

A DIAMOND IN THE ROUGH

On October 8, 1943, Erev Yom Kippur, a handful of men comprising the original founders of our congregation made the decision to move forward and create a new synagogue. Over the next year, a nucleus of

52 members applied for the official charter which was granted by the State of Michigan, ultimately being named the Northwest Hebrew Congregation. On September 20, 1944, the first annual election of officers was held. Our first president, was Alexander Moss. In short order, the interest and enthusiasm of this new congregation grew rapidly, leading to the need for a new, larger building to accommodate all the activities and families that were joining. In August of 1946, Rabbi Jacob E. Segal was approved by the board of directors to become the first spiritual leader. Over the past 75 years, Adat Shalom has been fortunate to have some of the very best clerical leaders in the country. That tradition continues today with the leadership of Rabbi Bergman, Rabbi Shere and Hazzan Gross. We also recognize the many families that now have third and fourth generations as members at Adat Shalom. Adat Shalom is certainly rich in history and now it's time to ensure it is rich in its future.

As we embark upon the celebration of our Diamond Anniversary, there is so much to be thankful for and a multitude of wonderful stories to be shared from our remarkable history. There have been difficult financial times throughout our history, but I am happy to report that we are collectively in a very good place as we begin our 75th year. The executive committee and professional leadership hope that all of you will join us for the beginning of our yearlong celebration, the weekend of October 26. It is our hope to create several memorable programs through the entire 75th anniversary year.

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FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS DIAMOND JUBILEE CONCERT

At the end of October, we will be celebrating Adat Shalom's 75th anniversary. The weekend festivities will culminate on Monday, October 29, with a "Diamond Jubilee" Concert (the diamond being the gemstone

associated with a 75th anniversary). Your invitation should already have arrived in the mail. The concert will feature, in addition to myself, 6 gems of the Cantors Assembly:

Jack Mendelson, Cantor Emeritus of Temple Israel Center in White Plains, NY, a larger than life individual who has starred on the bimah and screen, and who continues to be the most influential cantor in my life;

Alberto Mizrahi of Anshe Emet Synagogue in Chicago, hailed as the "Jewish Pavarotti," he has admirably represented the Conservative cantorate internationally through both concerts and recordings;

David Propis of Congregation Shaarey Zedek, who has recorded many wonderful albums, who always gives a thrilling live performance, and who is the producer of the CA and USCJ's series of CDs entitled "The Spirit Series";

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FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN BECOMING LEONARD BERNSTEIN

2018 is the centennial year of Leonard Bernstein's birth. It his hard to imagine American music without him. He was so talented and influential that it is hard to imagine that he was just one person.

He was a great composer, writing classic

musicals like West Side Story, and moving symphonies like his Third, known as the Kaddish Symphony.

He was a great conductor, bringing energy and passion to other musicians and even reviving the appreciation of another great Jewish composer, Gustav Mahler.

He was a great teacher. His writings and television shows taught generations of young people to understand and love classical and modern music, and even jazz.

He was a great friend, encouraging others to meet their potential and to expand their musical and cultural knowledge. People much older and much younger were drawn to him, because his spirit was ageless.

Given all these talents, he almost did not become a musician at all. This is from an article from the New England Historical Society:

Sam wanted his eldest son to join him in his increasingly successful hair product business.

Lenny attended the prestigious Boston Latin School, where he excelled academically. He graduated from Boston Latin in 1935 and entered Harvard, where he majored in music. His father still wanted him to join him in his hair products business. Lenny wanted music.

FROM RABBI RACHEL SHERE SUKKAH WALLS OF SHELTER

The first day of October marks the end of the holiday of Sukkot. Going out to live in a *sukkah*, a dwelling that will be here today and tomorrow but gone in a week is, our sages teach, a way to face the fragility and

impermanence of life. Sukkot forces us to embrace the reality that nothing in life is for certain; all that we have today could be gone tomorrow. And yet, Sukkot is called *Z'man Simchateinu*, the time of our joy. At this time of year, we build a space that is naturally open and welcoming to friends, family and strangers alike.

There is a large segment in the Talmud about materials that can and cannot be used as sukkah walls. One of my favorite lines in this section reads, "It is kosher to use a friend as one of the four walls of your sukkah" (Shulchan Aruch, Orach Chaim, 630:12.) In order to make sense of this, we must understand the purpose of the sukkah walls. According to the Talmud, the walls are there to create a temporary shelter from the dangers of the outside world.

As we see everyday in the headlines, the events of our world unfold erratically and unpredictably. Yet this law about the sukkah walls teaches an important truth. In a world filled with terror and tragedy, human beings are here to be each other's shelter. We are here to help one another respond to brokenness with bravery, and to loss with love. Long after we have taken down our sukkot, may the holiday's poignant message find a permanent home in our hearts.

We are honored ...

Rabbi Bergman is participating in a unique mission to Israel. October 15 - 18, he will be part of a small select group of rabbis invited to engage constructively with influential Israeli leaders.

This mission is based on the premise that American rabbis who are committed to pluralism and the unity of the Jewish people can and should play a positive and constructive role to create



greater understanding and to help close the gap between Israel and the United States. They will have a unique opportunity to delve deeply into a variety of issues and communicate suggestions and concerns to people in Israel who are in a position to make a difference. There will be frank, open and honest conversations with opinion makers and leaders to foster greater understanding on both sides of the Atlantic. The goal will be to hear each other in a constructive rather than a confrontational, antagonistic or adversarial way. Rabbi Stuart Weinblatt, President of the Rabbinic Cabinet of the Jewish Federations of North America, who extended the invitation at the suggestion of Ambassador Dermer, stated that "I have received assurances that (schedule permitting), we will have private meetings with the Prime Minister and President, as well as with key members of the Knesset and others in influential positions."



Ambassador Ron Dermer, the Israeli Ambassador to the United States, nominated Rabbi Aaron Bergman to participate in this mission being coordinated with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. A small, select group of rabbinic colleagues were invited to join this important leadership mission to Israel to explore ways to create a deeper

understanding between Israel and the North American Jewish communities.

In his invitation to Rabbi Bergman, Rabbi Weinblatt continued, "At this critical juncture in our history, it is incumbent upon rabbis who believe the goal of *achdut* is important to work to bring our communities together, not to divide or exacerbate the gap between them. If we do nothing, the divide between these two great communities could deepen and become insurmountable.

This mission is not for everyone — it is for rabbis who are motivated by the principles of *clal Yisrael* and *ahavat Yisrael*. It will require open mindedness which will transcend allegiance to any ideology, organization or movement. Such an approach will thereby allow us to identify those common values which unite us and will serve as the guide to a path of greater cooperation and facilitate unity without uniformity. By identifying what unites us I hope we will strengthen the foundation upon which a positive relationship can be built and thereby help to close and bridge the gap, or at least do what we can so that it does not become greater.

You have been nominated to participate in this special mission because you are recognized as someone who is open to listening and to engaging in dialogue in a respectful and constructive manner and as one who can make a significant contribution to the discussion. At the conclusion of our mission, we will discuss potential future actions.

I sincerely hope you will be able to participate."

Rabbi Bergman eagerly responded that he would be attending. We are honored that he was recognized by Ambassador Dermer as a rabbi committed to the process and qualified to make a difference.

Nosh & Drash

This month, Nosh & Drash students (grades 8-12) will explore Jewish views of leadership. We are looking forward to deciding what makes a leader, and how we can discern both good leadership skills and incorporate them into our lives. Any 8th through 12th grader is welcome to come check it out! Classes meet on October 8, 15, and 22; on the 29th, teens will join the congregation as we celebrate Adat Shalom's 75th Anniversary with a Diamond Jubilee Concert.

What's new and exciting this year?

Hebrew Immersion for our younger students (Pre-K through second grade) is taught through a wonderful program called Hebrew Through Movement. This research-based approach follows the same process we do when we first learn a language: first we understand, then we speak. Students will develop familiarity with Hebrew vocabulary well before they begin reading the words on paper. Thus, instead of decoding Hebrew later on, they will be reading.

Second grade is using a new (to us) approach called Aleph Champ. Designed originally for Chabad Hebrew schools, this program is built like a Karate belt system, and students progress from "white belt" to "black belt" in reading and comprehension. Our faculty is excited about bringing this approach to our introductory reading program.

Students in grades 3-6 have an opportunity each week to choose a specialty area to explore. Third and fourth graders have *chuggim*, electives, on Sunday mornings; fifth and sixth graders have them on Wednesday afternoons. For six weeks at a time, students can choose to delve into such choices as Jewish Drumming, Choir, Art, Drama, Modern Conversational Hebrew, Book Club, and more.



After graduating from Harvard with honors, he enrolled in the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia to study conducting.

His father still pressured him to give up music for the Samuel Bernstein Hair Company. Lenny refused, returning to Tanglewood the next summer as Koussevitsky's conducting assistant. After that summer, he vowed to return to New York to seek his fortune.

On Nov. 14, 1943, he made his debut conducting the New York Philharmonic Orchestra, as the conductor had come down with the flu. He was on his way.

Much later, in 1958, his father told the New Yorker "Every genius had a handicap. Beethoven was deaf. Chopin had tuberculosis. Well, someday the books will say, 'Leonard Bernstein had a father'."

As he later said, he had no idea his son would grow up to be Leonard Bernstein.

In fairness to his father, he really did want Leonard to grow up to be happy and successful. However, it was based on his own vision of happiness.

We should think about the people in our lives and whether we are encouraging them to find and express their true gifts, and not just do what we want them to do. They may not become the next Leonard Bernstein, but they will be the best version of who they want to be, and will be happier because of it



The diamond is an enduring jewel, many-faceted, strong and lustrous, but when first discovered requires careful attention to detail and repeated phases of cutting, shaping and polishing to achieve its final beautiful state. While we celebrate the past, it is now time for us to turn to the future, as we apply the hard work necessary to ensure the next 75 years are as fulfilling as the past 75. In the book of Numbers, there is a commandment to "place a thread of blue into the corners of your garments" — the commandment for *Tzitzit*. It is the reason why the color blue was selected for the background color of the flag for the State of Israel. It is also the chosen color for the logo and letterhead of Adat Shalom. That color is a significant binding color for Jews throughout the Diaspora. While the color blue may not be your personal favorite color, there is no denying how we all recognize its meaning to us as Jews and how it brings us together.
