

FROM THE PRESIDENT,

OUR HISTORY, OUR FUTURE

Our great congregation originally came together in 1943. During that time, it was quite common for congregations that were forming to pattern themselves after specific national backgrounds, such as Polish, Russian

or Hungarian congregations. Adat Shalom really came together as a result of a geographical need at the time and was originally called the Northwest Hebrew Congregation and Center. It became a place of worship where anybody was welcome regardless of their cultural heritage. The congregation grew quickly and ultimately changed the name to Adas Shalom with the completion of the beautiful new building that was constructed on Curtis and dedicated on March 30, 1952.

As more European Jews filtered into the city of Detroit following World War II, the opportunity to belong to a Jewish congregation without imminent fear and the ability to safely observe their customs and rituals in a synagogue setting took on new meaning. Sadly, so many of these new Detroit Jews had witnessed and suffered the unthinkable. Many had lost their entire families. One of those people was my father, of blessed memory, Cantor Larry Vieder, who joined the clergy of Adat Shalom in 1961.

For my father, like so many other survivors, the synagogue became a very important symbol. It was a beacon of light that proved to the world that Jews mattered. It afforded him an opportunity to rebuild a new life, with a new family. Like so many other survivors, it was that grit and determination to not only rebuild a meaningful life and a prosperous synagogue, but also to assure for generations to come that the synagogue as a symbol

# FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS JOIN THE RHYTHM OF THE DRUM CIRCLE!

On Tuesday, August 7, Adat Shalom will be hosting a drum circle (see additional information on page 4). I believe that this is the first time we have offered such a program. A

drum circle is a group of people, each with a drum, bringing the community together through rhythm. The beauty of a drum circle is the spontaneity that ensues from all of the individual rhythmic contributions to the collective beats. The idea came about back in 2013 when Adat Shalom hosted a highly successful regional Songleader Boot Camp conference. One of the sessions was a drum circle, and I have wanted to lead a drum circle event at Adat ever since. The catalyst for doing so was our congregant Deborah Cymerint, who contacted me a few months ago with a similar idea. Thanks to her enthusiastic persuasion and to Hillel Day School for loaning us the majority of the drums, the idea is now coming to fruition. There is a limit to the number of participants due to limited drum availability. We have drums available for 20 people. We can accommodate additional participants who are able to bring their own hand drums. # FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN A NEIGHBORHOOD FOR ALL OF US

I loved Mr. Rogers. No other man except my father had such a profound impact in how I approach the world. Fred Rogers saw the best in people, and helped them see it, too. He was not naive. He was strong, but kind, and faithful but open-

minded. His voice is needed today more than ever. Here are a few of his teachings.

Many of these quotations are collected in the posthumous volume *The World According to Mister Rogers*, though they come from various sources, including his many television appearances. They were collected here by Chris Higgins.

# 1. On Heroes Without Capes

"When I was very young, most of my childhood heroes wore capes, flew through the air, or picked up buildings with one arm. They were spectacular and got a lot of attention. But as I grew, my heroes changed, so that now I can honestly say that anyone who does anything to help a child is a hero to me."

# FROM RABBI RACHEL SHERE THE MOST FREQUENTLY REPEATED COMMANDMENT

If you had to take a guess, what would you say is the most frequently stated commandment in the entire Hebrew Bible? I'll give you some clues. It doesn't concern how

often you pray, how much you give to charity, what you eat or even how you treat your neighbor (although that last one is the second most frequently stated commandment). You might be surprised to learn that the commandment "Do not fear" is stated nearly eighty times in the Tanakh, making this, by far, the most repeated of God's words.

One of my favorite authors is the renowned psychiatrist, Dr. Elisabeth Kübler-Ross. Having authored hundreds of books and scholarly articles on death, dying and living a life of meaning, her last published words were:

The sole purpose of life is to grow. The ultimate lesson is learning how to love and be loved unconditionally...All the hardships that come to you in life...are an opportunity to grow, which is the sole purpose of life...It is very important that you do only what you love to do. You may be poor, you may go hungry, you may live in a shabby place, but you will totally live. And at the end of your days, you will bless your life because you have done what you came here to do... Dying is nothing to fear. It can be the most wonderful experience of your life. It all depends on how you have lived.

The upcoming High Holidays give us the opportunity to look inward and reflect upon our lives. I don't believe that any of us is here by accident; there is an important reason why each of us is in the world at this time and in this place. Fear, however, can rob us of the opportunity to live the fullest expression of our lives. There is a quotation, often attributed to Mark Twain, which reads, "I have lived a long life and had many troubles, most of which never happened."

As we add Psalm 27 to our daily prayers this month, let us take its opening verse to heart: "God is my light and my strength. Of whom shall I fear?"



#### **HOUSING THE HOMELESS**

It was a busy time preparing for our guests from the South Oakland Shelter (SOS). Most of us assume that the need for emergency shelter decreases during the summer months. However, with warming centers closed for the season, the need increases for SOS. This year we experienced severe heat and were happy to offer our guests a chance to "chill" on Saturday. They could stay at the syngagoue and were grateful for this day inside. It was the right thing to do.

We welcomed 32 guests during the week, including 4 family units with 9 children, ranging in age from 1-15. One mother, with four children, would get up at 3:30 a.m. to leave at 4:30 a.m. She would drop the children off at two different daycare sites so that she could arrive at work at 6 a.m! This is never easy but imagine that you are staying in a different site every week. Our guests were appreciative of all that we did for them to make their stay comfortable. On a positive note, two of our guests exited to housing during the week. This is always the goal of the SOS.

This year magician Fred Letner performed and we also introduced karaoke. Fred included the audience in his act and everyone loved it. One of our guests summed it up this way, "Sometimes it's just good to laugh." Bingo was an old favorite and everyone won a gift card.

We could not have done it without all of our many volunteers and supporters. Beds were picked up and made, lunches assembled, and early morning breakfast served. Over 300 pounds of laundry were done. People helped out at the last minute and made things happen. Special transportation needs are always difficult to plan. Volunteers stepped in at a moment's notice and got people where they had to go. These efforts help them get closer to their goal of independence.


### YOUTH ENGAGEMENT





#### RABBI BERGMAN (continued from page 3)

#### 2. On Sharing Responsibility

"We live in a world in which we need to share responsibility. It's easy to say, 'It's not my child, not my community, not my world, not my problem.' Then there are those who see the need and respond. I consider those people my heroes."

### 3. From a PSA Following September 11, 2001

"If you grew up with our Neighborhood, you may remember how we sometimes talked about difficult things. There were days ... even beautiful days ... that weren't happy. In fact, there were some that were really sad.

Well, we've had a lot of days like that in our whole world. We've seen what some people do when they don't know anything else to do with their anger.

I'm convinced that when we help our children find healthy ways of dealing with their feelings--ways that don't hurt them or anyone else--we're helping to make our world a safer, better place.

I would like to tell you what I often told you when you were much younger: I like you just the way you are.

And what's more, I'm so grateful to you for helping the children in your life to know that you'll do everything you can to keep them safe and to help them express their feelings in ways that will bring healing in many different neighborhoods."

### 4. On What We Do

"What matters isn't how a person's inner life finally puts together the alphabet and numbers of his outer life. What really matters is whether he uses the alphabet for the declaration of a war or the description of a sunrise--his numbers for the final count at Buchenwald or the specifics of a brand-new bridge."

### 5. On Looking for the Helpers

"When I was a boy and I would see scary things in the news, my mother would say to me, 'Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping.' To this day, especially in times of 'disaster,' I remember my mother's words, and I am always comforted by realizing that there are still so many helpers--so many caring people in this world."

### 6. On Helping

"I hope you're proud of yourself for the times you've said 'yes,' when all it meant was extra work for you and was seemingly helpful only to somebody else."

# 7. On Pain

"There is no normal life that is free of pain. It's the very wrestling with our problems that can be the impetus for our growth."

#### 8. On Accepting Our Feelings

"There's no 'should' or 'should not' when it comes to having feelings. They're part of who we are and their origins are beyond our control. When we can believe that, we may find it easier to make constructive choices about what to do with those feelings."

## 9. On "Disabilities"

"Part of the problem with the word disabilities is that it immediately suggests an inability to see or hear or walk or do other things that many of us take for granted. But what of people who can't feel? Or talk about their feelings? Or manage their feelings in constructive ways? What of people who aren't able to form close and strong relationships? And people who cannot find fulfillment in their lives, or those who have lost hope, who live in disappointment and bitterness and find in life no joy, no love? These, it seems to me, are the real disabilities."

#### 10. On Facing Sadness and Anger

"Confronting our feelings and giving them appropriate expression always takes strength, not weakness. It takes strength to acknowledge our anger, and sometimes more strength yet to curb the aggressive urges anger may bring and to channel them into nonviolent outlets. It takes strength to face our sadness and to grieve and to let our grief and our anger flow in tears when they need to. It takes strength to talk about our feelings and to reach out for help and comfort when we need it."

of our resolve as Jews and the strength of Judaism, would stand as a critical piece of society that could not be eliminated, burned or destroyed. My father spent his entire lifetime building, promoting and safeguarding our congregation and what it stood for. To this end, the new name of Adas Shalom (which means Congregation of Peace) had very deep meaning.

As we fast-forward to the present, it is easy to see that our congregational culture and mission has genuinely been retained and upheld from its original roots. While much has changed over the 75-year history of the congregation, we have always remained true to the original vision. Our basic cultural fabric and goals remain the same. Adat Shalom continues to be an open. welcoming and inclusive congregation to many different types of people with different cultural heritages. While we continue to conduct traditional daily minyan and Shabbat services in a warm, friendly environment, we also offer a wonderful variety of alternative services and programs to celebrate the Jewish holidays and Shabbat. Our roots and traditions are steadfast, yet we do so in a contemporary fashion and our amazing clergy are always striving to innovate to meet the needs of our members. There is truly something to offer for every age and every generation of the families that collectively make up this great congregation.

Despite our remarkable history, it's important that we keep our eye on the future to ensure that what was started in 1944 continues to have the proper foundation, commitment and financial security for the *next* 75 years. We are at a critical juncture where we need to capture the imagination and commitment of the next generation of Jewish leaders to ensure that a symbol of Jewish solidarity and permanency remains as a bright beacon in our community. We must continue to move forward in our contemporary interpretations of Jewish life, while respecting our heritage and the deep roots that the founders of this synagogue worked so hard to plant. It is critical that we intrigue the next generation to help build upon the mission, traditions, spiritual exploration, cultural growth, education and friendship that make Adat Shalom what it is. We must meet the needs of our next generation to ensure our future.
