FROM THE PRESIDENT, JOYCE BERLIN WEINGARTEN

Shalom! I hope you are all having a safe and peaceful summer! I have been thinking about the word "shalom." When it was taught to me many years ago in religious school, we learned that shalom means hello, goodbye, and peace. I remember thinking how could one word have three different meanings and especially how

could it mean hello and goodbye?

The word shalom is used in many different contexts in Judaism: prayers, Torah, Talmud, Mishnah, and in general conversation. Our prayers and liturgy are filled with requests for peace. At the end of the Kaddish Shalem it says, "May the one who creates peace on high bring peace to us and to all Israel (and to all who dwell on earth)." And we say: Amen. Rabbi Nachman of Breslav said of this verse, "What is Shalom?...This is the joining of two total opposites, for although fire puts out water, and the Holy Blessed is He brought peace by joining them together (LM 1:80)." This made me think about what this all means.

The root of the word shalom means wholeness or completeness. The power of our words can bring joy and peace between people if we overcome obstacles in the form of differences or other emotions that may be in the way. When we greet someone with the word shalom, we express our joy in seeing them and the desire to have wholeness and peace in our encounter. It is also what we want upon leaving. Performers are often taught to leave the audience wanting more. If our interactions have been engaging and peaceful, we can enhance our relationships and feel good about saying shalom again.

Our prayer book is called Siddur Lev Shalem. The Hebrew word "lev" means heart and also means mind or intellect. Our siddur is filled with prayers for peace that fill our hearts and stimulate our minds. Shalom is a blessing and a value. Practicing mindfulness of speech in our interactions by using a wise heart can bring peace of mind to ourselves and others. Pausing to think before reacting to differences of opinions will help enable the power of words to find peaceful solutions.

Our magnificent synagogue Adat Shalom means Congregation of Peace. We are a community of people with various beliefs, approaches to life, and politics. When we come together to pray, learn, study, volunteer, and enjoy Shabbat we remember that we have way more in common than we have differences. Hazzan Gross ushers us out of Shabbat services each week singing a beautiful song about shalom for all. We break bread together at Shabbat Kiddush, dinners, and morning minyan breakfasts because at Adat Shalom you can be who you want to be feeling whole and complete. We put the shalom in Adat Shalom. Come to our synagogue and see for yourself.

Dear friends, may you have peace on your journeys as you come and go and may there be peace in your homes and in the world.

Jeffrey and I wish you a happy, healthy, safe, and peaceful summer.



FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN

I am not sure what to do about Tisha B'av, the day that commemorates the destructions of the two Holy Temples in Jerusalem, the exile from Israel, and many other tragedies that our people have experienced during our history. Traditionally, we fast for twenty-five hours, beginning in the evening of the Ninth of Av and

continuing until the following evening, making it the only other complete day and night fast except for Yom Kippur.

For a large part of our history, we blamed ourselves for the catastrophes that happened to us. There was an attempt to reconcile sin and tragedy in order to feel that there was divine justice in the world. We sinned and were appropriately punished. We said the first Holy Temple was destroyed because of our lack of loyalty to Jewish Law, and that the second one was destroyed because we did not act with enough mercy and kindness toward others. Jerusalem was destroyed and we went into exile.

My uncertainty about the proper way of observing Tisha B'av is based on two events that occurred in the 20th century: the Holocaust and the creation of a Jewish state in our ancestral home. The centuries of self-blame no longer feel fair. What sin that we committed could be fairly punished by the Holocaust? What divine justice would be possible to justify such destruction?

We are no longer in exile and Jerusalem is no longer in ruins, but has been rebuilt to a level of splendor undreamed of by our biblical ancestors.

Can Tisha B'av still be relevant and should we still fast the entire time? I believe the day is as important as it ever has been, but it is worth thinking about how long the fast should be. It is important to remember how much our people have suffered just because they lived Jewish lives, and that their willingness to embrace their Jewishness even in the worst of times is a reason that we are here today. Israel is a wonderful country, but we have seen all too often during these last few years, that it is also a deeply polarized society, one that can split apart and collapse if it loses its way as a state committed to both Jewishness and to democracy for all of the people under its control.

I personally fast from the evening until the middle of the afternoon. Others will have different and well thought out approaches, which I respect. We are living in one of the most extraordinary times in Jewish history, a time that our ancestors would never have imagined. We survived a tragedy of unprecedented scale, but also built a state in our ancestral land, all within a short amount of time. Tisha B'av reminds us of how much work still needs to be done. We need to remind ourselves of how far we have come.





FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS WHY TEN?

One of the most important services provided by Adat Shalom is the twice daily minyan service (a serendipitous play on words!). Every day of the year, no matter if it's a secular holiday or if there's inclement weather, Adat Shalom offers prayer services both in the morning and in the

evening.

The word *minyan* is a Hebrew word that is translated as "quorum." It comes from the root *manah* (מנה), meaning to count or to number. Ten Jewish people of at least Bar/Bat Mitzvah age are what constitute a minyan.

There are many explanations as to why ten is the magic minyan number. In the story of Sodom and Gomorrah, God tells Abraham that he will spare the cities from destruction if there are ten righteous people there. Philo Judaeus, a Hellenistic Jewish philosopher who lived two thousand years ago, said that ten is a perfect number. Ten is also significant because of the Aseret Hadibrot, the Ten Commandments, an indisputably powerful and symbolic connection. Lastly, the Talmud explains that the ten spies who went out to scout the land of Canaan are referred to as an eidah (עודה), which means congregation (the same word as Adat in our synagogue's name!). Ten is considered a microcosm of a community and, therefore, a minyan.

There are specific prayers that require a minyan: Barchu — the call to prayer; Kedushah — the Amidah prayers about God's holiness; $Chazarat\ HaShatz$ — the public recitation of the Amidah; the Torah and Haftarah service; and last, but definitely not least, Mourner's Kaddish. Of these, Kaddish is what is most often associated with a minyan, as it is crucial that a critical number of people be gathered in order to provide comfort and community when one is saying Kaddish for a loved one.

What happens if we don't have ten people for minyan? It is acceptable to count the Torah as part of the minyan if nine people have assembled. It is also permissible to count someone under B'nai Mitzvah age as long as they hold a Chumash (the book containing the Torah and Haftarah readings). Lastly, thanks to modern technology and Zoom, people who participate virtually are now counted in the minyan as well.

There is something very special about coming together for prayer. While praying by oneself can be very meditative and therapeutic, one cannot replicate the support and camaraderie that is created with others. Whether it is harmonious (or cacophonous) singing together or the comforting schmoozing before and after services, our sages were astute in their implementation of the necessity for a minyan and the power of being together.

Post-pandemic, our minyan continues to grow and flourish, but there are still some days when we could always be bolstered by more people in the room. If going to minyan is something that interests you, but you are daunted because you feel uncomfortable or unfamiliar, please don't hesitate to reach out to me, one of the rabbis or Michael Wolf and we will be glad to help. We have undoubtedly the warmest, most caring, and peaceful minyan in the community — how could we not with the name Adat Shalom, congregation of peace!



FROM RABBI BLAIR NOSANWISCH

Almost all my favorite memories of being a kid are of the summertime. Summers were a time for spending as much time as possible outdoors, eating ice cream, and just generally "hanging out."

In truth, the heat of summer can go two ways. In one direction, it's stifling and overwhelming. In the other, it's loose and free. On Tisha B'Av we feel the heat of the summer in the fiery memories of destruction in the past. We mourn and weep and try to stay indoors. Because we are fasting, we don't expend extra energy throughout the day; instead, we spend our day trying to make it through to nightfall. But only six days later, dressed in white for Tu B'Av, we dance out into the fields under a full moon. We get to feel free and open, the heat of summer seems to melt our boundaries, helping us to frolic (or simply feel joyful) out in the open.

All year long on Shabbat mornings we've been gathering our younger Adat Shalomniks for MiniMinyan. It's been a structured space where we sing prayers and get to know each other. We always have a Torahrelated activity and separate space for our older kids to learn and pray together. This summer, in honor of the heat and the sense of fun and freedom it brings, we're heading outside for **Camp MiniMinyan**. We'll leave much of our structure behind and spend our Shabbat mornings doing camp activities based on that week's parsha. For Matot-Masei, we'll do a nature walk around the woods of Adat Shalom, just like the scouts did when they entered the land. We'll imitate Moses the dramatist as we open the book of Devarim with "theater day," putting on a skit together. All summer long we'll meet on the playground, drink cold brew coffee (adults only!), eat popsicles, and enjoy the warm weather!

If you're a kid and you're reading this (kol hakavod!), I can't wait to see you at Camp MiniMinyan this summer. If you're a grown-up reading this, please make sure you take time to be outside this summer (with sunscreen and a hat, of course), whether you bring your kids or grandkids to Camp MiniMinyan, or you pop out to the playground during kiddush to take a few deep breaths and enjoy the laughter.

Before we know it, we'll be watching the leaves change and preparing for the High Holy Days. Let's savor the summer for all the light, heat, and joy it has to offer, and head into the High Holy Day season having made beautiful summer memories.







FROM RABBI DANIFI S. HORWITZ

The Hebrew word most appropriate for this moment is *lehitraot*. Commonly mistranslated as "goodbye," the word actually means "until we see each other again." This isn't goodbye. The Horwitz family will be back to visit Adat Shalom regularly.

What does our tradition have to say about taking leave from another?

There are two particular Talmudic teachings that I love that speak to this question.

First, we read in Tractate Brachot (31a):

"A person should neither take leave of another from an atmosphere of conversation, nor from an atmosphere of laughter, nor from an atmosphere of frivolity, nor from an atmosphere of purposeless matters. Rather, one should take leave of another from involvement in a matter of *halakha*."

The rabbis of the Talmud always wanted us to have words of Torah on our lips, and here, they're teaching that when exiting, you should ideally leave folks with words of Torah. Why? Because they believed that when someone thought about the person who had departed, that they would remember that person fondly due to having learned Torah from them.

I hope that during our years together, the Torah that we've studied together has resonated and impacted you all the way it has me, such that we'll forever be able to remember each other and our time shared together fondly.

Second, we read in Tractate Brachot (64a):

Rabbi Avin HaLevi said: One who takes leave from another should not say "Lech b'shalom" – "Go in peace" – but rather, that person should say "Lech l'shalom" – "Go to peace."

Rabbi HaLevi derives this teaching from two Biblical verses. In Exodus, Yitro says to Moses "Go to peace," and Moses is then successful in his mission. In the second book of Samuel, David says to his son Absalom "Go in peace," and Absalom meets an untimely end. So, clearly the former is a better formulation than the latter provided you legitimately are wishing the person you're departing from well.

It has been such a privilege having the chance to serve as one of your rabbis. Thank you for the honor. Thank you for embracing my family and me. And thank you for all the Torah you've taught me.

L'hitraot v'lech l'shalom.

Until we see each other again, go to peace.




Did you know that all adults, ages 30 and under, are welcome to a complimentary Adat Shalom membership?

THE LEARNING COMMUNITY

One of the driving questions in our educational program is "who do we want to be?" Not **what** but **who**. Once we figure out **who** we want to be, **what** will follow. At Adat Shalom we find ways to help our students, *madrichim* (teen teacher assistants), and teachers harness their strengths so they can grow socially, emotionally, physically, and Jewishly. We understand that there is no one path for Jewish learning and living, and that our students - like their predecessors - need to find their own way. We hope that their path will keep them engaged Jewishly, living full and rich lives as Jewish adults, and embracing the community that has guided them.

The pandemic put the brakes on the highly successful teen learning program we had in place until March 2020. The students who were in **eighth grade** when we shut down that spring are about to begin their **senior year** in high school. Our goal as we move into the coming year is to meet teens where they are and attempt to draw them into the warmth of the Jewish community - in Metro Detroit and here at Adat Shalom.

Teens (grades 8-12) are invited to join us for an incredible **Shabbat Retreat at Camp Tamarack** November 3-5, 2023. Generously subsidized by an anonymous donor family and the Legacy Heritage Foundation's Better to Serve program, this retreat will have a minimal cost to families. More information will be available by August, and we can't wait to hang out with you around the campfire.

We are also excited to restart our Monday **Nosh & Drash** program in October. Exciting topics change from month to month, and each series is taught by our educators and clergy team. Find a topic (or several) that pique your interest. Register for the year or for a three-week session - your choice! Dinner is included, of course, as the "nosh" part! Returning students will be pleased to see that we still have Oreos for dessert.






