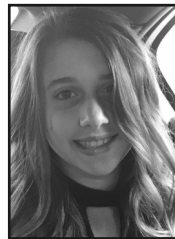

FROM THE PRESIDENT, KEN GOSS **WISHING YOU A THANKFUL THANKSGIVING**

When this issue of the Voice arrives in November, the theme of thanks and giving will be all around us. Coincidentally, I am actually writing this during Sukkot, which is a Jewish holiday of Thanksgiving. Many cultures have a specific festival to celebrate and give thanks. Around the globe these are agriculturally based, like Sukkot. Here in the United States most of us in cities don't have that harvest connection during our November celebration.

We can have other reasons to give thanks - continued good health, our families coming together for the abundance of food, and so many more reasons. In our tradition, one way we give thanks is through performing mitzvot and study. November at Adat Shalom is full of these opportunities, between Shabbat Torah Study sessions, Lunchtime Learning, and especially the November 12 Global Day of Learning. This is a worldwide program that connects Adat Shalom to over 500 communities in 44 countries. A very special program for K'lal Yisrael... all Jews worldwide.

FROM HAZZAN GROSS **ALWAYS SAY "THANK YOU"**

It's one of the first lessons we learn in life: always say "thank you." Our ancient sages understood this notion well and it is displayed in a myriad of ways in our tradition. One of the Hebrew names of the Jewish people itself, *Yehudim*, comes from the same root as the word for thanks (*Todah!*). The first word out of our mouths in the morning is supposed to be *modeh*, which means thank you. We also give thanks during the Amidah, a succession of blessings that is found within every prayer service. The final three blessings in every Amidah are about gratitude, and the middle blessing of those three is referred to by its first word, *Modim*, which is plural for thanks. There are times in the service when the entire Amidah is first said privately and then the *shaliach tzibbur* (prayer leader) repeats the entire thing out loud. What transpires during this repetition is what I want to draw your attention to. When the *shaliach tzibbur* gets to the *Modim* blessing, there is a second version of this benediction that the congregation is supposed to concurrently recite. The message behind this custom of everyone reciting this particular blessing is powerful. The theory behind the *shaliach tzibbur* repeating the entire Amidah is that there may be people who are unable to say the silent Amidah on their own. By merely responding *Amen* to all of the blessings, it's as if everyone present is saying the blessings as well. The one prayer, however, that each person has to say individually is *Modim*, the blessing of thanks. Saying thank you is not something that someone else can do on our behalf, we must do it ourselves, individually. You may have heard the saying that every Jew is supposed to say one hundred blessings each day. It so happens that the numeric value of the word *modim* is 100. This month, as we prepare to celebrate with family and friends on Thanksgiving, I hope and pray that you are able to find one hundred things to say thank you for. On Thanksgiving Day and every day.



FROM RABBI BERGMAN **RENEWING OUR VOWS AS A PEOPLE**

Ruth and I spent our first year married in Israel. We were both students, and it was a really great way to begin our marriage. 2018 will be the seventieth anniversary of Israel, and our thirtieth of being married. I am incredibly grateful for both of these events.

I have been thinking a lot about how marriage has been changing, and how our connection to Israel as American Jews has been changing, too. I think the two are related.

Let me begin with the changes to marriage. For much of human history, marriage was a relationship of mutual need. One partner, usually a man, earned money outside the home, but was not terribly involved within it. The other, usually a woman, took care of the home, including all childcare responsibilities, but had a limited role at best in public. Affection and love was a bonus, but not necessary. Marriage was limited to only a man and a woman, with the presumption that all children would be born to married couples. Just about everyone got married. It is not clear that these relationships were happy, but they were part of the communal norms and expectations.

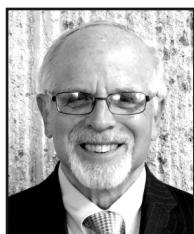

In this sea of indifference by Jews to Judaism and to the Jewish people, some Jewish people stood out as proud, involved and generous. One of these was Monty Hall z"l who died on September 30, 2017 at the age of 96.

An indefatigable fundraiser and philanthropist for Jewish causes, Hall is described as having "a particular love for Israel." Renowned for co-creating and hosting "Let's Make a Deal," he is praised for being "equally if not more proud of raising, by some estimates, more than one billion dollars for charity."

We learn in the Talmud – Menachot 43b:

It was taught, Rabbi Meir used to say, 'A person must make one hundred (me'ah) blessings each day, as it stated (Deuteronomy 10:12), "And now Israel, what (mah) does the Lord, your God, ask of you."

Come to minyan – we'll help you get close to 100 blessings (there are 19 blessings recited in the Amidah prayer alone). On weekdays and Sundays after minyan, we provide a breakfast followed by Birkat HaMazon (grace after meals – another 4 blessings!)

We can also show appreciation in how we treat other people.

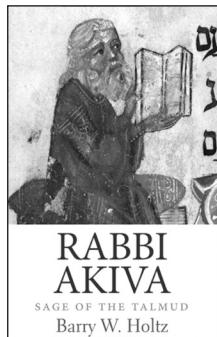

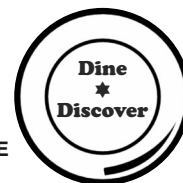

The Sisterhood of Adat Shalom Book Club Goes to Book Fair

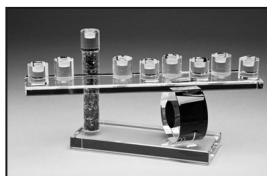

Monty Hall hosted 4,700 episodes of "Let's Make a Deal," one of the most successful shows in television history. People in his audience dressed in costumes, in hopes of being picked by him to appear on "Let's Make a Deal."

There was a larger goal in what Hall had in mind when he picked people to appear on his show. That goal was inclusiveness. Hall told the Archive of American Television in a 2002 interview: "Let's Make a Deal was the first television show that used black people, brown people, yellow people, old people, fat people, skinny people . . . a cross-section of America."

During Friday night and Shabbat morning services, we pray the words of Psalm 92 whose first commitment is "It is good to give thanks to God – Tov L'Hodot LaShem." On the Sunday night after Thanksgiving, November 26, 2017, at the home of Beverly & Hadley Wine, I will lead a discussion on people in our lives who have been/are blessings. Those people can be parents, siblings, friends or public figures, such as Monty Hall. It is good to give thanks to God for their presence in our lives.

The program previously known as "Supper Series," is now entitled "Dine & Discover."

Aside from his best friend – his wife Marilyn to whom he was married for 70 years – Monty Hall's circle of friends included the Rabbi of his Conservative congregation Beth Ahm, Rabbi Jack Pressman z"l, a University of Pennsylvania and Jewish Theological Seminary Rabbinic School graduate, with whom he socialized regularly. His humanity, compassion and love for the Jewish people and all of God's creation will be a focus, but not the only one, at our November Dine & Discover gathering.

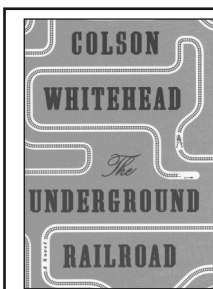

Every year we begin a new cycle through the holidays, but there is one holiday that we have the gift of celebrating every week. 'God blessed the seventh day and declared it holy, because on it God ceased from all the work of creation that He had done' (Genesis 2:3); therefore we have the gift of Shabbat. From sundown Friday night to sundown on Saturday, we have the gift of rest.

Each family has a different dynamic and therefore rest or peace looks different in every household. I challenge you to add a new tradition to your Shabbat. Below are some suggestions.

1. Light Shabbat candles and begin Shabbat with a glow. Each member of the family can share their favorite part of the past week.
2. Bake or buy challah for Shabbat dinner. Say the prayer Hamotzi.
3. Read a Shabbat story. Check out the PJ library website for suggestions or to register your child.
4. Shabbat dinner can be the highlight of Shabbat. Whether you are at home, at a friend's, or out to dinner; check out this site <http://www.yutorah.org/shabbattable/> for a few thought provoking conversation starters.
5. Take turns each week and have a member of the family pick a new game to play. Try to pick a game that does not require batteries or writing.
6. Google the Torah portion of the week and print out a simple summary. Fill a paper bag with miscellaneous items from your home, and have each member of the family (and guests) try to act out the story using the brown bag items as props.
7. End Shabbat with Havdalah. Have everyone share what they are looking forward to in the week to come.

The Torah tells us that God spent six days creating the universe, and that on the seventh day, God rested. This down time is a separation from the rest of the week, a chance to rejuvenate (or re-Jew-venate) and spend quality time with family and friends. We can take a break from the endless cycle of news and social media that fill our week, and try to focus inward on ourselves and our loved ones. As Shabbat ends, we mark the beginning of the new week with Havdalah, a short ceremony that separates the holiness of Shabbat from the mundane.

Part of observing Shabbat is creating a peaceful time and space. We aim to do this at the synagogue, with friends, and especially in our homes. We value *sh'lom bayit*, "peace in the home," not just on Shabbat, but all the time. There are challenges all around us; how can you create more peace in your life, your home, and the world? (Jewish Holidays, Jewish Values, Behrman House, 2014)

We begin Shabbat with three symbols. We light two or more candles, each with one wick. We drink wine after we sanctify the day. We taste challah, symbolic of the times of the Temple in Jerusalem.

When Shabbat comes to an end, we also thank God for the wine, but here we use it to extinguish the flame of one candle with many wicks. Instead of delicious challah to nourish our bodies, we have the aroma of spices like cinnamon and cloves to nourish our soul.

Wishing you a year of restful and "re-Jew-venating" Shabbatot!

Fewer people are getting married today. Who is allowed to marry has also changed. Fewer children are being born to couples married to each other than not. There are some significant challenges, but as long as the parents have the best interests of their children at heart, the children seem to be fine. Those couples who do marry seem to have happier relationships.

The reason for this is that people are not getting married because they need each other, but because they really love and understand each other. Marriages are more and more based on mutual respect and mutual sharing of responsibilities, and less on roles defined by gender and identity.

I think this approach is the future of the relationship between those Jews who live in Israel and those who live outside it. For many years, this connection was defined by mutual need. Israel provided a safety net against the possibility of diaspora Jews needing to flee their homes because of antisemitism. It was a city of refuge. Jews living outside of Israel would contribute resources toward the economy and well being of Israel.

Israel today is doing very well economically. It is safe, though it is still in a volatile region. Jews in other countries, particularly America, are also safe, even though antisemitism is a significant concern. There are many ways of being Jewish. This means that the two groups do not really need each other any more in order to survive.

The relationship is now going to have to be based on mutual respect, understanding and love. I believe that this will lead to a stronger, and more meaningful connection that will last for many, many years to come.

Israelis and all Jews need to listen to each other's fears, legitimize each other's differences, and open our hearts to each other. It has never been more important to visit Israel, and to encourage others to do so. Only by getting to really know each other will the relationship flourish.

Let's make Israel's seventieth anniversary a renewal of vows between all Jews.

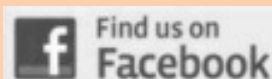
