FROM THE PRESIDENT

EXCERPTS FROM HIS HIGH HOLIDAY MESSAGE ON ROSH HASHANAH

AREN AND I JOINED Adat Shalom for the same reason as did many of you. We found this large shul to be warm and welcoming. That is not always the case when new families join large synagogues.

In Hebrew there are several terms for synagogue, and one is *Beit Knesset*, literally a house of gather-

ing or assembly. Adat Shalom is just that type of house, with activities to span all ages. Imagine how much fun it is to watch – or even more so to participate in – a class for infants who are just a few months old. These types of programs continue for toddlers, often involving parents and grandparents. What can be better than connecting to two or three generations all at the same time here at shul.

We have 149 pre-K through 7th grade students learning and experiencing here in the Adat Shalom Beth Achim Learning Community. In the fall those with school-age children can have the joy of experiencing *havdalah* together as a family, but also as a community. During the summer there is *Shabbat in the Sun* with the same opportunity to enjoy a *freilach* Shabbat experience together.

We have almost 100 families with children at Hillel Day School, and our clergy are there having

when I tell them that I did not have a cantorial role model while growing up. They are even more taken aback when I tell them that most of my encounters with cantors as a youth were negative!

It was not until I was an adult, studying at the Jewish Theological Seminary, that I encountered my cantorial mentor – Cantor Jack Mendelson. At the time, Cantor

Mendelson was teaching at both JTS and Hebrew Union College, and was serving as the cantor of Temple Israel Center in White Plains, New York. His classes were always the highlight of my day, my week, and my entire tenure at cantorial school. Cantor Mendelson's personality can fill up a stadium. He has a wonderful sense of humor and always intrigued his students with his stories about growing up in Brooklyn and how he was destined to become a cantor. His colossal voice and inimitable cantorial style are second to none and he is one of the last living masters of the long and venerable tradition of hazzanut (cantorial performance music).

FROM RABBI BERGMAN THOUGHTS FOR AN ELECTION YEAR



RABBI BERGMAN

was very fortunate to have been a senior administrator at the Frankel Jewish Academy at the very beginning of the school's history. I was involved in interviewing a lot of the first faculty. One of the teachers who was applying to be the department head of science asked me if I wanted him to teach Creationism in biology class, since we were a Jewish day school. I said absolutely not, much to his relief. The story of the creation of the world was for the Torah classes. We wanted the science classes to reflect the best of current scientific thinking.

Maimonides, known as Rambam, was our greatest intellectual. He was proficient in math, science and philosophy, in addition to his complete mastery of Jewish text and tradition. He stressed the importance of scientific reasoning, even when conflicting with the Torah itself. He said in such cases, we should treat the story in the Torah as a parable.

FROM RABBI SHERE ONE NATION UNDER GOD

DURING THE ELECTION SEASON, it has seemed, at times, that our nation's divisions have never been worse. However, on October 3, 1863, when President Abraham Lincoln, by presidential proclamation, created an annual national holiday for Thanksgiving, our nation wasn't simply divided politically as it is now; it was

actually at war with itself.

In such a tense and trying time for our nation, Lincoln realized the importance for all Americans, in both the North and the South, to celebrate and appreciate their blessings on the same day. Looking at his proclamation today, I am especially moved by President Lincoln's ability to act in a way that our tradition calls, "Hakarat Hatov," recognizing the good. His address began with the following words: "The year that is drawing toward its close has been filled with the blessings of fruitful fields and healthful skies...In the midst of a civil war of unequaled magnitude and severity, which has sometimes seemed to foreign states to invite and provoke their aggressions, peace has been preserved with all nations..." It is a spiritual prayer that can put us closely in touch with the transcendent embedded within Judaism. Every form of Kaddish ends with an expectation that one day there will be peace.

I raise this issue because we are in an election year. The presidential election has gotten the most notice, but we often neglect the local and state elections that probably have as much, if not more, of an impact on our daily lives, as the national ones do. Those politicians are the ones who most determine what is taught in our schools.

It is important that we make sure our communities have good schools that teach the best of the secular world through critical thinking, and not just preconceived religious beliefs. Wherever we send *our* children, we must make sure that *all* children have access to excellent education.

Discussions of God are important, and should happen in religious institutions and religious studies classes. Judaism does not see a conflict between science and religion, but each religion has its own approach. The state should not be endorsing one over another.

We must make sure our local elected officials are committed to curricula that reflect scientific and mathematical standards, and not their own theological ones. It is one of the foundations of a healthy democratic society, the kind of society in which we as Jewish people have flourished.

A dat Shalom is one of thousands of organizations around the world who will participate in the Global Day of Jewish Learning. This year's theme is "Under the Same Sky."


On that morning, Rabbi Bergman will teach an adult education class at Adat Shalom entitled "The Earth is Full of Your Creations."



Matrix series with two volumes of the series to be published each year for five years. The intent of the series is to be "transformational, to draw out the spiritual and transcendent embedded within Judaism." This year 2016, the two volumes published were *Birkat Kohanim* and *Kaddish*.

From our Adat Shalom pulpit, our world has been described as "scary." To help us in our personal and in our collective "scary" times, many of us praise God via prayers such as Kaddish while praying to be partners with God in repairing the world in God's sovereignty – "I'takkein Olam B'malkhut Shaddai" (Siddur Sim Shalom, "Aleinu" prayer.) I believe that the Kaddish prayer can inspire us to constructive action. Anthropomorphically, the Rabbis imagined God praying "May it be MY will that MY mercy conquer MY anger...that MY mercy overcome MY sterner attributes and that I behave toward my children with the attribute of mercy and that for their sake, I go beyond the boundary of judgment." (Babylonian Talmud B'rachot. page 7A). When the Kaddish is said, we join with God in praying for a better world.

In 28 chapters, the Mesorah Matrix *Kaddish* explores the Kaddish as it relates to the redemption of the world, the resurrection of the dead and the place of Kaddish in Jewish prayer since the beginning of the Common Era. The Kaddish can strengthen us even in the most difficult personal and communal times.

Rabbi Sidney Greenberg, one of the most influential Conservative pulpit rabbis of the twentieth century, commented on how fragile life is and that we need to handle that fragility in part with prayer that can lead to action. The action of praying the Kaddish in community reminds us that while we may be lonely, we are never alone.

A Message from Melissa Ser **Director of Education**

IF YOU HAD ASKED MY MOTHER ל"ל what her favorite Jewish holiday was, she would have, without hesitation, said "Thanksgiving."

Thanksgiving? It's not a Jewish holiday, per se. However, the Pilgrims really were celebrating a delayed Sukkot harvest festival, and so the origins of the holiday are truly Jewish. And we did have that wonderful Thanksgivukah two years ago when Chanukah and Thanksgiving took place simultaneously. But what's Jewish about Thanksgiving - and how can we incorporate Jewish values around our table?

In Judaism, we talk about Shalom Bayit (Peace in the Home), Hakarat Hatov (Gratitude) and Hachnasat Orchim (Welcoming Guests). On Thanksgiving we are Sameach b'Chelko (Happy with our Lot), and we definitely Ma'achil Re'evim (Feed the Hungry). These Jewish values are central to the ideas of Thanksgiving in America.

When my family lived in Jerusalem, we still made an effort to celebrate Thanksgiving each year, but made it a Thanksgiving Shabbat (since Thursday wasn't a holiday there). It was the only time of year when whole turkeys could be found in Israeli grocery stores (and the butchers knew to start stocking them in mid-November, alongside cans of pumpkin and cranberry sauce). The joyous spirit of family, of welcoming, of gratefulness, and of peace was felt throughout the room, and just like in my childhood, no one left hungry.

Some would say that Thanksgiving is not a Jewish holiday, and we should instead focus on the holidays that ARE Jewish. However, as an American-Israeli-Jew, I wholeheartedly embrace my mother's favorite Jewish holiday. It is the one that brings all of our values, quite literally, to

the table.

Happy Thanksgiving.


