FROM THE PRESIDENT MAINTAINING OUR STABILITY

hortly, you will receive your Synagogue dues statement for the 2011-2012 Fiscal Year. After many years of holding dues level, (the last increase was in 2007), the Board of Trustees has determined that it is time to raise dues.

We do not undertake this step lightly. When we reviewed dues at all Conservative and Reform congregations in metropolitan Detroit, we discovered that our dues were at the bottom of the scale. This, alone, is not a reason to raise dues, but we

considered that we provide an excellent "product," and that there is a cost associated with continuing to provide that "product" – We are a full service synagogue, which maintains a pre-school, religious school, and abundant youth group programming, in addition to a high level of adult educational opportunities and wonderful clergy. have a plethora of fond memories from my four years living in West Philadelphia during my undergraduate days at The University of Pennsylvania. It may come as no surprise that many of these memories have to do with singing. Penn has a dozen or so a cappella groups, some of which include Penn Masala (the world's first Hindi a cappella group), Pennyo (an all Chinese group), and Off the Beat, the group in which I

The Latin term a cappella literally means "in the manner of the chapel." The term today, however, is synonymous with singing without instruments. (Believe it or not, a cappella was "cool" long before the hit shows Glee and The Sing Off.) Now, Off the Beat is not your typical barbershop a cappella group. Described as a "modern rock coed a cappella group," here's a glimpse of just some of the artists we covered during my tenure with the group: Peter Gabriel, Nine Inch Nails, Weezer, Ozzy Osbourne, Coolio, and Tori Amos. In Off the Beat, singers use their voices to replicate the high soaring guitar riffs, the low resonating bass lines, and even the foot-tapping, head-nodding drum beats, aka "beatboxing." I was fortunate not only to sing with the group, but I also functioned as Music Director and President, and I composed many of the singing arrangements. I am grateful to live in a country in which we settle

political disputes with words, no matter how harsh at times, and with the vote.

I am particularly grateful this year to live in the first country in which Christians, Jews and Muslims have lived together as equals. Throughout history there have been moments, however brief, in which Jews lived peacefully under the control of another religion. People often quote the Golden Age of Spain as a highlight for our people and for ecumenicism. That period may have been significantly better than others, nonetheless Jews lived under the Muslim government. When that government was deposed, we lived under the Catholic one.

n Shabbat Vayera, read from Shabbat Minchah, November 5 through Shabbat November 12. we read in synagogue about a righteous gentile and about an entire community of evil people.

The righteous gentile, I believe, is King Abimelech of Gerar, who is told by God

that he has acted with a "blameless heart" (Genesis 20:6 in Etz Hayim, p. 110), in contrast to the people of Sodom who were destroyed due to their wicked behavior (Genesis 19:4-11, Etz Hayim, pp. 105-106). Not always though is it easy to determine who is a righteous gentile.

One such controversial figure is Reverend Dietrich Bonhoeffer. who died a martyr's death in 1944. A recent biography of Bonhoeffer by Eric Metaxas was the number one best-seller on The New York Times best-seller non-fiction e-books listed in the Sunday, September 25, Book Review Section. The New York Times describes the book tersely as "a biography of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a German pastor and theologian who was hanged for his part in the assassination plot against Hitler."

(We will serve juice and a treat from 9:30 to 9:50 a.m. for anyone who gets here before 10 a.m.) At 10 sharp, we begin our morning Tefillah with a rousing cowboy style Modeh Ani. Hazzan Gross has taught everyone that melody, and our K-3 students sing it every Sunday. Students will be called up to lead many of our morning prayers! Our students receive a special bead for their reading bracelets when they participate in any Family Shabbat service. When it comes to Torah service time, our special storytelling guests will provide a Torah reading like none you have ever before seen. In their hands, the Torah truly comes alive! After services we invite everyone to enjoy the kiddush "lunch" that the Adat Shalom Sisterhood provides whenever there is a Bar or Bat Mitzvah with the addition of some extra kid-friendly snacks. There will be two child care rooms open from 10 a.m. until the completion of services. Everyone is welcome in the Family Service, but the content of our "storahtelling" may be challenging for children younger than 2nd grade. Younger children are invited to stay as long as they can and then take a break in our Shabbat play

This summer, Bonhoeffer scholar Professor Geffrey Kelly spoke on "The Cost of Christian Discipleship for Dietrich Bonhoeffer" at Chautauqua, New York. When action was requested from Israel's Yad Vashem to designate Reverend Bonhoeffer as a "righteous gentile," much controversy in the Jewish communitv ensued.

Who was Bonhoeffer? Was he a "righteous gentile"? Why was he so controversial? These are some of the questions I will address in the first 5772 Supper Series offering, now in its seventeenth year in Metro Detroit. Reverend Bonhoeffer was a man of great courage. Those of you who have met him either through his writings or through writings about him are likely never to forget him. If you decide to participate in the November 6 Supper Series program, or to read about Reverend Bonhoeffer, please let me know if you think that he was a "righteous gentile." He was a giant of a man, but was he a "righteous gentile," as well?

Did his defense of "Christians of Jewish origin" sometimes highlight his lack of similar vigorous defense of Jews who did not convert? Was this "righteous" behavior?

I agree that these periods of time were far safer for us, but I think we have to be careful not to romanticize them. At no point were we full and equal members of those societies.

In America, we are full partners in society, answerable to no other religion. The same is true for every other religious, ethnic or cultural group. No one may prevent others from living freely and pursuing their lives as they see fit. The founders of our country may not have written the Constitution with divine inspiration, but they were the first to make a truly free society possible.

My prayer is that the spirit of democracy which infuses America becomes an inspiration for the whole world, with members of each religious group living peacefully with each other, not under each others' domination. That will be an achievement for which we can be truly grateful.

With the increase, our dues level will still be lower than comparatively sized Reform Temples and Conservative Synagogues in the Detroit Metropolitan area. Based on our annual expenses and in consideration of all membership units, our dues would need to be \$2,226 per member account for each of the current 980 member accounts. After much consideration, the new base dues will be \$2,150. Although we have been fortunate enough not to need to rely fully on membership dues to balance our budget and pay our operational expenses, the money received from dues is significant in that regard.

We look forward to continuing to build a solid and financially stable base for our future. Thank you for your continued affiliation with Adat Shalom.
