





FROM THE PRESIDENT, KEN GOSS Join Our Club for A Meaningful Celebration

With this edition of the *Voice, Pesach* (Passover) comes in just a few weeks. We all celebrate this festival in many different ways, following the traditions and customs brought down from our ancestors.

The National Jewish Population Survey estimates that close to 85% of American Jews will attend a Seder. This holiday has more Jews participating in some type of religious ceremony than any other Jewish holiday, even more than Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

I think one reason for this high participation rate is that Pesach is the most home-centered festival in the Jewish calendar. The major ceremony takes place around the dining room table with family and friends. What could be better than being together, telling stories and eating? We recite stories about our Exodus from Egypt, from slavery to freedom. We are told that "everyone is obligated to see oneself as if having personally left Egypt" (*Mishna Pesachim 10:5*). This makes it very personal and provokes conversation. It is also a constant; each generation does the same thing, no matter what else is happening around us in our homes or the world.

Please take this opportunity to celebrate this beautiful holiday. Feel free to consult our clergy or staff for ideas in making this the most meaningful Passover celebration possible.

Wishing you all a *Chag Sameach V'kasher*, a happy and Kosher Passover.



FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS **KLEZMER AT ADAT**

On Sunday, March 18, Adat Shalom is partnering with the JCC's Active Life Program for an exciting afternoon of klezmer. We are presenting Heartland Klezmorim, an excellent local klezmer band. Not only will they be teaching us about klezmer music, they will be

giving a freylekh performance during which I will be joining them for several songs.

A brief summary of klezmer music will set the stage for the program. The word klezmer itself is a combination of two Hebrew words: kley which means vessel or instrument and zemer which means song. Klezmer was originally used to describe the musician who played this music. Only later was it also used to describe the genre. Klezmer is essentially Ashkenazi (Eastern European) folk music which dates back to the 16th century. The melodies come from Romanian, Polish, Russian, Hungarian and Bulgarian folk songs and dances. Its characteristic sound, however, comes from the specific instruments which comprise the ensemble, in various combinations of violin, clarinet, flute, trombone, trumpet, tuba, cello, double bass, accordion, piano and cimbalom. The majority of klezmer melodies are upbeat dance tunes as the music is frequently associated with simchas (joyous celebrations). There is also a very strong connection between chazanut and klezmer. The distinct krekhtz (cry) or tzchok (laugh) made by the clarinet are reminiscent of the same sounds a cantor may interpolate into a prayer. Both klezmer and chazanut allow the instrumentalists and singers to improvise freely, and to incorporate virtuosic ornamentation of the notes.

I'm looking forward to performing with Heartland Klezmorim. Come join me in the freylekh experience!

I had been preparing a very different article for this issue of the *Voice*, but I also thought that my father would be with us longer. Let me begin, then, by thanking all of you for the incredible support and kindness you have given my family and me during this difficult time. Every decision I have made to stay a

part of this wonderful Jewish community has been more than validated by your great hearts and souls.

The *shloshim*, the intense thirty day period of mourning, for my father ends around the time Purim begins. Purim contains two great messages. FROM RABBI RACHEL SHERE

Forget your perfect offering There is a crack in everything That's how the light gets in

- LEONARD COHEN

The Philadelphia Eagles' Super Bowl win was particularly meaningful for a group of Adat Shalom teenagers. Due to the generosity of an anonymous donor, Adat Shalom staff and I recently had the opportunity to lead a teen trip to Jewish Philadelphia. We spent a meaningful Shabbat praying, eating and studying with local teens and rabbis, and we toured the American Jewish History Museum including an exhibit on artistic expression and the Holocaust. A significant part of our trip was visiting the Liberty Bell. After seeing this great American symbol with its iconic crack, I was deeply impressed with the group's ability to discuss the following ideas: Is the crack a necessary component to the bell's significance as an American symbol? How do the broken aspects of our lives define us? How can our problems and challenges guide us and teach us without limiting or defeating us?

This month, we will read in the Torah how Moses comes down from Mt. Sinai, sees the people dancing with the golden calf, and drops the tablets. We know that Moses went back up the mountain and carved a new set of tablets which remained whole and sacred, but whatever became of the shattered tablets? Our sages teach, "The broken tablets were placed in the holy ark along with the whole, intact set and together they traveled throughout the 40 year journey." It is the broken *and* the whole that make us who we are. Without darkness, we couldn't appreciate light. Without loss, we couldn't appreciate triumph. It's the truth; ask any Eagles fan.

In Memoriam: Leonard Cahan Rabbi, Adat Shalom Synagogue 1965-1970

Bimkom Sheyn Anashim Tishtadel L'hiyote Ish. In a place where there is no man (*mentsch*) try to be a man – *Mishnah Pirkei Avot 2:5.*

Rabbi Leonard Cahan was always the *Ish* in the room. In reflecting back on his life, he stated that his proudest moment was the 14 days he spent in jail for "Civil Disobedience on Behalf of Soviet Jews" (May 1985). He was an activist for our people as well as a teacher of our tradition.

Rabbi Cahan ended his journey on this earth on January 17, 2018, just a short time after celebrating his second Bar Mitzvah at the congregation which he founded in Potomac, Maryland.

From 1965 to 1970, Rabbi Cahan was Assistant Rabbi to Rabbi Jacob Segal at Adat Shalom. He is well remembered by his friends in our community and in particular by those whose lives he influenced. Rabbi Dan Shevitz remembered him as "the adult who got us young people. He was a serious interpreter of Jewish culture...My memories of him are centered on Shabbat afternoons at his home, where we played ping-pong and listened raptly to his stories...The Cahans were loved and admired by dozens of Detroit baby boomers who mourn his passing and celebrate his gifts to us all."

Rabbi Rachel Ain (Sutton Place Synagogue in Manhattan) and Rabbi Dan Greyber (Beth El Congregation in Durham, North Carolina) were raised in his congregation and were influenced by him. Rabbi Ain wrote, "I will be forever grateful that he put me on the path where I am today."

Rabbi Cahan's example as a U. S. Navy Chaplain who attained the rank of commander influenced others to become navy chaplains.

Over the years, whether in our home or at a Rabbinical Assembly convention, his company was always a joy. In conversation, we shared ideas, thoughts and mutual scholarly interests. I appreciated his keen intellect, his warmth and his sense of humor. He was a treasured colleague and friend who truly lived the words of *Pirkei Avot*.

May his memory be a blessing - Yehi Zichro Baruch.

From Michael Wolf Director of Spirituality and Outreach

Vayikra starts the third book of the Torah. While the Book of Exodus explains the construction of the Tabernacle, the priestly clothing, and the sacrificial utensils, it is in the Book of Vayikra (Leviticus) that these items are put into practice. We are introduced to 5 kinds of sacrifices:

Olah – This is the regular daily offering which is given as a freewill offering – often to express gratitude, reverence, or regret.

Mincha – The meal offering. The grain offering consists of unleavened choice flour and oil which is given by someone who cannot afford to give an animal.

Shlamim – The peace offering. This category of offering was brought by a person who had something to celebrate. It is motivated not by guilt or obligation but by a sense of wholeness in the donor's life.

Hatat – The sin offering. This purification offering is brought to atone for serious sins that are committed unintentionally.

Asham – The guilt offering. This reparation offering is brought primarily for someone who stole, lied, oppressed his neighbors or otherwise dealt falsely.

It has been suggested that one of the reasons Jewish learning begins here is to teach from the outset that life involves sacrifice. Nothing worthwhile in life is ever achieved without it.


Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver wrote - "No religion is worth its salt which does not make great demands upon its adherents...Too many of our people want an easy-going religion, one which does not interfere with their leisure, their sleep, or their television, which calls for no study and no observance, which does not challenge or disturb them, a religion without any spiritual travail, without any stab of thought or conscience, without any sacrifices, the religion of a self-pampering people. No religion has ever survived in that kind of an emotional and intellectual vacuum. Judaism least of all."

We learn something at services every morning and evening because understanding why we do something can make it more meaningful. I believe leading services and chanting from the Torah can also be a way to make prayers and learning Torah more meaningful. The ownership of chametz (leavened food) during Pesach is prohibited in the Torah. For those who wish to adhere to this tradition, Adat Shalom will be happy to arrange for the

contractual (virtual) sale of your chametz to a non-Jew for the duration of the Pesach holiday. According to this contract, your ownership of your chametz will end at 9 a.m. on 14 Nisan (March 30) and will be restored at 8:45 p.m. on 22 Nisan (April 7).

You may arrange to sell your chametz beginning Thursday, March 15, through 8:30am on the morning of Friday, March 30. To do so, you may email Michael Wolf (mwolf@adatshalom.org) with your name and address to be added to the contract, or you may come in personally to sign the papers. To sign in person, please see Michael Wolf at minyan (Sun-Fri mornings, and Sun-Tues and Thurs evenings) or call Michael at 248.660.5556 to schedule other weekday availability.

It is customary, but not necessary, to make a contribution to the synagogue for requesting that we act as the agent for the sale of your chametz. *If you wish to do so, we suggest a \$20 donation to Adat Shalom's Minyan Breakfast Fund.*

Family Education programs are endowed in memory of Jeanette & Oscar Cook

At the end of March we begin to celebrate the holiday of Passover (Pesach). However, sometimes it doesn't feel like a celebration due to all of the requirements and work that go into the preparation and practice of the holiday. The simple question to ask is what we are celebrating. The Israelites were slaves in Egypt for 400 years before beginning their journey through the desert, ultimately leading to the receiving of Torah on Mount Sinai and the creation of the Jewish people. Regardless of how you as a family prepare for the holiday, together as a community we are celebrating freedom and the creation of our peoplehood.

When you celebrate Pesach this year, you may want to focus on strength and freedom, or on the things that bind our community together.

Here are a few suggestions for you to add to your family celebration this Pesach.

- 1. Visit the Matzah factory at the JCC. Experience making your own matzah.
- 2. Passover is a time that all leavening is removed from our house and diet. Think about something in your life that is bloated or weighing you down. During this holiday, take time to focus on its essence; can you remove it?
- On Passover we ask, "why is this night different from all other nights?" Create or print on line a "spot the difference" Passover sheet for your little one to complete.
- 4. Seder means order. Ask everyone (all ages) at your seder to pick one change they could make to add order to their lives.
- The four questions are a guide to initiate questions. Encourage children and adults to ask questions at the seder table (questions can earn candy or prizes.) Answers may be discussed or saved for another day, interaction is the key.
- 6. No two seders are the same. Take a poll of which Haggadah is being used by the people you know. Some are purchased and some are homemade, and all have different commentary. Which one is right for your family?
- 7. Part of the seder requires the telling of the exodus; let every one, from the youngest attendee to the oldest, dress up and act it out. All ages were present in history.
- 8. Join Rabbi Aaron Bergman and me on Friday, April 6 for PJs & Stories with your preschool-age child or grandchild.
- 9. Read an age appropriate Passover book together. (Call the Education office for help picking one.)

I am available to help you individualize your Passover experience this year. Just stop in or call. If you would like to share how your family celebrated and any changes you made to your seder this holiday, send me an email at dbanooni@adatshalom.org.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE ADAT SHALOM-BETH ACHIM LEARNING COMMUNITY

Our Preschool class keeps growing as we welcome new friends to our community all year long. Our students play, sing, create art, celebrate holidays, and learn Hebrew words. In Kindergarten, our students are learning about symbols of Jewish life, especially Shabbat. First graders are focusing primarily on the symbols surrounding Passover as the central story of the creation of the Jewish people. Second graders are learning about the creation of the world from the Torah, as well as how to create a better world through Jewish values and ideas. In third grade, students learn about mitzvot - commandments - between us and God and between us and other people. They are spending time learning how to be a mensch, countering bullying, and being positive influences on others. Our fourth grade class is learning about being a Jew in today's world, and is also in the middle of a unit on the Jewish history of Michigan, correlating with their public school curriculum on Michigan history. Fifth grade is learning how Jewish values connect us to the larger community, while sixth grade is delving deeply into research and project-based learning about Israel and the Torah. We can't wait to see their final projects at the end of the year. In seventh grade, students have been exploring Jewish history and the Holocaust, which concludes with meeting survivor Mania Salinger and leading our school-wide Yom Hashoah observance.

We currently have 151 students in grades Pre-K through 7, 45 teens in our Educational Leadership Madrichim program, 22 teens in Nosh & Drash Monday Night School, and 35 high school students attending Dual Enrollment Hebrew with Adat Shalom and Eastern Michigan University.

Reconstructing a curriculum

Using what is termed a constructivist approach, I have been reaching out to students to really listen to what they are interested in learning about. I then use their concerns to ensure that our curriculum meets their needs. This process came about through the redesign of our high school learning program, Nosh & Drash, and reached the lower grades when a *madricha* (teen assistant) shared that a kindergartner had asked about why we come to Hebrew school and what being Jewish really meant. We started asking the children (anonymously) what they wondered about, what was hard about being Jewish, and what they wished they could learn or do. Here's a sampling of the things that will become part of our ongoing process of curriculum development:

- I wish I could be recognized more often as a Jew.
- I wish I could go to the Western Wall.
- The Jewish topic I want to know more about is God.
- How is Judaism different from other religions?
- It's hard to be Jewish when people make fun of Jewish kids.

All of this would not happen if I could not continue my own professional growth and development, and I am grateful to have the ability to do that, learning best practices and continually becoming a better educator. I will earn my MAJE at JTS in May, and was selected to participate in the 8th cohort of the Mandel Teacher Educator Institute (MTEI), which began in November 2017. Last month, I was awarded the title Conservative Jewish Educator (CJE) by the Jewish Educators Assembly during our annual conference. It is an honor to be recognized as a CJE, and I am so proud to be part of a small group of Jewish educators upon whom the title has been bestowed.


