From the President, Ken Goss **A Time to Grow and Celebrate**

We find a discussion in our holy text the Mishnah, which creates the foundation for Jewish law and how we practice our religion. In Shabbat (chapter 2) there is mention of what types of wicks and oils are suitable for the lights of Shabbat. Some materials are not allowed

because they cause "the flame to sputter." In ancient times, these lights were the primary source of light in homes on Shabbat. However in the Talmud (Shabbat 21b), which is the elaboration and explanation of the Mishnah, we find that these restrictions do not apply to Chanukah lights.

When studying this text, thinking how it related to our modern celebration of Chanukah, I suggest one could make a case that since these lights are not allowed to be used for illumination, rather Chanukah lights which grow in number each day can be part of our religious growth. Hopefully we continue to grow each day by doing good deeds, learning about our tradition and history. During this holiday, an important way to grow is to celebrate and enjoy Chanukah with family, friends and our community.

From Hazzan Gross And: A Miraculous Word

As we light the Chanukah candles later this month, we will recite two b'rachot (blessings) each night (plus the Shehecheyanu blessing on the first night). We say the first b'rachah over the mitzvah of lighting the Chanukah candle. I want to shed some light on the second

b'rachah which we say over the miracle of Chanukah. There are actually two versions of this b'rachah which exist today, and the only difference between them is one letter, shuruk. Now you might be thinking to yourself, "I've never heard of a Hebrew letter called *shuruk*!" *Shuruk* is a specific type of the letter *vav*, which has a dot in the middle and is pronounced "oo." It looks like this: I

When the *shuruk* is used as a prefix, it simply means "and" (like

the more common 1 pronounced "ve").

Most of us may be familiar with the way older siddurim have this b'rachah written, without the *shuruk*:

בָּרוּהְ אַתָּה יְיָ אֱלֹהָינוּ מֶלֶהְ הָעוֹלֶם, שֶׁעֶשָׂה נִסִּים לַאְבוֹתִינוּ בּימים ההם בּזּמו הזָה.

I his would be translated as:

Praised are You, Adonai, our God, sovereign of time and space, who has performed miracles for our ancestors *in those days at this time – bayamim haheim bazman hazeh.*

More modern siddurim contain the shuruk in the last line as follows:

and the translation is change : בּיָמִים הָהֶם וֹבוְלֵם הָּחָם בּיָמִים הָהָם וּבוְלַם הַאָּבּים הַהְם וּבְּיִמִים הָהַם וּבוְלַם הַא Praised are You, Adonai, our God, sovereign of time and space, who has performed miracles for our ancestors in those days and at this time – bayamim haheim uvazman hazeh.

From Rabbi Bergman Why God Celebrates Chanukah

Passover is the first major holiday of the Torah and has so many miracles that we devote part of the seder to just counting them. These miracles are spectacular, including the splitting of the sea and the falling of fire-filled hail on Egypt. Passover is about freedom from slavery and liberation from

Egypt.

Chanukah is not found in the Torah at all. It has one less than impressive miracle. Lights lasted longer than anyone thought. A miracle to be sure, but one that pales in comparison to the Passover ones. Chanukah is about how the Maccabees retook the Holy Temple, but does not celebrate the full liberation of the Jews from the Syrians. It only has one commandment, to light lights in honor of the miracle.

We might think that the holiday that we would most publicly celebrate would be Passover. Passover, though, is celebrated completely indoors. In fact, the origin of opening the door for Elijah began when we were concerned that people might be listening in to the seder from the outside and report us to the authorities for treason.

FROM RABBI SHERE **Do Jews Believe in Angels?**

Do Jews believe in angels? In short, yes. The angels we believe in are not the type with wings and halos, but a different variety altogether. In Hebrew, the word for angel is *malach* and it is in the book of Bereshit that we gain a deeper understanding of what a malach truly is. Sarah

becomes very jealous of her handmaid Hagar and banishes Hagar and her young son, Ishmael, from the family home. Out in the desert, desperate, thirsty and out of water, Hagar places Ishmael under a bush, saying "I can't bear to watch him die." Sobbing and alone, Hagar suddenly encounters a malach (angel) who asks her, "ma lach Hagar?" This is a difficult phrase to translate, but means something close to, "Hagar, what is hurting in you?" In this eponymous moment for the malach, we discover a few important ideas about the Jewish Continued on page 15



FROM RABBI YOSKOWITZ THE CONSECRATION OF ADAS SHALOM SYNAGOGUE

In the first half of the twentieth century, Rabbi Abraham M. Hershman was well known in Detroit and in the North American Conservative Judaism community. On October 14, 2003, as a friend of a

member of Rabbi Hershman's family, I officiated at the funeral of an adult daughter of Rabbi Abraham and Miriam Hershman z"I. To help me to prepare an appropriate eulogy, the family shared hundreds of pages about her life and especially her father's extensive correspondence with her. Rabbi Hershman was both a loving parent and an excellent Jewish scholar.

Among his writings is a book, *Religion In the Age and of the Ages*, published in 5713 -1953 by New York's Bloch Publishing Company. A copy of the book was in our Adat Shalom Library. A section of the book *Continued on page 15*

The miracle of Chanukah is celebrated by placing the lights outdoors, or at least at a window that opens to the public areas, whether a street or courtyard. I think the reason for this is that the miracle of Chanukah occurred after the Maccabees had the courage to fight against those who tried to destroy Judaism. God did not tell them to fight, nor does it seem that God gave any direct assistance. Only after the battle was won does the miracle of lights occur.

I think the miracle of the lights was to show God's admiration for those who stood up for what they believed in, despite the odds against them. It was to show that we must never be afraid to be Jewish in public.

God is acknowledging the miracle of our courage to be a source of light in the world, even when the world feels dark. Every day that we live our lives as Jews publicly and proudly is one worth celebrating.

The addition of the simple little word "and" completely changes the blessing's meaning! Our gratitude to God can be expressed by recognizing the miracle at that time, that is, the miracle of the oil lamp and the defeat of the Syrian-Greeks by the underdog Maccabees, **or** it can be expressed by thanking God for the miracles that happened both then and now. Whether you choose to conclude the b'rachah by saying bazman hazeh or u-vazman hazeh, I pray that you are able to be grateful for both the Chanukah miracles and the everyday miracles. Chag Urim Sameach!

In the Torah portion of Vayeishev, Jacob sends Joseph to check on his brothers (Genesis 37:14-16). When Joseph reaches Shechem, a man came upon him wandering in the fields. The man asked him, "What are you looking for?" He answered, "I am looking for my brothers. Could you tell me where they are pasturing?" The man said, "They have gone from here, for I heard them say: 'Let us go to Dothan.' So Joseph followed his brothers and found them at Dothan."

My first reaction - I remembered Jacob sending Joseph out to check on his brothers but I didn't remember that they weren't there (it's not in the play) ...My next reaction - wow - a proof text that it's all right for a man to ask for help and directions!

The Torah only gives a brief outline of the conversation between Joseph and the man. The Rabbis assume there was more to the conversation (the man had to have at least asked the identity of the brothers), but regardless, if Joseph hadn't met the man he might never have found his brothers (and the rest, as they say, is history).

One never knows the impact they may have on another – even in a brief encounter! My segue to our daily minyan: your attendance during this brief encounter (service) will not only have a tremendous effect in helping to make sure there is a minyan – but my hope is that YOU will be impacted and find meaning.



HOPE Hospitality and Warming Center is a safe overnight center for the homeless in Pontiac. Without this center, many of the guests would be staying on the streets and at great risk. Our volunteers serve a warm and filling meal in a caring atmosphere. They are always at their maximum capacity of 60 men and women who stay at the warming center. Many of them have spent the day on the streets and this is a safe haven for a few hours. We are fortunate to have Daniel Dunsky, owner of O'Brien's Crabhouse, doing the cooking for us for three nights. He makes a "soup to nuts" gourmet dinner for the guests. Dan brings it prepared and ready to serve. The guests are always sad to see us go! We need 6-8 volunteers over the age of 18, each night. The guests are very appreciative of our kindness. Volunteers will carpool to the center. WE NEED YOUR HELP! Please call Evva Hepner, 248-798-7673, if you are able to help.

In addition to providing dinner we would like to collect men's white athletic socks to donate to the center. As we enter the month of December, the days are getting shorter and we are physically spending more time in the dark. When we wake up in the morning, it is dark; when we get home from work or school, it is getting dark. During this physical time of darkness, we also acknowledge a dark time in our history, which we now celebrate as a holiday of light and freedom, Chanukah. For more information on the history and meaning of Chanukah, see Dr. Melissa Ser's article on page 11.

This Chanukah, I hope that you celebrate Freedom and Light. Here are a few suggestions to add to your celebration.

- 1. Light the menorah each night, beginning with the shamash (helper) and one candle, and increasingly toward eight candles for eight nights. Say the blessings each night as you light (three the first night, two for the rest).
- 2. Light the chanukiah and watch as the light increases. Each night, acknowledge a person or event that has brought light into your life.
- 3. There is sweetness in celebrating a holiday. Make edible treats with your children or grandchildren. For ideas, see the dailymeal.com/edible-hanukkah-activities-kids.
- 4. There are many who are not free to live their lives the way they choose to due to persecution or circumstance. Take time this holiday to help others. Provide gifts so others can celebrate, make donations to a shelter so a family can have a warm meal, and/or choose your own way to help.
- 5. The Talmud teaches us that one small amount of olive oil lasted for eight nights in the Temple. Resources are so important. Take your little ones through the house and collect everything that can be recycled or reused, include them in the sorting process.
- 6. Celebrate freedom. Pick something that you've always wanted to do as a family but haven't gotten around to doing. Celebrate the freedom that you are blessed with and make it happen.
- 7. Learn about Chanukah around the world. Start here: https://www.myjewishlearning.com/jewish-and/beyond-latkeshanukkah-around-the-world. You can also read a Chanukah story together. You can find books for children of all ages on the PJ library website. If you are not already receiving free Jewish books for each of your children, you can register at pjlibrary.org
- 8. Celebrate olives and olive oil! Learn about the traditional fried foods eaten on Chanukah throughout the Jewish world, including Moroccan sfinje, Israeli sufganiot, Colombian patacones, or fried plantains, or plain old potato latkes, and there are many more. Or taste test different varieties of olives!

Highlights from "The Astonishing Real Story of Hanukkah" by Elon Gilad (Haaretz, December 1 2013)

The Talmud asks: What is Hanukkah?

Our earliest source on the celebration of Hanukkah is the Book of Maccabees I, written at the end of the 2nd Century BCE. It tells us: "And Judah and his brothers commanded that all the people of Israel shall celebrate the holiday of the dedication of the Temple on the 25th day of the month of Kislev, every year in praise and thanks to God."

The later Book of Maccabees II - written in Alexandria, in Greek, in 124 BCE - tells us the holiday was celebrated as a second Sukkot. That may explain why the holiday lasts eight days. That is, simply, the length of Sukkot, which is a harvest festival, and possibly Hanukkah began as one as well. Some researchers suggested that the holiday coincides with the end of the olive oil making season, which could explain the oil-centeredness of the holiday.

The Talmud - compiled around 500 CE but containing writings spanning centuries - [does not] have a separate tractate on Hanukkah, but it does provide more information on the holiday. This is where we first learn that candles were lit for eight days. But why? Today only one explanation is offered: the miracle of the oil, enough for one day but lasting for eight. The Talmud, however, offers other possibilities: that it took eight days to get oil in from the countryside, or that there were eight spikes found in the Temple which were converted into a menorah.

Dreidel, dreidel, dreidel

The dreidel was simply a gambling game, with the letters on the dreidel not denoting "nes gadol haya sham" ("A great miracle happened there") as we say today. Rather, each letter stood for a Yiddish word having to do with the game: nun was for nicht (nothing), gimel was for gantz (all), shin was for shtel ein (put in), and hei was for halb (half) – which indicated what one must do after each turn. The rules are those of an earlier non-Jewish gambling game called teetotum.

Latkes and sour cream

Sometime during the Middle Ages, it became a tradition for Jewish women to eat dairy products on the holiday in recognition of the heroism of Judith, the Jewish heroine of the Book of Judith. In Eastern Europe, the dairy diet took the shape of eating latkes, which were cheesy pancakes. Only later in the mid-19th Century, when Russian farmers began growing potatoes, did latkes take the form of the potato pancakes that we know today.

The tradition of eating fried doughnuts, or sufganiyot as they are called in Israel, is an even later addition to the holiday. It is believed to have first appeared in Morocco in the end of the 18th Century, though it is widely attributed to the father of the Rambam, Rabbi Maymon, who lived in Iberia hundreds of years earlier.



understanding of angels. In calling out to Hagar by name, we see that angels help others to feel seen and known in their uniqueness. Angels show up and are present with another's suffering. It is worth noting that the angel doesn't solve Hagar's problem; the angel simply acknowledges her pain and, in so doing, alleviates enough of Hagar's hopelessness that she is able to feel God's presence guiding her toward a well of water which she had previously been unable to see.

If I've learned anything in my thirteen years as a rabbi, it's that nearly everyone we encounter is carrying something profoundly difficult. I've also learned that sometimes, when we are open to it, God puts us in the right place at the right time to act as angels to each other.

includes a chapter entitled, "The Synagogue - A Community Institution." The text of this chapter was first shared at the consecration of Adas Shalom Synagogue on March 30, 1952. His words then are applicable to us now as we prepare to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the founding of Northwest Hebrew Congregation - the name of the Congregation at its founding - as it was when Rabbi Hershman spoke these words in 1952.

At the consecration service, Rabbi Hershman said that "this edifice is of deep and vital importance to all the Jews of Detroit...They all stand to benefit by what will be done here. They are all therefore your debtors and have ample cause for rejoicing with you. For rightly understood, a synagogue is a community institution. It creates a religious climate, a spiritual atmosphere – our given and desideratum today" (page 115).

In his remarks, the scholarly Rabbi deals with questions being asked today e.g. "Is Judaism worthwhile?" Am I worthy of Judaism" and "Why remain a Jew, loyal to the calling which the name implies?" In our age we are experiencing a loss of religion and a corresponding loss of the bonds of community and of the sanctity of marriage. In a secular, individualist culture, we find that living by sacrifice is much more difficult. Rabbi Hershman's questions can help us to focus on how we can reinvigorate community, marriage and a spirit of sacrifice.

The Adat Shalom Synagogue is indebted to Rabbi Hershman for the guidance he gave us in 1952 when we consecrated our second building and for what he gives us as food for thought in 2017 as prepare to celebrate our 75th anniversary in our current building.

May it be God's will that the Lord's presence will inspire us to greater Kedushah – holiness.
