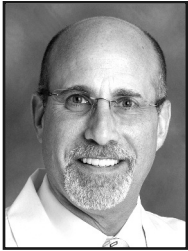

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FROM THE PRESIDENT,
SANFORD VIEDER
***THE HIGH HOLIDAYS, RITUALS AND
SPRING TRAINING!***

With the onset of the month of Elul, it is customary to begin blowing the Shofar at daily morning minyan in preparation for the upcoming High Holidays. For many, the sound of the shofar brings a multitude of memories and thoughts as we turn our attention to the preparations required for the holidays. For our talented clergy, the month of Elul is, in many ways, their time of “spring training” or “training camp.” I recall with very vivid and fond memories how my father, Cantor Larry Vieder z”l, would use this time to begin his rituals of preparation. There was much work to be done. The Torah covers required their annual change to white. The white robe or kittel needed dry cleaning and all the teenage Torah readers needed to be “taped down” (given their own cassette tape recording) so they could learn their respective readings. The sheet music binders were prepared for choir rehearsals, along with at least 1 or 2 new melodies to be learned and mastered! Weekly choir rehearsals would begin and with each passing year as we gathered all the men’s choir members, it was like a homecoming, often seeing each other for the first time in many months. There would be much laughter and *kibbitzing* during rehearsals despite the work ahead, but it was indeed a very special time, and my father knew it. He was always so proud of all the kids, the choir members and, of course, Adat Shalom. He had that special way of *kvelling* and his ear to ear smile and special twinkle in his eyes was proof!

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FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS
A NON-LEATHER SOUL

One of the most vivid childhood synagogue memories I have is at Kol Nidre services when I was around Bar Mitzvah age. I looked up from my *machzor* and the woman standing in front of me was clad in a dress made entirely of leather. I turned to my mother in bewilderment; we were both highly confused. Little did we know then, that the prohibition of wearing leather on Yom Kippur only applies to shoes.

The Torah makes no specific mention of the abstention from leather shoes on Yom Kippur. What the Torah imparts is that we are to “afflict” ourselves. It is the Talmud that interprets this as refraining from the following five things: eating/drinking, intimate relations, self-beautification, bathing/washing, and wearing leather shoes. There are several interpretations behind the reasoning for the leather shoes restriction: 1) It’s a reminder of having been expelled from the Garden of Eden, as Adam and Eve had to don leather shoes to protect their feet from life’s thorny path outside the Garden. 2) Footwear was prohibited in the Temple and the sacrifice was made in the Temple on Yom Kippur, the only time of year that the High Priest entered the Holy of Holies, the inner sanctum of the Temple. 3) In Talmudic times, an essential theme of the holiday was to refrain from all things which provided pleasure, and leather shoes represented foot comfort.

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FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN
WHAT’S YOUR QUESTION?

One of the most popular toys when I was a kid was Magic Eight Ball. It was a large ball filled with a mysterious liquid with a triangular shaped thing floating in it. You would ask the Eight Ball a question, then shake it up and wait for the answer to appear. We did not take it very seriously unless it gave us the answer we wanted to hear, but it was fun.

We sometimes, though, treat our spiritual practice as a kind of Magic Eight Ball. If we pray enough words of the siddur or meditate enough or even do lots of acts of kindness, we will get the answer in life that we want. It almost never works out that way, and we are often disappointed, and sometimes give up the practice.

The purpose of Jewish practice is not to give us the answers, but to help us figure out what is our question in every stage and part of our lives.

I think about this a lot around the High Holidays. We talk about repentance, but the holidays are really about *Teshuva*, which means our response and our answer to life. How do we know the proper response if we do not know what our question is?

Each year I ask myself, “What is my question now?” I spend a lot of time on this, and try not to force an answer. Eventually I come up with one or two that I try to work on during the year.

I will share with you the two that have been occupying my thoughts. I offer these not as questions that you should be asking yourselves, but just an example of how to approach things.

The first is something I have been grappling with since my father passed away. So much of my identity has been formed by my father. My question is, “Who am I now?”

The other arises from the instability in the world in so many ways. This question is, “What am I really afraid of?”

All I am doing is really reflecting on these questions, and thinking about them while I pray or meditate. This practice has helped me a lot in understanding myself better, and how I interact with my thoughts and feeling and even my memories. It helps me in my relationships, too.

There is nothing magical about doing this, but it is not easy. It means being honest with yourself, but also forgiving. It will not make the holidays easier, but it will make them much more valuable and meaningful.

FROM RABBI RACHEL SHERE
A DYNAMITE LIFE

While Jews make up only 0.2 percent of the world’s population, as of 2017 nearly 23% of Nobel Prize winners have been Jewish. In case you’re trying to do the math, that’s about 110 times greater than expected. Why is it that there are so many Jewish Nobel laureates? While there’s no clear-cut answer to that question, looking at the Prize’s origin may lend some insight.

In the spring of 1888, Swedish chemist Alfred Nobel had an experience few of us ever do. When his brother Ludvig died, a French newspaper mistakenly published an obituary for Alfred instead of his brother. The obituary, said to have been entitled,

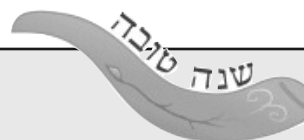

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- TICKETS -

The Synagogue is now processing High Holy Day tickets. Extra tickets for the Main Service for adult children over age 30 or parents of members may be purchased for \$275 per ticket. Please fill out request forms for extra seats with names of **unmarried** children and/or **dependent** parents. **Checks must accompany your extra seat requests.** Contact Denise Gallagher with questions, 248.851.5100, ext. 221.

Tickets will be mailed to all members in good standing (current year's dues, building fund installment, and miscellaneous charges paid). Please take care of unpaid obligations now so that your tickets can be processed and mailed. If you have questions with regard to your current balance, please consult our controller, Carma Gargaro, 248.851.5100, ext. 226.

- RECIPROCITY -

Adat Shalom participates in a reciprocity program whereby members in good standing of other Conservative congregations *outside* Michigan may attend High Holy Day services at our synagogue. Please understand that reciprocity can be extended for a maximum of three consecutive years. For details, contact Alan Yost.

- SEATING -

In order to be assured of your choice of seats, we urge all congregants to arrive as early as possible for both Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. **You may save seats only up until 10:15 a.m. Please follow this rule so that all congregants may be seated in an orderly manner.** We have many wonderful volunteer ushers who are eager to help you in any way possible. If you have any questions while you are in the building during the holidays, please stop at the membership information table located in the main foyer.

- PARKING -

Attendants will be on duty to direct you to a parking space. We realize that parking will be tight. **WHEN LEAVING THE LOT, PLEASE WAIT UNTIL THE CAR AHEAD OF YOU PULLS OUT. WE MUST HAVE YOUR COOPERATION.**

Please note that worshipers **will not be permitted** to park in the Beztak Companies parking lot directly adjacent to the Synagogue at 31371 Northwestern Highway for Rosh Hashanah or Yom Kippur. Summit Apartments on Northwestern Highway has requested that worshipers do not use their parking lots.

"The Merchant of Death is Dead," focused on his invention of dynamite, explaining that his immense wealth came from helping people kill one another faster and more efficiently than ever before.

When Alfred died eight years later, in 1896, he transformed his legacy by leaving his estate for the establishment of an eponymous prize to be given to individuals whose inventions confer "the greatest benefit on mankind."

In "13 Principles of Jewish Faith" Maimonides writes, "*Mabit l'sof davar b'kadmato* – The end of all things should be seen in their beginning." In other words, as author Stephen Covey often states, "Begin with the end in mind." Whenever we begin a project, whether large or small, it is useful to envision how we would like it to look at its completion. The High Holidays, with their intense focus on self-reflection and personal accountability, help us to do just that with the greatest project any of us will ever begin: creating a life. The High Holiday prayer book is called a machzor which comes from the Hebrew root word "to review"; its many prayers are there to help us to reflect upon the lives we are living and the legacies we are leaving. While few of us will read our own obituary, the time and space set aside at the Jewish New Year gives us each the opportunity to think about what we would like it to say. After all, a dynamite life doesn't just happen; it is mindful and consciously crafted from the beginning with the end in mind.

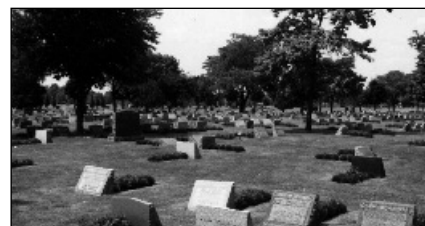

In the modern era, there have been discussions on whether it is permissible to wear comfortable footwear such as sneakers, Crocs, etc. The answer is that you can absolutely wear any non-leather shoe you want, no matter how comfortable it may be! There is a lot of standing during Yom Kippur services, so why not give your feet a break? Yom Kippur is a day of introspection and humility and not one of external concerns. Physical needs are not what we should concentrate on – comfortable shoes are a must so that we don't focus on our feet or any discomfort stemming from them. Our spiritual needs and aspirations for a pure soul and clean slate are what we hope and pray for at this time of year.

I pull out my black Crocs only two times a year: on Yom Kippur and on Tisha B'Av (when we also refrain from leather shoes). The mere act of wearing these shoes for these two special occasions sets these holy days apart from the rest of the year. This simple act of differentiation truly changes my mindset and helps put me in a different frame of mind. Yom Kippur is frequently regarded as the Day of Atonement. I like to refer to it, instead, as the Day of Purification. Having special non-leather shoes is a simple yet profound way to get my body and mind ready for reflection and renewal.

We all know not to judge a book by its cover and I learned at a young age not to judge a person by her leather dress. On these High Holidays, may we all only look inward to change only what is within our control and look outward only with love, understanding and compassion. *L'shanah tovah tikatevu v'techatemu!*

Of course, I cannot forget how my dear mother, Gitta Vieder z"l, would have her own rituals of High Holiday preparations. She would work tirelessly for days, even weeks, baking cakes which dad would hand deliver to so many Adat Shalom members, friends and his fellow clergy around the city. For many people, the holidays did not begin, really, until they received their Gitta Vieder delicacy! Then there were those late nights and very early mornings when she began to cook. She'd make her incredible gefilte fish, rounding out each piece carefully by hand, adding just the right palmful of salt and sugar (*measuring cups not required!*) as dad would often join in and help her grind the fish when her hands would tire. It was an experience I will never forget, my parents working hand in hand, late into the night, making the fish our family would soon enjoy, while they chatted, chuckled, and of course, argued (only a *bisse!*). What is crystal clear to me now is that the preparation, the ritual, was a key ingredient for their incredible partnership and lovely 63 years together. Like so many children, I took all this for granted, at times even being indifferent to it, only to realize much later how special these moments were that I witnessed for so many (and ultimately grateful) years.

As I look forward to the upcoming High Holidays, while much has changed, and I remember my parents, so many of those rituals remain the same and have already begun. Rabbi Bergman and Rabbi Shere are hard at work in preparation of their special sermons and meaningful commentaries. Hazzan Gross has been busy with choir rehearsals, and I am sure, mastering a few new musical pieces. All of our *Ba'al Tefillahs* are practicing in preparation, while Hazzan Gross has been busy preparing our teenage Torah readers and Michael Wolf has been ensuring that the Shofar is sounded each morning at daily minyan. My brother Mark is also busy preparing, as he looks forward to his 10th year as the cantorial leader along with the men's choir. Of course, Alan Yost and the entire synagogue office and maintenance staff are also hard at work, ensuring that the building looks pristine, floors sparkling, landscape trimmed, new seating aligned, lights replaced and membership tickets printed and mailed out (have you paid your dues?)

This year, Rosh Hashanah not only marks the beginning of a new year but also a new era with the beginning of Adat Shalom's 75th anniversary year. The executive committee and many other dedicated board members, lay leaders and chairpeople are engaged and excited to be planning for our celebration weekend, this coming October 26-29. Please be sure to reserve the dates and be a part of the momentous occasion. Next month's *Voice*, in addition to mailed invitations, will have much greater detail about all the anniversary events. So, as the preparatory rituals continue, we also eagerly look forward to new innovative programs to enrich our minds, souls and bodies. As you enjoy special time together with family and friends, be sure to review all the great offerings our clergy and staff have planned, with something for everyone in the coming year.
