

FROM THE PRESIDENT, JOAN CHERNOFF EPSTEIN

I look back on the origins of Adat Shalom - even before Rabbi Segal - when our founders sought a more inclusive, open, and transparent approach to Conservative Judaism. Those early members came from all over Detroit and with family origins from many countries. They brought with them different ideas,

customs, and languages, but shared a belief in the power a diverse group can bring to a synagogue for it to thrive, adapt, and grow.

Today, as I speak with members I have known for years, and as I meet so many new members, I see that same wonderfully uniting, inclusive philosophy amongst the congregation. And I see the same commitment to openness. FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN

As the world starts to reopen it is important for each of us to spend some time thinking about who we are and who we aspire to be. The High Holidays ask important questions: What matters the most and what are we doing about it? The time leading up to the Holidays is an opportunity for us to

reevaluate and recalibrate our lives, to make sure that we are living in the best and most meaningful ways possible.

The farewell speech by President Shimon Peres, z"I, from July 2014 resonated very deeply with me. He talked about the greatness of which Israel is capable, but also what the entire Jewish people could be. As you begin your own preparations, I hope these words are a source of inspiration for your own spiritual journey:

Farewell Address to the Knesset by Shimon Peres Israel, this small country, became a truly great state.

I know of no other country on the face of the earth or throughout history, which amazed and surprised so much.

Gathering in its people. Making its wilderness bloom. Resurrected from the ruins, surviving a terrible Holocaust. Fighting back in seven wars. Bringing a language back to life. Respecting its traditions and adopting modernity.

And at the same building a country which continues to develop. A country which carries values and practices democracy. A country without natural resources, which utilized instead the resourcefulness of its people. Our human resource is far more precious than wells of oil or mines of gold. A country which was established upon a historical core and became an outstanding state in the new scientific world. A country of song. A country of literature. A country which seeks peace day and night.

We are a people that experienced unimaginable agony. And we are a people that reached the lofty heights of human achievement. We made great efforts. We paid a heavy price.

We will never forget our brothers and sisters who perished in the Holocaust. We will remember those who fell in battle, who brought new life to a redeemed people.

We returned. We built. We fought. We prayed. Until we began to see contours that even surprised us. We are an ancient people who are getting older. We are a people, first and foremost, that rebuilds itself time and again.

Israel was born as a precedent and created precedents. Despite being small in number among the nations, our people carried a faith as great as any. The first to rebel against prejudice was Moses. A nation that rebelled against Pharaoh. That smashed idols. That shattered illusions. A nation that walked through the desert to reach its home, its destiny.

We climbed the mountains and came down with the tablets, with the Ten Commandments which became the foundations upon which our nation was built and which were adopted by Western civilization.

We continue and will continue with this great legacy. There are still idols to be smashed, slaves to free, lives to save and justice to uphold. There is still a world to fix. Even if we remain the minority among the nations. Even if we serve as a target for evil - we will not deviate from our moral heritage.

FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS TU B'AV - ISRAEL'S VALENTINE'S DAY

According to the Mishna (Tractate Ta'anit), the two most festive days of the year were considered to be Yom Kippur and Tu B'Av. Hard to believe, right? How can Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, be a happy holiday? According to our sages it was because this holy

day symbolized God's forgiveness of Israel for the sin of the golden calf, resulting in the happy occasion of Moses receiving the second set of tablets containing the ten commandments.

I want to focus on the other most festive day mentioned in the Mishna: Tu B'Av. Many people are not even aware that such a holiday exists. Tu B'Av literally means the 15th day of the Hebrew month of Av. *Tu* is made up of the Hebrew letters *tet* (U), which represents 9 and *vav* (I) which represents 6, thus adding up to the number 15. Tu B'Av is one of four holidays that fall in the middle of the month, at the peak of the full moon, the others being Sukkot (15 Tishrei), Tu B'Shvat (15 Shevat), and Pesach (15 Nisan).

The Mishna says that Tu B'Av marked the beginning of the grape harvest and Yom Kippur marked the end of the grape harvest - hence the linking of these two holidays agriculturally. Tu B'Av also marked the wood offering brought to the Temple, a crucial element not only needed for the sacrifices but for the *Ner Tamid* (eternal light) as well.

Most significantly, Tu B'Av has historically been regarded as a Jewish day of love. The Mishna describes how on Tu B'Av, the unmarried women of Jerusalem would go out and dance in the vineyards and be chosen to be partners in marriage. Moreover, on Tu B'Av, women and men from the different tribes of Israel were allowed to ignore earlier prohibitions against intertribal marriage. Although mostly forgotten for centuries, Tu B'Av in modern Israel today is considered a holiday of romance, much like Valentine's Day, celebrated with dancing, singing, and exchanging of flowers, and is a popular date for weddings.

While we tend to associate the month of Av with sadness because of Tisha B'Av (commemorating the destruction of the Temples), keep in mind that right around the corner is Tu B'Av, a day of utmost happiness. In Jewish tradition, we embrace the concept of moving from darkness to light. The month of Av is the perfect representation of this beautiful and powerful idea.

FROM RABBI DANIEL S. HORWITZ **GREETINGS ADAT SHALOM FAMILY!**

It's a pleasure to have the chance to share a few words with you via The Voice for the first time.

For so many of us, the HiHos (as I like to call the High Holidays) seem to just appear out of nowhere. We're living our daily lives, and then

suddenly it's "Oh my! Rosh Hashanah is only a few days away!" And then, we scramble to menu prep and cook, and maybe pick out a flattering outfit.

But often we don't make the time to spiritually prepare for what can be the peak of our spiritual year. Showing up to High Holiday services (whether in person or virtually) without doing any sort of self-work ahead of time is like showing up to play on Opening Day without having gotten into shape during spring training.

Fortunately, our tradition has a built-in spiritual technology to help prepare us for the HiHos – the month of Elul. Each day of Elul (which this year begins Sunday evening, August 8th) provides an opportunity to do the spiritual "practice" necessary to prepare ourselves

During the month, we traditionally read Psalm 27 twice daily (the first half of which focuses on assurance, and the second half of which entails a desperate search for the Divine, encouraging us to focus on integrating the parts of ourselves which are seeking support with the parts that feel secure so that we can be holistically one heading into the New Year), and we also blow the shofar at the end of minyan each weekday morning, reminding us with its piercing sound that Yom Tru'ah (the Biblical name for Rosh Hashanah which translates as "the day of [shofar] blasting") is approaching.

Thus, it only seemed logical that we organize a shofar-blast-a-day social media campaign that also features a short teaching on Psalm 27, so that those who aren't daily minyan-goers can still hear the shofar and a bit of Psalm 27 each day of Elul online! Keep an eye out for our daily Facebook and Instagram posts each morning beginning August 9th!

With Elul beginning in the coming weeks, I encourage us all to find ways – whether by utilizing the traditional ones mentioned above, or new ones that are personally meaningful – to start getting ourselves ready for the HiHos, so that we'll be ready for our spirits to soar together on the Opening Day of 5782!

FROM RABBI BLAIR NOSANWISCH DIRECTOR OF SPIRITUAL CARE

When we encounter destruction, in our personal lives, in the news, in public or in private, how do we react? There is a peculiar story about Rabbi Akiva, a first century sage, who laughed when he saw the destroyed Temple Mount in Jerusalem. His peers wept

and despaired at the sight of a fox scampering out of The Holy of Holies, as I imagine I would have, as we are still meant to do this time of year on the ninth of Av. Why did Rabbi Akiva laugh while the others cried? What did he understand about destruction that allowed him to approach it with such levity?

This Torah feels personal to me. I have a different way of dealing with despair and destruction than Rabbi Akiva and his peers. For me, I all too often deal with destruction by trying not to see it. Sometimes I do this by looking instead at my phone, and sometimes I do it by not reading the news, but the basic idea is the same. I manage my own despair by looking away.

Not so for these Talmudic ancestors. Whether laughing or crying, they all looked at the destruction before them - letting themselves feel the feelings of this unimaginable loss.

So, why was Rabbi Akiva able to laugh? The story (Makkot 24b) goes on to explain that he knew of two prophecies. In order for the one to come true, the other first needed to come to pass. When Rabbi Akiva saw a fox prancing across the ruined temple, he remembered the first prophecy: that the Temple would be reduced to rubble and, ostensibly, reforested. But this instantly connected him to a second more hopeful prophecy, later in the chronology of the Torah, which said: עוד ישבו זקנים נוקנות ברחובות ירושלם "There shall yet be elderly men and elderly women sitting in the streets of Jerusalem" (Zechariah 8:4).

It takes a great deal of strength to stare destruction head on and be able to stay grounded in the bigger picture. But what Rabbi Akiva knows in his bones could be summed up in the old adage, "This too shall pass." This is a spiritual perspective that we can cultivate in relation to our earthly toils. No matter how small, powerless, or overwhelmed we feel, we are always in the middle of a story that has already been and will continue to be told. As we begin to write the story of the next year of our lives, let's cultivate the ability to stand together and look boldly at the world before us, laughing and crying together, as much as we need.



FROM MICHAEL WOLF
DIRECTOR OF SPIRITUALITY AND OUTREACH

I am sharing an example of a 'One Minute Of Fun' teaching we have - every Sunday through Thursday between the afternoon and evening services - hope to see you back in the synagogue soon!

Tu B'Av - the Talmud states that: "There were no holidays so joyous for the Jewish People as the Fifteenth of Av ..." (*Ta'anit 26b*).

According to the Mishna, *Tu B'Av* was a joyous holiday in the days of the Temple in Jerusalem, marking the beginning of the grape harvest. Yom Kippur marked the end of the grape harvest. On both dates the unmarried girls of Jerusalem dressed in white garments and went out to dance in the vineyards. Each young lady would be dressed in white clothing borrowed from her neighbor so that those who came from wealthy families would not stand out and none would be embarrassed.

As they danced, the ladies would call out: "Young man, lift your eyes and choose wisely. Don't look only at physical beauty—look rather at the family [values], 'For charm is false, and beauty is deceitful. A God-fearing woman is the one to be praised ..." (Proverbs 31:30).

Why such joy? Here are some of the reasons the rabbis offer for celebrating:

- It was on the 15th of Av when the prohibition of the rest of the Jewish tribes marrying into the tribe of Benjamin was lifted.
- It was on the 15th of Av when <u>Hoshea ben Elah</u>, the last king of the northern kingdom of Israel, removed the roadblocks set by <u>Jereboam</u> to prevent his subjects from making the pilgrimage to Jerusalem.
- The masses of Jews who were massacred when the Romans conquered the city of <u>Betar</u> in 133 CE were finally buried, on the 15th of Av.
- The 15th of Av was the final day when wood was cut for the Temple. When Ezra and Nehemiah returned to Jerusalem and rebuilt the Temple, they found that the enemies of Israel had cut down most of the trees, a common act for an army at that time. In order to supply wood for the Temple sacrifices, Jews would donate wood, which was desperately needed, and offer a sacrifice at the same time, called the "wood offering." The 15th of Av is considered the end of the sunny season, and it marked the date by which the wood in the Temple needed to be dry. It was a day of celebration for having amassed enough wood for the Temple's needs.

This year Tu B'Av falls on Shabbat Nachamu - July 24th.



Since beginning at Adat Shalom a decade ago, I have gently shaped and reshaped our Hebrew program. We went from whole-class instruction with some students getting extra 1:1 help to a Hebrew Resource Room for more students to get additional support. Then we shifted toward a small-group based approach, where students received personalized attention as they worked their way through basic Hebrew literacy and then through the prayers of the siddur. It was working for most of our students, especially those who attended twice weekly and were in a smaller group.

Then it was March, 2020. Everything just stopped.

When we re-imagined learning for the 2020-2021 school year, the one area I felt the most strongly about was individualized Hebrew lessons. By shifting from classroom based learning to 1:1 learning at times and days that work for a family, our Hebrew class attendance is at almost 100%. Students have a full 30 minute lesson each week with a dedicated teacher: no changing groups, or remembering what page they were on, or figuring out what to do when one member of the group is absent or late.

I had the opportunity to work with several of our students this past year, and the growth I saw was extraordinary. This is echoed by my faculty, all of whom saw exponential growth and learning in their students this year. It used to take a full two years for a student to work through a Hebrew reading primer (learning the letters and vowels and building fluency). This year, most of our second graders reached a level of fluent or almost fluent reading in just seven months. By working through the texts at their own pace, students also have the opportunity to ask questions, delve into the prayer language and the big ideas of WHY and HOW we pray, and learn vocabulary.

As we move (hopefully, soon) into a post-pandemic world, one thing I am holding on to is individualized learning for Hebrew. Want to know more? Give me a call or send an email, and I'm happy to share data and success metrics.
