

FROM THE PRESIDENT, JOYCE BERLIN WEINGARTEN

As the days become shorter this time of the year and the weather becomes colder, we have two holidays on the calendar to brighten our lives.

One of my favorite Jewish holidays is Chanukah: the festival of lights that commemorates Judah and the Maccabees' unlikely victory over the

powerful Greek army. This inspiring story of the rededication of the Temple and the miraculous single cruse of uncontaminated oil that burned for eight days in the menorah found in the Temple has warmed our hearts and souls since childhood.

I treasure so many aspects and memories of Chanukah. I love the story, potato latkes, applesauce, and dreidels of which I have a very large collection. I also love giving gifts on Chanukah; I loved surprising our children when they were young and still enjoy sending them gifts as adults. Mostly I love the chanukiah and the lights.

Jewish people of all denominations around the world will light a Chanukah menorah. Why do you think this is so? Taking out the chanukiah and getting it ready for the holiday invokes memories from childhood. It is fun to light, adding a candle each night while the lights grow brighter each time. Adding the next candle to the chanukiah each night in the proper order is a divine ritual in itself. The light from the chanukiah during some of the darkest and coldest days of the year is infusing and uplifting. Watching the candles burn is meditative and soothing. Note: be sure to make sure your preschool-age child's chanukiah is properly shellacked.

Although not a Jewish holiday, Thanksgiving is a time to gather with family and friends to enjoy a festive meal. Thanksgiving is a time not only to give thanks for what we have but also a time to give. While focusing on gratitude is important, making a concerted effort to offer our time, money, talent, or resources is equally if not more important especially around the holidays.

According to Proverbs, a mitzvah is a candle, and the Torah is light. We can be a light to others and ourselves by performing mitzvot. Perhaps there is someone you know that is not able to have a Thanksgiving dinner or latkes on Chanukah and you can be their light by helping them. Offering kindness through food, gifts, or company is a light that makes the world brighter.

Our congregation is a gift of light for you. We are always here for your simchas, sorrows, or if you simply need brightness in your life. You are a gift of light to our congregation by being part of our community. I enjoyed seeing all of you during the High Holy Days. Your presence, energy, and smiling faces continue to bring light and warmth into our synagogue. FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN

I love Thanksgiving. I love the Food. I remember as a child the carving the kishka, and the matzah balls with marshmallows. The usual. Okay, not really, but we always have traditional foods and they are great.

I love the football games. Most of them. Some

years more than others.

The best part of Thanksgiving of course is time with friends and family. Most families go around the table and talk about what they are thankful for. It is important to remember how much people do for us, and how many good things there are in our lives, even when things are challenging.

This is also the time people think about how much others were not thankful for them and what they did. They did something for others, but do not feel properly appreciated. There can be lingering resentments.

There might be a number of reasons you were not thanked:

- 1. They did not know what you did for them.
- What you did was not really as great as what you thought you did, or that they really did not want you to do, or that they really would have been happier if you did not do that thing.
- 3. They did thank you, but you did not think it was sufficient, or you were not really paying attention.
- They appreciated it, but did not know how to express it properly. A lot of our loved ones mean well, but it does not always come out right.

Jewish tradition has an interesting approach that I am beginning to understand. There is a phrase in our ethical literature that says, "The reward of a *mitzvah* (a kind and compassionate act) is an opportunity to do another *mitzvah*."

When you do an act of kindness for someone else, your reward is another opportunity to do another act of kindness. No promise of material prosperity or spiritual salvation in this world or the next. No promise of thanks. Just another opportunity to help others.

This does not make a great advertising slogan. Live Jewishly, work hard for others, and you will get a chance to do more work.

I believe this approach contains a key to happiness. The reward of doing this act of kindness is recognizing that it is a worthy thing to do, that we are living our lives in a meaningful way, and that what we do matters.

There will always be these opportunities. We never have to wonder what to do with our lives. Every moment is an opportunity to help, no matter what it is we do.

We can cherish the gratitude. I am not that modest. I do enjoy recognition as much as anyone else. The difference with this approach is that we no longer need the recognition.

I would add that if our efforts are constantly being ignored or diminished, it is okay to find others to share the good things in your life.

This Thanksgiving ask if what we are doing for others is what they really need.

If it is, be thankful you can help. That is the best reward we can ever have.

My Bar Mitzyah

In recognition of my thirteen years at Adat Shalom and the November 6 celebration of both Rabbi Bergman's and my B'nai Mitzvah, I thought I would share a quick trip down memory lane to my own Bar Mitzvah.

My family attended Traditional Congregation, a small shul in St. Louis, Missouri. When I've explained to people in Metro Detroit what it was like, those who are familiar with synagogue approaches say, "Oh, like B'nai David." The shul had what is affectionately known as a "trichitza," with one section for men, one for women, and one larger section for mixed seating. The rabbi was Orthodox in his practice and the shul was not egalitarian – only men led the prayers and chanted Torah. I went to synagogue regularly as a kid, so I was very familiar with the service. When it came time to study for my Bar Mitzvah, I had two tutors – one taught me how to chant Torah and Haftarah and the other taught me how to lead Musaf. The latter came very easily to me because I had already absorbed the melodies that would surround me on Shabbat morning.

My Bar Mitzvah was December 9, 1989, and the parasha was Vayeitzei (which coincides with December 3 this year). I vaguely remember my d'var Torah being about Jacob's ladder. I find this to be a beautiful coincidence, because Jacob's ladder is the image chosen for our ark doors by Rabbi Jacob Segal, the founding rabbi of Adat Shalom. In addition to my davening of Musaf that morning, I also read four Torah aliyot, the maftir, and the Haftarah. After hearing my chanting, the rabbi said, "I think you'll be doing a lot of this in your future." I just assumed he meant the immediate future, because I continued to lead services and read Torah for years to follow. Little did anyone know, except for the clairvoyant rabbi perhaps, how my life would unfold!

A bit of irony is that Traditional Congregation has never had a cantor. They are led in prayer by a cadre of capable and knowledgeable congregants. Moreover, Traditional was a singing congregation. My idea of uplifting Jewish prayer, even at a young age, was the power and beauty that is created from people singing and praying together. To this day, many of the melodies that I continue to use come from my childhood.

I look forward to celebrating with you this month at our special B'nai Mitzvah event. Thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve as your cantor these past thirteen years. Save the date for when we celebrate my next thirteen years sometime in 2035!





FROM RABBI DANIEL S. HORWITZ

It may seem crazy to be reading this in November, but this issue of The Voice also covers December and Chanukah, so I'm excited to share with you 8 Chanukah Fun Facts you may not have known!

- Chanukah commemorates a military victory (around 164 BCE) after two Jewish groups (one of which was the Maccabees) rose up against assimilated Jews and the oppressive Greek government.
- 2. "Chanukah" means "dedication." Our ancestors re-dedicated the ancient Temple after recapturing it from the Greeks.
- 3. The story of *Chanukah* does not appear in our Bible! The story about oil burning for 8 days shows up for the first time in the written record hundreds of years later in the Babylonian Talmud (written down around the year 550 CE)!
 - a. Remember to ask me why, if this is the case, when saying the blessings over the candles, we say that God commanded us to light them!
 - Also the rabbis of the Talmud did NOT like the Maccabees. Maybe that's why they focus on the miracle of light rather than the miracle of the military victory...
- 4. In the Books of the Maccabees (non-Biblical books written down at the time of the revolt and shortly after), the reason given as to why the celebration lasted 8 days was that the Jews were belatedly celebrating the festival of *Sukkot*!
- 5. We do not use a "menorah" on Chanukah! Menorah = ancient hardware used in the Temple. Seven spots for flames. Chanukiah = hardware used to celebrate Chanukah. Nine spots for flames (corresponding to the 8 days of the holiday + an extra for the shamash the helper flame).
- 6. Because the story involves oil, we cook with oil to celebrate! Deep fried deliciousness awaits! Whether it's donuts, latkes, deep fried Oreos or Zucchini, your imagination is the limit!
- 7. Dreidel is based on a German version of an English/Irish game popular at Christmastime. The letters on the dreidel (*nun*, *gimmel*, *hey*, *shin*) are based on German letters: N=Nichts= nothing; G=Ganz=all; H=Halb=half; and S=Stell ein=put in.
- 8. Chocolate gelt is an invention of the past 100 years! Originally, actual coins were given on the holiday. American chocolatiers of the 20th century picked up on the gift/coin concept by creating chocolate *gelt*. In the 1920s, Loft's, an American candy company, produced the first chocolate gelt, wrapped in gold foil in mesh pouches resembling money bags. Chocolate 'geld' is also given to children as part of the St. Nicholas holiday in Belgium, Germany and the Netherlands (*geld*, spelled with a "d," being both the Dutch and German word for money).

So, we have a holiday that commemorates a military victory that we now say is actually about light but that really was probably about celebrating Sukkot belatedly, and that is supposedly about fighting assimilating into Hellenistic culture but contemporarily embraces spinning tops and chocolate coins from surrounding non-Jewish cultures as core symbols of the holiday, and that encourages us to consume foods that we know to be delicious for our souls but terrible for our bodies and skin. In short, it's complicated, which is the essence of Judaism! Complicated isn't bad. Complicated is good. And when deep fried or in chocolate coin form, it's delicious!

Wishing you and yours a *chag urim sameach* – a joyous festival of lights! -RD



FROM RABBI BLAIR NOSANWISCH Growing Our Prayers

This past Yom Kippur, I shared in my sermon about my personal journey to connect with Jewish prayer. I explained that nine years ago on Yom Kippur, I said, for the first time, the Amidah (the private prayer that is at the center of our three daily services). That experience was

powerful and challenging, not just because Hebrew was foreign to me, but also because of the shame I felt for all the things I didn't know. At the end of my sermon, I explained that what ultimately had allowed me to begin my journey was allowing myself to simply "start with alef."

I was later asked by someone who had enjoyed the sermon, "What is alef?"

I was stunned by the question. My attempt to communicate something simple and basic, that we should begin with the first letter of the Hebrew alphabet, the letter alef, was not basic enough. When I speak or teach, I always try to be aware of the person in the room who has no idea what is going on. As a student, I am often willing to ask whatever questions I have because I have been shown, time and again, that I'm never the only one who doesn't understand. I identify with the slowest learner in the room and I care about bringing them along. When you think like a teacher, you have to know what you want people to learn, but also what foundational information they need in order to understand. This person's simple yet powerful question reminded me that there is always a step further back to go in our understanding, especially when we talk about Jewish knowledge.

At the end of my sermon, I shared the following intention for the year to come: "To not let my fear or shame for what I don't know guide me, and to share the guideposts that have helped me along the way in case they will be of service to you." I share my intention with you here not only because I want to put it in writing, but also because I hope to hear from you about what you'd like to explore that will help you along the way on your Jewish journey.

In the coming year, I'm excited to be taking on the role of Tefillah educator for our 5th-7th graders in the Adat Shalom-Beth Achim Learning Community. I'm also thrilled that as a clergy team we are offering a number of classes and spiritual practices that are meant to help you connect more deeply with our tradition in a variety of ways. As examples, Hazzan Gross will be teaching a class about the siddur, Rabbi Dan is offering an Intro to Judaism series, Rabbi Bergman leads Meditation and Mindfulness, I will be teaching a class on theology ("God Talk"), and we offer Soulful Yoga in parallel to our main sanctuary service on a frequent basis.

We will continue to work to meet your needs for meaningful, connected, spiritual Judaism. Please let us know how we can best support you on your educational and spiritual journey.








God Talk
