





From Hazzan Daniel Gross **Selichot**

Summer has gone by in a blaze of glory and it's hard to believe it's September already. The fall season is emblematic of change. The weather slowly turns, the foliage undergoes a beautiful metamorphosis, students begin a new year of school, and last

but not least, the High Holidays are upon us with the Jewish New Year. A dominant theme of the High Holidays is forgiveness. It is such an essential aspect of this time of year that there is an entire service called "Selichot" devoted to it. Selichot falls on the Saturday night which precedes Rosh Hashanah. (Note that on years like this one when the first day of Rosh Hashanah falls on a Monday or Tuesday, Selichot is then held on the Saturday night prior to the one immediately preceding Rosh Hashanah.) Selichot literally translates to "forgivenesses" but the term refers to any prayers of repentance. Selichot prayers also focus on God's benevolence and compassion, and include the well-known prayer referred to as The Thirteen Attributes ("Adonai, Adonai, El rachum v'chanun..."). The collective Selichot prayers mirror the content found on Yom Kippur. Therefore, the theme of forgiveness functions as bookends of the High Holiday season.

FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN



There is a wonderful thing that used to be very helpful in relationships and politics, something that allowed people to speak to each without humiliating or insulting the other. That thing, which appears to be long gone, is a filter.

I have never seen people so unfiltered in their conversations. Instead of saying, "I don't agree" they go straight to hate and anger. Politicians are the worst at this. It has been a long time since our leaders have encouraged us to hate other people.

Unfortunately, I see this angry and abusive language in so many family and friend relationships, too. It is getting so bad that some people say that we should not listen to what a person says, but only look to what they do.

I think this is a dangerous approach, and one that Jewish tradition has never accepted. Words matter. If they didn't, why bother praying, why say blessings, why tell our stories? They have power. A leader's hateful words can create fear and terror in vulnerable populations. A parent's words of rejection to a child can create a lifetime of pain and separation.

In Jewish tradition, humiliating and denigrating people is considered a form of bloodshed. We are all created in God's image. Hateful and racist speech desecrates God's image and insults God, no matter who says them.

FROM RABBI RACHEL SHERE FROM LIGHT TO LIGHT

Over the summer, fifty educators from around the state of Michigan and the Midwest came to Adat Shalom as part of a program hosted by the Holocaust Memorial Center. The educators who attended this seminar came from communities without

much of a Jewish population. Because Michigan legislation, since 2016, has mandated Holocaust education in all public schools, these educators were concerned that many of their students' first exposure to Judaism would be pictures of tattooed Jews behind barbed wire. This seminar, sponsored by The Olga Lengyel Institute for Holocaust Studies and Human Rights (TOLI), is built around teaching about the Holocaust through the lens of educating about Judaism as a whole. It is important to TOLI that the week of learning both begin and end "with light." This is why the educational seminar began and concluded at Adat Shalom, where the teachers learned and saw firsthand the way Jewish communities thrived before the Holocaust and continue to thrive today.

I was honored to meet with these educators on both visits. The meetings with them were informed by an extraordinary memoir I recently read by Holocaust survivor and acclaimed psychologist Dr. Edith Eger, entitled *The Choice: Embrace the Possible*. In this bestselling memoir, written at the age of ninety, Dr. Eger says, "We have the possibility within us to find meaning in suffering and turn it into an opportunity to discover within us something that we never thought was possible. I have no time to hate because if I would hate, I would still be a prisoner. When we seek revenge, even non-violent revenge, we are revolving, not evolving."

Tickets will be mailed to all members in good standing (current year's dues, building fund installment, and miscellaneous charges paid). Please take care of unpaid obligations *now* so that your tickets can be processed and mailed. If you have questions with regard to your current balance, please consult our controller, Carma Gargaro, 248.851.5100, ext. 226.

- RECIPROCITY -

Adat Shalom participates in a reciprocity program whereby members in good standing of other Conservative congregations *outside* Michigan may attend High Holy Day services at our synagogue. In order to be assured of your choice of seats, we urge all congregants to arrive as early as possible for both Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. You may save seats only up until 10:15 A.M. If you have any questions while you are in the building during the holidays, please stop at the membership information table located in the main foyer.

- PARKING -

Attendants will be on duty to direct you to a parking space. We realize that parking will be tight. WHEN LEAVING THE LOT, PLEASE WAIT UNTIL THE CAR AHEAD OF YOU PULLS OUT. WE MUST HAVE YOUR COOPERATION.

Adat Shalom's accomplishments reflect, in large part, your investment in the welfare and growth of that "home". As a result of your generosity in recent years, we have been able to replace the chairs in the Social Hall, install environmentally sound LED lighting throughout the building, resurface and replace driveways, parking lots and concrete walkways, make improvements to the decorative, acoustical wall paneling in the Main Sanctuary, and in August we will install a new sound system. During the course of our 75th anniversary year, we replaced all the original heating and cooling equipment and completed an energy efficiency envelope project to assure significant utility cost savings.

This year, we once again ask you to do a special mitzvah on behalf of Adat Shalom. The cost of these necessary infrastructure replacements from the original 1972 equipment was in excess of \$1.5 million, which primarily came from our unrestricted endowment funds. It is imperative that we regrow the endowment funds to assure ongoing interest growth that will ensure we have a balanced operating budget each fiscal year.



Rosh Chodesh Elul falls on August 31 and September 1 (whenever there are 30 days in a Hebrew month, we observe Rosh Chodesh for two days). Elul is the 6th Hebrew month, the month that precedes the High Holy days. Some say that the Hebrew letters that comprise the word Elul – *aleph, lamed, vav, lamed* – are an acronym for "Ani l'dodi v'dodi li," a verse from Song of Songs that means "I am my beloved's and my beloved is mine." Most often interpreted as love poetry between two people, the phrase also reflects the love between God and the Jewish people, especially at this season, as we assess our actions and behaviors during the past year and hope for blessings in the coming year.

Several customs during the month of Elul are designed to remind us of the liturgical season and help us prepare ourselves and our souls for the upcoming High Holidays.

1. Blowing the shofar

Traditionally, the shofar is blown each morning (except on Shabbat) from the first day of Elul until the day before Rosh HaShanah. The sound is intended to awaken the soul and kick start the spiritual accounting that happens throughout the month.

2. Reading Psalm 27

It is customary to read Psalm 27 each day from the beginning of Elul through Hoshana Rabbah, which is the last day of Sukkot.

3. Visiting loved ones' graves

Elul is also a time of year during which Jews traditionally visit the graves of loved ones. This custom not only reminds us of the individuals on whose shoulders we now stand and helps us honor their memories, but also prompts us to think about our own lives and the legacies we will leave to others — kind words spoken, comfort offered, love given and received — which take on added meaning as we enter the High Holiday season.

4. Reflecting

It also is a month during which we are encouraged to study and take time for personal reflection around our actions of the past year and to seek forgiveness from those we have wronged or with whom we otherwise have "missed the mark" in our interactions and behaviors.

This is why most of the sins that are mentioned during the High Holidays have to do with the way we use our words. Very few of them are other actions. Our sages understood that the most dangerous part of the human body was the tongue, that is why God put it in an enclosure.

People will always find things to disagree on. No matter what issue seems to be the most important today, something new will emerge tomorrow. The question is whether we want to be able to maintain the relationships we say we value. We need leaders whose words bring out what is best and most noble within us. We need to find the words to make our friends and family feel valued even when we differ.

Our words need to bring sweetness to the world, like the apples and honey of Rosh Hashanah, and not feelings of discomfort, like the fast of Yom Kippur.

May we create a new year of sweetness and joy for everyone.
