
We Are Going Paperless

FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS BERLIN'S BLOCKBUSTER

In 1940, a man stayed up all night in a California hotel writing a song which would go on to become the world's best-selling single of all time. The man was Irving Berlin and the song was "White Christmas."

Irving Berlin was born in the Russian Empire in 1888 as Israel Beilin, one of 8 children born to Moses and Lena Beilin. Moses was a cantor and shochet (ritual slaughterer) and moved the family to America in 1893 in order to escape the pogroms. Israel was only 8 years old when his father died and having obtained only two years of formal education, he started working as a street singer and a singing waiter in New York's Lower East Side. His first published song, "Marie from Sunny Italy," appeared in 1907 and a printer's error on this song named him "Irving Berlin." Berlin composed nearly 1000 songs, 19 musicals and 15 film scores. George Gershwin claimed that Berlin was "the greatest songwriter who has ever lived" and Jerome Kern said that "Irving Berlin has no place in American music—he *is* American music."

Berlin supported Jewish charities and various organizations and was honored in 1944 by the National Conference of Christians and Jews for "advancing the aims of the conference to eliminate religious and racial conflict." Five years later, he was honored by the New York YMHA as one of twelve "outstanding Americans of Jewish faith." Berlin was a proud American, displaying his patriotism in his illustrious song "God Bless America." In 1955, President Eisenhower presented Berlin with a gold medal in recognition of his services in composing many patriotic songs for the country.



FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN

There are a lot of Jewish holidays. We have a long and eventful history, and have lived in a lot of locations, some voluntary and some not. Each of these eras created their own holidays, and for the most part each generation of our people has maintained them. There is one notable exception.

The original celebration of the Chanukah story was called Nikanor Day, which commemorated a great military battle against the Hellenistic Syrian army. We no longer celebrate it. It is not even on the calendar.

Instead, we rejoice over the Maccabees reclaiming the Holy Temple and over the miracle of lights. Our sages said that it was far more important to remember the event that brought us light and connection than it was to remember the defeat of an enemy. They understood that if the only thing that brings us together is a common enemy, then defeating that enemy will at best only bring temporary connection.

Our rabbis recognized that this was one of the problems with gossip. We use it to create a connection with someone, but at the expense of someone else. We create an enemy in order to bind us to someone else. That is why there are so many laws in Judaism that deal with how we use words.

Brene Brown has an interesting idea called common enemy intimacy. She writes, "Common enemy intimacy is counterfeit connection and the opposite of true belonging. If the bond we share with others is simply that we hate the same people, the intimacy we experience is often intense, immediately gratifying, and an easy way to discharge outrage and pain. It is not, however, fuel for real connection. It's fuel that runs hot, burns fast, and leaves a trail of polluted emotion. And if we live with any level of self-awareness, it's also the kind of intimacy that can leave us with the intense regrets of an integrity hangover. Did I really participate in that? Is that moving us forward? Am I engaging in, quite literally, the exact same behavior that I find loathsome in others?"

Genuine connection comes from celebrating the good in the world. When you light the Chanukah lights this year, think about the people in your life who really matter and who bring you joy, not divisiveness. Remember how much light there is when we appreciate those who bring light into our lives.



FROM RABBI RACHEL SHERE Which Night Is Your Favorite?

Chanukah always occurs right around the winter solstice, the time of year when we have the least amount of daylight. It's the time of year when even the most positive among us can't help but feel a little bit of the external darkness and cold seeping into our days. At


the exact time of year that the frigid temperatures and long nights start to feel endless, lighting that first candle is a radical act; it is an act of standing up to the forces in the world that work to chip away at our optimism and diminish our spirits. In lighting that first candle, we echo the hopeful attitude of our ancestors who, not having enough oil, nonetheless set a fire under the little bit they had. It was only after they took that first radical step that the oil miraculously lasted for another seven nights.



HOPE HOSPITALITY AND WARMING CENTER

DECEMBER 25-28, 5:30 P.M. - 9:00 P.M.

Hope Hospitality and Warming Center is a safe overnight center for the homeless in Pontiac. Hope is open from 5 P.M. until 9 A.M. providing dinner, triage healthcare, showers and overnight shelter, and access to resources that can be a pathway out of homelessness. Each year, more than 250 Hope guests exit the shelter to a place they can keep as their home. Without this center, many of the guests would be staying on the streets and at great risk.

Adat Shalom and Kol Ami partnered and together were the first synagogues to volunteer at the center. Our volunteers serve warm and filling meals in a caring atmosphere. The center is always at their maximum capacity of 60 men and women. We need 6-8 volunteers, over the age of 18, each night. The guests are very appreciative of our kindness. Volunteers will carpool to the center. WE NEED YOUR HELP! Please call Evva Hepner, 248.798.7673, if you are able to join us.

In addition to providing dinner we will be collecting men's white athletic socks to donate to the center. Elizabeth Kelly, executive director of Hope, emphasized the importance of socks to the homeless population. This need is especially critical during the winter months when wet feet can lead to frostbite. Changing socks, something we take for granted, can save lives. A box will be in the main office area of the synagogue to collect your sock donation..

"White Christmas" came out in the middle of World War II and through its mixture of beautiful sentimentality and vivid images of the comforts of home, the song provided solace for countless people affected by the hardships of war. Bing Crosby said that the most difficult thing he ever had to do in his career occurred at a USO show in 1944 in Northern France when he had to sing "White Christmas" in front of 100,000 G.I.s who were in tears. This took place only a few days before the Battle of the Bulge where many of these soldiers lost their lives.

I'm always happy to admit that I love Christmas music (see my December 2018 Voice article, available at adatshalom.org). The Jewish people's contributions to the arts is indisputable and although many of us may experience the "December Dilemma," we can all take pride in knowing that the best-selling song of all time was written by a nice Jewish boy. My best wishes for an illuminated, wonderful, and maybe even White Chanukah!

When our world feels dark and cold, it's easy to get frustrated and discouraged. The first step toward fixing any problem is always the hardest to take. With any goal, once we see that first bit of progress, no matter how small, it becomes easier to take the next step. Darkness is dispelled one small step at a time. Our Chanukah candles may shine the brightest on the eighth night, but the first night will always be my favorite.

Continuing my 5780 theme - the year of Outreach...

Jacob prepares to meet his brother Esau in Parashat Vayislach. Jacob employs a number of strategies before meeting with Esau:

- 1. Direct diplomacy (sending messengers Va-Yishlach 32:4 "Jacob sent messengers ahead to his brother Esau...")
- 2. Preparation for the possibility of war (32:8-9 "Jacob was greatly frightened; in his anxiety, he divided up the people with him, and the flocks and herds and camels, into two camps, thinking, 'If Esau comes to the one camp and attacks it, the other camp may yet escape")
- Passionate prayer (32:12 "Deliver me, I pray, from the hand of my brother, from the hand of Esau...") DAILY MINYAN 7:30 A.M. 5:00 P.M.
- Gift giving (32:14 15 "after spending the night there, he selected from what was at hand these presents for his brother Esau: 200 she-goats and 20 he-goats; 200 ewes and 20 rams.")
- 5. Mental preparation (wrestling intellectually with his opponent Esau's guardian angel in anticipation of their eventual confrontation).

Something was done right, because miraculously Jacob was not harmed by his brother. Which one was it that made the difference? It probably wasn't just one thing that Jacob did, rather it's that he did all he could do. He acted in advance rather than reacting.
