FROM RABBI YOSKOWITZ WHAT ARE IN YOUR POCKETS?

During Sukkot, it is customary to study the *Book of* Kohelet - *Ecclesiastes*. This book is linked with the Book of Job which several of us studied as preparation for Rosh Hashanah. J. Alberto Soggin states it this way:

"Ecclesiastes concludes the work of limiting wisdom which Job had begun; it deprives man of the vain hope of being able to recognize the supposed order of the universe."

The Rabbis caution us not to despair about our limitations. Rather, they say that there is a need for balance. In one pocket, they tell us, keep a note that reads "I am but dust and ashes." In the other pocket, keep a note that reads "I am but little lower than the angels," thus reminding us that we, like the patriarch Abraham, can fulfill God's commandment: You shall be a blessing - Veheyeh berakhah (Genesis 2:12).

What are in your pockets?

Is there a note of courage such as that

FROM HAZZAN GROSS THE HAPPIEST HOLIDAY

t's no wonder that my head always spins like crazy at this time of year. One needs a Ph.D. just to keep track of all of the late summer and early fall Jewish holidays. In the span of twenty-three days, there are five different Jewish holidays: Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, Sh'mini Atzeret and Simchat Torah. Despite the intense preparation and involvement that I put into each holiday, what often perplexes me the most is just trying to keep

track of "Which holiday is it today?" (As far as I know, Judaism is the only religion that juxtaposes two holidays with completely opposite nicknames: "The Day of Atonement"/Yom Kippur and "The Time of Our Happiness"/Sukkot.) The anchor of this holiday pentathlon is Simchat Torah.

I would like to argue that Simchat Torah is the happiest Jewish holiday. Why? Because here is a holiday that focuses on the single most important thing in the Jewish religion - the Torah. Without the Torah, there would be no Jewish people and without Jewish people, there would be no Torah. It is a symbiotic relationship that culminates on this one day of the year. Simchat Torah is a celebration of the

here is a story from our tradition that I used to find kind of puzzling. King David, who was known as a great musician and poet, asked God, "What do you think of my music?" God said, "It is good, but not as good as the croaking of a bullfrog." I thought God was being harsh to David, trying to keep his ego in check.

My understanding of this changed when I was at a retreat in the Catskill Mountains. It was late at night, and I was sitting by myself at the edge of a lake. I soon realized that I was listening to some of the most beautiful "music" I had ever heard. It was the croaking of bullfrogs and the rustling of the water and the swaying of the trees, all in perfect rhythm and harmony. This was the music God was talking about. It was a true psalm, a true prayer to God.

Rabbi Nachman tells us that the entire world and the universe itself makes wonderful music, if we would only listen CONTINUED ON PAGE 12



to stand up for the Jewish People and for the values we hold dear. This course will look at examples of such "text people," including the Jewish partisans of World War II, the Jewish Civil Rights Leaders in America, and those who have responded to issues of social justice in the 21st century. What Jewish values guide them and what can we learn from their actions?

10th Grade

I BELIEVE: JEWISH THEOLOGY AND ME

Instructors: Rabbi Joseph Krakoff and Hazzan Daniel Gross

Description: A central part of being Jewish is that we "wrestle" with God. This class will explore such important questions as: Is there a God? Who/What is God? What does it mean that I'm created in God's image? Do I -- and how do I -- relate to God? What is our understanding of God after the Holocaust? Is the Bible True? Do Jews believe in a messiah? What is my relationship with God? A significant part of this year will also be exploring the significant differences and commonalities among Reform, Conservative and Orthodox Jews and Judaism, with special attention to the question: What does it mean to me to be a Conservative Jew?

11th Grade Israel and Me: What is My Role as an American Jew?

Instructor: Dr. Melissa Ser

Description: Israel is the homeland of the Jewish people and, as an American Jew, I have a unique relationship with her. As such, what are the origins and significance of modern Zionism? What are the beginnings of the Arab-Israeli Conflict and how has that conflict evolved through the years? How does the media function in presenting Israel, the Middle East, and the Jewish People in general to the rest of the world? What are the Jewish obligations toward the non-Jewish world (and are those obligations different for Israeli Jews than for Diaspora Jews?)? As an American Jew, what is my connection to Israel? As a Jewish American, what is my connection to America? How do I relate to Israel if I don't always agree with her actions?

12TH GRADE

WHERE DOES GOD BELONG? MAKING ADULT JEWISH CHOICES FOR THE REST OF OUR LIVES

Instructor: Rabbi Aaron Bergman

Description: The mitzvot of Judaism (both ritual and ethical) provide spiritual meaning and practical guidance for Jewish adults. This course recognizes that our teens are preparing to graduate, enter college and the "real world." As such, they will be facing a number of new situations and questions for which Judaism offers guidance. The first semester will explore such important questions as what mitzvot govern Jewish dating and married life between spouses? What mitzvot govern having and raising children and what are examples of

Jewish families in the Torah from which we can learn? The second semester will focus on positive Jewish choices that our students make on campus and the tools we can arm them with to make these positive Jewish choices.

HEBREW CORE


ADVANCED HEBREW LEARNING

better at what we do.

Change and a desire for improvement are constants. They are very much a part of our synagogue as well. Over this past year we have hired a new director of congregational learning, Melissa Ser; brought in a new caterer, The Epicurean Group; renovated our social hall; and facilitated changes in the ATID teen education program. Yet, we know that further changes at our shul are both inevitable and desirable.

In order to chart out and prioritize the changes we'd like to implement, the Board of Trustees is holding an offsite meeting on October 21 to focus on key topics. This will be the first such offsite since November 2008. Some of the issues the Board discussed four years ago are still relevant, such as attracting new members and retaining our current membership and creating new and innovative programs to meet the changing needs of our members. We have new issues to address as well. In a future column, I'll report on the outcome of our offsite meeting. One thing I'm confident of is that we're all seeking improvement in our already wonderful synagogue, and that means there will be change.

to it. I think this is the key to understanding what the prayer "Shema" really means. It is usually translated as "Hear O Israel, the Lord our God, the Lord is One." What is the significance of "hear"? This is clearly a significant declaration of faith, but even The Ten Commandments do not start that way.

I prefer to translate it as, "If you listen, then you will know that God is God." If we pause for a moment, and sit in absolute quiet, then we will hear the world that God made, and the prayer that the world offers.

I think it is easiest to do this in nature, even in a park, but it can be in a city, as well. There are beautiful and strange sounds in the world, sounds that harmonize with and reflect each other. The next time you go for a walk, even in a mall, listen to everything around you. You will be amazed by the wonderful rhythms. It will no longer feel like noise, but a prayer.

In one pocket, there should be a note about our limitation. In the other, you may want to include the last verse in the *Book of Job, Chapter 28*, which you can cut out from this article:

Yirat Adonai he Chachma V'sur Merah Binah Fear of the Lord is wisdom, to shun evil is understanding

The notes in your pockets can indicate our limitations. It is good to recognize that notes of courage and of faith in God and in yourself should be in your pockets, too. They remind us that no matter how limited we are, there is much that we can do to make our little spot on this earth better for our being a part of it.
