FROM HAZZAN GROSS MAZEL TOV?

PERHAPS THE ONLY PERSON who fields more questions than a pregnant woman is a parent during a long road trip. People are naturally curious, but caring as well. So what should one say to an expectant mother to express good wishes? When Lauren was pregnant, many people would wish us "Mazel tov!" and then follow that remark with "I know that's not what you're supposed to say, but I'm not sure what else to say."

Is it wrong to say "Mazel tov" at a time like this? I say absolutely not, but there are those

who would disagree with me. Why? Because in addition to being curious, Jews are superstitious. Many Jews invoke the phrase kenne hora, a colloquial pronunciation of the three Yiddish words: kein ayin horah - "no evil eye." Intended to ward off evil, this concept has its roots in the CONTINUED ON PAGE 4

FROM RABBI BERGMAN In the Time of the Omer

WE ARE NOW IN THE TIME between Pesach, the holiday of our exodus from Egypt and Shavuot, the holiday of the giving of the

These two holidays together represent our physical and spiritual liberation. One is not more important than the other. We have bodies, minds and spirits, and they all live

together in the same place and need to be nurtured.

This period of time is known as the *Counting of the Omer*. It is mostly about learning how to live a happy and balanced life. As you know, this is not easy and requires constant adjusting.

The Kabbalists, the Jewish mystics, created an interesting system for thinking about this period. They noticed that the Torah divides this period into seven weeks, as opposed to forty nine days. They said that each week represented a different Sefirah, a different aspect of God.

These are the Sefirot of the seven weeks:

- 1) Chesed Compassion, acceptance without judgment
- 2) Gevurah Strength and Judgment
- 3) Tiferet Beauty, a combination of Chesed and Gevurah
- 4) Netzach Victory, changing what needs to be changed
- 5) *Hod* Splendor, leaving alone what needs to be left alone
- 6) Yesod Foundation, knowing what needs to be changed and what does not
- 7) Malchut Sovereignty, where heaven and earth meet, balances all the other qualities and creates a peaceful

In Kabbalistic writing, these seven Sefirot are represented as two inverted triangles balancing on each other and then both on the last one. Balance is the key, not too far to the right or left or the whole thing could fall over and collapse.

Many of these terms are found in Lecha Dodi. which we sing on Friday nights. It, too, was written by Kabbalists in Sfat. The first time I heard Lecha Dodi was as a very stressed sophomore at the Hillel House in Ann Arbor. Hearing it was when I would start to relax, to feel that I had made it to the end of the week, and that at least for a little while that my life was rebalanced.

If you think about it, a week is like the seven Sefirot. It is two sets of three days, balancing on top of one day, Shabbat.

Judaism in general is about finding your middle, your balance and equilibrium. Blessings on food are a chance to pause a moment and remind yourself to enjoy what you are eating. Prayer is spending a few moments quietly reminding yourself each day that you are a person and not a drone. Lifelong Torah study allows you the opportunity to learn interesting and meaningful ideas and challenge yourself at the same time.

Maybe the most effective tool in finding your balance is asking questions. That is one of the highlights of Passover. It is how the Talmud begins.

The most important question is "Why am I doing or saying what I am doing or saying?" Is it out of habit and anger, or out of genuine belief that it is the most helpful thing you could be doing?

Look at what the other person needs, and adjust yourself, if you really want to help. If you cannot, you may just need to not get involved in the situation.

This will not give immediate

at board meetings far surpassed my expectations. Reshaping our governance and the composition of the Board as well as the structure of the Board meetings, which I believe created an environment in which our lay leadership was truly engaged and felt as though their contributions mattered, is the single achievement of which I am most proud.

I also tried to bring a new level of transparency to the business of the synagogue. Our financial situation, membership statistics, school enrollment and operating challenges should be shared with the congregation, and I have tried to do that. We made significant strides in achieving a balanced budget, in no small part by closing the Early Childhood Center, and we renewed the contracts of Rabbis Bergman and Shere and Hazzan Gross, thereby assuring continuity in our clergy for at least the next several years. Melissa Ser and the Curriculum Committee has made significant progress in improving the quality and curriculum of our religious school. We have also achieved stability in our catering operations, which will continue to benefit the Synagogue in the future.

There is, of course, still work that needs to be done. I regret that we were not able to raise much needed additional funds for our endowment and our building requires a significant amount of capital improvements. While our membership has stabilized, we have not gained as many new members as I had hoped. I'm optimistic that we'll achieve these goals in the coming years.



roots in the Talmud, Pirkei Avot and Kabbalistic writings. People have strong feelings when it comes to trying not to "jinx" things. So does saying "Mazel tov" upon hearing that news that someone is pregnant tempt the evil eye? No, because what's important here is one's good intentions, or their kavanah. Kavanah is often associated with ones' feelings when praying, but it can apply to other situations as well.

There is another expression, however, that one can say that is specific to the time of pregnancy: b'sha'ah tovah, which means "at a good hour." It is a wish for the pregnancy to be free of complications and for birth to take place when both mother and baby are fully ready and healthy. The next time you see a pregnant woman, feel free to wish her a "b'sha'ah tovah." But if you can't remember this expression, however, and another well-intended remark comes out of your mouth, there is nothing wrong with that. "Mazel tov" will be accepted in the spirit in which it was intended, with good wishes and no evil eye.



Conservative synagogue, located next to the Conservative Yeshiva. Israelis and Jewish Americans find many warts on each other. Far transcending their respective liabilities are the virtues and assets that both possess. To understand what these warts, virtues and assets are, I have read two books on Israel which are recipients of high praise in newspapers and in journals. For me they are the best two books written about modern Israel.

The first was written by a former Jewish American, a bar mitzvah from the Linden Heights Jewish Center in Brooklyn, N.Y., where I, too, became a bar mitzvah. Yossi Klein Halevi's "Like Dreamers: The Story of The Israeli Paratroopers Who Reunited Jerusalem and Divided a Nation" is a longitudinal narrative of seven paratroopers who helped to reunite Jerusalem in 1967. These soldiers went on to reshape Israeli society in very different ways. As an American immigrant with a modern Orthodox upbringing, Klein HaLevi knows how to tell a story to a Jewish American audience.

The second book which I read after returning from Israel is Ari Shavit's "My Promised Land." In 1897, Shavit's great–grand-father Herbert Bentwich, an affluent London lawyer and Zionist leader, led 21 British Jews to the Holy Land. Shavit traces Israel's history partly through the lives of his pioneering forbearer. Throughout the book, Shavit grapples with the vexing complexities of Israel's history, right up to the year 2013, when his book, the first that he wrote in the English language, was published. Shavit, like Klein HaLevi, can't help but marvel at the miracle of the "Jewish national project."

My visit to Israel was inspiring. It was a country filled with a zest for life and for purpose. As one cab driver put it, "We live in a Garden of Eden . . . well almost. It would be one if our neighbors would not keep trying to destroy us."

"Ein Ba'al Hanes Makir Et Niso" – "One living a miracle does not recognize his miracle."

I hope that you will pause for a moment on Israel Independence Day to thank God that we are living in a miraculous time when we can glory in the vitality and in the accomplishments of the Jewish State of Israel.
