MESSAGES



From the President, Joan Chernoff Epstein

During the secular holiday on July 4th we were thinking of freedom and of independence- both our own and that of our country. At the same time, Adat Shalom came together at our Kabbalat service to welcome Rabbi Daniel Horwitz and Rabbi Blair Nosanwisch. It was a beautiful evening with

Hazzan Gross and Rabbi Bergman at the helm, Rabbis Horwitz and Nosanwisch participating, accompanied by Marty Liebman and Dan Shere. It was a great start to the season. The celebration continued the very next day at Shabbat services when we honored Rabbi Bergman's 13th anniversary of leading us with his characteristic strength, intelligence and vision, along a journey of many unexpected twists and turns. It was a wonderful in-person celebration. Rabbi Bergman did a spectacular job of singing the Haftorah and it was even more special to feel and see the joy of those in attendance. We all needed that human connection!

Many of you requested a copy of my remarks that day, so you will find them below, and my comments for this article brief, but first I want to once again express my gratitude for our leadership - both clerical and lay - who have kept us going and thriving in these most challenging times. Last year we were scrambling to safely celebrate the holidays in unfamiliar ways. Now we have come so far! We are back to gathering together, feeling more comfortable in our new routines, keeping our own health and the health of those around us foremost in our minds. We as a community are knit together through the herculean efforts of our leadership and staff, forming a resilient fabric of congregants.

My remarks at the celebration on July 2, 2021....

Jewish philosopher Martin Buber once said:

"I do not accept any absolute formulas for living. No preconceived code can see ahead to everything that can happen in a man's life.

As we live, we grow, and our beliefs change. So, I think we should live with this constant discovery.

We should be open to the adventure in heightened awareness of living.

We should stake our whole existence on our willingness to explore and experience."

This quote reminds me of our own Rabbi Aaron Bergman - open to the adventure of leading us at Adat Shalom. He seems eager to explore and experience what life brings him. While on this roller coaster of a ride we have been on, through all the steep climbs upward, through the twists and turns and rapid descents, I never heard the shrieks from him that many of us were feeling inside. Throughout, he has remained steady and calm, and seemed to have a sixth sense about what obstacle was around the next bend. That says a lot about the kind of man he is: everything he has done has come from the heart, and it's all been for the benefit of the congregation.

This week's Torah reading of Parashat Pinchas explains a change in property inheritance after the five daughters of Zelophehad, lacking any brothers, successfully petitioned to inherit their father's apportionment. Moses related this in a way which demonstrated fairness, openness, and compassion. I cannot help but notice the similarity to our own Rabbi Bergman, who himself has four daughters, although not five! His leadership clearly embodies these same admirable qualities.

Most Jewish Holidays begin in the middle of the month when the moon is full and bright. Rosh Hashanah is the only holiday that begins on the new moon when it is only a sliver in the sky and the night is at its darkest. The darkness is real and can be frightening, but it is not all that there is. Judaism is about

finding light when it is dark and affirming life when we are afraid and uncertain.

We always believe that no matter what, there is still good in the world, even if it is hidden. It is our responsibility, our destiny, and our privilege to reveal it for ourselves and for the whole world. We do not count our year by a significant moment in Jewish history or event in the lives of one of our ancestors, but by the creation of the whole world.

One of the most important words in our vocabulary is *tikvah*, hope. Jewish hope is faith that the world can be better, if we partner with God in making it that way. Hope is our strength. It is our refusal to give in to despair and fear. We have suffered so much as a people, but because we have held on to hope, we have accomplished so much and have flourished even in the worst of times.


We say *modeh/modah ani* every single morning, beginning our day with gratitude that we have been given another chance at making the world better in our own unique way. That is a statement of hope and faith. We don't know what our day will be, but we are grateful for the opportunity to find out.

No wonder that *Hatikvah*, The Hope, is the national anthem of Israel. To sing of hope after the Holocaust is an extraordinary and powerful affirmation of life.

Leonard Cohen explained he wrote "Hallelujah" because, "I wanted to stand with those who clearly see God's holy broken world for what it is, and still find the courage or the heart to praise it. You don't always get what you want. You're not always up for the challenge. But in this case — it was given to me. For which I am deeply grateful."

None of us really know what will happen in the coming year, but I do know that as a people we will face it with hope and gratitude.

May we have lives of sweetness, health and joy and may we find the strength and courage to help heal God's holy broken world.

FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS PUTTING THE FAST IN FASTING

My first observance of a fast was on the Yom Kippur before my Bar Mitzvah, and my inquisitive mind was hung up on a peculiar detail — why was it called "fasting"? Fasting definitely does not go by very fast and I would quip that it should be called "slowing." It turns

out that the word "fasting" comes from the Old English word fæstan: to abstain from food, especially as a religious duty. It is further derived from an older Germanic meaning of holding oneself firmly in control (as in "to hold fast.")

So why do we fast on Yom Kippur? The requirement to fast on this holiday is biblical in origin, as stated in the Torah (Numbers 29:7), "On the tenth day of the same seventh month you shall observe a sacred occasion when you shall afflict your souls. You shall do no work." Yom Kippur occurs on the tenth day of the seventh Hebrew month, Tishrei. Ancient sages physicalized self-imposed "soul affliction" by fully abstaining from food and water. Soul affliction is a direct and rather harsh translation of the Hebrew phrase *v'initem et nafshoteichem*. If we dig a little deeper to the root of *v'initem*, we find the word *anah*, which means to respond or react. In my mind, the concept of responding to our souls (to address spiritual needs) is much more intriguing and profound than the view of afflicting our souls (with physical punishment).

Yom Kippur is my favorite holiday. There is a palpable and indescribable spiritual aura that envelops me beginning before Kol Nidre and which increases through the conclusion of Ne'ilah. Fasting adds an introspective dimension of holiness and focus for me. Because I'm so involved in the service, the time seems to go by quickly. The fasting itself does not pose that much of a challenge for me anymore, unlike when I was a young teen. (As a sidenote, people frequently ask how I am able to sing for so long without water. The body is a remarkable, miraculous thing and the salivary system provides enough hydration to sing for long periods of time.) I can empathize, however, with those who find fasting very difficult and therefore struggle with aspects of Yom Kippur. Whether you are participating in shul during the holiday service or resting at home, the time may not necessarily fly by. Perhaps finding ways to engross yourself in the service will help pass the time away. Whether it is scrutinizing the Hebrew words of a prayer, finding meaning in an English translation or any of the various readings and interpretations in the machzor, or simply singing along, there are a number of different ways to focus your mind on the beauty and spirituality that Yom Kippur has to offer, and take the focus off your immediate physicality.


The unique greeting exchanged on Yom Kippur is *Tzom Kal* which means "have an easy fast." I hope that if you are fasting, that it does go by fast. After all, time flies when you're having fun, and Yom Kippur should be viewed as a meaningful and beautiful holiday of self-reflection and renewal. My best wishes to you for a happy and healthy 5782.

FROM RABBI DANIEL S. HORWITZ



For me, it was participating a few weeks ago in the ceremony and celebration of dedicating a new Sefer Torah in honor of my late grandparents.

To participate in the festivities, Jonah (my eldest) and I picked up my brother Adam and his eldest Benjamin from their home in Ann Arbor, and together we made the drive down to Cincinnati, where my Uncle and Aunt (who took the lead on the project) live. First of all - I have no idea how parents (like mine) did road trips with kids before built-in DVD players were a thing. And second of all, it was incredibly special to get some quality brother/cousin time after a Covid year that had us overwhelmingly apart.

So - we get to Cincinnati, get to spend a bit of quality time with our extended family, and then it's show time: a literal parade as the new Torah scroll was danced (with a couple of other scrolls that had been updated - smudges are a no-no when it comes to Torahs being deemed kosher!), under a chuppah, on a 2-mile route, on main public streets that had been blocked off for the occasion (with a significant police presence). And, I should note, most of the folks who were there celebrating with us happened to be Orthodox meaning there were black hats, kippot, tzittzit and the like proudly on display. Add to it a live piano player making Jewish music on a trailer through a massive mobile amplification system while being pulled by a pickup truck at the front of the group, and there could be no doubt that this was a Jewish celebration.

I found myself at times wondering what non-participants might be thinking – particularly if we had cut off their quickest route home. Would it be just another reason for them to hate the Jews? I found myself grateful for the police presence, while also realizing that there are Jews of color for whom police may not serve as a symbol of protection and care as they do for me. I found myself shvitzing, as it was literally 94 degrees out. And I found myself crying, as after almost a year and a half of comparative isolation due to Covid, coupled with a notable spike in anti-Semitic hate crimes globally, I had the chance to be in a large and diverse group of Jews, proudly celebrating our heritage and Torah in public, dancing and singing, and to share the experience with Jonah and family... knowing that my late grandparents surely were crying tears of joy, exhaustion, anxiety and love along with me.

FROM RABBI BLAIR NOSANWISCH DIRECTOR OF SPIRITUAL CARE LEARNING SOMETHING NEW

The first time I ever said/read/prayed the Amidah (the 18 blessings at the center of Jewish daily prayer) was Yom Kippur 2013, at the age of 28. I had spent much of my early life feeling like I didn't really know what it meant to

be a Jew. When I was 23 I lived on a Jewish farm at a Jewish retreat center in Connecticut and the experience was so transformative, I decided for the first time that I wanted to take ownership of my Jewish identity. It still took five years from that decision to arrive at a moment when I was able to form the question, "How do I do this? How do I say the Amidah?" Thankfully I had a friend whom I trusted with my question. At the time, I'd come to so love being a Jew, but felt ashamed that I didn't know "how to Jew." I spent that Yom Kippur sounding out each letter of the Amidah (which I later learned was longer on Yom Kippur than any other time of year!). It was a painstaking experience, but also one of the more powerful and meaningful things I'd ever done.

I don't take for granted that everyone has the same desires for their Jewish lives. For me, learning how to Jew, by which I mean learning to feel like the owner and author of my own Jewishness, was about growing my knowledge of Jewish history (particularly American Jewish histories), increasing my Hebrew literacy, beginning to live the cycles and rhythms of the Jewish calendar, and taking on certain day-to-day practices like Kashrut and Shabbat. But from the beginning of my journey, I remained committed to both Judaism and modernity.

In the coming months, I'll be offering a series of classes called "How to Jew." This series isn't meant so much as a beginner's course in Judaism, but rather as a space for those who choose to join me to work out your own questions about your Jewish lives as full, complex human beings. We will cover a range of topics that speak to core Jewish practices, asking what values they offer, how they push us and nurture us into a greater sense of being. I look forward to learning and growing with you in this new year!

FROM MICHAEL WOLF
DIRECTOR OF SPIRITUALITY AND OUTREACH

It has been told that whenever Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel gave an evening lecture, he would begin by telling the audience, "Ladies and gentlemen, a great miracle just happened!" People would stop to listen very carefully, wondering: what miracle happened?

Why didn't we see it? Then Heschel would continue, "a great miracle just happened: the sun went down!" Some people would laugh. Some would shake their heads at this crazy rabbi. Others remained puzzled about what he meant - then Heschel would begin to talk about how a religious person sees the world.

Miracles happen all the time, Heschel taught, amazing things, magnificent things are happening all around us. But most of us don't notice. We have learned how to ignore them.

We normally think that miracles are events that break the laws of nature - seas split, plagues that fall from the sky, or sticks that turn into snakes. Heschel understood that the most remarkable things are not these rare and unusual events, but the normal, regular, everyday things that we never notice. How can normal things be miracles? It's all in how we look at them.

Heschel says the religious person notices the miracles - the religious person stops and wonders at the beauty of a sunset, the power of a thunderstorm, and the kindness of a stranger. The opposite of being religious, according to Heschel, isn't a person who doesn't believe in God, but a person who doesn't notice all the amazing things around us. The opposite of being religious is being bored. Moments we have when we feel God close to us - they can happen all the time according to Heschel - the problem is that we're distracted - we're too busy...

Prayer is a way to learn how to stop and notice the miracles around us. Prayer is a way to have a moment with God. Prayer isn't about asking for things - it's a way to learn mindfulness - how to pay attention to the miracles that are all around us.

The purpose of prayer isn't to change God. The purpose of prayer is to change us. The purpose of prayer is to make us aware of the miracles around us and the moments of God's closeness waiting for us each day.

Legacy Heritage BetterTogether

The focus of Better Together™: An Intergenerational Program is to sensitize students to the challenges of growing older and incorporate Jewish learning and values in their interactions with the older members of their community. The Better Together™ program, now an integral part of our sixth and seventh grade curriculum, includes the opportunity to teach students and our community members Jewish traditions and ethics that they can actualize in their daily lives.

Students and community members have the choice of attending in person or via Zoom, which means you can join us from Florida too! Activities will include art projects, music, text study, and documenting our shared memories. At the end of the year, we look forward to a celebration of all that we've accomplished.

The program will take place at Adat Shalom and via Zoom at 10 a.m. on October 10, October 24, November 14, December 5, January 9, January 30, February 13, March 13, and April 24. If you are looking forward to sharing your lives, experiences and wisdom with our younger teens while engaging in meaningful interactions and learning opportunities, then this program is for you! Back to School. Our first day of school this year falls right between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, and we could not be more excited about this return during the days of teshuva. We understand this word as repentance, but teshuva literally means turning or returning. As we reflect during the days from Rosh Hashanah through Yom Kippur, an opportunity presents itself to return to ourselves: to what we hope to become. For me, returning to school during this time is monumental, and I look forward to welcoming each of you and your children into our caring community of learners.

We are keeping up with rapidly evolving CDC and Michigan guidelines, and adapting as needed. Most of our students cannot yet be vaccinated against COVID-19, and as we return to the building we are following these guidelines to keep everyone as safe and healthy as possible. Our protocols include universal mask use for all staff and students, as well as any visitors to the school wing of the building. In addition, we will continue to offer a Zoom-In option for those who are quarantined, not feeling well, or uncomfortable attending in person.

Youth Engagement

Helping your children feel a connection to other kids and the Adat Shalom community is one of my goals. With a team of dynamic youth engagement leaders, we strive to plan fun social, cultural, and community service experiences that kids would enjoy attending. I'll start: My dog Juneau has taught me patience and joy. She is a high spirited but loving dog and makes my house feel full!











Housing the Homeless | June 20-27

Although it looked different this year, we were able to participate in the Lighthouse - South Oakland Housing the Homeless Program. 


