AS THE MONTH OF ELUL APPROACHES...



The month of Elul, which begins this year on Wednesday, August 27, is traditionally associated with preparing for the High Holidays by waking up to the sound of the shofar and engaging in introspection and study in the weeks leading up to Rosh Hashanah.

You will hear a shofar blast at our morning minyan starting on the 27th.

Soon after, we invite you to join with our clergy and professional staff in four separate sessions designed to stimulate our minds and our souls.

Hazzan Dan Gross will lead off the series on Wednesday, September 3, with a lunchtime learning session entitled **KOL NIDRE: THE PRAYER. THE MYTH. THE LEGEND.** Hazzan Gross will demystify this hallowed prayer and will delve into its origin, customs and musical notoriety.

Dr. Melissa Ser, our Director of Congregational Learning, will discuss **ALEINU: ROSH HASHANAH AND BEYOND** at 7 p.m. on Monday, September 8. How can we best understand this ancient text, first written for the Rosh Hashanah Musaf service? Why did it become part of our daily liturgy? What is this prayer trying to teach us about how to live our lives - not just on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, but the other 362 days of the year as well?

Rabbi Rachel Shere has planned a lunchtime learning session, **Asking the Big Questions**, on Tuesday, September 9. Join her in thinking through such profound questions as: Why do we pray? Is God listening? Are all our deeds recorded? Through exploring the liturgy and asking the big questions now, we will make our High Holiday experience all the more meaningful.

Rabbi Aaron Bergman will conclude this year's Elul programs with a morning program at 9:30 a.m. on Sunday, September 14, entitled **THE CHALLENGE OF THE COMMANDMENT TO HONOR OUR PARENTS.** Our sages said that the hardest commandment to fulfill was the one to honor our mother and father. One reason is because we can never fully repay what our parents do for us. The other is that it is sometimes complicated trying to figure out the right way to honor parents who are very difficult. Rabbi Bergman says that we will also think about whether we ourselves are worthy of honor, and whether we make it possible for children to honor their parents.



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



FROM RABBI YOSKOWITZ MOURNING AS A COMMUNITY

In Preparing to report to you the highlights of the recent Rabbinical Assembly Convention in Dallas, I was amazed when I re-read a Biblical text which I studied at the convention with Shalom Hartman Institute Scholar Dr. Micah Goodman, one of the most substantive and inspiring teachers from whom I have ever learned.

Many rabbis have traveled to Israel's Shalom Hartman Summer Rabbinic Institute to study Jewish texts. At this Rabbinical Assembly Convention, a few of the outstanding Hartman scholars came to us. Highlights were the teaching of a four-hour session on *The Primacy of Ethics in Jewish Tradition* taught by Rabbi Donniel Hartman and a session on *Faith in God, God's Faith In Humanity – The Study of Beginnings*, led by Dr. Micah Goodman.

when I received my first text message. The reply on my flip phone was slow and laborious. I was not a fan. Fast forward to today. For me, texting has become an extremely succinct, convenient and practical way of communication. While I strongly believe that mobile and computer communication will never be as personable as a good, old-fashioned conversation, people are starting to rely on electronic communication more and more

I now receive useful text message alerts from my son's school, my home voicemail provider, my credit card, even a grocery store! This got me thinking that maybe there is a way Adat Shalom could benefit from texting.

Enter one of the most critical elements of Adat Shalom – the daily minyan. Our tradition imparts that there are certain

FROM RABBI BERGMAN MILK & HONEY

HE END OF AUGUST is the beginning of the Jewish month of Elul, the time that we start focusing on our spiritual goals for the coming year. I want to think about the image in the Torah of the Promised Land as a land flowing with milk and honey.

We have the records going back thousands of years of nations that lived in the

Middle East, including those living in what is known to us now as the land of Israel.

No other nation had called their land a land of milk and honey, including the Philistines, Canaanites, Jebusites and other assorted "ites" who lived there. This image should have been a prominent feature for everyone. They all had milk and honey as part of their culture.

In Egypt, milk and honey were used for religious rituals, mostly funerals, for all except the poor and the outsider.

An ancient Persian method of execution, called scaphism, used milk and honey. Described by Plutarch in the ife of Artaxerxes. Artaxerxes was probably a father or grandfather of Achashverosh of the Purim story. If Achashverosh invited you for tea and asked you if you wanted milk and honey in it, you knew it was not going to go well for you

In a Sumerian text from the time preceding Abraham, it was said that in the afterlife, in their version of heaven people would eat milk and honey.

The land of Canaan did not always flow with milk and honey during the time of Abraham, especially for the poor and the strangers. There was a lot of drought and famine. Abraham's willingness to share what he had was very impressive. He did not share it with kings to give himself more power and prestige, but with the outsiders and outcasts of the land.

Milk was the first thing served to weary travelers, as we see in the story of the tent of Abraham and Sarah and the three strangers they serve. When the Torah tells that we will be living in a land of milk and honey, I think it means that we are the ones who will have to transform it into that for everybody.

Honey is sweetness found in

The Synagogue is now processing High Holy Day tickets. Extra tickets for the Main Service for adult children over age 30 or parents of members may be purchased for \$275 per ticket. Please fill out request forms for extra seats with names of unmarried children and/or dependent parents. Checks must accompany your extra seat requests.

Tickets will be mailed to all members in good standing (current year's dues, building fund installment, and miscellaneous charges paid). Please take care of unpaid obligations now so that your tickets can be processed and mailed. If you have questions in regard to your current balance, please consult our controller, Carma Gargaro, 248-851-5100.

- RECIPROCITY -

Adat Shalom participates in a reciprocity program whereby members in good standing of other Conservative congregations outside Michigan may attend High Holy Day services at our synagogue. Please understand that reciprocity can be extended for a maximum of three consecutive years. For details, contact Alan Yost.

- SEATING -

In order to be assured of your choice of seats, we urge all congregants to arrive as early as possible for both Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. You may save seats only up until 10:15 a.m. Please follow this rule so that all congregants may be seated in an orderly manner. We have many wonderful volunteer ushers who are eager to help you in any way possible. If you have any questions while you are in the building during the holidays, please stop at the membership information table located in the main fover.

- PARKING -

Attendants will be on duty to direct you to a parking space. We realize that parking will be tight. WHEN LEAVING THE LOT, PLEASE WAIT UNTIL THE CAR AHEAD OF YOU PULLS OUT. WE MUST HAVE YOUR COOPERATION.

was that it was Conservative, conveniently located eight minutes from our home, the dues would be prorated according to our age, and I was offered a nursery school carpool! What more could we ask for? The only additional thing we could "hope" for was to find a sense of community. Carpool brought us to Adat Shalom, but friendships and a special sense of community have kept us here.

I recall filling out the membership paperwork in Alan Yost's office, and I could not have felt more welcomed. Our children knew that Alan always had good candy and good toys, but more importantly, he became a good friend to us and our sons. Minyan Musings

FROM BARRY L. LIPPITT, RITUAL DIRECTOR

WITH THE YEAR WINDING DOWN, I'd like to review what we've been trying to accomplish since last Rosh HaShanah.

THE TRIENNIAL SYSTEM AND ALIYOT...

We have been reading Torah on the triennial cycle for about six weeks. We have seven aliyot and the Torah reading has been ending by approximately 10:15 a.m. We begin assigning aliyot at 9:30 a.m. so that all being honored can be seated in front of the sanctuary to help with the flow of the service. If you would like an aliyah on Shabbat morning, please arrive and check in by 9:30 a.m. Better yet, contact me or my assistant, Caren Harwood, and make the request at least one week in advance.

The shorter length of aliyot provides a good opportunity for those who want to get back into Torah reading. If you are interested, please send me your name and the date(s) on which you would like to read.

PLEASE HELP US...

We are continuing to collate our members' Bar and Bat Mitzvah Torah readings and Haftarot. At times of the year when we have a reduced number of Bar/Bat Mitzvah services, we enjoy giving members opportunities to read on the anniversaries of their B'nai Mitzvah celebrations. Having this information will enhance our ability to contact you in advance of these occasions. Please send me an email that identifies your Bar/Bat Mitzvah sedrah and, if different, your Haftarah. When you're at the synagogue, you may add this information to the list we are compiling in the chapel.

Additional information will help us as well: your and your father's Hebrew/Yiddish names – and whether you (or for women, your father) are a Kohen or Levi.

MINYAN BREAKFAST...

An important Adat Shalom ritual following our daily minyan is eating a wonderful breakfast prepared by Marvin. We need your participation in order to offer enhanced breakfasts on a regular occasion and adding occasional "extras" to an unsponsored breakfast. Typically, you may want to sponsor a breakfast in observance of a *yahrzeit*, concluding a period of mourning, celebrating a *simcha*, such as a pre-Bar/Bat Mitzvah aliyah, the birth of a new baby, a birthday, an anniversary, or other special event. We do not limit the number of sponsors on any one morning. If you prefer an alternative to sponsoring a full breakfast, please consider a contribution to the Minyan Breakfast Fund to mark an aliyah, or an honor you have received at the daily minyan, or on any other special occasion.

Our breakfasts are always friendly events highlighted by discussions of current affairs, questions about ritual practice, Monday-morning quarterbacking (every day of the week), and the occasional joke, both new and old. If you've never been to breakfast with us, don't wait. Come to our morning minyan and join us afterward.



the land where there does not always seem to be sweetness. Milk is humble but nutritious.

One of the purposes of Zionism and Israel was to make that region once again into a land of milk and honey, and I believe the founders were remarkably, if not miraculously, successful.

They turned the land of Israel into a land flowing with milk and honey by being honest about our people's humble origins and by our commitment to social action. They were devoted to repairing the land. It is our sacred task to be participants in helping to maintain and develop a State of Israel that is always free and democratic, whether by visiting, supporting it financially, advocating for it, or even living there.

For the High Holidays, we additionally need to think about what are we doing to make all our homes into a land flowing with milk and honey. Do we recognize how much sweetness there really is, even when things are hard?

Do we try to help others whose lives are not as sweet as honey or even as humble and sustainable as milk?

The Torah does not want just one land of milk and honey, but – through our compassion, commitment and demand for justice and mercy – but the entire world.



imparts that there are certain prayers (including Mourner's Kaddish) that can only be recited in the presence of a minyan (ten Jewish adults). This aspect of communal reliance is the epitome of a synagogue. There are, however, occasional times throughout the year when we fall short of having enough people for a minyan. In order to accommodate those who are present, we need to get in touch with people right away to see if they are able to get to the synagogue in a very short time. I always thought how great it would be if there were a way to easily send an SOS message to a large number of people. Now there is!

Thanks to a program called Remind, we can send out a group text message to anyone who is interested in helping out our minyan at a last minute's notice. (Back in the day, this was accomplished by turning on a special "Minyan Help!" light out on the street.) There is no obligation to take part in Remind, but it is free and very easy to use. There are several ways to sign up to receive our "Minyan Maker" alert messages. The easiest way is simply to send a text to 248-987-5351 with the message @adats or you can also sign up at www.remind.com/join/adats. You can opt out of receiving messages at any time, but hopefully this is not a system we will need to rely on frequently. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to send me an email, or better yet, text me!

Hartman, Dr. Goodman selected only four texts from the Bible and from the Talmud. Rabbi Hartman taught very well. For me, Dr. Goodman's presentation surpassed all the others at the convention with unique insights and a superb teaching style.

I re-read Dr. Goodman's texts and his commentary on them. I was amazed by his commentary on Vayikra - Leviticus 10:6. He could not have known that the Jewish people, who always place protecting our children as a primary responsibility, would suffer the deaths of three of our teenagers. They were kidnapped and shortly thereafter killed by members of the terrorist group Hamas, and as the Psalmists did "B'erev Yalin Bechi," we cried and cried (Psalm 30). Dr. Goodman's commentary on the verse in Leviticus that tells of the deaths of two of Aaron's sons is instructive. The text reads: V'Acheichem Kol Beit Yisrael Yivko Et Hasarefah – All the House of Israel shall bewail these deaths by fire. Dr. Goodman commented: "When there is a major tragic event, such as the death of two leaders, Aaron's sons, the parents may not mourn only as individuals. They must mourn as part of the entire people Israel. The entire Jewish people must mourn with them."

The parents of the three young men – Eyal Yifrach z"l, Naftali Fraenkel z"l and Gilad Shaar z"l – whom we could not sufficiently protect from Hamas could not mourn alone. They had to allow us to mourn with them. Dr. Goodman taught this lesson from the Vayikra text to us.

As we begin to prepare for the High Holidays, and as we hear threats of a third intifada in an Israel already ablaze as a result of acts of terrorism, let us pray that the second half of the verse from Psalm 30 – "In the morning (after the night of tears) will come joy" – will soon come to pass.

There was much to study and to learn at the 2014 Rabbinical Assembly Convention, but Dr. Goodman's teaching by itself made our annual meeting of study and of camaraderie worthwhile.
