FROM THE PRESIDENT, SANFORD VIEDER

Shalom has truly been a second home for me for all of my 56 blessed years on this earth. It all began when I was just 8 days old and celebrating my Brit Milah (Bris) front and center, in the daily minyan chapel of the original Adas Shalom Synagogue building on Curtis near Livernois. Now I certainly have no direct recollection of that momentous day, but having been told the myriad of stories from many members who were actually present on that day in April of 1962, I certainly can conjure up a vivid picture with the details that were shared. I wonder if my parents, Gitta and Larry, of blessed memory, would have ever thought that 56 years later, that infant would be elected to lead the congregation as its president. Perhaps?

FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS ALBERT EINSTEIN'S JEWISH IDENTITY

There is no denying that the great Albert Einstein had a deep connection to his Jewish roots. Born in Ulm, Germany, to a nonobservant family, Einstein actually attended a

Catholic elementary school; however, by the age of twelve, he had developed an interest in Judaism. This led him to begin keeping kosher, a short-lived endeavor, as the more he studied the sciences, the more he felt a contradiction to his traditional Jewish beliefs. Although he ultimately ventured away from a quasiobservant lifestyle, he never lost his Jewish identity, which can be demonstrated through his own writing.

After Chaim Weitzman, Israel's first president, passed away, Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion asked Einstein to be the successor. Einstein respectfully declined, saying:

> I am deeply moved by the offer from our State of Israel, and at once saddened and ashamed that I cannot accept it. All my life I have dealt with objective matters, hence I lack both the natural aptitude and the experience to deal properly with people and to exercise official functions. I am the more distressed over these circumstances because my relationship to the Jewish people has become my strongest human bond, ever since I became fully aware of our precarious situation among the nations of the world.

Another captivating fact is that Einstein was scheduled to deliver a speech on Yom Ha'atzmaut for the 7th anniversary of Israel's independence, which was to air on all the American television networks. Unfortunately, prior to the broadcast Einstein became very ill, but was able to pen the following from his hospital bed:

> The establishment of Israel is an event which actively engages the conscience of this generation...It is, therefore, a bitter paradox to find that a State which was destined to be a shelter for a martyred people is itself threatened by grave dangers to its own security. The universal conscience cannot be indifferent to such peril.



FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN **G**RATITUDE FOR **TEN WONDERFUL YEARS**

I grew up in Oak Park, and even though I did not grow up at Adat Shalom, I always knew what a great synagogue it was. It was known for being traditional and innovative, large but welcoming. I never

thought, even when I was a rabbi, that I would someday be part of it.

This is an even better synagogue than I imagined when I was on the outside looking in. I have been blessed to work with wonderful colleagues, lay leaders who are truly committed to serving the Jewish people, and a terrific staff who keep the shull going day after day. Most of all I have been blessed with the best congregants a rabbi could ask for. You are devoted to Judaism, our people, America and Israel. You demonstrate that it is possible to live meaningful Jewish lives and be loyal citizens of this country. You are compassionate and generous and kind.

July 1st is my tenth anniversary at Adat Shalom. I am so profoundly grateful to be a rabbi and the mara d'atra of this extraordinary congregation.

FROM RABBI RACHEL SHERE A MATTER OF TIME

As schools let out and the sundrenched hours of day stretch out into the evening, I often feel a subtle, yet significant shift in my relationship to time. It starts with the desire to take off my watch and let the kids linger by the pool long after we would all

normally be getting ready for bed. The wearing of wrist watches is a somewhat recent phenomenon. A New York Times article from July 1916 describes how, prior to World War I, Americans joked about the British trend of wearing bracelets with clocks and called them "a silly a** fad." War, with its need for explicitly timed and coordinated attacks, is what turned a European fashion trend into a mass-marketed American reality.

I recently heard a lecture by author David Steindl-Rast in which he shared that the Chinese word for "busy" consists of two characters - heart and killing. With stress-related illnesses on the rise, the ancient Chinese characters for time make a whole lot of sense today. It's not only our bodies, however, that suffer from our society's chronic addiction to business; our souls wither as well. In Greek, there are two words for time, kronos and kairos. Kronos is the root for the English word chronology and refers to quantitative sequential time. The word is derived from the violent Greek Titan god Kronos who, when angry, devoured his own children. Kairos refers to the space between measured time, the moment, and is of a more qualitative and enduring nature.

Now that summer is upon us, perhaps we can all think about ways to shift the balance of kronos and kairos in our lives. I can't help but think that something meant to aid soldiers in the trenches of war has inadvertently created a culture in which overscheduling runs our lives. And it is our children who are at risk of being devoured.

Offering you nourishment for your mind, body & spirit

From Michael Wolf Director of Spirituality and Outreach

I recently watched a Ted Talk given by psychologist Susan Pinker. She went to the Italian island of Sardinia which has more than six times as many centenarians as the mainland and ten times as many as North America. According to Pinker, it's not a sunny disposition or a low-fat, gluten-free diet that keeps the islanders healthy - it's their emphasis on close personal relationships and face-to-face interactions. Pinker suggests that we need close social bonds and uninterrupted face-time with our friends and families in order to thrive-even to survive. Pinker quoted a study done by Julianne Holt-Lunstad. a researcher at Brigham Young University. Dr. Holt-Lunstad studied tens of thousands of middle-aged people looking at every aspect of their lifestyle: their diet, their exercise, their marital status, how often they went to the doctor, whether they smoked or drank, etc. She recorded all of this and then she and her colleagues sat tight and waited for seven years to see who would still be breathing. And of the people left standing (insert drum roll) the most important factor is social integration. This means how much you interact with people as you move through your day. How many people do you talk to? And this means both your weak and your strong bonds, not just the people you're really close to, who mean a lot to you, but, do you talk to the person who every day makes you your coffee? Do you talk to the postman? Do you talk to the woman who walks by your house every day with her dog? Do you play bridge or have a book club?

Which got me thinking of adding another question – Do you come to morning minyan and stay for breakfast? I used to think it brings meaning and spirituality to your life – but after watching the Ted Talk, I learned that it can actually add years to your life as well! Hope to see you soon.

Community Service at B'nai Moshe for Tisha B'Av



PATHWAYS FOR TEENS / דרכי נוער / DARCHEI NOAR

I have spent the past year completing an action research Master's project in Jewish Educational Leadership at JTS, attempting to answer the question "How can I develop a Jewish teen curriculum driven by students' genuine interests?" At the completion of this study, I have some interesting results -- all of which are part of developing our ongoing Jewish educational opportunities for teens.

Adat Shalom truly has an engaged Jewish teen population which cares about both their own education and the community's well-being and growth. In total, 70% of the Jewish teens at Adat Shalom are regular participants in Jewish education and/or engagement. The teens surveyed were overwhelmingly in favor of regular Jewish learning. They asked for more education, more points of connection, and more depth. Furthermore, they want to be part of the development process. Asking the teens for their input and evaluations throughout the year led to a process of ongoing research, as well as a plan of action for the coming academic year. Teens' interests reflected a wide range of content areas, and included topics related to social connectivity, family, life skills, and personal goals. In addition, teens expressed interest in serious Jewish knowledge, especially in how to connect it to issues and concerns of the modern world.

Overall, teens want quality Jewish education but also have very limited time. They want to develop trusting relationships with their teachers. These positive relationships provide the backdrop against which teens can feel comfortable asking difficult and challenging questions about Judaism, relationships, and their own personal growth. An example of this occurred when students asked if we could rename our program (at least for an evening) "Couches and Conversations" and just ask me all of their Jewish knowledge questions! For ninety minutes that is exactly what they did; questions ranged from "how do we celebrate Shavuot?" and "why isn't chicken pareve?" to "how do I know if I've met the right person?" It was powerfully telling that the students were not embarrassed to ask their questions and were respectful of each other. We had succeeded in creating a trusting, safe learning community. We are excited to welcome new students to join us.

Einstein died the following day after refusing emergency surgery. Lastly, I'd like to share a letter Einstein wrote to Cantor Leib Glantz, one of the great cantors of the Golden Age of Hazzanut. It was said that listening to Glantz's rare and uniquely beautiful voice was like experiencing a man talking directly to God. Einstein sent the letter to Glantz on April 19, 1949:


Dear Mr. Glantz:

Thank you very much for the kindness to send me the album of records of Hebrew Spirituals. The strength and vigor of those songs made a strong impression upon me. It is indeed a merit to collect these original expressions of our people before the equalizing influence of our modern world has extinguished them.

Yours very sincerely, Albert Einstein

Composed in the aftermath of one the greatest tragedies of mankind and just one year after the founding of the State of Israel, Einstein's prescient statement is just a small indication of his

brilliant mind and proud passion for his Jewish identity. We must never forget his powerful message and continue to preserve and cultivate our unique culture and customs. May Albert Einstein's words and accomplishments continue to inspire us all!
