FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN

I recently came across a teaching by Dr. Brene Brown that gave me a lot to think about. She talked about the distinction between belonging and fitting in. She wrote, "Fitting in is about assessing a situation and becoming who you need to be to be accepted. Belonging, on the other hand, doesn't require us to change who we are; it requires us to be who we are."

Much of our life is having to figure out whether we fit in or whether we belong in a particular situation. Can we be ourselves or are we changing to meet what we think others expect of us? This question applies to home, work, school, family and friends. Are we more ourselves at work and less so at home? Do our friends and family love us for who we are, or do we pretend to be something in order to get their approval?

Compromise is important in all relationships, but it can be very painful if we feel that we have to hide or suppress an aspect of our life. We lose a sense of who we are, and who we want to be. It would be helpful to ask ourselves if we give the people in our lives the genuine space and acceptance to be who they are, or do we demand conformity to our vision of how they are supposed to be. Do we stay in unhealthy relationships because we crave approval?

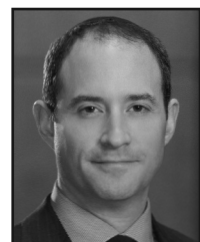
I was also thinking about this issue in the context of membership in Jewish organizations and institutions. We say we want people to belong, but I wonder if we really mean we want them to fit in. Asking people to belong means to welcome and celebrate them for the fullness of their being. Asking them to fit in means to be just who we want them to be.

All people are entitled to dignity and to be accepted for who they are. We can help each other find the places we belong.

Not every place will be for every person. I am glad that the Jewish world is filled with all kinds of spaces to express different ways of being Jewish. I want to make sure that Adat Shalom is doing everything it can to make people feel like they belong. I would love to hear from you about what you think we could do to make sure that happens.

On the 17th of the Hebrew month Tamuz, which falls this year on Saturday, July 20, a period of mourning begins that we call "The Three Weeks." It starts off with the minor fast day *Tzom Tamuz* (although this year it is observed on the 18th of Tamuz because a minor fast cannot take place on Shabbat). *Tzom Tamuz* recognizes several tragedies which took place on this date. The 17th of Tamuz is believed to be the date on which Moses broke the original tablets containing the Ten Commandments after having descended Mt. Sinai, only to witness the Israelites worshipping the Golden Calf. It is noteworthy that the 17th of Tamuz falls forty days after Shavuot, a number of days that shows up many times in the Torah. Shavuot is a celebration of Moses having received the Torah on Mt. Sinai and he remained there forty days, a symbolic numerical parallel to the forty years the Israelites spent in the wilderness prior to entering the land of Israel. Also on the 17th of Tamuz in the year 70 C.E., the Romans besieged Jerusalem by breaching the walls of the Old City. This attack ultimately led to the destruction of the Second Temple three weeks later on Tisha B'Av (the 9th of Av).

The Three Weeks is known as *Bein Hametzarim*, or literally, "between the straits," or "in the narrow places." This name is derived from the third verse of Chapter 1 of Eikhah (Book of Lamentations): "all her pursuers overtook her in the narrow places."

Every year when Adat Shalom hosts the South Oakland Shelter, our morning volunteers are surprised that they need to wake our homeless guests up at 4 and 5 A.M. because they need to get to work on time. It

is truly a misstatement that homeless people don't have jobs. In fact, over the years I have driven people to work in construction, landscape, fast food and more. The reality is that many homeless people work but their jobs don't pay enough to cover all of their expenses, especially when bills include unplanned medical costs. A recent study found that a majority of Americans have no emergency savings for things such as an emergency room visit or car repair. The same study found that 40% of Americans are just one paycheck away from poverty.

The second Torah portion in the Book of *Bamidbar* (Numbers) is *Naso*. The verb *naso* is most often translated “count” yet Rabbi Shlomo Riskin points out that the literal translation of this verb actually means “uplift.”

Throughout the history of the Jewish people, being counted has been critical to our survival and continuity. Today is no different. Rabbi Riskin writes that the biblical census is “a record of the courageous and sacred individuals who put their lives on the line, dedicating their very selves to the well-being of our people.” All of us must find a way to be counted to uplift our collective spirit and safeguard the well-being of our people. Whether it is going to visit Israel or writing to our elected officials to encourage their support for Israel for a just and secure peace, or whether it is seeking ways to build our network of relationships with other communities, or pouring our energies into Jewish identity and continuity in North America, we must all find a way to be counted among the children of Israel and in doing this we will uplift ourselves and uplift an entire people.

God tells Moshe that Aaron and his sons should bless the Children of Israel with three blessings (Numbers 6:24-27) – the same formula Betsy and I are blessed to recite when blessing our children each Friday night. The blessing for our sons invokes the shining examples of Jacob’s grandchildren (Joseph’s sons), Ephraim and Manasseh, who, although raised in Egypt, did not lose their identity as Jews. The blessing for our daughters refers to the four matriarchs, Sarah, Rebekah, Rachel, and Leah, all of whom were known for their concern and compassion for others.

I conclude with the three-fold blessing:

“May God bless you and keep you;
May God make His face to shine upon you
and be gracious to you;
May God lift up His face unto you and grant you peace.”

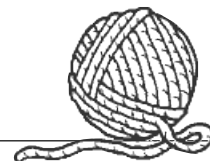

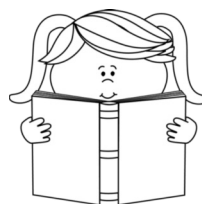

The Adat Shalom-Beth Achim Learning Community has been selected to participate in the Legacy Heritage Better Together Program, a four-year grant designed to encourage meaningful interaction between young and old. Sixth grade students, under the direction of Dr. Melissa Ser and their classroom teacher, Ms. Ariel Stollman, will be participating in the program with the Fleischman Residence through Jewish Senior Life. The Adat Shalom-Beth Achim Learning Community is grateful for being chosen to participate in the Legacy Heritage Better Together Program and looks forward to sharing with our community how this program positively influences our students.



Teens from Adat Shalom will take part in a year-long program of Jewish values and social justice starting in the fall, funded by a grant from the Stephen H. Schulman Millennium Fund for Jewish Youth. The next time you walk into our magnificent building, I hope that you'll stop for a moment to appreciate how beautiful our space is. I hope that you'll reflect on the important role it plays in making your synagogue experience meaningful. Over the preceding 12 months, there has been significant capital investment into the infrastructure of the building, including energy efficient LED lighting, a new heating and cooling system which is currently being installed, and making significant improvements to the building envelope to increase our energy efficiency and reduce not only waste but also the monthly costs associated with our utility bills. By the end of 2019, Adat Shalom will be a much "greener" space! Later this summer, a state-of-the-art sound system is scheduled to be installed in the main sanctuary which is sure to improve the experience for services, celebrations, and concerts. We also eagerly anticipate the construction and completion of a new indoor/outdoor venue with a generous gift provided by the Rosen & Wiener Families. During the three weeks prior to Tisha B'Av, we employ literal *metzarim*, restrictions, such as refraining from holding weddings and other joyous celebrations, and some people even abstain from haircuts and shaving. The final nine days of The Three Weeks begin on the 1st of Av and the intensity of the somber mood increases as the 9th of Av approaches.

It seems incongruous that the saddest days of the Jewish calendar occur during the peak of summer. Great meaning can be found, however, in the dichotomy of emotions stirred by reflecting on the tragedies which befell our ancestors during a time of year in which our lives are often devoted to leisure and enjoyment. The Three Weeks exemplifies the essence of Judaism — knowing that after the darkness comes light.
