FROM THE PRESIDENT LOVE YOUR NEIGHBOR...

THE BIBLE TEACHES US that the commandment to "love your neighbor as yourself" is one of the most important mitzvot in the Torah. The manner in which one honors this commandment is a very personal matter. Volunteer activities, as seen in action at Adat Shalom's Volunteer Day, inspire me to incorporate more mitzvot into my life.

On January 17, the Adat Shalom Beth Achim Learning Community, Sisterhood, Men's Club, Social Action Committee and the Tikkun Adat volunteers collaborated with representatives from fifteen community organizations to provide opportunities to assist those in need. At one end of the Social Hall, a group of volunteers was teaching children how to knit so that they, too, could make hats to be donated to the March of Dimes for premature babies. At the opposite end of the room, a group of adults was teaching children to properly use tools to build birdfeeders and birdhouses to be donated to JARC homes and clients of Jewish Family Service. In between, adults and children wrapped toys for students at Bennett Elementary in Detroit and Darchei Torah, assembled activity bags for patients in Children's Hospital of Michigan, made cards for soldiers in the IDF and Jewish American service personnel, prepared lunches and assembled fleece blankets and scarves for CONTINUED ON PAGE 12

HREE YEARS AGO, I traveled with several local

Jewish educators to my hometown of St. Louis to attend a conference called Songleader Boot Camp. Hands down, the greatest part of this experience for me was meeting a fellow musician and educator from Asheville, North Carolina named Billy Jonas. My first encounter with Billy was hearing him in an evening concert which featured several different performers. From the moment Billy ascended the stage I was riveted. There are

numerous reasons as to why, and I would like to share some of them with you.

There is something rare that all great performers have, and it is not something that can be taught. It is something innate. There is no word for this in the dictionary, and therefore I call this "it." "It" is the ability to be completely natural and free on stage, capturing the complete and undivided attention of the audience. When you go to a dance, theater or

PURIM: KEEPING OUR LIVES IN BALANCE

VERY YEAR, A MONTH BEFORE PASSOVER, Jews dress up in fun costumes, host parties, deliver tasty packages to friends and give donations to charity. We do all this because it's actually mandated by the holiday, Purim, which is a Jewish Halloween of sorts – except there are no ghouls or goblins or tricks.

Purim is the day on the Jewish calendar when our brethren around the world dedicate the day to poking fun at our religion, making fun of our rabbis and engaging in parody and satire about the very thing we usually

take so seriously: what we believe.

Especially in light of recent current events around the globe, not taking yourself so seriously is an important part of any religion. On Purim, students are allowed to make fun of their rabbis. Congregants make goofy jokes about the liturgy and the tradition. It's a very light-hearted and celebratory day, tied to the idea that if you take yourself so seriously all the

FROM RABBI SHERE SPIRITUALITY RETREAT

In MID-MARCH, a group of more than twenty women from Adat Shalom will head off to a local hotel and conference center to participate in our first Spirituality Retreat for Women. I will be co-leading this meditation and yoga retreat with Rabbi James Jacobson-Maisels, PhD, of Israel, and local yoga instructor, Mindy Eisenberg.

Four years ago, I attended a silent retreat led by Rabbi James, and it was there that I was first truly exposed to an in-depth study of Jewish meditation. While Jewish meditation has a long history, teachers such as Rabbi James are reinvigorating its message of mindfulness for a generation of Jews eager to embrace new spiritual practices.

Mindful eating and walking are two of the techniques which we will be learning and practicing throughout the retreat. There is a popular meditation book by Sylvia Boorstein which is cleverly entitled, *Don't Just Do Something, Sit There*. It is sound advice and I look forward to taking it to heart.




Men's Club Is Going Back to School



A Message from Melissa Ser Director of Education

N THE PREVIOUS VOICE, I shared with you an update on our Hebrew and Prayer curricula. This month I promised an update on our Judaics curriculum.

Curriculum is a "running course" of what we learn, either intentionally or by accident, a combination of planned learning and unplanned experiences. In our program, we intentionally create family learning experiences, and we scaffold the curriculum so that students grow from one year to the next. Curriculum is always a work in progress, and it is never in its final form.

CURRICULUM HIGHLIGHTS (each grade covers many more topics than those highlighted here)

Preschool:

- Living Jewish holidays, values, and time with hands-on experiences
- Developing familiarity with the synagogue and clergy

Kindergarten:

- Introduction to Jewish time and the land of Israel
- Introduction to Torah and its lessons; symbols of Judaism

1st Grade

- Hatikvah and the basic understanding that Israel is different than the US and is the homeland of the Jewish people
- Mitzvot (commandments) between people and God.
- Celebrating holidays in the US and in Israel

2nd Grade:

- Concept of sanctification of time
- The Torah as the Five Books of Moses and Simchat Torah as a celebration of the Torah
- Creation narratives through Exodus
- Jewish ethical values

3rd Grade:

- Jewish values through holidays
- Introduction to Prayer and the Siddur; structure and function of the siddur for prayer and in our lives.
- Being a mentsch and doing the right thing

4th Grade:

- \bullet The values we learn from the stories of our ancestors in Genesis
- Our Jewish identity

5th Grade:

- Sacred community / Kehilah Kedoshah
- Traditions from generation to generation
- Community institutions that preserve Jewish tradition and help others

6th Grade:

- Focus on Modern Israel
- Jewish History
- Sacred Community
- Connecting to deeper understanding of Torah

7th Grade:

- The Holocaust, Jewish Resistance and Strength in times of difficulty
- Jewish Life Cycle
- Judaism and the Environment

I am happy to speak with anyone who would like more information about each of our grades and the curriculum that we are always in the process of developing further.

In these books, there are references to Biblical stories such as the Patriarch Jacob wrestling with the angel which is interpreted as Jacob's struggle "to confront the meaning of a life" (Dr. Paul Kalanithi When Breath Becomes Air, p. 114).

At a SYNergy Shabbat in 2006, we hosted Dr. Shep Nuland, a best-selling author who won the National Book Award for How We Die. He was a great influence on Dr. Kalanithi, who referred to Dr. Nuland's "heroic spirit of responsibility" and who portrayed "the true image of a doctor" (pp. 52-54).

I only wish that my friend, Dr. Nuland, who died last year at age 83, could have been alive to read these words of acknowledging what a positive difference he made in the life of an exceptional young physician whose book is a much talked about best seller.

The second book that I will discuss is On Being Mortal by Dr. Atul Gawande.

You are invited to come and learn with me at the next Supper Series program on Sunday, March 13, about two current best-selling physician authors, who articulate a very Jewish point of view. (See announcement on page 4.)


Debby writes:

We went to Hart Plaza, where several "clients" were waiting for us. We met Tracy, Andrea, and Owen, who rode up on a bike with a helmet over his hood and excitedly showed us walkie talkies he'd just purchased from the Salvation Army. We then drove through Greektown, Corktown, and Michigan Ave., stopping along the way to give lunches, scarves and good wishes to those standing alongside the road with their signs asking for help, the work of the homeless. Larry, Ken and Angie knew them all by name. We delivered garbage bags, requesting they clean up their spaces. We went to Gil's house and delivered a package of food for a week, as he is homebound. ARCHIVES EXHIBIT COMING TO ADAT SHALOM

t's been 70 years since our synagogue opened its doors on Curtis Ave. as the Northwest Hebrew Congregation and Center. During the month of April, an image from that historic dedication will appear in a "pop-up" display at Adat Shalom. The exhibit marks yet another birthday: 25 years since the founding of the Leonard N. Simons Jewish Community Archives, created by Detroit's Jewish Federation to preserve the proud history of a great community.

The pop-up "Neighborhoods" panel - including the Curtis Ave. image - explores Jewish life and migration from Detroit's Hastings Street northward to the suburbs. it creates a problem.

Every fall, after the solemnity of our Jewish New Year (Rosh Hashanah) and Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, which is a 25-hour fast day to avenge our sins, we have another light-hearted holiday called Sukkot. The juxtaposition is no coincidence – sure, we have the serious and the harsh, the contemplative and the reprimand. And then we have the fun.

Balance is key in any organized community. It's imperative, actually. In Judaism, and in all religions, we have mechanisms built-in so we won't take ourselves that seriously.

Although it falls on March 5th this year (beginning at sundown on the 4th), Purim is actually the last holiday of the Jewish calendar because Passover is considered the start. That's the holiday that's all about God doing everything for us, whereas the Purim story is about human beings taking some responsibility.

The celebration of Purim is very lighthearted, but the story of Purim itself is quite serious. It takes place after the Babylonians destroyed the First Holy Temple in Jerusalem in 586 BCE and took the Jewish people to Babylonia as captives in exile. The Persians then conquered the Babylonians.

The Jewish people lived safely in Persia for a while until a vicious anti-Semite named Haman tried to convince his King Achashverosh to destroy the Jewish community. Thanks to the bravery of a Jewish woman named Esther and the strategies of her uncle Mordecai, Haman fails and is himself destroyed.

Purim is a reminder of how quickly our safe and comfortable world can be turned upside down by fanatics, and how much diligence and courage is needed to prevent that from happening. Mordecai and Esther took their responsibilities very seriously, but did not take themselves too seriously. They did what was needed.

Part of being responsible includes knowing when to take things seriously and knowing when to let things go. It's the wisdom of realizing that we shouldn't fight over everything and that we can laugh at ourselves a little bit.

If a tradition is good, it can take a little poking at. Only insecure people are afraid of parody or criticism. Most religions include built-in checks and balances – while we are responsible for setting an example, doing right, making the world a better place, we can also have fun and enjoy our lives.

Those who are forbidden from criticizing the establishment build up resentments. And at a certain critical mass, those resentments explode.

In one of our sacred texts, *Pirkei Avot*, which translates as Lessons of the Fathers, we are reminded that rabbis are not to separate from the community. I interpret that as preventing the leaders of a community from building an inflated sense of their own importance.

On Purim, everyone comes together to eat, drink and be merry. We get silly. We dress up. We make fun. We regain a healthy sense of perspective that tempers any lingering anger or hostility. It's like our built-in release valve, showing us that religion is important but not more important than people.

instrumental performance, and you find yourself focusing on one person, that's because this person has the most "it." Needless to say, Billy has "it."

Billy's performance style is one of a kind. He's a singer, guitarist and "industrial re-percussionist" — a term that Billy coined. This last element was most captivating for me. More commonly known as industrial percussion, it

is the taking of household items and converting them into instruments. You may have encountered this with the guys on the street enthusiastically banging away on buckets after a Tigers game, or in the theatrical show Stomp, or perhaps in your own kitchen when you gave your child those pots and pans to bang away on until it was time to reach for the Advil. Billy has created an art form out of this genre and his percussion sounds like a top of the line drum kit. Watching him maneu-

talent.

ver and master the different drums is a sight and sound to behold. Moreover, Billy's voice is natural, clear and beautiful, and emanates from his heart. All of these characteristics combine to become "it," and create a truly unique

Now on to Billy's songs. Billy is a gifted songwriter, whose poetic lyrics are accessible, meaningful and powerful. His music is original, memorable and catchy, so much so that when I came home from the conference with his CDs, my entire household was singing his music, and continues to do so, three years later! What is so special about Billy is that his music is for all ages. He is a true folk artist. I describe his performances like the great animated films that come out of Hollywood. One may think that the 2006 Pixar movie *Cars* was just for children. Although my children have enjoyed it dozens of times, the several times that I have watched it I am always touched by the story and the varying levels of complexity built into the screenplay and the film itself. Each time I watch it, I discover something new. This is Billy Jonas.

Lastly, I want to talk about Billy as an educator. I had the privilege of learning from him as he led several workshops at the conference. Billy grew up in a Conservative Jewish household in the suburbs of Chicago. His Jewish roots are deep, strong and sincere. He combines his knowledge of Jewish tradition with modern sensitivities that touch on the body, mind and soul. The latter element, the soul, is one that we often struggle to connect with, and Billy has a special gift of making the intangible seem tangible.

My goal in this article was singular — to get you excited about Billy Jonas coming to Adat Shalom, the weekend of March 25-27. To say that I am excited is a huge understatement. I urge you to come to everything and take advantage of Billy's presence with us. The details for the weekend can be found on pages 1 & 5.

In conclusion, I urge you not to miss Billy Jonas — I wouldn't want you to suffer the re-percussion of missing "it"!


