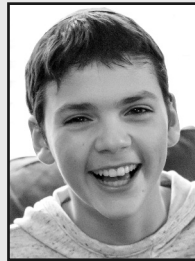

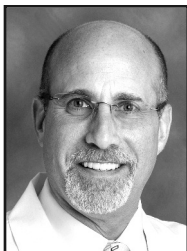

FROM THE PRESIDENT, SANFORD VIEDER

The beginning of the Jewish New Year is always a very busy time. Of course I always get a chuckle when I hear the holidays are either too late or too early (never seem to be just at the correct time!). Parents with school-age children are in the midst of back to school activities and trying to get back into routines after easier summer days. Along with all the hustle and bustle of work, school and home life adjustments coming out of summer siesta come all the fall programs from our incredibly rich Detroit Jewish community. There is no shortage of great organizations vying for our participation, attendance and, of course, financial support. As many of you have heard me say before, "Jews take care of Jews" - it has always been our responsibility and that will never change.

The past year at Adat Shalom has been busy with regard to absolutely necessary infrastructure improvements. I trust that you will all agree that the updates to our building have not only enhanced its appearance, but will also be instrumental in reducing overhead expenses by virtue of energy savings, and reduced utility costs and maintenance expenses. FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS **A KOL NIDRE Q&A**

The name "Kol Nidre" is taken from the first two words of the prayer which is the centerpiece of the brief, one-page service that immediately precedes the Erev Yom Kippur service. The text itself reads like a dry legal statement, but the prayer has garnered so much importance over time that the entire Yom Kippur evening service is regarded as "Kol Nidre." Upon examination of the Aramaic text, you will see that it is a 46-word legal formula listing all possible types of oaths and vows that a person might make. It then asks for annulment of those vows in the event that the promises are unable to be kept in the upcoming year. This seemed problematic enough that many rabbis over the years wanted to remove this prayer from the liturgy entirely. In short, Kol Nidre can be understood as a request for forgiveness in advance of any mistakes that might be made in the future.

Why has the prayer withstood the test of time, given the controversy? Simple — because of the melody of the prayer. Without a doubt, Kol Nidre is one of the most haunting and powerful melodies in the entire Jewish body of prayer music. It is so beloved that many Reform congregations that did ban Kol Nidre in the 20th century still utilized the melody with a different text.

Why is Kol Nidre chanted before sunset? Since the Kol Nidre service is akin to a legal procedure, it would be a violation to perform it on a holy day, hence it begins just before the Yom Kippur evening service while it is still daylight.

FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN **UNITY AND REPENTANCE**

Rabbi Avraham Kook was the first Chief Rabbi of Israel, before it officially became a state. He had a great love for all Jews, including secular ones. This was a controversial approach at the time, and maybe still is in many places. He was also facing an Israeli society that felt that Judaism was a relic of the past. He was able to unite both groups and help build an Israel that respects both democracy and religion. I am sharing with you an article that he wrote in 1933 that resonated deeply with me. May we bring his spirit of love and tolerance for others into our own day.

Unity and Repentance

As we stand before the start of a new year, it is incumbent upon us to examine our deeds and aspire to the path of teshuvah (repentance), a path that brings redemption and healing to the world.

The Jewish people have become divided into two camps, through the categorization of Jews as Charedi (religious) and Chiloni (secular). These are new terms, which were not used in the past. Of course, not everyone is identical, especially in spiritual matters; but there was never a specific term to describe each faction. In this respect, we can certainly say that previous generations were superior to ours.

By emphasizing this categorization, we obstruct the path toward improvement and growth in both camps. Those who feel that they belong to the religious camp look down upon the secular camp. If they think about teshuvah and improvement, then repentance is required by the irreligious, not by them.

FROM RABBI RACHEL SHERE **ANOTHER VERSE**

There's a hilarious scene in one of my favorite movies, *Meet the Parents*, where Ben Stiller's character is discussing the meaning of the song "Puff, the Magic Dragon" with his soon to be father-in-law, played by Robert DeNiro. Ever since the song's release in 1963, there has been speculation as to its deeper meaning. Some years back, I had the opportunity to meet its writer, Peter Yarrow (of Peter, Paul and Mary) at The Ark in Ann Arbor. Earlier that day, I had played the song for one of our kids, hoping he would love it as much as I did at his age. However, as the song neared the end, he broke into tears and cried, "Ema, turn that off. It's the saddest song I've ever heard." I had forgotten how sensitive he was and how legitimately morose the song's final verses are:

*A dragon lives forever but not so little boys
Painted wings and giant rings make way for other toys
One grey night it happened, Jackie Paper came no more
And Puff that mighty dragon, he ceased his fearless roar
His head was bent in sorrow, green scales fell like rain
Puff no longer went to play along the cherry lane
Without his life-long friend, Puff could not be brave
So Puff that mighty dragon sadly slipped into his cave.*

Later that night, standing in a line of people waiting to meet Peter Yarrow, I decided to tell him about our son's emotional reaction to Puff and ask him why the song ended on such a sad note. His answer was very appropriate to this time of year.

Rabbi Jacob E. Segal z"l and Cantor Larry Vieder z"l identified the synagogue as the home of the Jewish people. Proudly, Adat Shalom is our home.

Adat Shalom's accomplishments reflect, in large part, your investment in the welfare and growth of that "home". As a result of your generosity in recent years, we have been able to replace the chairs in the Social Hall, install environmentally sound LED lighting throughout the building, resurface and replace driveways, parking lots and concrete walkways, make improvements to the decorative, acoustical wall paneling in the Main Sanctuary, and in August installed a new sound system. During the course of our 75th anniversary year, we replaced all the original heating and cooling equipment and completed an energy efficiency envelope project to assure significant utility cost savings.

This year, we once again ask you to do a special mitzvah on behalf of Adat Shalom. The cost of these necessary infrastructure replacements from the original 1972 equipment was in excess of \$1.5 million, which primarily came from our unrestricted endowment funds. It is imperative that we regrow the endowment funds to assure ongoing interest growth that will ensure we have a balanced operating budget each fiscal year.

All members received a Yom Kippur Appeal tab card in the mail. Please remember to bring it with you when you come to services on Yom Kippur Day, Wednesday, October 9. YAD EZRA KOL NIDRE FOOD DRIVE

The annual Yad Ezra food drive is Tuesday evening, October 8, 2019. A truck will be parked outside of the main entrance for drop-off food donations. In addition, in the synagogue lobby there will be a place for your monetary donations.

Yad Ezra opened its doors in 1990 with the purpose of providing kosher food to needy families. Initially this was 250 families, however, this number has since grown to 1300 families. This incredible organization recently created a loan option for Jewish Communal organizations like Adat Shalom of up to \$100,000 interest free for up to 3 years. I want to thank Hebrew Free Loan and acknowledge how helpful the loan was to assist Adat Shalom with cash flow as invoices came in. We have agreed to a maximum 24 month repayment period, however it is our intent to pay this back immediately upon successfully completing our endowment campaign and annual appeal, so that these funds can be recycled to help other local Jewish institutions in need. We truly are fortunate to co-exist in a community with incredible Jewish organizations like HFL.

So as we move forward into the *Yamim Noraim*, with our annual Yom Kippur appeal and the 75th anniversary endowment campaign, Adat Shalom is in need of your ongoing generous support. The secular Jews, on the other hand, are convinced that any notion of penitence is a religious concept, completely irrelevant to their lives.

It would be better if we would all concentrate on examining our own defects, and judge others generously. It could very well be that others have treasure-troves of merits, hidden from sight. We should recognize that there exists in each camp a latent force leading toward goodness. Each camp has much to improve upon, and could learn much from the positive traits of the other camp.

Let us be known to each other by one name — Klal Yisrael. And let our prayer be fulfilled,

"May they all become one brotherhood, to fulfill Your Will whole-heartedly" (from the High Holiday liturgy).

At the High Holidays, we ask that God inscribe all of our names in The Book of Life. Our Sages teach that this book is not written by God, but rather is penned by each of us; its words are the words we have spoken, its plot, the choices we have made. At this time of year, we are asked to examine our books. How meaningful is the storyline? Who are the characters that figure most prominently? Are there some people we'd like to see more of? Are there others to whom we should reassign more minor roles? How many of the pages are filled with joy? How many with worry? Is our story primarily a drama, a comedy, or a tragedy? Does the plot line or the main character need redirection? Is there a love story?

In these days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, I find myself thinking about the concert and remembering Peter Yarrow's answer to my question about the song. That night he told me, "Tell your son that the song doesn't have to end where I left it. He can write his own ending..." In the "Puff, the Magic Dragon" book I bought that night, Yarrow wrote: *It's never too late to add another verse.* I believe that, at this time of year, God takes each of our books off the shelf, hands us a pen, and tells us the same.

Why is a tallit worn on Kol Nidre? The prayer shawl is worn to add to the unique holiness of Yom Kippur. Our custom is to wear the tallit only during daytime services, stemming from the third paragraph of the Shema which states that we should look at (and be able to see) the tzitzit, the corner fringes. Therefore, in combining the sanctity of Yom Kippur and the fact that the Kol Nidre service takes place during daylight, all who are able wear a tallit.

Why do we take the Torah scrolls out of the ark for the Kol Nidre service? There are many explanations for this custom, but the one that resonates best with me is that the presence of the Torah, the holiest object we have in Judaism, adds to the sacredness and importance of the Kol Nidre prayer.

Why is Kol Nidre chanted three times? One reason is that in Jewish law when releasing someone from a vow, the court has to make the absolution declaration three times. Another more practical reason is to allow latecomers the chance to not miss the prayer. Yet another beautiful explanation comes from the Machzor Vitry (11th century France) which states "The first time he [the hazzan] must utter it very softly, like one who hesitates to enter the palace of the King to ask a gift of Him whom he fears to approach; the second time he may speak somewhat louder; and the third time more loudly still, as one who is accustomed to dwell at court and to approach his sovereign as a friend."

I have fond childhood memories of going to shul for Kol Nidre — seeing everyone dressed up, wearing sneakers, hearing people already kvetching about the fast, and hearing the unmistakable melody of Kol Nidre and the hallowed tone that it set for Yom Kippur. I pray that you have a positive, meaningful experience, not only on Kol Nidre, but during this entire High Holiday season.
