HAZZAN GROSS

FROM HAZZAN GROSS *TISHREI IS COMING*

PREPARED FOR A HOLIDAY is not something foreign to us. On Passover, there's the kashering of the kitchen; on Sukkot, we build a sukkah; on Shavuot, we count the omer. For the *Yamim Noraim* (Days of Awe), the High Holidays of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, we utilize the Hebrew month of Elul. While Elul is barren of holidays of its own, we use this time to prepare for the subsequent month, Tishrei. With the dawning of Elul, we include two additions to our services to highlight what's to come.

The first addition in Elul is that we sound the shofar every morning at the end of minyan. This unique sound is a wake-up call, a visceral alarm to begin our mental preparation for a new year of endless possibilities. The *ba'al tokeah*, the person who blows the shofar, sounds a prescribed series of blasts, including each special pattern of the shofar: *tekiah – shevarim – teruah – tekiah*. If you are able to blow the shofar, please let us know, as this is a wonderful way to volunteer. If you've never blown the shofar but you are able to play a brass instrument, there's a good chance that you can be a *ba'al tokeah*!

The second addition to our Elul liturgy is the reading of Psalm 27. It is recited before *Aleinu* in both *Shacharit* (morning service) and *Maariv* (evening service). This sounds like a simple addition, yet this psalm packs a powerful punch. Personally, this is my favorite psalm due to its poignancy, accessibility and relevance. I could write a dissertation about it but for now I will share just a few of its verses which demonstrate the beautiful messages found within:

FROM RABBI BERGMAN *NATAN SHARANSKY AND HIS CONTINUING HEROISM FOR THE JEWISH PEOPLE*

I WAS DISAPPOINTED, BUT NOT SURPRISED, by the Israeli government's decision to effectively end the agreement to allow portions of the Western Wall to come under the auspices of the Conservative and Reform movements.

Politicians will always act like politicians, no matter what party or what country.

There has been one bright spot in this situation, one politician who has transcended politics in an effort to bring together Jews inside and outside of Israel. That person is Natan Sharansky, the former Soviet Refusenik who now serves as the chairman of the Jewish Agency. He is one of the true heroes of our people.

RABBI SHERE

FROM RABBI SHERE *LIGHT ON THE SALT*

RECENTLY I VISITED THE DETROIT INSTITUTE OF ARTS and saw the statue there of the pillar of salt formerly known as Lot's wife. God turned her into a pillar of salt because when she and her husband were leaving Sodom and Gomorrah, God told them not to look back, yet she did. Salt is a preservative. That part of her life was over and it wasn't healthy at that moment to

look back – she literally got stuck in the past; unwilling to move forward, she became unable to do so.

A corollary to the story of Lot's wife is the salt in which we dip our challah on Friday night. The salt we use on Friday night is about remembering – preserving the undisturbed, sacred family time we experience each week as the sun sets and the candles are lit. The story of Lot's wife underscores the importance of knowing what and when to preserve and what and when to let go.

What aspects of the past year are you ready to let go of and which do you want to hold on to? This might be a meaningful family conversation starter to have at your dinner table.

I'll close with the words of one of my favorite poets, Mary Oliver, who wrote:

To live in this world / you must be able to do three things: / to love what is mortal; / to hold it / against your bones knowing your own life depends on it; / and, when the time comes to let it go, / to let it go.

FROM RABBI YOSKOWITZ *SPIRITUAL RENEWAL*

PHYSICALLY WE ARE SUBJECT TO the process of birth, growth, and senescence. Does that process pertain to our spiritual selves, too?

Our Jewish tradition teaches us that self-renewal is possible for each of us. If we hold onto our ideals and reexamine our lives, we can pull ourselves up. As we recite Psalm 24, the special Psalm said in our Sunday Shacharit prayer, we can raise ourselves up.



- ❖ *One thing I ask of Adonai – for this I yearn: to dwell in the House of Adonai all the days of my life – to behold God's beauty, to pray in God's sanctuary.*
- ❖ *I will bring God offerings with shouts of joy, singing, chanting praise to Adonai.*
- ❖ *Though my father and my mother leave me, Adonai will care for me.*
- ❖ *Yet I have faith that I shall surely see Adonai's goodness in the land of the living.*

These profound statements need no explanation; the words serve as a powerful reminder of our relationship with God.

There is a meaningful coincidence that the Hebrew spelling of the word *Elul* אֱלּוּל is an acronym for the well known verse from Song of Songs, *Ani L'dodi V'dodi Li*,

אֲנִי לְדוּדִי וְדוּדִי לִי meaning "I am my beloved's and my beloved is mine." As we embrace our connection with the Divine at this time, I pray that we bring to mind the words of George R. R. Martin that "life is full of possibilities." May this preparatory time before Tishrei and the coming of the new year be one of great blessing and inspiration. *Kein yehi ratzon!* – So may it be!

At this time last year, we received a grant from JBaby and started a Baby & Me on Sunday mornings for parents and their babies from birth to 13 months old. This program was so well received that we are not only continuing it, we are now creating Toddler & Me. Sunday mornings, toddlers (13 months to 3 years) and their parents will have valuable interactive time together. The Bubble Club programming will help in the development of fine and gross motor skills, cognitive awareness, language development, and physical ability.

Additionally this fall, I look forward to kicking off:

Family Life – Understanding Judaism from a new family perspective.

Family Life is a 3-part series that brings families together, adapting to the change of a new baby (first, last or somewhere in between). The series focuses on holidays, symbols and rituals; teaching the history, why and where. Sessions will discuss how to incorporate and adapt with family dynamics. – “Mi Yaaleh B’har Adonai - Who can ascend the mountain of the Lord?” We can as individuals and as a historic community!

Henry Wadsworth Longfellow (1807-1882), reinforces this theme in his poem, “A Psalm of Life” when he writes:


*Not enjoyment and not sorrow
Is our destined end or way
But to act that each tomorrow
Find us farther than today*

To better reflect on our need for spiritual renewal, some of us invest part of the summer for Jewish study in a setting that inspires trust in each other and in ourselves. In fact, some of the exercises that I best remember are “trust exercises” at Camp Ramah in Wisconsin. After a day of teaching and of learning, of sports and arts & crafts, we learn to trust our partner by closing our eyes as a friend with open eyes guides us through forestland. In the photograph adjacent to the column, Rabbi Bill Lebeau, great uncle of Jason Sherman, our 2017 Jay Yoskowitz Israel Scholarship award recipient, is guiding me on a sunny summer Ramah day through a forest section of Ramah. In that quiet walk with trust in a friend, I could better hear “the still small voice” as did Elijah, to prepare me to face whatever unknown dangers that await.

As men and women, boys and girls of Adat Shalom, we can renew our spiritual selves as we listen with complete trust to our Divine voice.

High School Hebrew Dual Enrollment Program

High school students (grades 9-12) may take Modern Hebrew for dual enrollment credit (both high school graduation credit and transferable college credits). Through our partnership with Eastern Michigan University, students may take 6 credits of Hebrew over two semesters. Courses range from Hebrew 1 to Hebrew 4 and are fully accredited. They meet on Sunday evenings from 5-6:30 p.m. at Adat Shalom Synagogue, beginning on September 10. Adat Shalom-Beth Achim Learning Community kicks off the year on September 10!

Religious school classes for grades Pre-K through 6 begin on Sunday, September 10, with midweek classes for grades 2-7 beginning on Wednesday, September 13. We will be welcoming new students in our kindergarten and upper grades at a special Consecration ceremony during our opening assembly at 11:30 a.m. on Sunday, and we invite the entire community to kick off the year at a family barbeque complete with bounce house, face painting, and fun activities starting at noon.

Our faculty is very excited for an amazing year of learning together!

Monday Night School (8-12 grade) will be piloting a new teen Mussar program from Chai Mitzvah. Mussar is the Jewish spiritual practice of character development alongside text study, social action, and values programming. Like its counterpart for adults, Chai Mitzvah for Teens is a serious Jewish learning program that is also filled with engaging activities for teens. This hands-on leadership program has nine monthly units which include social action, building self-esteem, Jewish identity, Jewish literacy, opportunities for positive personal expression, and connections with teens around the United States and the larger Jewish community.

Our seventh grade class will join our Monday Night School students for dinner, and then spend the rest of the evening studying prayers in depth alongside Jewish history and the Holocaust. Classes begin on Monday, September 11 at 6:30 p.m. and are taught by our clergy and education team, along with occasional guest speakers.





He stood up to the Soviet Union when they made life so miserable for the Jewish people, and he suffered terribly for many years in prison until his release. I was at the March for Israel parade in New York during his first trip to America. Though I was among 50,000 other people, and could barely see him, I knew I was in the presence of true greatness.

Sharansky is working hard to build bridges between Israel and the Jewish communities around the world.

This is what he said after the Kotel agreement was crushed. It is honest and insightful.

"The truth is that in the conditions of the Diaspora, to survive and not be assimilated is a big challenge. From the beginning, when Jews were allowed to live equally among non-Jews beginning 200 years ago, and those of them who wanted to continue living actively among gentiles but to feel themselves Jewish at home, some of them went for different forms of Judaism."

"It's not the place where I pray, the place where I talk to God. But it is the place where a lot of Jews, who want to stay being Jewish, are gathering."

"So the State of Israel, if it continues to say that it is home for all the Jews definitely has to say to them: We want you. But we also want your communities, we want your rabbis, your grandchildren."

"So many Jews in the Diaspora say (to Israel), Be democratic like us. But they don't understand that we're doing something much (more challenging) than them: We are trying to be democratic in the Middle East."

"Equally, many Jews in Israel say (to the Diaspora), Be not assimilated like us. We're religious or secular. But they don't understand that (Diaspora Jews) are doing something much more difficult. How to not be assimilated in America is not the same as how to not be assimilated in Israel."

"They are using these tools (of different streams of Judaism). If we could invent tools now, at a time of the existence of the State of Israel, maybe we would invent different tools. But these are the tools that exist."

I believe there will ultimately be a workable agreement that will allow Jews from the many different movements to pray at the Kotel in the manner that best connects them to Judaism and Israel. It will take a lot of time, argument, effort and compromise. With people like Natan Sharansky, I have hope.
