



n mid-October, 35 members of the Board of Trustees attended a retreat to strategize about the future of Adat Shalom. We divided into three groups to discuss different pre-selected topics. People were engaged and passionate, and many different suggestions were made, though three themes emerged.

Congregations Ahavas Achim (1912-1968), Beth Aaron (1943-1968) and Beth Achim (1968-1998) are all part of Adat Shalom's history. When Adat Shalom merged with Beth Achim in 1998, our congregation absorbed the histories of Beth Achim and of the congregations which merged to become Beth Achim in 1968. Two years ago, when the call went out for photo-

FROM HAZZAN GROSS DAILY PRAYER FOR RAIN...IN DECEMBER?

here are many personal prayers that I'm sure are said in December: "Lots of snow!" "No snow!" "The iPad mini for Chanukah." "Good health." "A Red Wings victory (or at least a game)." And on the 5th of December, in our liturgy we start to pray for... rain. Rain? Yes, rain.

The ninth blessing in the weekday Amidah is known as Birkat HaShanim - the blessing of the years. This prayer is a request for agricultural abundance,

specifically for the success of the harvests. The Amidah is one of the most private moments in a service, yet amidst praying for our own personal needs, we turn our hearts to the needs of our land - specifically our ancestral homeland, Israel. This speaks volumes about our liturgy and about our religion. Prayer is often associated with deep, innermost requests involving petitions to God. Here in the Diaspora, however, during the middle of winter and the darkest time of year, we unselfishly think and pray for others. Israel is mostly desert land and desperately requires water. Our ancestors did not have the advanced irrigation systems that are now scattered throughout the country - therefore, they needed rain. This prayer provides a tangible way for us to connect to Israel.

You may be confused and thinking,

FROM RABBI BERGMAN CHANUKAH, OH CHANUKAH...

veryone loves the first days of Chanukah. Children are excited by what gifts they may get. Parents are hopeful that their children will appreciate the gifts they receive. We can all eat just one more latke without guilt or heartburn. The lights, small as they are, fill the room.

The last days are another story. We can't look a potato in the eye. The children know the

good presents are over, or maybe they will get socks or school supplies. The thank yous to the parents have probably stopped, even if the perfect gift was given.

This is precisely why the last days of Chanukah are probably more important than the first. Let me explain.

In the Talmud there is a debate over how many candles we should light each day. The school of Shammai says we start with eight, and then count downward. This way we would know how many days were left. The school of Hillel, which we follow in general, says that we start with

ast month I taught a Lunchtime Learning class at Adat Shalom about Martin Buber and his

seminal work, I and Thou. The book is complicated, but its central message is that the place to find God is in our relationships with other human beings.

Buber writes, "Don't we find that modern developments have expunged almost every trace of a life in which human beings confront each other and have meaningful relationships?" This state-

ment, written in 1923, could easily have been written today. In our era of Facebook, text messaging and the Internet, meaningful face to face contact between human beings is becoming more and more rare. I am not sure what "modern developments" Buber was highlighting, but I can only imagine what he would have to say about today's modern developments and the ways in which they expunge life with meaningful relationships.

Earlier this year, Stephen Marche authored a well-written article in The Atlantic entitled, "Is Facebook Making Us Lonely?" The article states, "Within this world of instant and absolute communication, unbounded by limits of time or space, we suffer from unprecedented alienation...We have never been more CONTINUED ON PAGE 10

one candle, and add one each day. The idea is that we increase the amount of holiness over time, and not decrease it.

This is a great metaphor for our lives. I feel bad for people who always say, "same old, same old," or "been there, done that." I feel worse for the people who have to live with them or listen to them. They are bored by just about everything.

Judaism says that every moment of every day of our lives can be filled with holiness if we bring enthusiasm to it and show appreciation for what we do. You may have eaten a thousand sandwiches, but you have never eaten the one you are about to have for lunch. That sandwich was made out of ingredients that will never occur again exactly that same way.

This is only a way of thinking about things. I chose the sandwich model because I am about to eat lunch, but you get the idea. If we say to ourselves each day that the world is newly created and that we have a chance to enjoy it in a way that no one

before or after us could, then we will grow in appreciation for our lives, and not be bored by even the most mundane things.

When you light those last Chanukah candles, remember that we can increase the light, the holiness, in the world each day.

(pages 12-25).

Now as I research the history Congregation Beth Achim, I make the same request of you that I made at the beginning of this multi-year project of recording our history. If you can, please provide me with photos from Beth Achim's history. As best as you can, please identify the people in the photographs, the occasion or event, and the date.

You will receive this issue of The VOICE just before Chanukah. Perhaps the first photographs that you send will be that of Chanukah celebrations at Beth Achim.

Next spring we will have forums at Adat Shalom to discuss what we have learned about Beth Achim's history, including to what extent the 1968 "merger would overcome the congregation's two separate origins and its fault lines to become knit together as one congregation." (page 25 of the full 2012 article).

I look forward to seeing photographs of Beth Achim and to sharing highlights of my research with you. Thank you.

be our lifeblood. We have to develop programming and events that attract different subgroups and create a reason for people to want to be involved in the Synagogue. Our members will seek out smaller groups of like-minded congregants, which will strengthen and enrich their connection to Adat Shalom.

The second theme that emerged is that people are interested in both shorter and alternative services. Working with Rabbi Bergman, our Spiritual Committee will evaluate how we can retain the integrity of our services but shorten them too. This idea is not new; it was, in fact, one of the common themes that emerged from our 2008 congregational survey. Four years later, we haven't done anything with this idea, but it's worth revisiting. The fact that it keeps resurfacing is significant and cannot be ignored. A different approach may be to retain our current service but also provide an alternative for people to attend. The two services would end at the same time so everyone could enjoy the Kiddush together.

The third takeaway from our retreat is that we have to rethink what it means to be a member of our Board. Our governing model has relied upon the executive committee to be the key decision making body, and as a result, board members feel disengaged and are tired of passive participation in monthly meetings. By empowering our board members and, at the same time, asking more of them, I really think we will have more engaged and effective lay leaders.

We discussed these issues and more during our retreat, and we benefited from the participation of Rabbis Bergman and Shere, as well as Alan Yost and Melissa Ser. Some of these issues have been bandied about before, but I'm confident that we will continue this conversation we restarted in October, and we will be better off because of it.

AS WE GET CLOSER TO CHANUKAH, we're nearing the end of the first book of the Torah, Bereshit. We are used to thinking of these beginning stories as stories of the deeds of men. And they are... but they are also stories of the deeds of great women, from whom we can learn much about what it means to ignite our Jewish souls.

Sarah went forth with Abraham to a new land and gave birth to a new nation. When her son Isaac meets Rivka, we will see how she determines the fate of the Jewish people, as she is instrumental in choosing Jacob over Esau. Rachel and Leah together form the maternal core of the Twelve Tribes of Israel. Soon we'll begin to read the stories of Shemot, and we'll be rescued by not just

Miriam the Prophetess, but also by Pharaoh's daughter – without these two girls, Moses would never have survived. We are just so used to reading Torah with a masculine lens

that we miss the integral role of our matriarchs. Rivka did not stand by and let her husband determine the future of his children; she may have been deceptive, but she knew which of her boys was ready to be a leader – and which was not. Esther didn't stand by and watch as her people were decimated; no, she infiltrated the kingdom! She became the king's right hand woman – and ultimately saved the Jewish people. Each of these women is important because she took initiative. And each of us can learn from them.

The description of Mt. Sinai is powerful: fire, thunder and lightning filled the air; every single person stood still and witnessed a miracle. At the time, midrash tells us,

attained again, not even by Ezekiel. The mountain was on fire, but no one was afraid. The people of Israel stood and watched, and announced "we will do, and then we will understand." The thing they agreed to do – before ever knowing the details – was Torah.

Shammai said: "Make your study of the Torah a fixed habit. Say little and do much, and receive all men

Shammai said: "Make your study of the Torah a fixed habit. Say little and do much, and receive all men with a cheerful countenance." In other words, study something regularly: once a day, once a week, even once a month. Make it a habit. Don't talk about what you're going to do – simply DO it. And in the meantime, be pleasant – the ways of Torah are pleasant, and the ways

of those who study Torah should be pleasant as well. Another of our sages, Shimon ben Gamliel, said: *Studying* Torah is not the most

important thing but rather *fulfilling* it. But how can we fulfill Torah – and how can we thus be fulfilled by it, drinking in its words to soothe our Jewish souls – if we don't study it?

more detached from one another, or lonelier. We live in an accelerating contradiction: the more connected we become, the lonelier we are."

For me, the best antidote to social media is Shabbat. On Shabbat, our kids know that family time replaces screen time, that any "chatting" we do is face to face, and when we refer to "text," we mean the Torah. Even for those who don't observe Shabbat in such a traditional way, it still makes sense to designate Friday night or Saturday afternoon as "unplugged."

I'd love to hear what you think about this idea and the role technology plays in your family life. If you have a chance, send me an email and let me know. Better yet, let's meet in person.

"Didn't we start to pray for rain right after Sukkot?" We did. During Sh'mini Atzeret, we added the line "Mashiv haruach umorid hagashem" (You cause the wind to blow and the rain to fall) to the second blessing in the Amidah. Here, water is a metaphor for life. Just as water is essential for life, so is God. That is why during this second blessing, God is praised as being the source of life to all things, even the dead. It is the ninth blessing, however, in which water is requested for its literal need to sustain our lives.

During this time, it is very easy to turn our thoughts toward material desires and hope for that perfect Chanukah gift. Sometimes though, there's nothing more satisfying than a good glass of water.


