

FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS L'SHANAH HABA'AH B'ITALY!

Next summer I am thrilled to be taking part in the Cantors Assembly's "Jewish Musical Journey through Italy" and you are invited! Italy has been a continuous home to Jewish communities for over 2000 years.

These vibrant and diverse communities are comprised of Italian, Ashkenazi, Sephardic, Persian and Libyan Jews.

The 2020 mission dates are June 22 through July 2, and the itinerary includes a nonstop array of fascinating sights and sounds. Some of the highlights:

We begin in Rome and will explore the city's many remarkable landmarks such as Palatine Hill, Castel Sant'Angelo, the Trevi Fountain, the Jewish Ghetto, the Great Synagogue, the Jewish Museum, the Coliseum and the Vatican. The cantors will be featured in two concerts in Rome as well as a late night talent show. After spending Shabbat in Rome, we head to magnificent Florence where we will set out on a walking tour of the city to see Il Duomo, Piazza Santa Croce and the city's museums, as well as a concert with the Florence Jewish community. We then depart for the day to San Gimignano, known as the "Town of Fine Towers," famous for its medieval architecture. There we will also enjoy a wine tasting and a visit to the Archaeological Museum.

The next stop is Ferrara where we will visit the new Museum of Italian Judaism and the Shoah, and walk through the former Jewish ghetto. Next, we head to Venice, the unparalleled, dreamlike "City of Water." Here we will experience Doge's Palace, St. Mark's Basilica, Campo Del Ghetto, and the Jewish Museum. We will also be treated to a sunset gondola ride, a visit to the Island of Burano and a concert at the Arsenale.

In my ten years with the Cantors Assembly, I have taken part in two international missions, first to Germany and then Spain.

FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN WHAT, US WORRY? A FAREWELL TO ALFRED E. NEUMAN

One of America's great Jewish political and social commentary magazines is coming to an end. *Mad Magazine* will no longer be printing new stories on a regular

basis, though there might be occasional specials. Part of the reason is that print magazines are dropping in sales, but I think it signals a more profound change. We Americans are capable of ridiculing and demeaning those who disagree with us, but because we take ourselves and our opinions so seriously, we have lost the ability to laugh at ourselves.

Mad was founded by William Gaines originally as a comic book in 1952. It became a magazine in 1955. Many, though certainly not all, of the artists and writers, such as Harvey Kurtzmann, Al Jaffe and Dave Berg, were Jewish. The very first story was called Goniffs, the Yiddish word for thieves. William Gaines was the son of Maxwell Gaines, born Max Ginzberg, who had invented the comic book itself in the 1930s. Gaines envisioned a publication that would lampoon things like politicians and social trends, and by doing so would point out the flaws in what were often closedminded and self-satisfied people, people who were potentially dangerous to the vulnerable in society.

Many politicians were obviously very angry at being portrayed in such an unflattering light, and tried to shut down the publication, but Gaines always prevailed. Freedom of the press is more than a right. Our founding fathers understood it as an obligation. Thomas Jefferson knew that the suppression of parody would lead to tyranny. He wrote, "No experiment can be more interesting than that we are now trying, and which we trust will end in establishing the fact, that man may be governed by reason and truth. Our first object should therefore be, to leave open to him all the avenues to truth. The most effectual hitherto found, is the freedom of the press."

Though *Mad* might be coming to an end, I hope we learn to value our opinions, but not take ourselves so seriously that we try to destroy those who disagree with us. If not, it will really be time to worry.



FROM RABBI RACHEL SHERE It's Not Love: Human Trafficking's Subtle Seduction

Human trafficking is a modern-day form of slavery that is happening throughout the world. While certainly a global issue,

many people do not realize that it is also a local issue. In May and June of this year, nearly sixty people were charged with sex trafficking in Michigan. In fact, the FBI ranked Michigan tenth nationwide in arrests for trafficking crimes last year.

On August 15 at 7:00 P.M., Adat Shalom will host a screening of the 2019 film "Ring of Silence," a 90-minute movie based on stories of sex trafficking happening in Michigan and across the U.S. Following the screening, I will be one of several participants in a panel discussion and Q&A session.

From Michael Wolf Director of Spirituality and Outreach

The Shabbat following Tisha B'Av (the ninth of the Hebrew month of Av) is called Shabbat *Nachamu*, the Shabbat of Consolation, referring to the opening words of the *haftarah*, the weekly reading from the Prophets. It is the first of seven *haftarot* noted for their theme of consolation. Shabbat *Nachamu* is always paired with *Parashat Va'etchanan* in which we read the *Shema* and the 10 Commandments.

In the Book of Exodus, Moshe comes down from the mountain with the tablets (*luchot*) and sees the golden calf. After contemplating the situation Moshe reacts: he throws the tablets down. How does God respond? According to the Talmud, God says, "*Yasher Kochacha* that you broke the *luchot.*" *Yasher Kochacha* literally meaning, "Your strength has been straight." Proverbially patting Moshe on the back, God tells Moshe, you've used your strength for good things, good job breaking the *luchot*.

In Deuteronomy 6:18 Moshe says to the Israelites, "You will do that which is right and good in the sight of Adonai." The Hebrew for "right" or "straight" is י-ש-י (Ya-shar). The same word is used in verse 40:3 of the Haftarah: "clear in the wilderness the way of Adonai! Level (make straight) in the desert a highway for our God."

Today we wish someone a *yasher koach* or *yasher kocheich* as a way of congratulating them for participating in the service. The traditional response is "*Baruch Tihyeh*" which means "blessed you should be."

Believe me, I know that some mornings it takes *koach* (strength) to get to shul, but I hope to see you at *minyan* so I can greet you and wish you a *Yasher Koach*!

WEEKLY SHABBAT TORAH STUDY

The world stands on three things: Torah, Worship, and Acts of Loving-kindness, (Shimon the Righteous, Pirke Avot 1:2)

Torah, also known as the Pentateuch, the first five books of the Hebrew Bible – Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy, tells the ancient stories of the Jewish people. These stories touch upon science, history, philosophy, ritual and ethics that involve individuals, families, wars, slavery and more. Virtually no subject is taboo for Torah. Woven into these stories is the unique lens through which the Jewish people have viewed the world and God.

Our Shabbat Torah Study resumes on Saturday, August 3. Join clergy and educators each week at 9:45 A.M. to dig deep into the weekly Torah portion. We conclude in time to hear the Rabbi's sermon.





LIGHTHOUSE - SOUTH OAKLAND SHELTER-HOUSING THE HOMELESS, JUNE 23-30

We opened our doors to provide a safe home for 34 guests during the week. We had 9 children ranging in age from 1-14. One of our guests had a service dog that also spent the week with us. We plan for months but there are always unexpected needs. We adjust to ensure that our guests feel welcome.

Ilana Woronoff has been volunteering in the Housing the Homeless project at Adat Shalom since she was a young child. She would come with her father and grandfather for the Men's Club barbecue dinner. Ilana continued to work at SOS through the AmeriCorps program. She has devoted countless volunteer hours working every year during our shelter week. Her recent reflections highlight the way in which we can learn from one another.

"The men, women, and children who participate in Lighthouse's rotating shelter program (SOS) are just people. They like to sleep in, they like cream and sugar in their coffee, they are people. Throughout this past week, they have included me in their SOS family, they learned my name, and had patience with me as I learned their names. We worked together on a puzzle, we experienced the fun of magic, we learned that pancakes warm up surprisingly well in the toaster oven. Whenever you have the opportunity to get to know someone different from you, take advantage of it!"

It takes many people to make this week run smoothly. Thank you to everyone who volunteered to make breakfasts and lunches, drive in the morning to ensure that clients got to work on time, carried mattresses, did laundry, and visited at dinner with our guests. Without each piece of the puzzle we could not have successfully completed our work.

My husband and I both grew up at Adat Shalom, and we are proudly raising our boys here, a place that feels like home to each of us. We feel grateful that we belong to this welcoming and loving community. Micah, our 5 ½ year old son, confidently walks these halls like he owns the place, because his comfort level with the staff, Rabbi Bergman, Rabbi Shere, Hazzan Gross, and members has always been high. He and our younger son, Hudson, have been coming to synagogue consistently since their brises, and Micah told me recently that he loves coming to services (especially with his nana and papa). My boys have loved Parent-Toddler classes, Shake Rattle & Twist, PJ's & Stories, and Tot Shabbat, and I always look forward to these programs so I can

spend quality time with them, see their smiles, nurture their Jewish identities, connect with other parents, and fill my own soul. We sing several of Hazz'n Dan's songs before bed and make up our own versions to the songs, too. Through family volunteer opportunities such as Housing the Homeless, my husband and I have been able to teach our sons the concept of Tikkun Olam; I see their hearts open so fully when showing kindness to others, and I often tell my boys they are becoming "the menschiest mensches."



Personally, I have deepened my connection to Adat Shalom and Judaism as I continue to become more and more involved. In these meetings we discussed and planned how to incorporate the intricate history and vibrant culture into our classrooms.

I am excited to begin to incorporate the CIE curriculum with the upper grades (5-7). We will explore topics about the Zionist history, the people and places that make Israel unique, the Jewish state, and more. The learning will be guided and end with hands-on and exciting projects for the students to work on throughout the year. Learning about and feeling connected to Israel is critical for our students and will ultimately help keep our students engaged and active in their education as they mature to adults.



We deliberately picked the date of the screening, August 15, because it is the Jewish holiday of Tu B'Av (the 15th of Av). Tu B'Av is a day that celebrates love and is often called the "Jewish Valentine's Day." Many women who have been victims to human trafficking say that the traffickers initially recruited them with a perverse seduction that often happened right under the eyes of parents, teachers and friends.

Edee Franklin is a Jewish woman and founder of Sanctum House, the first long-term recovery program and safe home in Michigan for victims of human trafficking. Upon opening Sanctum House in 2018, Edee said, "It's in my DNA. As Jews, do we still not carry the scars of slavery from all those generations ago? I've learned through my Jewish heritage and my own slavery to drug addiction that no one should be a slave to anything or anyone."

This Tu B'Av, I encourage you to attend the sceening of the film "Ring of Silence" and join us in conversation about how we can work to put an end to human trafficking in our state and in our country. This is surely one very important step we can all take to work toward a world where all God's children are afforded the opportunity to live lives of dignity, purpose and love.
