



FROM THE PRESIDENT Purim: It's Not Only About Food

***OMING UP IN THE JEWISH** calendar is Purim, a festival of fun and joy. However, the history and events that led up to our current celebration were anything but fun and joyful. The Book of Esther recounts the Jews of Persia, modern-day Iran,

being saved from destruction. Haman sought to destroy the Jews in revenge against Mordechai, who was the first person ever called "Jew," for not bowing down before him. We should all remember the subsequent events of Queen Esther asking the king not to exterminate the Jews, rather Haman and his sons being hanged on the same gallows that were constructed for the Jews. There is a similar theme in the Purim and Passover stories. Our enemies wanted to destroy us; it is interesting now how Iran is back on the radar screen

The festival is preceded by a minor fast, which means it is only during the day. The primary mitzvah attached to Purim is to hear the reading of Megillat Esther, the scroll of Esther. It is customary to have a feast or party after hearing the reading, to give gifts to friends, and to give charity to help the poor. We are encouraged to bring unopened boxes of pasta to use as

FROM RABBI BERGMAN ESTHER AND THE TRUE MEANING OF HEROISM



TE END EVERY SHABBAT with a verse from the book of Esther. We light the Havdalah Candle and say, "For the Jewish people there was light and joy, rejoicing and appreciation for the preciousness of life."

This verse is from the last chapter of the book, after the people had faced near annihilation, and were saved because of Esther's great bravery in implementing Mordechai's plan. If not for her courage, the Jewish people would have come to an end in the Persian empire. Instead, there was a vibrant Jewish community, in what is now Iran, up until the creation of the State of Israel in

BERGMAN our own time.

Mordechai learned that the Jewish people in Persia were in danger of being destroyed by Haman. He asked his niece Esther to risk everything by hiding her Jewish identity, and to marry King Achashverosh. She had to persuade the king to save her people, even though she could not tell him

FROM RABBI SHERE Simply Add Water

HEN ADDRESSING THE FIRST GRADERS at Hillel Day School's recent Siddur Party, I said to them, "While I hope you will treasure your siddurim and the beautiful words that they contain, I also hope you will remember that you don't need your siddur in order to talk to God. For, like the siddur, YOU have a lot of beautiful words inside of you and God wants to hear them


RABBI SHERE all."

I said this because I am concerned that, as Jews, we no longer experience prayer as the passionate and heartfelt experience our ancestors imagined it could be. Jewish prayer was once a far more individual and spontaneous experience. People used prayer as a means to express wonder and gratitude, to ask for help, and to connect to something larger than themselves. The first siddur was written in the ninth century, but it would be more than a thousand years before siddurim were mass produced and distributed in the synagogue. The pressure we feel today to keep up with the shaliach tzibur (prayer leader) or to be on "the right page" is a relatively new phenomenon in Jewish history.



"Selling" Your Chametz



The ownership of chametz (leavened food) during Pesach is prohibited in the Torah. For those who wish to adhere to this tradition, Adat Shalom will be

happy to arrange for the contractual (virtual) sale of your chametz to a non-Jew for the duration of the Pesach holiday. According to this contract, your ownership of your chametz will end at 10 a.m. on 14 Nisan (April 10) and will be restored at 9 p.m. on 23 Nisan (April 18).

You may arrange to sell your chametz beginning Monday, March 27, through 8:30 a.m. on the morning of Monday, April 10. To do so, you may email your name and address to be added to the contract (email Caren Harwood at charwood@adatshalom.org), or you may come in personally to sign the papers. To sign in person, please see Carly Rosen at minyan (M, T, W, Th, F mornings and Sun, M, W, Th evenings) or Caren Harwood during weekday business hours.

It is customary, but not necessary, to make a contribution to the synagogue for requesting that we act as the agent for the sale of your chametz. *If you wish to do so, we suggest a \$20 donation to Adat Shalom's Minyan Breakfast Fund.*

At Adat Shalom, all members of your family, whatever their birth order, are invited to join in the siyum and the deluxe *chametz* breakfast that follows.



This month we celebrate the holiday of Purim. While you may first be thinking about where you put the costumes and when the carnival will be, I'd like to take a moment to explore the other elements of Purim. It's so much more than costumes, carnival games, and hamantaschen! There are four Mitzvot (obligations) to Purim, and all of them can be made family-friendly with just a little bit of planning.

1. Hear the Megillah (Book of Esther): There is an opportunity to hear the full Megillah read, both Saturday night at B'nai Moshe and Sunday morning at Adat Shalom. For some families the opportunity to make noise and shake a grogger or box of pasta is enough to keep things interesting. If not, consider packing an entertainment bag – small snacks, puzzles, toy cars, and even crayons and a coloring book! The commandment is to hear the Megillah read. A child can play with a puzzle or roll cars around on a carpet and still hear everything.

2. Give money to those in need: Purim is a time of Jewish unity. Haman attempted a plan to kill all the Jews, but by working together, we were able to prevent it. This is a time when we remember the importance of supporting each other when in need. If your child has a bank or receives an allowance, this is a good time for them to learn to separate the amounts so that they can see what is for them and what they can donate. We try to give our contributions before Purim, so that the poor can enjoy a meal on Purim. On this day, you can show your children what they are donating and why.

3. Feast: On the day of Purim it is an obligation to have a joyous, festive meal. This, in and of itself, is child-friendly. Make sure to have lunch at our carnival and you'll be fulfilling this mitzvah with your family and friends.

4. Send gifts of food to friends. These mishloach manot or shalach manos are sometimes called Purim Parcels. On Purim, it is important to emphasize community and friendship. A gift of food is a package that contains at least two different (ready to eat/drink) foods. Your little one can help put this together and or decorate the container with markers or stickers (this would be considered hiddur mitzvah – beautifying the mitzvah).

Throughout the Talmud, prayer is called avodah she'ba'lev, work of the heart. What would it feel like to truly experience prayer as the work of our hearts?

I heard someone compare prayer to powdered soup mix. The prayer book contains the powder, but we have to add our own hot water in order to make it palatable. The hot water is made up of our personal thoughts and questions, requests and regrets, fears and passions.

As you may know, the word siddur comes from the Hebrew root seder, which means order. Prayer has the potential to fill our lives with order and meaning, joy and connection. But only if we add the water.

they were her people.

She gave up a lot just by marrying him. She saw what happened to the last wife, Vashti. He had a lot of other women in the harem, any of whom could replace her. He was no prize himself. He drank a lot and tried to impress his friends, who were all eunuchs. He had a bad temper. She could have been killed at any moment.

She did not have to risk her life. She could have stayed where she was, or once she was queen, she did not have to tell Achashverosh anything, and could have just remained rich and safe in the palace.

She did not do that. We know how the story ends, but she had no reason to think that what she did would work. Haman was a smart and powerful enemy. She risked it all

because it was the right thing. She saved the Jewish people. She saved her whole country, because Haman would not have stopped with Jews. Hatred and paranoia doesn't limit itself to just one group.

This is what we have always done as a people, and need to do so in the future. We are not here just to save ourselves, nor should we think that we should, but look to save the world, one person, one place at a time, no matter how impossible it seems.

We are living in a world where it seems like everyone is trying just to save themselves. This can only lead to tragedy.

Ego and triumphalism will destroy us. Risking what we have to help others live good and safe lives will save us.

Esther risked her life to help her people. This is why the book is named after her. This is why we remember the light she brought to the world every week.

deeply de-religionized culture will we find it?" (Jewish Review of Books, Summer 2014, pp.11-12).

In 2014, he elaborated that "such is the degree in secularization among the West's elites now that religious liberty is felt by many believers to be at risk." Is the S.Q.N. of a synagogue increasing religious faith through worship or inspiring congregants to feel more religious by spending more time in the Jewish People's most religious city of Jerusalem? Perhaps the S.Q.N. of the synagogue is to teach how to treat each other with respect. For example, in the synagogue we can learn from the reference to Rabbi Nehunya ben Hakanah who explained why he lived a long life: "I never sought respect through the denigration of another person" – "Mayamai lo Nitkabodti biklon chaveri"

What is the S.Q.N. of our synagogue? Perhaps it is all of the above. What do you think?
