

FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS AARON COPLAND

This past year, the classical music world spotlight has focused on Leonard Bernstein, as 2018 marks what would have been the year of his 100th birthday. I'd like to now shift the focus to another Jewish

American composer of the same era, a colleague and close friend of Bernstein, born on November 14, 118 years ago – Aaron Copland.

Copland was born in Brooklyn into a Conservative Jewish family of Lithuanian descent. The family surname was originally Kaplan. His family was active at Congregation Baith Israel (now known as the Kane Street Synagogue), where Copland celebrated his Bar Mitzvah. The rabbi of this synagogue at the time was Israel Goldfarb. Rabbi Goldfarb was a composer himself and wrote many melodies which we still sing to this day (his most famous arguably being the well-known "Shalom Aleichem" melody sung on Friday nights).

Copland wrote his first song at age 8 and decided to become a composer at 15. Copland's musical influences were quite diverse, being inspired by the classical music of Russia, France, Eastern Europe, England, Austria, Germany and Belgium. His compositional style was also influenced by what he heard growing up in the U.S., particularly jazz and even the Yiddish music permeating the streets of Brooklyn. To me, Copland's music sounds like America. It is expansive and optimistic, yet ironic in that a composer who spent most of his life in the city wrote music extensively about the American frontier. Many of Copland's most well-known pieces are based on iconic American places or people, such as Appalachian Spring, Rodeo, Prairie Journal, Lincoln Portrait and Billy the Kid. "I suppose in one sense it's the feat of the imagination," Copland said. "But after all, a kid in Brooklyn would've seen movies with cowboys in them. As a matter of fact, I did go out to the southwest fairly early in my career. And, I don't know, every American kid grows up with a sense of cowboys and what the west must have been like."

Despite his Jewish roots and musical influences, Copland's "Jewish" compositions were few and far between. One such early work is a song called "My Heart is in the East," a musical setting for a poem by Aaron Schaffer, notable for its quasi-Zionist text. Another is *Lament* for cello and piano based on a Rosh Hashanah melody of "Adon Olam." In the first of *Four Motets*, Copland paraphrases Yiddish folk song motifs. The music of his cantata *In the Beginning*, with text taken from the beginning of the Torah, has been described as evoking the feeling of davening. Banu is a hora of Jewish Palestine, arranged by Copland. The most substantial of his limited Jewish output is a piano trio called *Vitebsk: A Study On A Jewish Theme*. The main melody is based on a Chassidic tune used in Sholem Ansky's Yiddish play *The Dybbuk*.

Several composer colleagues of Copland described his "Jewish temperament." In fact, Virgil Thompson hailed him as "a prophet" whose music was "an evocation of the fury of God." Copland died on December 2, 1990 — seven weeks after the death of Leonard Bernstein. A simple and profound way to honor the memories of these two American Jewish music giants would be to listen to any recording of Leonard Bernstein conducting Copland's music .A short and exhilarating example would be Bernstein conducting

FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN THE WAR DIDN'T END ALL WARS

This November 11 is the 100th anniversary of the end of World War I, or as some called it at the time, The War to End All Wars. Many people are unfamiliar with the impact that this war had on the Jewish

community, an impact that still resonates to this day. I pray that the issues that have brought so much devastation and destruction since that war, such as racism, nationalism and antisemitism, will find resolution in our lifetimes, or at least in the lifetimes of our children and grandchildren.

This is part of an interview with Daniel Schwartz, an associate professor of history and director of the Program in Judaic Studies at George Washington University.

How many Jews fought in World War I?

This is a watershed. The number of Jews who are soldiers for different sides far exceeds any precedent to that point. Approximately a million and a half Jews fought in World War I for their respective countries.

What made Jewish participation so significant?

FROM RABBI RACHEL SHERE GOD FRIENDED ME

The above title comes from a new CBS show that my youngest son and I have been watching together. Percolating inside each of us are the stories about God that we were taught as children, the images of God

we read in the siddur, and our personal experiences with that "Something Larger" that we can't quite explain. This month I will be offering a Lunchtime Learning series as well as an evening class on the subject: "What do we really believe about God." While there is no singular answer to this question, in these sessions we will study texts and engage in an honest, soulful and pragmatic conversation about the ideas that have most influenced my understanding of and relationship with God. Whether or not you can attend the class, I hope you will find meaning in the following letter that Elie Wiesel addressed to God nearly fifty years ago, first printed in his book, *One Generation After*.

"I no longer ask You for either happiness or paradise; all I ask of You is to listen and let me be aware and worthy of Your listening. I no longer ask You to resolve my questions, only to receive them and make them part of You. I no longer ask You for either rest or wisdom, I only ask You not to close me to gratitude, be it of the most trivial kind, or to surprise and friendship...As for my enemies, I do not ask You to punish them or even to enlighten them; I only ask You not to lend them Your mask and Your powers...They are modest, my prayers, and humble. I ask You, God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, to enable me to pronounce these words without betraying the child that transmitted them to me. God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, enable me to forgive You...I no longer ask You for the life of that child, nor even for his faith. I only implore You to listen to him and act in such a way that You and I can listen to him together."

In *Parashat Vayishlach* we read about the reunion of Esau and Jacob after many years of separation. 



In the debates about Jewish emancipation — granting Jews equality — dating back to before the French Revolution, the question was, "Can we really trust Jews to be good soldiers? Can we really trust them to be patriots?" The argument was made that, "Look, Jews will be more loyal to their fellow Jews than they will be to people in this particular nation." World War I certainly is not the first time that Jews fight on opposite sides. There had been the Franco-Prussian war of 1871. In the American Civil War, Jews fought for both sides, as they did early in the 19th century in the various Napoleonic Wars. But nothing approaching this scale.

How did World War I affect Jewish history?

World War I is absolutely a turning point. You could say it's a turning point in western history more generally, but also in Jewish history, because two of the most impactful events of the Jewish 20th century — the Holocaust and the creation of the state of Israel — are almost unimaginable without World War I.

By the second decade of the 20th century, modern anti-Semitism, which had emerged in the late 19th century, seemed, for the most part, to have petered out as a political movement. But World War I gave it new life. The German experience in the First World War — its defeat, its humiliation by the Allies, and the scapegoating of Jews for the economic, social and political turmoil that followed — set in motion the events leading to Holocaust.

Similarly, Zionism also is a late 19th century movement that as of 1914 seems to have run into a brick wall. The Ottomans are implacably opposed to Zionism, basically preventing Zionists from immigrating, at least from purchasing land. Even though the war itself is initially damaging to Zionism and to the Yishuv [early Jewish settlers of Palestine], the alliance and the Balfour Declaration that comes from it enable the movement to develop. This is something that could not have been anticipated in 1914.

Why were the consequences of the war so grave for Eastern European Jews?

On the Eastern Front, one moment the Russians are invading, then the Germans or the Austro-Hungarians are successfully counter-attacking. And it goes back and forth. This is critical because the Eastern Front was basically located right smack in the heartland of East European Jewry. You have millions of Jews living in these areas who are immediately and direly affected by the war. Whole communities were destroyed and never reconstituted.

As the Russian soldiers attacked — or retreated, for that matter — they created tremendous refugee crises. They often would expel Jews. There was this fear that the Jews were not loyal. And so they pushed them east behind Russian lines, sometimes with as little as 24 to 48 hours' notice. Or Jewish populations would attempt to escape to the west because they heard about all the brutality — both deportations and massacres. My paternal grandmother, who died earlier this year at the age of 100, was from Eastern Galicia and remembered having to leave her home with her mother and her grandparents and take shelter in refugee camps, as did thousands of Jews. They were running away from the Russians.

What accounted for the continuing devastation even after the 1918 Armistice agreement?

For Eastern European Jews, the war doesn't end November 11, 1918 — or when the fighting between the Germans and the Russians ends earlier that year. The vacuum that's left in the aftermath of the Russian Revolution in March 1917, the Bolshevik Revolution in October 1917, and then the central powers' withdrawing from these areas leads to all sorts of civil wars. And during these civil wars, tens of thousands of Jews are killed in pogroms, between 1919 and 1921.

How did World War I impact American Jews?

The impacts were mixed. On the one hand, the war plays a somewhat absorptive role. Jews fight in disproportionate numbers — about 250,000, or close to 8 percent of the total Jewish population — along with people of other backgrounds, other religions, and from other places. Also, American Jewish diplomats and major American Jewish organizations play an important role in the peace negotiations, particularly in negotiating the Minority Rights Treaties. But popular reaction to involvement in this European war also unleashes a wave of nativism and anti-Semitism, resulting in immigration laws that cut off Jewish entry during a period when the situation of Eastern European Jews is becoming increasingly dire. The war also ushers in a period of Ivy League admission quotas and widespread distribution of anti-Semitic propaganda, like the Protocols of the Elders of Zion. These developments effectively arrest and reverse some of the progress that Jews had already made in the US.



LEARNING COMMUNITY NEWS YOUTH ENGAGEMENT

At Adat Shalom, learning doesn't end when we celebrate becoming Bar or Bat Mitzvah. It's only the beginning, like a driver's license to Judaism! Can you imagine if we learned all the rules of the road in a book and then weren't allowed to practice them on the freeway?

Our teens get to practice their "Jewish Driving Skills" in many ways:

- Working as madrichim, classroom assistants, once or twice a week during religious school (37 teens)
- Attending Dual Enrollment Hebrew classes, earning both high school and college credits at the same time (48 teens)
- Coming every Monday night for Nosh & Drash, learning with their friends how to adult Jewishly (over 20 teens)
- Being involved in BBYO, USY, Friendship Circle, Peer Corps, and other Jewish organizations
- Taking part in Teen Volunteer Corps, combining service and learning on a regular basis
- Attending services during the week and on Shabbat

What's interesting about each of these "practice" sessions is that they are group-based, and there is no pressure to get it perfectly right the first time. Teens need an opportunity to try, to grow, and to learn. It's the VR simulator of Jewish adulthood - and questions are always encouraged.

As adults, we find it difficult to locate a group that lets us "practice" the things we aren't yet sure of. The Education team has been working hard to come up with some suggested Chavurot, or cohorts, whereby we will help put like-minded adults (and their children, where applicable) together into smaller groups so that you can learn and grow together, with the assistance of an education professional here at Adat Shalom.

Some of the Chavurot we are thinking of include:

- Didn't grow up practicing Judaism, but want to do more
- Recent divorce (separate groups for men and women)
- First-time parents of small children
- Empty-nesters: making Judaism meaningful for adults
- Transplants from other states/cities
- · Non-Jewish extended families


