FROM THE PRESIDENT, JOYCE BERLIN WEINGARTEN

The High Holy Days are a festive time and a time of deep personal introspection. We come to synagogue with many personal prayers in our hearts. The sound of the shofar blown at the end of morning minyan during the month of Elul and on Rosh Hashanah awakens us to these prayers and thoughts. It is helpful to contemplate these

feelings with an open heart.

I have been a student of yoga, mindfulness, and meditation for many years. Some of the many yoga postures include what are called heart opening poses. These poses are physically beneficial in increasing chest and shoulder flexibility, improving circulation, alleviating back pain, and improving posture. They can feel emotionally powerful as well. With these poses comes the sensation of opening the chest and the heart, increasing the ability to feel more love, joy, compassion, and forgiveness to others and ourselves.

During the High Holy Days, it is traditional to apologize to those we may have offended and to forgive those who have offended us. This can be a difficult task that requires an open heart. There is a meditation called Metta, which involves extending loving kindness to yourself, to people you love, and to people who are difficult in your life. Metta involves opening the heart and can be transformative in one's ability to love oneself and others.

Rabbi Dr. Abraham Twerski of blessed memory taught that harboring resentment is like allowing someone you don't like to live inside your head rent-free. He asked why anyone would allow that.

It is much healthier to practice loving kindness, open our hearts, let go, and forgive. There can be capacity in the heart for forgiveness even without formal apologies. Imagine how much better one might feel having forgiven oneself and others. Imagine the impact this may have on relationships with family, friends, and the world as a whole. I recently read this quote by musician Carlos Santana: "The most valuable possession you can own is an open heart. The most powerful weapon you can be is an instrument of peace."

This High Holy Day season we will be in our magnificent sanctuary for our traditional service led by our clergy. Hazzan Gross and the choir will lead the liturgy with beautiful and inspiring prayers that will help open our hearts during these Days of Awe. There will also be family services and other opportunities to study, learn, and meditate, helping to enhance your holiday experience. Be here, be present, be yourself, be openhearted, be with community, and be part of your Adat Shalom family.

May the prayers in your hearts be answered dear friends and may the year 5784 bring sweetness, good health, and peace to all.

FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN

The comedian Jay Mohr said that the key to his marriage is not that he and his wife like the same things, but rather that they hate the same things. Their mutual loathing of other things brings them closer together and creates a deeper bond. At first I thought this was kind of funny, but realized that it contained a darker

truth about many of the problems in our society today.

It may not be a bad thing if the same things that we and our friends and family hate are certain songs or movies, or foods. However, it is very destructive to society if we hate other groups of people for who they are or how they live their lives, in order to create connections within our own group.

This need to hate others just to become closer to the members of our own group comes from two conflicting impulses that all humans seem to have wired within us. We have natural inclinations toward goodness. We also have natural inclinations toward hating people who are different from us.

Nicholas Christakis, a professor at Yale, writes, "We have this capacity to surrender ourselves to the benefits of the whole group. Now, that can also lead us astray. We can so identify with our own group that we demonize other groups...There've been many experiments with small children in this regard. You can take a group of 3-year-olds and randomly assign them T-shirts of different colors. The children know that they didn't do anything to deserve these colors, and yet, once you assign them these colors, they immediately hate the other group. Those blue T-shirted children should be punished. They're awful children. They shouldn't get any toys. It's crazy. You just scratch the surface of human beings, and you get this quality."

The Torah is concerned about the demonizing of others in order to create closer tribal and familial bonds. In Deuteronomy, it says, "When you go to war against your enemies..." The word enemies here seems redundant. Who else do you go to war against? How many times, though, have leaders created enemies out of others who were no real threat in order to create patriotism and unity among their followers? How many times have they tried to make their own people feel superior by dehumanizing others?

There are some truly dangerous people in the world, and they do terrible and destructive things. They need to be stopped, and sometimes war is the only response left. So many wars, though, are fought just because we have been taught to hate who the other person is, not what they do. We see them as different, and alien, and therefore threatening to our way of life. This is rarely ever true, but it serves as an effective deflection from the issues that a group of people may have among themselves. Instead of trying to figure out a solution that benefits everyone, we look to blame others for our problems.

The Torah, by demanding that we only battle against those who are a genuine danger to us, is asking us a fundamental question. Can we love ourselves without hating others? Can we elevate ourselves without diminishing others?

The High Holy Days are the perfect time to think about how we think about others, and to make sure our relationships are based on what we love, and not what we hate.

My family and I wish you a year of joy and sweetness.



FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS High Holiday Harmony

It is hard to believe that this will be my fifteenth High Holiday season at Adat Shalom. Due to COVID, the last three seasons have been missing an integral part of the High Holiday experience our Adat Shalom choirs. At long last, they are returning to the bimah! I have written about the

choirs in the past, but this occasion merits another article about our special congregational singing groups.

Choirs have a very special place in my heart. Prior to my junior year of high school, the only singing I ever did was when I became Bar Mitzvah. Then, in the summer of 1992 at Camp Ramah, I was cast as Javert in our production of "Les Miz." When school resumed that fall, I was sitting in the library when I felt a tap on my shoulder. I turned around and it was Mrs. Smiley, the school choir director. She said, "A little birdy told me that you can sing. Come up to the choir room with me for a minute." Did I have a choice? Mrs. Smiley was a tall, imposing figure and was someone you could not say "no" to. After singing two or three scales for her, she said, "Dan, you need to be in our choir." I joined the choir, then the chamber choir, then the show choir, and, as they say, the rest is history!

Singing with other people, whether it's in a choir setting, at shul, in the car or around the dinner table, can be a moving and transformative experience. Singing together is unifying, gratifying and can feel very cathartic. However, I can't tell you how many people tell me that they don't sing along because they "can't sing" or "can't sing in tune" or "have no voice." None of these reasons matter to me. I would rather hear a cacophony of discordant voices than no voices at all.

We are blessed with some very talented and dedicated singers in our congregation. It's a pleasure to work and sing with them. What I want to say to you — the congregation — and it bears repeating as I've said it before, is that our choir is not meant to be listened to. Huh? Yes, you read that right. Our choir is meant not *only* to be listened to, but to be *sung with*. The most moving experiences that I have ever had while leading services at Adat Shalom are the times when it sounds like everyone in the sanctuary is singing along. This, to me, is true harmony. Not the harmony of different notes coming together to form a pleasing chord, but the harmony of different people coming together to create a beautiful, shared, and moving experience.

This year, the Mixed Choir and Men's Choir are combining into a single choir to participate in our morning High Holy Day services (Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur), as well as Kol Nidre. For Ne'ilah, I will be joined by the Men's Choir as in the days BC (Before COVID).

Please add your voice to our synagogue collective "choir." Sing or hum along, even if you are unsure of the words or the melody. Don't be afraid of annoying those sitting near you in the sanctuary, and if they glare at you, say, "Hazzan Gross told us all to always sing along!" I mean it!

Whether you choose to sing outwardly or inwardly, I want to wish you and your loved ones a most happy, healthy, and harmonious 5784. Shanah Tovah!

FROM RABBI BLAIR NOSANWISCH

This winter, I was meeting with a congregant who was reflecting on the past decade or so of his Jewish life. He shared that at this moment, Adat Shalom was feeling like a particularly nourishing community to be a part of. I asked him what is speaking to him about the synagogue right now,

and almost without hesitation he offered, "if I had to describe what seems to be the overall ethos of the synagogue right now, I'd say it's a place where you are encouraged to simply BE."

I was so moved by this answer, for it seemed to me that something essential was being communicated effectively by our synagogue clergy and staff - that Adat Shalom is a place where you can come as you are and be met anywhere along your Jewish journey. When discussing what message we wanted to share with the congregation for the upcoming high holy day season, this simple invitation to BE felt like it captured our intentions in the broadest sense.

What does it mean "to BE" at Adat Shalom? On Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, our liturgy depicts a God of judgment. For many, religious life and institutions have always played the role of judging and shaming us in order to try to encourage us to be on our best behavior. But judgment and shame are not the sum total of what religion has to offer, and they are not the only aspects and qualities that God has to offer us humans. Here at Adat Shalom, we have been sharing a Torah of teshuvah and rachamim, of second (and third!) chances, care, and compassion. These qualities are essential to a Jewish life, for they welcome us to come as we are and grow as we are able. Instead of shame and guilt, we weave a web of relationships, learning, and growth.

How do we hope you will BE at Adat Shalom? One hope I'm excited to share is that we have hired Elissa Schechter into a new role - Director of Member Engagement. In addition to working as my assistant, Elissa is bringing her talents for connecting and nurturing relationships to both increase connectivity between members and enhance the experience of belonging for new members.

Judaism is best when it is active, not passive. Think of it as a sport you want to participate in rather than watch from the sidelines. BEing can mean just showing up. It could also mean increasing the time you spend in synagogue community or incorporating some Jewish behaviors into your household - such as lighting candles on a Friday night or turning off your work e-mail over Shabbat. It could also mean joining a continuing education class to deepen your Jewish knowledge and increase your spiritual connections. And it could mean getting involved in Adat Shalom's special interest groups like Chesed to help our members, The Green Team to help the earth, Sisterhood or Men's Club to help the community and beyond! We hope that in the year to come, you will feel like you can bring your whole self to Adat Shalom. And when you do, we'll be here to help you find the next deeper step on your Jewish journey.

We hope that you too feel that Adat Shalom is your place to BE.






FROM MICHAEL WOLF EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR


Adat Shalom Synagogue High Holy Day Services


RECIPROCITY

Continuing Our Investment in the Future of Adat Shalom Synagogue

Your contributions to the Adat Shalom Yom Kippur appeal have helped our congregation thrive over the years. We are grateful for your caring about our community and your generous financial support.

One year we purchased new comfortable chairs, another, the Lev Shalem Siddur, and another fixed the roof (no more leaks) above our beautiful sanctuary. Just last year, we set our sights on funding an outdoor structure, a "prayground" with enhanced landscaping, to provide a shaded



space for services and other gatherings, all to be enjoyed for many years to come. After much research we are happy to report we are ready to begin building our new outdoor shelter.

For our 5784 Yom Kippur Appeal, we are committed to updating our restrooms. Some are the original spaces that show their age. Others were updated many years ago and need a facelift. As with any space in the building, the restrooms need to feel like a healthy place that is modern and well maintained.

Built in 1972, our over fifty-year-old structure needs repairs and updates. HAPPENINGS WITH THE ADAT SHALOM GREEN TEAM

"Divrei Torah Mayim Chayim"

Just as Torah nourishes our spirit, so too does water nourish our body.

The Adat Shalom Green Team is proud to announce "ADAT MAYIM", our new water initiative! With many thanks to ADAMAH for our sustainability grant of \$3,000, the Adat Shalom Green Team will be installing a Water Bottle Refilling Station before the High Holy Days. Here are some FAQ's:



1. How was this decided upon? Approximately 15

people who comprise the Adat Shalom Green Team $D'_N \ \mathcal{N}\mathcal{T}\mathcal{X}$ took a walk around the property to see how we can make it more sustainable. We all came up with different projects /initiatives, and then voted on them. It was decided that the Water Bottle Refilling Station would be the most beneficial project as everyone could be a part of it.

2. Why focus on water? Americans buy nearly 15 billion gallons of bottled water per year. According to data collected from the International Bottled Water Association, Americans can't get enough bottled water. 15 billion gallons would translate to 120 billion bottles of water if Americans were only buying single-serving PET bottles. With a recycling rate of around 30%, the containers of more than 10 billion gallons of water are ending up in landfills.

3. Where and when will this be installed? It will be directly outside of the coat room, by the main sanctuary and installed over the next month. It will replace one of the water fountains. It has the capability of not only refilling water bottles, but also functions as a water fountain.

4. **Can I bring my own water bottle to synagogue on Shabbos?** Absolutely! And please, feel free to fill it at our new station!

5. What if I don't have my own water bottle? Don't worry! We are currently creating an "Adat Mayim" reusable water bottle that you can purchase at the synagogue! Water bottle sales will raise funds for another updated water fountain to be installed downstairs for our Adat Shalom Beth Achim Learning Community.

It is our hope that this new Water Bottle Refilling Station will inspire our Congregation to leave a smaller Carbon footprint on our Earth. YAD EZRA YOM KIPPUR FOOD DRIVE Sunday evening, September 24, 2023

We will collect non-perishable food and monetary donations at Kol Nidre services. The Yad Ezra truck will be parked out front of the synagogue to collect your food donations. *Please drop off your bags before entering the synagogue*. Yad Ezra, which gives kosher food to the vulnerable Jewish families, provides an average of 1,200 families with food, health care items, and household goods every month, and approximately 1,100,000 pounds of free groceries to families in need annually.

LIGHTHOUSE-SOUTH OAKLAND SHELTER HOUSING THE HOMELESS, Took place June 25-July 1, 2023

Since COVID, the shelter is no longer rotating into the community but community support remains very important in helping these families. The families are living in an apartment complex in Oakland County. Although we miss having the opportunity to provide a temporary home and to have interactions with the participants, this living arrangement is much more stable for the families. These apartments house over 60 people, more than half under the age of 18.

Thank you to the Schostak family (2 nights of dinners), Nancy and Richard Barr (2 nights of dinners) and Domino"s Corporate Headquarters for Saturday night pizza. In addition, we made a significant monetary contribution to offset additional nights of dinners and lunches. Thank you for your contributions to the Hillel Moses and Rachel Maisel Housing the Homeless Fund. It is through your contributions that we are able to continue to provide this act of kindness.

A past participant of the program shared, "I was on my own after giving birth to my son and had no family support in the the area. Although I was working, I couldn't afford an apartment so I was 'couch surfing' with friends for 4 years."

She was referred to Lighthouse and was placed in their family emergency shelter. With their support she was able to get a voucher that enabled her to rent a place to live. She is working full time now and her son attends school in the neighborhood.

She summarized, "You see this bright house when every house is dark. Sometimes you don't want to go into the light because you don't know what you will find. Going to the Lighthouse shelter was that bright house for me and it was the beginning of my new life."




