FROM THE PRESIDENT CONSIDER THESE THOUGHTS...

recently read an article published in The Forward entitled "How Conservative Judaism Lost Me" by Michah Gottlieb, an associate professor of Hebrew and Judaic Studies at New York University. Gottlieb cites a recent Pew Research Center survey of Jews in America, which reported the significant decline of Conservative Judaism in our country. In 1990,

43% of American Jews affiliated with Conservative Judaism, while that percentage has declined to just 18% today.

Gottlieb argues that the Conservative movement lost many of its most ardent followers because its principal focus became

O f all the tourist places that I visited for the first time in 2013, Durham, North Carolina's Hall of Honor made the deepest impression on me.

Located adjacent to Duke University's Cameron Hall basketball arena, the Hall of Honor touts Duke University's basketball players who have brought honor to them-

selves, to the University and to our country through their achievements on and off the hardwood. There are Halls of Fame but this is the only Hall of Honor with which I am familiar.

As we continue to celebrate Chanukah during the last month of 2013, it is appropriate to reflect on how the Hebrew language reflects Judaism's prioritization of "honor" over fame.

During Chanukah, we focus in our prayers on Psalm 30 which ends with our desire to sing of God's honor – L'Maan

FROM HAZZAN GROSS A St. Louis Connection



HAZZAN GROSS

No, I'm not talking about the Cardinals, the World Series or beards. What I'm referring to is Songleader Boot Camp (SLBC), which Adat Shalom is hosting on December 22 and 23. Back in February, several Jewish professionals from the Detroit community, including myself, went as emissaries to the SLBC National Conference in St. Louis to investigate whether this program would be worth bringing to our community. It was unanimous – we all thought it should take place here.

What is SLBC? *Al regel achat* (a Hebrew idiom similar to "in a nutshell"), it is a conference to strengthen leadership qualities. This applies to anyone who is in a situation of guiding others, be it educators, clergy, lay leaders and, of course, songleaders. One of the founders of SLBC is Rick Recht, a nationally acclaimed Jewish rock musician who grew up in St. Louis as I did. Rick has created a concrete and dynamic system of developing leadership skills. These techniques are thoroughly explained, demonstrated, and then put into action throughout the conference.

FROM RABBI BERGMAN THE RAMBAM

December 13th is the 810th anniversary of the death of Moses ben Maimon, known to the world as Maimonides, and to our people as the Rambam. It is hard to overestimate how important the Rambam was to the development of Jewish law and philosophy, as well as medicine and interfaith relations. His devotion to rationality

and reason is needed today more than ever in a world that is becoming increasingly fanatic and anti-intellectual.

Maimonides grew up in Spain, lived briefly in the Land of Israel, and spent the rest of his days in Egypt. He grew up in a world that was controlled exclusively by Islam. Many of those years were of enlightened tolerance, but many were also those of persecution. Maimonides and his family even had to live publicly as Muslims to escape oppression.

He understood first hand the dangers of those who lived by blind faith. He devoted his life to studying the best of the world's thinkers, including a number of Muslim teachers who had been adherents of Greek philosophy. Maimonides shared an idea that became very controversial around the world, among many Jews. He said there was no such thing as Jewish truth. There was only the truth. He believed that Judaism contained the highest levels of truth, but that we must be open to the thinking of all moral peoples.

He also said that when there was a conflict between reason and a sacred text, we were not to take the text literally but treat it as a metaphor. He would not have tolerated the Biblical literalists today. For example, the story of the Garden of Eden and the beginning of human ancestors cannot be taken literally, because the only way Adam and Eve could produce all of humanity through themselves



Many of them have spent the day on the streets, and this is a safe haven for a few hours. The meals are prepared in advance and reheated and served at the facili-

In a recent letter, Elizabeth Kelly emphasized the importance of socks to the homeless population. Most are forced to sleep with their shoes on to prevent them from being stolen. 

"When I was saying Kaddish, I found the minyan to be very comforting. What I found that I hadn't thought about were new friends. Minyan connected me to Adat Shalom and in the minyan I found a community." - Sandy Shapiro

"I think our Adat Shalom faithful minyan recalls for me the commitments of my powerful generations of fathers, their gentle dignity, isolated southern Jewish covenants, and humble nature of my great-grand-and birth mothers who pared my childhood routine to support our fathers There's a bond among the Jewish minyan folks...and it's for me a sacred connection. It's good to know the traditions continue." - Tanya Walker

I invite all of you to join us at minyan to find your own source of inspiration and commitment to the ideals of Conservative Judaism.

Please remember that our evening weekday minyan meets at 5 p.m. Sunday - Friday, through February. Morning minyan remains at 7:30 a.m. Monday - Friday, and 8:30 a.m. on Sundays.

Yesamerchah Chavod - and with the pledge that we will give thanks to God as long as we live.

It is interesting to note that in the Alcalay Hebrew-English Dictionary (columns 984-985) there are several important teachings which include the Hebrew word Kavod - honor. Yehi Chavod Chaverchah Chaviv Alecha K'Shelcha - "Let your neighbor's honor be as dear to you as your own" is an important emphasis in Judaism as is the wise lesson "Harodef Achar Hakavod, Hakavod Boreach Mimenu ...- Pursue honor and it will flee, flee it and it will follow."

All of us have a "Chov Shel Kavod" – a debt of honor. I believe that the debt is owed to God for the many blessings that God gave to us and continues to give to us.

There is nothing wrong with a Hall of Fame, but to me a Hall of Honor is of a higher level.

What are your thoughts on these two types of Halls? May each of us give honor to God and to our fellow man as we conclude one secular year and prepare for another.



the pursuit of egalitarianism, which distracted movement leaders from the real problem, which was that Conservative Jews were not committed to Halacha and Jewish learning. Gottlieb's solution to the continuing decline in Conservative Judaism is to "Support and nurture the most committed Conservative Jews at local synagogues. Give them outlets for their religious curiosity and passion." He continues, "These Jews may not write big checks. They may sometimes make the less committed members of the synagogue feel uneasy. But they are the future."

I could not disagree more strongly with Gottlieb's premise. I believe that recommitting ourselves to a more traditional service would further hasten the demise of the Conservative movement. Conservative Judaism represents the religious center of Jewish worship. We have aspects of our service that reflect both Orthodox and Reform Judaism, and, importantly, we're committed to tinkering and experimenting with our traditional service until we strike the right balance. I believe that at Adat Shalom and other Conservative congregations our future is dependent upon connecting spiritually and communally with our members. Our clergy and our lay leadership understand that one approach to religious worship will not satisfy all of our

members, and we have to connect with those for whom our traditional service is a turnoff. For that reason, we've begun to offer alternative and intimate Shabbat services in other parts of our Synagogue, such as Torah Yoga, Shabbat ReSOULed, and family services such as ShirLaLa last month.

We've tracked the members whom we've lost in the recent past, and excluding those who have moved out of the area, we continue to lose the most members to the Reform movement; very few leave to join an Orthodox congregation. My strong sense is that our members want to feel passionately about a service they understand and connect to, not one, as Gottlieb suggests, that appeals to the most observant, which would only serve to alienate many of us. I also believe that Conservative synagogues that have concluded they must emulate the Reform movement to survive have lost their identity, confused their membership and hurt the Conservative movement.

I certainly don't have a prescription for our future success. But, I sense a change is beginning to occur, and it's one in which we can all have a role in shaping. Whether you're coming to Adat Shalom for a wonderful program such as the recent *Divas on the Bima* concert, for morning minyan, for our regular Shabbat services, Torah study or Torah Yoga, please let us know what works for you.
