MESSAGES



FROM THE PRESIDENT, JOYCE BERLIN WEINGARTEN

Purim is coming! A joyous holiday, Purim commemorates the miraculous salvation of the Jewish people in ancient Persia when evil was plotted against them. There are many mitzvot and traditions associated with Purim: The Fast of Esther, hearing the Megillah, giving tzedakah, mishloach manot (sending gifts of food to

friends), feasting on a delicious meal, special prayers, eating hamantashen, and masquerade!

Several years ago I facilitated a Rosh Chodesh group for teenage girls with Jodi Gross, our Director of Adult Learning and Youth Engagement at Adat Shalom. We met monthly with a curriculum centered around the holiday of the month, current events, girl talk, and a creative project or exercise related to the theme. My favorite project was on Purim when we created masks made by placing paper mache strips on the girls faces, letting them dry, and carefully removing them. Yes it was a mess but a fun one. It was also an exercise in trust as each girl partnered with another to put the paper mache on their faces. When the masks were dry, the girls painted the outside of the masks to depict who they were on the outside, and painted the inside of the masks with who they were on the inside. It was an extraordinary project, especially when the girls discussed the inspiration for their designs.

Disguise is a central theme in the Purim story, which has led to the traditional dressing up in costumes and masks on this festive holiday. God is not mentioned in the Megillah but is instead hidden throughout as miracles that are natural events of the Purim story. Most notably, Queen Esther hides her Jewish identity in order to carry out a plan to save the Jewish people. Esther masks her outer identity as a Jewish woman for the greater good of her people. Sacrificing her freedom of religion publicly speaks to her selfless inner nature, making her the heroine of the Megillah.

Now that we are coming out of COVID and have been removing our masks it is a good time to ask yourself some questions. Who were you before you began wearing a COVID mask? Who were you when you were wearing a mask? Who are you now when you take off your mask?

Many frontline workers, including medical professionals, first responders, teachers, and even grocery store workers, had to make sacrifices by wearing masks, shields, gloves, and gowns in order to protect themselves and others and keep the world running. I think you could wonder what those people felt when they were finally able to take off their masks and reveal their true selves. Although the dark and difficult days of the pandemic seem to be behind us we can all face this new normal with a fresh perspective and consider who we are now.

FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN



There are lots of Jewish foods. Some are Indescribably delicious. Challah. Matzah ball soup. Chummus. Some are indescribable. I'm looking at you gribenes. If you don't know, don't ask

Some are holiday specific like matzah. One of the best is hamantaschen. Hamantaschen really symbolize the courage to deal with what scares us, and the comfort of knowing we are stronger than we think.

The name hamantash is commonly viewed as a reference to Haman, the villain of Purim, as described in the Book of Esther. The pastries are supposed to symbolize the defeated enemy of the Jewish people.

The name is derived from two German words: mohn (poppy seed) and taschen (pockets). Mohntaschen, or "poppy seed pockets," were a popular German pastry dating from medieval times. Around the late 1500s, German Jews dubbed them Hamantaschen, or "Haman's pockets." The play on words likely references the rumor that the evil Haman's pockets were filled with bribe money. Plus, mohn sounds like Haman.

In Hebrew, *tash* means "weaken", and the hamantash may celebrate the weakening of Haman and the hope that God will weaken all of the enemies of the Jews.

In Israel, hamantaschen are called *oznei Haman*, Hebrew for "Haman's ears" in reference to their defeated enemy's ears.

Originally, oznei haman referred to a different type of pastry altogether: fried dough drenched in honey or sugar syrup that was popular throughout the Sephardic world.

Gil Marks explains that the first known recorded example of hamantaschen shows up in a 1550 play called *Tzachut Bedichuta de-Kiddushin*, An Eloquent Marriage Farce, a commedia dell'artestyle piece written in Hebrew by the Italian playwright and producer Judah Leone Ben Isaac Sommo. The play includes a debate about the logic of eating a food that symbolizes an evil enemy's ears; a second character responds that Jews are practically commanded to eat them because the name of the pastries sounds like "*manna*"—which fell from the heavens to sustain the Israelites as they wandered in the desert following the Exodus from Egypt.

The reason for the three-sided shape is uncertain. There is an old legend that Haman wore a three-cornered hat. Archaeologist documentarian Simcha Jacobovici has shown the resemblance of hamantaschen to dice from the ancient Babylonian Royal Game of Ur, thus suggesting that the pastries are meant to symbolize the pyramidal shape of the dice cast by Haman in determining the day of destruction for the Jews. A simpler explanation is that the shape derives from traditional Jewish baking techniques in Central Europe for folding dough so as to form a pouch around a filling, also common for making dumplings.

Others note that the popular poppy seed filling was a nod to Esther's vegetarian diet in Achashverosh's palace—she is said to have lived on seeds, nuts, and legumes, in order to keep kosher under the radar. And regardless of what's inside, the filling is partially covered by dough—just as God's role was veiled in the Purim story.

FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS The Whole Megillah

Have you ever wondered where the expression "the whole megillah" comes from? The idiom came into English from Yiddish (no big surprise!), an anglicization of the expression *di gantze megilleh*, meaning "the whole long story" (the word *megilleh*, of course, having been borrowed

from the Hebrew). *Megillah* literally means scroll, saga, or long tale, but it more specifically refers to any of the five books of *Ketuvim* (the biblical canon of "Writings"): *Shir HaShirim* (Song of Songs), *Ruth*, *Eicha* (Lamentations), *Kohelet* (Ecclesiastes), and *Esther*. In common usage, however, when someone refers to "the Megillah," they generally mean Megillat Esther.

Megillat Esther is chanted twice on Purim: once toward the end of Maariv (the evening service), and again after the conclusion of the Torah service in Shacharit (the morning service). One of the unique Purim mitzvot is not only to hear the megillah, but also to *read* the megillah. The *ba'al k'riah*, the person who chants the megillah, acts as an agent for the congregation's obligation to read. Purim is the only holiday where we are commanded to hear each and every word of the story, thus the origin of the expression "the whole megillah."

Like reading Torah, Megillat Esther is read from an actual parchment scroll. Also like the Torah, there are no vowels or trope inscribed so reading requires ample preparation. Unlike the Torah, the scroll is generally kept in a wooden or metal container and the parchment is not attached to wooden dowels. The scroll itself may be decorated and illustrated, similar to many of the Haggadot that are used on Pesach. The ba'al k'riah may either hold the scroll or keep it down on a table and is not required to use a yad (the special pointer used when reading Torah). Megillat Esther is ten chapters long, the longest chapter containing thirty-two verses and the shortest only three.

This year's Conservative Community Purim observance will take place at Adat Shalom on Monday, March 6. Services will start at 6:45 p.m. with the Megillah reading at approximately 7:15 p.m. (Don't forget our Purim carnival, beginning at 5:30 p.m.!) Morning services on March 7 will be held at B'nai Israel starting at 7:00 a.m., with the Megillah reading at approximately 7:40 a.m. If you would like to see what an actual Megillat Esther scroll looks like, please feel free to ask me at shul on Purim and I'll be more than happy to show you "the whole megillah." Chag Purim Sameach!

A lot of folks love coming to shul on the High Holidays. For many, it's the only time they attend prayer services annually. A time to see and be seen, to gather with community, and to mark another revolution around the sun. I love the High Holidays (and not just because at my

house there are chocolate chips in the seasonally-round challahs!). But, I have a secret to tell you: if I was only coming to shul once a year, it wouldn't be on Rosh Hashanah or Yom Kippur. It'd be on Purim!

Purim is like Halloween meets the circus meets Mardi Gras meets Brazilian Carnival. There are costumes, delicious foods (hamantaschen, kreplach, etc.), amazing storytelling, a true sense of revelry and Jewish joy, games to play, noisemakers, and the chance to "boo" during services as if you were rooting against a rival team at a sporting event. Compared with afflicting our souls on Yom Kippur, I'll take Purim any day, thankyouverymuch!

Thankfully, our tradition is one that recognizes that we can't let ourselves live in a state of doom and gloom all the time. Yes, we have sacred days marking sad times in our history. And, importantly, we have others that are all about cultivating our sense of joy (like Purim!).

Judaism, like Star Wars Jedi philosophy, values balance. Whether it's the notion that "to everything there is a season" as found in Ecclesiastes (3:1-8), or the often told practice of Reb Simcha Bunam who strove for a balanced ego by keeping two pieces of paper in his pocket at all times, with one saying "I am but dust and ashes" and the other saying "The world was created for me," Jewish practice and ritual are meant to bring us holistically to a place of comparative balance.

For plenty of valid reasons, things have seemed dark of late. Rising antisemitism, extreme weather events, inflation, war in Ukraine, respiratory viruses and more, have many of us justifiably concerned. It's easy to feel overwhelmed with all the negative in the daily news cycle and by the challenges we face. But in those moments, it's important for us to find excuses to celebrate life. To dance. To jump with joy. To raise our spirits. To eat a fertility cookie (what'd you think hamantashen were anyway?). To get ourselves back into balance. And thankfully, that's what Purim is for.

So, grab your costume. Mix your favorite cocktail or mocktail. Get ready to root for the home team. Come to shul and experience Jewish joy at its finest, and find personal balance in the process. Here's wishing us all a *freyleche* (joyful) Purim.

Passover is actually the first holiday of the Jewish holiday cycle, and the first mentioned in the Torah. Purim is the last holiday of the year, and the last biblical holiday. We start holidays with matzah, and end them with hamantaschen. Passover is about our total reliance on God.

Purim is the holiday where we recognize our God given ability to stand up for ourselves and others. The hamantashen remind us of the sweetness that comes with confronting our fears and helping each other do so, too.



FROM RABBI BLAIR NOSANWISCH

"I found a fruitful world, because my ancestors planted it for me. Likewise I am planting for my children."

Talmud, Taanit 23A

There is an ancient story of a man named Honi the Circle Maker, who once saw a person planting a carob tree. Honi asked, "How long will

it take until this carob tree bears fruit?" The person answered, "Seventy years." Honi responded, "Do you think you will live seventy more years? Does it make sense for you to work at a task that cannot possibly benefit you in any way?" The person responded to his skepticism with an incredible lesson, "I found a fruitful world, because my ancestors planted it for me. Likewise I am planting for my children."

On February 5 we hosted a Tu B'Shvat celebration at Adat Shalom which asked the question, "What have our ancestors done for us, and what will we do for our descendents?" Just as the ancient Honi needed to be reminded that small actions in our own lifetimes have important implications for future generations, we at Adat Shalom are beginning a conversation about what intention we'd like to bring to our actions for the sake of our future.

In America today, we often struggle to imagine our collective future. As inheritors of circumstances beyond our control, we are often left to ask where we might place blame for the enormous challenges we face. The truth is, there are no simple solutions to the problems we face, not in the realm of fighting for a robust, safe, recognizable Jewish future, and not in the realm of tackling the warming of our planet. All of our most complex struggles are urgent and important, but it can feel completely overwhelming to try to "tackle" them.

I want to take this moment before Purim and Pesach, to acknowledge the amazing process of renewal we undergo every spring. We clean our homes, cook elaborate meals, and gather to retell the story of how we became a people. In repeating the same narrative year after year, we remind ourselves of the fundamental truths that define our lives. We are a people who have triumphed over degradation and subjugation. We are humans who are both ingenious, brave, and powerful, and also subject to events and processes which are beyond our control. However, our Jewish wisdom teaches that we have control over ourselves and our own actions; by making intentional choices in our own lives, we can heal, correct, and transform the future.

What began on Tu B'Shvat as a collective moment of storytelling about who we are and what we value will grow in March and April into a series of meaningful conversations under the title Shomrei Adamah, meaning "Guardians of the Earth." Together with our partners from Hazon we invite the Adat Shalom Community to dive deeper into the Jewish relationship to earth, and to think collectively about how we want to act in the future. I sincerely hope that anyone for whom this journey resonates will join us.



"Selling" Your Chametz

The Torah prohibits Jews from owning chametz during Pesach. For those who wish to adhere to this tradition, Adat Shalom will be happy to arrange for the contractual (virtual) sale of your chametz to a non-Jew for the duration of the holiday. According to this contract, your ownership of your chametz will end at 9 a.m. on 14 Nisan (April 5) and will be restored at 9:10 p.m. on 22 Nisan (April 13).

You may arrange to sell your chametz beginning Monday, March 20, through 9 a.m. on the morning of Wednesday, April 5.

To do so, complete the form on our website: adatshalom.org/chametz or email Rabbi Nosanwisch at bnosanwisch@adatshalom.org with your name and address to be added to the contract. Please call Rabbi Nosanwisch with any questions.

It is customary, but not necessary, to make a contribution to the synagogue for requesting that we act as the agent for the sale of your chametz. If you wish to do so, we suggest a \$20 donation to Adat Shalom's Minyan Breakfast Fund.

Bedikat Chametz The Search for Leaven

Bedikat Chametz (The Search for Leaven) will be held this year after nightfall on Tuesday, April 11, 2023. By tradition, bread crumbs are placed conspicuously in rooms where food is ordinarily eaten or brought.

Using a candle for illumination, a "search" is made to find the remnants of *chametz*, which are then collected using a feather as a whisk.

Baruch atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech ha'olam, asher kidshanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu al biur chametz.

We praise You, O God, Sovereign of the Universe, Who hallows our lives with commandments, Who has commanded us to burn chametz.

Post-Pesach Activities

Restoring your home to "chametz" is a simple matter, consisting mainly of putting away Pesach utensils and bringing back the chametz items to their regular places. Pesach is concluded by havdalah said over wine. (The blessings over the candle and the spices are reserved for the conclusion of Shabbat).

Some families have a custom of eating a heavily *chametz* meal, such as pizza, or at least eating some foods that they sorely missed during Passover. For others, the transition back to *chametz* is a slow one, taking place during the omer period, a transition that goes from the Pesach meals of matzah and meat to the Shavuot meals of dairy foods and leavened bread.

Chametz may be eaten again after 9:10 p.m. on Thursday, April 13, 2023.

Preparing for Passover

COSMETICS AND TOILETRIES

All varieties of body soaps, shampoos and stick deodorants are permitted for use on Pesach, regardless of ingredients. All types of ointments, creams, nail polish, hand lotions, eyeshadow, eyeliner, mascara, blush, foot and face powders, ink and paint may be used, regardless of their ingredients. Colognes, perfumes, hair spray, shaving lotions, and deodorants that have restorable, denatured alcohol should not be used. This applies only to products in a pure liquid state. Lipstick that contains *chametz* should not be used.

KITCHEN SINK

A metal sink can be kashered by thoroughly cleaning it, then leaving it unused for 24 hours, and then pouring boiling water into it. A porcelain sink should be cleaned and a sink rack used. If, however, dishes are to be soaked in a porcelain sink, a dish basin must be used.

KASHERING OF UTENSILS

The process of kashering utensils depends on how the utensils are used. According to halakah, leaven can be purged from a utensil by the same process in which it was absorbed in the utensil (*ke-voleo kakh poleto*). Therefore, utensils used in cooking are kashered by boiling, those used in broiling are kashered by fire and heat, and those used only for cold food are kashered by rinsing.

EARTHENWARE

Earthenware may not be kashered. However, fine translucent chinaware and earthenware which has not been used for more than a year may be used if scoured and cleaned in hot water.

METAL UTENSILS USED IN FIRE

Metal (wholly made of metal) utensils used in fire (spit, broiler) must first be thoroughly scrubbed and cleansed and then made hot until it glows. Those used for cooking or eating (silverware, pots) must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned and not used for 24 hours, then they are completely immersed in boiling water. Metal baking utensils cannot be kashered.

GLASSWARE

There are two different ways of kashering glassware. Glass cookware includes cookware made of modern materials that are non-porous, such as Pyrex®. If you don't have a dishwasher, you may soak the items in water for three days, changing the water every 24 hours. The other way requires only that they be put through a clean dishwasher with no other items.

TABLES, CLOSETS, AND COUNTERS

If used with chametz, they should be thoroughly cleaned and covered, and then they may be used. Note that the covering material should be made of material that is not easily torn.

CHAMETZ AND NON-PASSOVER UTENSILS

Non-Passover dishes, pots, and *chametz* whose ownership has been transferred to a non-Jew should be separated, locked up or covered, and marked in order to prevent accidental use.

TABLES, CLOSETS, AND COUNTERS

If used with chametz, they should be thoroughly cleaned and covered, and then they may be used. Note that the covering material should be made of material that is not easily torn.

Since the Torah prohibits the eating of *chametz* during Pesach, and since many common foods contain some admixture of *chametz*, guidance is necessary when shopping and preparing for Pesach.

During the eight days of Pesach, *chametz* cannot lose its identity in an admixture. Therefore the most minute amount of *chametz* renders the whole admixture *chametz*, and its use on Pesach is prohibited. However, during the rest of the year, *chametz* follows the normal rules of admixture, i.e. it loses its identity in an admixture of one part *chametz* and sixty parts of non-*chametz* (batel beshishim). This affords us the opportunity to differentiate between foods purchased before and during Pesach.

What follows are some general guidelines. However, our rabbis should be consulted when any doubt arises. *Kosher l'Pesach* items that do not bear the name of a rabbi or one of the recognized symbols of rabbinic supervision, or which are not integral to the package, should not be used without consulting our rabbis.

Prohibited foods include the following: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereal, coffee with cereal derivatives, wheat, barley, oats, spelt, rye, and all liquids containing ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol.

Permitted foods that require no kosher I'Pesach label if purchased prior to Pesach include: unopened packages or containers of natural coffee without cereal additives (be aware that coffees produced by General Foods are not kosher for Passover unless marked KP); sugar, pure tea (not herbal tea); salt (not iodized); pepper; natural spices; frozen fruit juices (with no additives); frozen (uncooked) vegetables; milk; butter; cottage cheese; cream cheese; ripened cheeses such as cheddar (hard), muenster (semi-soft) and Camembert (soft); frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives); baking soda.

Permitted foods that require no kosher l'Pesach label if purchased before or during Pesach include: fresh fruits and vegetables, eggs, fresh fish, and fresh meat.

Permitted foods that require a kosher l'Pesach label if purchased prior to Pesach include all baked products (matzah, cakes, matzah flour, farfel, matzah meal, and any products containing matzah); canned or bottled fruit juices; canned tuna; wine; vinegar; liquor; oils; dried fruits; candy; chocolate-flavored milk; ice cream; yogurt, and soda.

Detergents - If permitted during the year, powdered and liquid detergents do not require a kosher l'pesach label.

Medicine required for health-sustaining therapy may be used on Pesach. If not for health-sustaining therapy, consult one of our rabbis. In all cases, capsules are preferred to pills, with or without chametz binders. Before discontinuing any medication, consult a rabbi and your physician.

You shall count from the eve of the second day of Pesach, when an omer of grain is to be brought as an offering, seven complete weeks. The day after the seventh week of your counting will make fifty days, and you shall present a new meal offering to God (Leviticus 23:15-16)."

Counting is great! We count the seven days of creation, the seven days of the week, and the eight nights of Chanukah. We also count how many days until a birthday or school break. Marking time provides the opportunity to set intention to the days leading up to a big occasion. I often use countdowns to manage time for my toddler. Creating a physical countdown is a useful tool for managing expectations in big and small kids. It can be something easy like a paper chain, sticky notes on a wall or a hand drawn calendar. Countdowns are a great family ritual. So how perfect is it that there's a built in countdown (or count up) between Pesach and Shavuot.

This year, let's focus on the excitement that numbers and counting provide. We are planning a special Shabbat morning experience on Saturday, April 8 to explore the meaning of numbers and counting in a great hands-on way. Come explore with us!

Spreading Kindness: Volunteer Day in review

Adat Shalom's 9th Annual Volunteer Day was a HUGE SUCCESS thanks to the volunteer day planning committee, project leaders, and volunteers (adults, teens, and kids). Together we spread kindness in more ways than we could have ever imagined.

Volunteer Day 2023 by number:

150 bags of dry ingredients to make soup were assembled and distributed by Metro Food Rescue. Metro Food Rescue donated the soup ingredients and food for other projects; 74 decorated notebooks and 64 activity bags will cheer up patients at Henry Ford Hospital West Bloomfield; 5 boxes of baby products, feminine hygiene and large toiletries were donated to CARES of Farmington Hills; over 130 decorated lunch bags filled with good food were made along with **165 bags of toiletries** for Hope Hospitality and Warming Center; 3 Baby Baskets and 2 Baby Bags were made for Adat Shalom members with a new baby or grandbaby in partnership with Chesed Committee; 78 SnackPax were decorated and filled with treats and 6 balls of plastic yarn (plarn) were donated to Song and Spirit Institute of Peace. The balls will be crocheted into sleeping mats for people who are experiencing homelessness; 139 colorful fleece scarves will keep clients of Project Healthy Community warmer this winter; 101 bookmarks and 3 boxes of books were donated to Pepper Elementary School in partnership with National Council of Jewish Women: 15 colorful no sew fleece blankets were made for Fleece and Thank You in partnership with Repair the World Detroit; 239 fleece cat and dog toys and fleece snuffle mats were donated to Michigan Animal Rescue League. The toys and mats were made with fleece donations from National Council of Jewish Women's "Wrapped in Love" project: 30 colorful tissue flowers and decorated flower pots for residents living at Fairmont Senior Living in Farmington Hills.

It takes a community to plan, implement and do all of the projects during Volunteer Day!




