FROM THE PRESIDENT TISHA B'AV, A TIME TO THINK ABOUT THE PAST AND LOOK TO THE FUTURE

THE CONSERVATIVE SYNAGOGUES in Detroit were forward thinking when we came together to create joint programs for Purim, Selichot and Tisha B'Av, the ninth day of Av. This year Tisha B'Av will be observed at Congregation Shaarey Zedek on Monday,

July 31. This day is regarded as the saddest day on the Jewish calendar, and has a 25-hour fast, like Yom Kippur. Yom Kippur is also a solemn day, but especially toward the end of the Neilah service, we should be joyous that we have been sealed in the book of life for another year.

We mourn the destruction of both Temples in Jerusalem, the first by the Babylonians, and the second by the Romans. Also remembered are the murder of Ten Martyrs by the Romans, the Crusades, the Bar Kochba slaughter, and many more calamities. In 1994 there was the bombing of the JCC in Buenos Aires where 85 were killed and over 300 injured. Traditionally we read Eikha, the Book of Lamentations, while sitting on the floor, and not wearing leather shoes.

FROM HAZZAN GROSS TORAH, HAFTARAH AND MAFTIR, OH MY!

WOULD LIKE TO DEDICATE this article in honor of our adult B'nai Mitzvah class, who will collectively be celebrating the culmination of their group studies at their Shabbat Rosh Chodesh ceremony on June 24.

During class we spent time discussing the differences between the various readings which take place during the Torah service. The specific section of Torah which is read each week is known as the Parashat HaShavua (portion of the week), sometimes called Sedrah. There are 54 parashiyot (plural of parasha) in the yearly Torah reading cycle, plus there are additional Torah readings specific to the various holidays. The word Torah generally refers to the Five Books of Moses (Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy). The word itself comes from the root word "teaching," similar to the Hebrew word for teacher — morah.

The Haftarah, on the other hand, is a selection from the book of Nevi'im (Prophets) and and is read following the Torah reading. The theme of the Haftarah parallels either the Parashat HaShavua or the holiday. The word Haftarah is derived from the Hebrew root meaning "additional" or "left over." In Ashkenazi Hebrew, it is pronounced "haf-TO-rah" and in the modern Sephardic pronunciation, it is "haf-ta-RAH." It is often mistakenly assumed that the word is related to Torah, however the similarity is only coincidental. In Hebrew, Haftarah is spelled neural (with a tet), while Torah is number (with a tay).

Between the Torah and Haftarah in the Torah service is the Maftir reading. Maftir is spelled מפטיר and therefore is linguistically related to the word Haftarah — the literal

N JUNE WE CELEBRATE 50 YEARS of Jews being able to live and worship freely in Jerusalem. At the end of July we observe Tisha B'av, the day that commemorates the destruction that befell our people, at least in part because of our inability to disagree with each other in peace, calm and mutual respect.

I offer two poems from Yehuda Amichai, one of Israel's greatest poets. He fought in most of Israel's wars, and loved Jerusalem and the Jewish people, but worried about them deeply, as well.

We lost Jerusalem two thousand years ago because of bitter divisiveness. We must not do so again.

FROM RABBI SHERE A SORDID BOON

UST OVER TWO CENTURIES AGO, the poet William Wordsworth wrote these words:

The world is too much with us; late and soon.

Getting and spending, we lay waste our powers;

Little we see in Nature that is ours; We have given our hearts away, a sordid boon!

I can only imagine the poem that Wordsworth might write if he were alive today. In the 21st century, we have been provided with the ability to get and spend, call and consume, 24/7. FOMO (Fear of Missing Out) has become a popular acronym, used frequently in conversations and texts by teens and adults alike. With so many choices and distractions around us, it is nearly impossible for any of us to feel present and content where we are. In such a time, Judaism's innovation of the 24/6 week

beginnings. "Why," he asked, "does the Torah begin with a bet – the second letter of the Hebrew alphabet – and not with an alef – the first letter?" After a long pause and without anyone proferring an answer, Mr. Wiesel said, "just so you should ask the question."

If I forget thee, Jerusalem,

Then let my right be forgotten. Let my right be forgotten, and my left remember. Let my left remember, and your right close And your mouth open near the gate. I shall remember Jerusalem And forget the forest — my love will remember, Will open her hair, will close my window, will forget my right, Will forget my left. If the west wind does not come I'll never forgive the walls, Or the sea, or myself. Should my right forget My left shall forgive, I shall forget all water, I shall forget my mother. If I forget thee, Jerusalem, Let my blood be forgotten. I shall touch your forehead, Forget my own, My voice change For the second and last time To the most terrible of voices — Or silence.

Poem #12 Eikha (Lamentations)

"How doth the city sit solitary," the prophet lamented over Jerusalem. If Jerusalem is a woman, does she know desire? When she cries out, is it from pleasure or pain? What is the secret of her appeal? When does she open her gates willingly and when is it rape? All her lovers abandon her, leaving her with the wages of love necklaces earrings, towers and houses of prayer in the English, Italian, Russian, Greek, Arab styles, wood and stone, turrets and gables, wrought-iron gates, rings of gold and silver, riots of color. They all give her something to remember her by, then abandon her. I would have liked to talk to her again, but I lost her among the dancers. Dance is total abandon. Jerusalem sees only the skies above her and whoever sees only the skies above-not the face of her lover-truly does lie solitary,



sit solitary, stand solitary, and dance all alone.

Each year, as part of our 7th grade curriculum, our students learn about the history of the Jewish communities of Europe, study the events leading up to the Holocaust and the Holocaust itself, visit the Holocaust Memorial Center, and most of our students take part in an essay competition sponsored by the Adat Shalom Men's Club. The Men's Club provides volunteers who, along with clergy, grade the anonymous submissions, and also provides prizes of \$50, \$25, and \$35 Visa gift cards for the winners. Men's Club President Alan Chandross helped coordinate, alongside Sammi Shapiro, and the volunteer judges were Rabbi Aaron Bergman, Rabbi Rachel Shere, Joe Wener, Bobby Blum, Les Hubert, and Joey Lebovic.

The students who participated in the essay contest were: Micah Bienstock, Daniel Bradford, Leora Kaye, Jordan Manela, Joshua Pollak, Raquel Rosenfeld, Madeline Sandberg, and Claire Wolfe. Below are the winners, along with excerpts from their essays:

First Place- Madeline Sandberg (Orchard Lake Middle School)

"People who otherwise might have lived peacefully with the Jews collaborated with the Nazis and entire families were lost. This shows how important it is to make sure that all people understand what happened because the Holocaust was not just a few crazy individuals. Moreover, those who survived the Holocaust are getting older and soon will not be able to tell their stories themselves. It is only through education that people in the future will understand the Holocaust."

Second Place- Leora Kaye (Warner Middle School)

"It's hard to believe that only 70 years ago, the Nazis were able to kill over 6 million Jews. This happened through a series of well organized planned events. When things aren't going well, sometimes people look for someone or something to blame their problems on. Hitler convinced people that the Jews were at fault for the bad economy, unemployment and everything else that was going wrong in Eastern Europe at that time. This was simply because the Jewish religion has different traditions and ways of life that stand out. Nowadays, most people don't think of this as a problem. But Hitler brought it to everyone's attention, and got people to believe that the Jews were bad people."

Third Place- Raquel Rosenfeld (Berkshire Middle School)

"I think the best ways of making the lessons come alive is by teaching it not just with textbooks but real people who may have been involved or who had relatives involved, this is so that the kids will have an understanding from someone who went through this. Another good way is since kids learn things usually better with something they are familiar with people could use technology to learn about the Holocaust."

has never been more necessary or relevant.

The limitations of Shabbat travel ask us to make a decision about where to be and then to be fully present there. Technology may have brought the world to our fingertips, but at the same time, it often relegates our friends and family to arm's length. On Shabbat, we put away our screens so we can better focus on the faces of our loved ones. When we observe Shabbat, we temporarily exit the competitive pressure of modern society and enter a much needed refuge of purpose and peace.

Society's response to the short attention spans and FOMO which plague 21st century minds has been to spout the newfound miracles of "mindfulness." Mindfulness, however, is hardly a new concept. The Mishnah, written two thousand years ago, teaches us to stop whatever we are doing and express gratitude at least one hundred times a day; this is our ancient tradition's way of guiding our focus and reminding us to remain ever mindful of the wonder that lies around and within us.

Some of the world's problems will, no doubt, be solved through ingenuity and innovation; others, however, may find their solution in answers given long before the problems ever manifested. Such is the wisdom of our Torah.

meaning also referring to something that was added. The Maftir is always the last section read from the Torah. Sometimes it is a repeat of a section which was already read (I like to refer to this as the encore), and sometimes it is a completely different reading, read from a different Torah scroll. Each holiday is assigned its own special Maftir. Are you confused yet? Here's where it gets really confusing. The person who chants the Haftarah is given the Maftir aliyah, and is called up to the Torah for the very last Torah reading to chant the blessings before and after the Maftir reading.

Our adult B'nai Mitzvah class has studied very hard over the past 18 months. Some started from scratch, literally learning for the first time how to read Hebrew, starting with the alef-bet. Now all of them will stand on the bimah, chanting the sacred words of our tradition. It has been an honor to learn with them. I look forward to continuing our studies and to begin working with a new adult B'nai Mitzvah group in the future!

Today, there are many books being published which ask the question: Why did the Holocaust – Shoah - occur? In a recently published book, the word "why" occurs in a book title. A teacher and student of Holocaust history, Peter Hayes, has written an important book entitled "Why? Explaining the Holocaust." (2017).

On the last page (343) of his book he posits the following possibility: if Gustav Krupp von Bohlen, head of the National Association of German Industry, had refused to follow an order of Hitler on April 1, 1933, there might not have been a Holocaust. After protesting Hitler's order to dismiss all his employees "who were Jews or affiliated with other political parties," Krupp gave in and fired "everyone of whom the Nazis disapproved on April 5 and thus breaking his contracts with each of these people."

Peter Hayes concludes his book with a proverb "Beware the beginnings." Of what beginnings should we be aware? That is a question which we need to ask to ourselves and to others in our Jewish and world communities.
