

Upon completion of each of the five books of the Torah in the course of the Shabbat morning Torah reading, it is customary for everyone present to shout out loud: "Chazak, chazak, v'nitchazek" which means "Let us be strong, let us be strong and let us strengthen others as well."

Chazak – In order for us to be strong, to be able to deal with the challenges, obstacles and pressures we encounter, we need to be grounded in something that gives us roots, like our Jewish traditions from *G'milut Chasadim* to *Tefillah* and everything in between.

In a sense, this emphasis on tradition is also the story of Chanukah. The Hellenist Greeks were conquering the world and a small band of Maccabees were able to resist the onslaught because they drew strength from our traditions. They stood up and said no, and they were empowered to do so because they knew who they were. Like their ancestors before them, traditions gave them strength.

The second *Chazak* points to relationships; we are strong when we have people we can count on. Our families and our Jewish community are sources of strength. The menorah in the Temple was made out of one piece of gold to show unity of the Jewish people.

Finally, *V'nitchazek* – We must strengthen each other. The world (and our daily *minyan*) needs us all desperately; there are many challenges and we gain strength by supporting and helping one another. May we continue to strengthen each other as we gather to sing the blessings over the *Chanukiah* and add light during the darkest time of the year.

October 26 and culminated with a truly inspiring and fabulously attended Diamond Jubilee Concert on Monday evening, October 29. The events were all carefully planned and flawlessly executed due to the hard work of our event chairpersons. My special thanks go to the entire synagogue office and maintenance staff led by Alan Yost, our fabulous clergy and specifically to Norma Dorman, Julie Wiener, Susan Graham, Joyce Weingarten, Harriet Dunsky and Gerrie Solish.

FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS RUDOLPH THE JEWISH REINDEER

It's no secret that many Jewish people love Christmas music. Almost everyone has at least one yuletide song that they smile and sing along with when it pops up on the radio. As you may be aware, many of the season's greatest hits were composed by Jews. Some

of these classics include Silver Bells, White Christmas, It's the Most Wonderful Time of the Year, The Christmas Song ("chestnuts roasting on an open fire..."), and Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer.

Rudolph started life as a poem written by Robert Lewis May, a Jewish advertising copywriter at Montgomery Ward in Chicago. In 1939, May was assigned the task of creating a Christmas story about an animal for use in a coloring book to be given out for free to customers. This ad campaign was a huge success and Montgomery Ward being second only to Sears as the country's largest retailer, the story poem of Rudolph entered most American bouseholds.

May used his own childhood experience growing up in New Rochelle, New York, as inspiration, and chose the name Rudolph as it closely resembled his own name, Robert. May himself said that "as a child I'd always been the smallest in the class. Frail, poorly coordinated, I was never asked to join the school teams."

FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN

The story of Chanukah takes place in the second century BCE, when the Jews of the Land of Israel were living under the domination of the Hellenized Syrians, a group who embraced the ancient Greek gods and tried to force their beliefs on others, particularly through idol worship.

The problem with Hellenism and the ancient Greek gods, in addition to its violation of monotheism, is found in the statues of these gods. There is no doubt that the statues represent one of the greatest artistic achievements. However, the statues set a standard for the ideal kind of person that few could live up to.

The physiques of these gods are flawless. They are muscular and beautiful. None is missing a limb. None is bent over in pain. None is poor. They are all of one race and ethnicity. The message of these statues is that only those who are perfect are truly created in the image of the gods. This often led to horrible acts. Children who were born with flaws were often left to die of exposure. People with developmental or physical disabilities were left to fend on their own. People of other religions and cultures were the enemy.

The Jews who fought against this said that every single human being is created in the image of God. That is why we believe that God is invisible to us. This way, no one can say what is the ideal kind of person. In Jewish tradition, we understand being created in the image of God as emulating God's ways. Just as God created people with love, we should treat all of God's creation with love. Just as God created a world with the potential for more than enough food for everyone, we have an obligation to feed the poor. Just as God created all different kinds of people, we have to find a way to celebrate those differences, and love people precisely because of their differences.



FROM RABBI RACHEL SHERE **IDOL (IDLE) WORSHIP**

On any given day, if we listen to the news or read the paper, we will likely be confronted with yet another example of the injustice, violence and despair that saturate the world in which we live. As Jews, what is the appropriate response to the bleak reality

that we often find facing us? The answer to this question is tied into the reason the Torah forbids idol worship. On the surface, it may seem that these two ideas have nothing to do with each other, however, our wise tradition understands the two as being inextricably bound. Rabbi Art Green writes, "Why is the Torah so concerned with idolatry? You might think that it is because God has no image, and any image of God is therefore a distortion. But Heschel read the commandment differently. He said, 'it is precisely because God has an image that idols are forbidden. You are the image of God. But the only medium in which you can shape that image is that of your entire life. To take anything less than a full, living, breathing human being and try to create God's image out of it - that diminishes the Divine and is considered idolatry.' You can't make God's image; you can only be God's image." May we find ways to feed and grow the Divine potential within us; and may these awakened reservoirs of Divine strength provide us all with the courage, wisdom and perseverance to transform our nation's headlines and heal our nation's heart.

As more European Jews immigrated to the city of Detroit following World War II, the freedom to belong to a Jewish congregation without imminent fear and the ability to safely observe their customs and rituals in a synagogue setting took on new meaning. Sadly, so many of these new Detroit Jews had witnessed and suffered unthinkable atrocities. Many had lost their entire families to the evil of the Nazi regime. Included with those people were my mother and father, of blessed memory, Larry and Gitta Vieder, who found a new family here in 1960.

For my parents and specifically my father, like so many other holocaust survivors, the synagogue became a very important symbol. It was a beacon of light that proved to the world that Jews mattered. It afforded my parents an opportunity to rebuild a new life, with a new family. Like so many other survivors, it was that tenacity, grit and determination to not only rebuild a meaningful life and a prosperous synagogue, but also to assure that for generations to come, the synagogue would remain an essential symbol of our resolve as Jews and the strength and beauty of Judaism. It meant the synagogue would stand as a critical piece of society that could not simply be eradicated despite any efforts to burn it down, or destroy it, or get rid of the people within. My father spent his entire lifetime building, promoting and safeguarding our congregation with great foresight of what it stood To this end, the name Adat Shalom (which means Congregation of Peace) has even deeper meaning today.

But, it is with a very heavy heart that I share this message tonight with the recent atrocity which took place at one of our sister synagogues, The Tree of Life Congregation in Pittsburgh. Within a few short minutes, pure evil took the lives of 11 fellow Jews, simply for being Jewish and peacefully celebrating Shabbat. We are all shocked and grieving at the tragic and senseless loss of innocent lives, as we pause to reflect on what has happened and what the future holds for the Jewish people in our modern times.

In paraphrasing Maimonides and our founding Rabbi, Jacob E. Segal, the problem with evil in the world, and ignorance, and disease, and crime is that these bad things are not positive forces in themselves. They are merely different forms of darkness. They are simply absent of light, which makes them absent of life.

However, from the darkness of this past Shabbat morning, all of us being here together tonight, and each time we gather within this magnificent spiritual home in the days and years to come, exudes light and radiance, along with consoling comfort and dedicated friendship. Knowledge, learning, wisdom, love, compassion and social justice are weapons of light which pierce the darkness. So tonight, we summon spiritual light through the beauty and wonder of music, song and Chazzanut. Tonight, we take a journey with these tremendously talented spiritual leaders, our Shaliach Tzibburs, and use these magnificent spirits of light to pierce the darkness and once again say to the world, we will continue to live proudly as Jews and continue to bring light to the dark corners of our earth.

Our renewed assignment as decent human beings and faithful Jews is to keep punching holes in the darkness, like a blazing torch, brightly shining light where it is needed. Adat Shalom and all other synagogues are the symbol of Jewish solidarity and permanency and they will remain a bright beacon in our community. So, without further delay, let us rejoice and shine bright, collectively together this evening, in dedication to those who were taken by dark evil. May all their souls be bound up in the bond of eternal light and eternal life!

LEARNING COMMUNITY NEWS

At Chanukah time, many focus on gifts and fried foods. Don't get me wrong, these are wonderful parts of our contemporary celebrations. However, one of the most important aspects of Chanukah is bringing light into darkness.

How can we do that? Last month, sixth graders spent some time on dealing with things that stress them out at a workshop with clinical psychologist (and religious school parent) Jackie Issner, PhD, LP. Later this month, our teens are taking part in a SafeTALK workshop (a training in suicide awareness) and I am completing a 2-day ASIST training in suicide prevention. Taking the stigma away from mental illness is one way we can help people find their inner light. In doing so, we can make sure we have the tools to help others get the help they need.

Thanks to a grant we received last year, we are able to provide these tools and other experiences to students and families within the religious school and our synagogue community. At the end of this month, co-sponsored by Sisterhood, we have a workshop for parents of upper elementary and middle school students on helping their children deal with stress. And at the beginning of next month, we have a self-care for parents workshop; after all, if you don't take care of yourself, you can't take care of anybody else's needs.

The Maccabees were fighting for more than any particular religious philosophy. They were fighting for the right to live normal lives of their own choosing, without threat or coercion. They were not interested in dominating another group or creating an empire. They were not trying to convert the world to their beliefs. They were trying to make a safe and secure corner of the world in which to raise their families. Despite overwhelming resistance from a superior military force, they succeeded.

Chanukah is about not losing hope no matter how bleak things may be. It is about having courage. It is about realizing that the greatest heroes are the ones who want to build their communities with peace for themselves and everyone else. God wants us to live lives that honor everything that God created. Chanukah brings light and warmth not just to a cold winter, but to our very souls.

He was also subjected to anti-Semitic bullying and it is no coincidence that the facial feature for which Rudolph is first mocked later becomes the reason that he ends up as the hero of the story. A decade later in 1949, May's lengthy poem was modified by his Jewish brother-in-law, Johnny Marks, to become the familiar chart-topping song made famous by Gene Autry (not a Jew!).

I admit, I love Christmas music, as well as the story of Rudolph. One need not feel guilty about liking such great music! We can take pride in knowing that so many lasting songs of the Christmas season, including the story of the most famous reindeer of all time, were created by an array of musically talented Jews. The song lyric proved correct: Rudolph definitely did go down in history!




