FROM THE PRESIDENT, JOAN CHERNOFF EPSTEIN

There is a nip in the air, the children are back to school, the Cider Mill is open, and Adat Shalom was able to hold High Holiday services in our Sanctuary once again this September. In the past, we regularly expected these events to happen at about the same time, and took comfort in the rhythms of our lives in this way. A

new year and a new beginning always bring a sense of hope and promise for the year ahead. I never thought meeting "once again" would ever be a consideration. Coming together for worship was as expected as the sun rising in the morning. That is why the High Holidays this year held so much meaning- especially the Days of Awe (*Yamim Noraim*).

It was such an emotional time for me, now more so than ever, to be in the Synagogue, together with the clergy and the congregation, practicing our faith. It was a solemn time, but also a joyful one. Coming together again felt strange, unique and special. It really meant something to see the emotions on people's faces. I felt such joy being able to connect with people again with hello's, smiles, elbow bumps, "air" hugs, and Zoom connections from near and far. I feel blessed to be a part of this special community with all the members of Adat Shalom.

Over the last 18 months, we have been able to maintain a connection to our Adat Shalom community by continuing our familiar traditions, even if the format was revised a bit. For example, each year a member of the Executive Board welcomes new members by delivering a plant and Machzor in person. My personal experience of delivering these packages to five families was so rewarding. I was lucky to find three of the recipients at home and it lit up my day to connect with these new members, to have a conversation and personally welcome them into the Adat Shalom family. It's these connections, new and old, that bind us together in community.

Another example of Adat Shalom's embrace was shared by my daughter-in-law and new mother, Abby. Here are her own words of the gratitude she felt for the support she and my son Jonathan received from the Synagogue:

FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS *THE BLESSING OF LIGHT*

There are numerous blessings that are based on mitzvot, the commandments found in the Torah. The formula for these b'rachot contains the phrase *asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu* which, meaning "You have sanctified us with Your mitzvot and commanded us." Some of the

more well-known blessings of this sort include the ritual washing of hands before a meal, affixing a mezuzah to a doorpost, and donning a tallit. Many of these biblically mandated blessings also have to do with the holidays, such as hearing the shofar on Rosh Hashanah, sitting in the sukkah for a meal on Sukkot, eating matzah and maror on Passover, and reading the Megillah on Purim.

What's confusing, however, is that we also add this phrase for the weekly lighting of the Shabbat candles and the chanukiah on Chanukah. So what's the issue? While the Torah commands that we observe Shabbat, it contains no commandment to actually light the Shabbat candles. As for Chanukah, it is not even mentioned in the Torah because the holiday is of post-biblical origin, taking place in the 2nd century BCE. To the rabbis of the Talmud, Shabbat represented the essence of Judaism, and Chanukah represented a victory that saved Judaism from extinction. *Licht bentschen* (the Yiddish phrase for saying the candle lighting blessing) for both Shabbat and Chanukah was therefore deemed worthy of containing the special words of sanctification.

We light the menorah for the first night of Chanukah on Sunday, November 28. May the lighting of the chanukiah bring holiness to you and every essence of your life during the Festival of Lights. *Chag Urim Sameach!*

FROM RABBI DANIEL S. HORWITZ

My favorite Jewish holiday is coming up! Can you guess which it is? Chanukah is lovely, but it isn't my favorite. My favorite Jewish holiday just happens to be Thanksgiving! "But, Rabbi Dan, isn't Thanksgiving a secular American holiday?" Well, frankly, no!

Americans commonly trace the Thanksgiving holiday to a 1621 celebration at the Plymouth Plantation, where the Plymouth settlers held a harvest feast after a successful growing season.

Fun fact: some scholars have suggested that since the original Thanksgiving was a fall harvest festival where gratitude to God was expressed, and since the Pilgrims were particularly religious, that the original Thanksgiving festival was inspired by the holiday of Sukkot.

In the years before the nation was formally founded (and in the years after), it was common practice for leaders to designate certain days as days of "thanksgiving."

For example, on October 3, 1789, George Washington signed a proclamation stating:

"Now therefore do I recommend and assign Thursday the 26th day of November next to be devoted by the People of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being... That we may then all unite in rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks...."

In 1863, Abraham Lincoln designated Thanksgiving as a recurring Federal holiday to be celebrated on the last Thursday in November, and he described it as:

"[A] national day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens."

So, while today we might think of Thanksgiving as a secular national holiday, its roots without question are religious, and are based on expressing gratitude to God.

And that, my friends, makes it about as Jewish a holiday as you'll find! (Check out our collection of 150 Psalms if you don't believe me!)

In our tradition, pretty much every day is meant to be a day of Thanksgiving. But wow is it special to gather with loved ones, count our blessings with intention, take in a parade, watch the Lions lose, eat dinner at 4pm for some strange reason, and express gratitude. It's about as Jewish a holiday as there could be.

And thus, I wish you and yours a festive, joyous, and gratitude-filled Thanksgiving! Chag sameach!

FROM RABBI BLAIR NOSANWISCH
DIRECTOR OF SPIRITUAL CARE

Jewish time is conceptually best understood not as a circle or a line, but rather as a spiral. What this means practically speaking is that we arrive at every “bookmark” in the year, every recurring experience (such as a holiday, a birthday, a season), as a person who has been impacted and changed by all the life that happened over the last year. Anyone who has spent a year in mourning knows this in intimate and bittersweet terms. New parents, on the other side of life’s bookends, know it too – as each milestone is marked and remarked upon.

I was struck while reading Rabbi Steven Leder’s book “The Beauty of What Remains,” by his description of a year of mourning. He shares how:

“anyone who thinks the shortest distance between two points is a straight line doesn’t understand grief... The sages of the talmud set up an elaborate set of rules for mourners, carefully defining the dos and don’ts for the entire first year. They knew that the first birthday, the first year’s worth of holidays, the first wedding anniversary, the first year of nothing but firsts, needed to be structured in a way that helped protect the mourner, at least a little, from having to face too much too soon”

Our society has had a collective experience of loss over these past many months. As Jews, we went through an entire cycle of firsts – where we had our first tiny pesach seders, our first virtual High Holidays, and for some of us, our first funerals with no visitors and no shiva, first baby naming ceremonies with only virtual guests. As individuals we celebrated birthdays with no guests, book clubs online, and dinners without friends. By now we have moved beyond the year of firsts, but unlike a year of mourning, there has been no marker, no sign, and no ceremony to tell us that something has changed. Instead we are beginning to ask ourselves what will never be the same. What has become a first of many? and what firsts will have been “onlys?”

So many parts of our calendar celebrate the resilience of the Jewish people. Chanukah, which comes at the darkest time of year, is no exception. On the one hand, Chanukah is a story of resistance to the forces of assimilation and of rededication to the rituals and practices of the ancient Temple. On the other hand, we tell of God’s miraculous saving power through the chanukah lights. We draw out and highlight different stories based on what we need to hear, based on where we need to draw strength. As we head into another pandemic winter, may we look to the miracle of Chanukah to illuminate what blessings we have found in our lives, to brighten our days, and to pause and take time to appreciate that we have made it to this day.



FROM MICHAEL WOLF

Similar to asking for forgiveness throughout the year – not just on Yom Kippur – we can express gratitude throughout the year – not just on Thanksgiving!

In Judaism we can show appreciation through reciting brachot (blessings).

We learn in the Talmud – Menachot 43b:

It was taught, Rabbi Meir used to say, ‘A person must make **one hundred** (*me’ah*) blessings each day, as it stated (Deuteronomy 10:12), “And now Israel, what (*mah*) does the Lord, your God, ask of you.”

Come to minyan (in the comfort of our Shiffman Chapel or the comfort of your home on Zoom). We’ll help you get close to 100 blessings (there are 19 blessings recited in the Amidah prayer alone). On weekdays and Sunday mornings after minyan, we provide a breakfast followed by *Birkat HaMazon* (grace after meals – another 4 blessings!)

We can also show appreciation in how we treat other people.

Please contact me or the office if you would like to express your gratitude by generously sponsoring a morning minyan breakfast to celebrate a special occasion or to honor a loved one.

We can show appreciation in how we take care of our bodies.

Jewish tradition prescribes a blessing to be recited upon going to the restroom. Known as *Asher Yatzar* (“who formed”), it is a blessing of thanksgiving for the workings of the human body.

“Blessed is God who has formed the human body in wisdom and created many orifices and cavities. It is obvious and known before You that if one of them were to be opened or closed incorrectly, it would be impossible to survive and stand before You at all. Blessed is God, who heals all flesh and does wonders.”

Please remember to set your clocks back on November 7th. Enjoy the extra hour of sleep! Evening minyan changes to 5 p.m. on November 7th as well.





A new session for pre-b'nai mitzvah families begins this month. I am looking forward to teaching Text Messages: Making the Torah Ours, a Shabbat morning workshop for families. Using "Text Messages: A Torah Commentary for Teens" as our springboard, we will learn how to listen to our ancestors' voices as we enter a conversation with them. Parents and b'nai mitzvah students will explore different elements of our weekly Torah portion, practice some of the skills we need to make sure our voices and ideas are heard, and then join the congregation to hear the rabbi's sermon and participate in the end of the shabbat morning service together. All texts will be provided in English and Hebrew. This workshop serves as the introduction to individual d'var torah workshop sessions that families will have with Dr. Melissa Ser in the months leading up to b'nai mitzvah. First session is on November 6; a spring session on April 30 will also take place this year.

I love the fact that Chanukah begins during Thanksgiving weekend this year. Thanksgiving was really a harvest festival, modeled on the Sukkot celebration commanded in the Torah (or the Bible, for the pilgrims). So Thanksgiving is Sukkot and, truthfully, so is Chanukah. As the wonderful folks at My Jewish Learning remind us, the first Chanukah celebration was actually a delayed Sukkot observance!

The second book of Maccabees quotes from a letter sent circa 125 BCE from the Hasmoneans (the Maccabees' descendants) to the leaders of Egyptian Jewry, describing the holiday as "the festival of Sukkot celebrated in the month of Kislev rather than Tishrei." Since the Jews were still in caves fighting as guerrillas on Tishrei, 164 BCE, they had been unable to honor the eight-day holiday of Sukkot, which required visiting the Jerusalem Temple; hence it was postponed until after the recapture of Jerusalem and the rededication of the Temple. Many scholars believe it is this connection to Sukkot – and not the Talmudic account of the cruse of oil that lasted eight days – that explains why Chanukah is eight days long.

Our Learning Community (a.k.a Hebrew school) has a caring, dedicated, energetic, and knowledgeable cohort of teens who choose to continue being part of the Adat Shalom community on a weekly basis after their B'nai Mitzvah. Beginning in the eighth grade, teens may volunteer or work within the school as Madrich or Madricha, a teacher or office assistant. While gaining valuable life and work skills, teens participate in weekly trainings to learn how to best assist the teachers and their students. Our Madrichim are positive Jewish role models who work with students on assignments, lead activity stations or games, and much more. Part of building community in our classrooms is showing younger students that Jewish learning and engagement continues after becoming a Bar or Bat Mitzvah – and having teens in the classroom makes this message come alive. In addition to being part of our Madrichim program, many of these teens volunteer with the Teen Volunteer Corps, enrolled in Nosh n' Drash, plan to attend our future teen trips and/or are enrolled in Hebrew Class with EMU. Being in the Madrichim program lays the meaningful foundation for lasting connections to our Adat Shalom community.




Yad Ezra Yom Kippur Drive




