whose plight I am sensitive but whose methods I deplore. Violence and terrorism are not the answer. Something must be done about their suffering, and soon. I trust Israel, for I have faith in the Jewish people. Let Israel be given a chance, let hatred and danger be removed from her horizons, and there will be peace in and around the Holy Land.

There is much to be done, there is much that can be done. One person – a Raoul Wallenberg, an Albert Schweitzer, one person of integrity, can make a difference, a difference of life and death. As long as one dissident is in prison, our freedom will not be true. As long as one child is hungry, our lives will be filled with anguish and shame. What all these victims need above all is to know that they are not alone; that we are not forgetting them, that when their voices are stifled we shall lend them ours, that while their freedom depends on ours, the quality of our freedom depends on theirs.

Thank you, members of the Nobel Committee, for declaring on this singular occasion that our survival has meaning for mankind.

The life of Elie Weisel was a source of strength and blessing for us. May his memory be an inspiration for peace and freedom.


