FROM THE PRESIDENT, JOYCE BERLIN WEINGARTEN

As the High Holy Days approach, I have been thinking about gratitude. We generally think of the month of Elul as a time of introspection and forgiveness. These practices are not easy but I have found that gratitude makes these difficult tasks easier.

I recently read an article about saying “Modeh Ani” upon waking up every morning. Here is the transliteration and the English version of the prayer:

Modeh ani l'fanecha, melech chai v'kayam, shehechezarta bi nishmati, b'chemla raba emunatecha

I thank You, living and enduring Sovereign, for You have graciously returned my soul within me. Great is Your faithfulness.

During the early days of COVID-19 I began saying Modeh Ani before getting out of bed in the morning. During those dark and difficult days it helped to be grateful for the good in my life. The English translation begins, “I thank you,” but the Hebrew syntax is literally, “Thank you, I...” In Jewish tradition the first words you say in the morning are “Thank You.” Thanking God for restoring your soul may put difficulties into perspective. Pausing to say a blessing before eating a meal to give thanks brings a new appreciation for eating and cultivates gratitude and joy.

Acts of loving kindness, “gemilut hasadim,” not only bring gratitude and joy to the recipient but to the giver as well. Visiting someone who is ill, bringing them a healing meal, or simply holding their hand makes the person feel loved. Doing acts of loving kindness can make you feel grateful for being able to help someone in need. Donating to food banks helps so many people who are struggling and inspires gratitude in those who receive the food and those who provide it. This Yom Kippur we will have our annual food collection for Yad Ezra. Please bring what you are able to give.

Teaching children to give back instills lifelong gratitude and joy in their lives. Encourage them to put coins in a tzedakah box, make dog toys for shelters, or help care for a friend or family member in need. I used to bring my children Emily and Elliot with me to our annual Housing the Homeless week at Adat Shalom where they would help cook and visit our guests. I showed them the classrooms where our guests slept and talked to them about gratitude for their own home. During these High Holy Days I encourage you to tell your family and friends that you are grateful for their presence in your life. In doing so they may realize that they are grateful for you as well.

We can all be grateful for our beautiful synagogue—our spiritual home. In this issue of the Voice you will see an abundance of offerings that you can attend. Come join your Adat Shalom family. Our devoted clergy, educational staff, and our loyal employees are always ready to assist you during lifecycle events and anytime you need them. Please reach out: we want to help.

As you prepare for this High Holy Day season I hope you will find meaning and joy in practicing gratitude. I am grateful for all of you: our dedicated and caring Adat Shalom community!

FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN

Rabbi Abraham Isaac Kook (1865-1935) said, “When people feel in great spiritual ruin, they should know that the opportunity has arrived to create a new building, one that is more lofty and elevated, more stable and magnificent than what had been there previously. They must fortify themselves and gather strength to

improve their ways and deeds with proper order, a courageous heart, pure desire, and a heart filled with strength and inner joy.”

Rabbi Kook was born in The Russian Empire and was recognized as a great scholar and intellect from a very young age. He moved to the land of Israel in 1904 and became the chief rabbi of Jerusalem and then chief rabbi of what would become the State of Israel. He was famous for his love of all members of the Jewish community, not just those who held his views. He saw the potential for greatness and joy in each individual, even if they felt broken and lost. He saw this potential in the entire Jewish people, who had endured two thousand years of exile, heartbreak, and degradation. His encouragement reminded people that they could recreate themselves even when they were experiencing difficult times and situations. He believed the new State of Israel would return the Jewish people not just to the land, but to their original state of splendor, and would be a radiant light to the nations. He did not live to see the State established, but I think he would be amazed at the rebirth of the Jewish people spiritually and intellectually, not just in Israel but around the world.


He would take great pride that our community was strong and vital, that so many Jews were learning about our tradition, but also helping all people around the world. He would, at the same time, be very concerned that we do not lose our way morally, that we do not forget that power, and power over others comes with great responsibility and a mandate to do justice and have compassion for all people. He would hold all leaders responsible for making sure that rights are respected, that all voices can be heard, and that the most vulnerable are protected. In short, true democracy must prevail, not mob rule.

During the High Holidays we should remind ourselves of Rabbi Kook's faith in our capacity to create even better versions of ourselves, even if we have experienced loss and suffering. We should never give up on ourselves, but remember who we are, a people who endures difficulties and tragedies, but never gives up on life or joy. The creation of the State of Israel, the symbol of our resilience and strength, after millennia of wandering and after the Holocaust is miraculous. We must never take it for granted.

We must also remember to make sure that we have an obligation to work for justice, to speak truth to power and fight for the rights of others, both in America and Israel. Our triumphs cannot come at the expense of others. We cannot build ourselves up by tearing down others.

We are at a vulnerable time in the world. So many of us feel broken, angry and afraid. The High Holidays and Judaism in general remind us of our true selves, people who can find beauty where so many others see ugliness, and who always try to do the right thing even when it is not appreciated.

May we all have a year of sweetness, health, purpose, and joy.

FROM RABBI DANIEL S. HORWITZ
An Apple a Day...

One of my favorite parts about living in Metro Detroit is that we have four seasons (even if winter lasts for 7 months of the year...). I have always loved fall in Michigan. The leaves changing colors, football (but more importantly tailgating) season in full swing, a crisp breeze in the air, embracing sweatshirts and jeans, savoring pumpkin spiced things, and knowing that the Jewish holidays are on their way, with all the special opportunities for gathering with loved ones (and food!) that accompany them.

In what has become a bit of an annual tradition, I look forward very much to going apple picking as a family. Pretty much since my eldest was 2 years old, we've gone apple picking each year in the lead-up to Rosh Hashanah. It's a chance to be together, to connect with nature and the growing process, to teach about the environment and joy of trees, and of course, to try to find the perfect apples to dip into honey on the holiday.

Since we began this family tradition, there was just one year when we did not go apple picking: the fall of 2020, not even a year into Covid, when we were living in Miami, Florida. Early that September, I asked a couple of my teammates at work: "So, where do people go apple picking around here?" I was met initially with blank stares, and then with laughter. "We don't grow apples in Florida, Rabbi Dan. Berries, citrus fruits, mangoes and avocados, we've got you covered. We've never been apple picking in our lives."

For the first time, I felt like I understood what it must be like for Christian children living in the southern hemisphere, having to hear songs all about a "white Christmas" they've never been exposed to or experienced, given that December 25th is smack dab in the middle of their summer.

It's an important reminder that just because we associate certain things with Jewish holidays, that doesn't mean that all Jews around the world associate the same things with the holidays that we do! It's amazing to me that we celebrate the same holidays, even when what we associate with them is often fundamentally different depending on where in the world we live. At the very least, it makes for amazing Jewish cross-cultural exchanges!

That said, I'm grateful to be back in Michigan, so that our family can continue embracing our apple picking tradition. For this Jewish Michigan, there really is nothing quite like the tartness of a fresh apple dipped in honey to mark Rosh Hashanah. So, whether your preference is Gala, Honeycrisp, Granny Smith or Red Delicious, here's wishing you and yours a happy, healthy, sweet, apple-filled new year!

FROM RABBI BLAIR NOSANWISCH

Coming Home

The theme of our High Holidays this year is “coming home.” We wanted to not only invite everyone who is ready to come back to our building, but also to come back in relationship to yourself, to one another, to community, and to the world.


The High Holidays are an epic time in our calendar, when we collectively meditate on themes such as creation, sovereignty, and forgiveness throughout our liturgy. But the essence of the holidays is not the services, it is in the opening of our hearts to the turning of the year, allowing ourselves to feel our place in the flow of Jewish time.

Judaism envisions time as a spiral, not a circle or a straight line. When we revisit the same moment in the calendar, we find ourselves and our environment changed. This perspective can be found in other traditions as well, such as the widely quoted, “No man ever steps in the same river twice, for it's not the same river and he's not the same man” (attributed to Heraclitus, 5th century BCE Greek philosopher). The river is never the same, and we are never the same.

This year there will be no exception. The synagogue clergy, staff, and leadership have lovingly crafted a suite of High Holiday experiences that will allow you to connect with this holiday season in a variety of ways. True, the offerings may be different, but you will be different too!

When I think about coming home in a Jewish sense, I think about a mezuzah. The word mezuzah comes from the root zuz (זוז), which means “to move.” When you affix a mezuzah to your doorpost, you say the blessing *likboa mezuzah* (לקבוע מזוזה) which means “to make fixed.” The High Holidays themselves are fixed in our calendar, but we move ceaselessly around them. Our homes are rooted to the earth, while we grow and change within them. Our tradition is rooted in the past, but it is also alive and changing because we are a part of it.

We are so excited to see you. Welcome home.

בטחון *Bitachon* – Faith, Safety, and Security


בריאות *Briut* – Health

September and October seem distant as I sit here in Jerusalem, Israel writing this article. I have immense gratitude for the opportunity I've been given to study at the Pardes Institute for Jewish Studies in the first cohort of the Senior Educators Learning Fellowship. As a backdrop to this incredible learning is the fact that Israel is observing the shmita year, during which the land is meant to rest so that it can come back renewed in the next growing season. So too this program is like a sabbatical, or a shabbaton, which is meant to provide the nourishment that one needs in order to come back renewed and rejuvenated.

My coursework ranges from the discussion of texts that we wish were not present in our Tanakh to the Talmud's exploration of "minhag hamakom," or local customs. In my professional seminar, we are going behind the scenes at historical sites throughout the city, learning from the education teams that make the programming excel. I am excited to share this learning when we begin our new post-shmita year together in the fall!

What's THE STORY

Let's explore our synagogue. Discover the history behind some of the wonderful artwork, Judaica, and building features of our synagogue that surround us, teach us, intrigue us, and always welcome us at Adat Shalom.

THE MEMORIAL SCROLL

The Memorial Scroll placed in the Sanctuary of Adat Shalom Synagogue is a Torah irreparably damaged during the Holocaust and rescued from Czechoslovakia by the Westminster Synagogue in London. It was written and prepared in 1890 and is from the town of Kyjov in Czechoslovakia.

The Torah mantle by artisan Elsa Wachs is designed to show that the soul of the Jew and the Torah cannot be parted. The charred and burned Tallit encircles this Torah mantle making the Torah and man seared into one being.

Sculptor Morris Brose, in explaining the sculpture support writes, "My principal aim was to create a spiritually expressive structure to house and to conserve the Holy Torah which survived the Holocaust. The sculpture would convey a sense of solemnity, of commemoration. Some of its forms are derived from traditional Hebrew ideas and symbols: other forms originate from our contemporary context."
