

FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN



The last several months have been among the darkest we have experienced as a people in many decades. The devastating loss of life, the displacement of so many, the rise of antisemitism and a lingering fear that we are not as safe as we have been all lead to a sense of darkness closing in. As Jews, though, we

never allow the darkness itself to define us.

In the beginning of the Torah, we see that God creates both darkness and light. The two of them combined, they make a day. A day is not just light. Night is part of the day. Darkness by itself is not bad or destructive.

Why, then, is darkness one of the Ten Plagues that afflict Egypt, and why does it just seem that only the Egyptians were affected? Darkness does not seem to be nearly as destructive as some of the earlier ones. It seems strange that is one of the later plagues, signifying how important and effective it was.

The Japanese philospher Dogen had an interesting perspective about the difference between light and darkness which helped me understand the power of this plague. He said. "The true nature of reality is the merging of these two sides, with darkness representing unity and light representing clarity. Light represents clarity because when it is bright outside we can see that things have different forms, colors, names, and functions. But when it's completely dark, even though things still exist, we cannot distinguish between them, just as we cannot distinguish between beings when we see them from the viewpoint of unity. So light and darkness are two aspects of one reality,"

Plague of Darkness actually affected everyone, both Egyptian and Hebrews. They were all in the dark. The differences is that the Egyptians turned on each other and the Hebrews turned toward each other. That has always been the key to our people's ability to get through the hardest of times.

Who are you in the darkness of your life? Do you turn toward the people you say you love, toward your community? Do you allow them to turn to you? Do you see that there is always light, even when it feels hidden? That ability to find meaning in life, to find light is always in you already. You just have to allow yourself to see it.

May we all have a sweet and joyous Pesach.

FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS One Pastry - Many Meanings

All of our Jewish holidays have specific foods associated with them. The culinary preparation for each holiday is often the catalyst that prepares our minds for the various meanings of that holiday. Purim (which falls on March 23-24 this year) is no exception. The triangular, filled

pastries known as hamentaschen are unique to Purim. They come in all sorts of sizes and flavors and everyone swears that their own recipe is the best. Did you know that the word *hamentasch* itself is jam-packed (pun intended!) with different meanings?

The first part of the word *hamentasch* contains the name of the Purim story's evil antagonist. I've always found it odd that the bad guy would get a tasty treat named after him. Why not Mordechaitasch or Esthertasch? Multiple explanations exist for the origin of the name.

Some common fillings for hamentaschen are jams, chocolate chips, and the most traditional of all and my personal favorite, poppy seed paste. In Europe, the poppy has symbolized fertility for centuries and serves as a powerful culinary symbol of Megillat Esther's message of the existence and resiliency of the Jewish people. The Yiddish word for poppy seed paste is *mon* (you may have heard it pronounced "mun") which comes from German. The word *tasch* in Yiddish means pocket. If you add the Hebrew word for "the" — *ha* — before *mon*, you get...Haman! These pastries are literally poppy seed pockets! Or, are they Haman's pockets? Some believe the latter as it's been surmised that Haman's pockets symbolize the money that Haman offered King Achashverosh in exchange for permission to destroy the Jews. Moreover, in Hebrew the word *tash* means "weakened." Therefore, these delicacies can mean the "weakening of Haman."

What about the significance of the triangular shape? You may have heard that it represents Haman's tricornered hat. While there is no reference to this style hat in the Megillah, this legend did give us fodder for the classic Purim children's song, LaKova Sheli Shalosh Pinot ("My hat has three corners"). Another explanation is that the triangle represents the three-way struggle between Achashverosh, Haman, and Esther. There is also a midrash that says that the triangle's three sides represent the legacy of our Patriarchs (Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob) that was protected by Esther and Mordechai's valiant efforts. Furthermore, ancient historians have connected the hamentasch's shape to that of triangular dice used in the popular ancient Mesopotamian board game known as the "Royal Game of Ur," thus suggesting that the delicacies symbolize Haman's casting of lots to determine the day to destroy the Jewish people. A more practical explanation for the shape of the pastry is that it was derived from the traditional Central European technique of folding dough for dumplings, and may have migrated from Italy to Germany's Ashkenazi Jews as far back as the 14th century. Hence, kreplach!

Lastly, the Hebrew name for hamentaschen is oznei haman which means Haman's ears. (If you are eating a hamentasch while reading this, you may want to put the pastry down now before continuing.) It's been said that as part of Haman's execution, his ears were either wrenched into a triangular shape or that they were cut off entirely. Not the most appetizing explanation! I like to think that calling them Haman's ears is our way of never forgetting the evil that confronted our people in the Purim story, and, therefore, we never take our lives for granted. Calling them oznei haman is a way for the proverbial Haman to continually hear that the Jewish people are thriving and that we are alive and well. Am Yisrael Chai and Chag Purim Sameach!



FROM RABBI BLAIR NOSANWISCH

When I first joined Adat Shalom, one point of pride I heard frequently was that Adat Shalom was unlike other area synagogues because when it was founded, it was not rooted in any particular Jewish community from the past (the synagogue for the Hungarian Jews, for exam-

ple) but rather, Adat Shalom was always a collection of Jews from many different Jewish backgrounds, coming together to create one loving kehillah.

In my first months serving the community, I met Dr. Harry Maisel. He shared with me that he had an extensive collection of dresses from his late wife Rae Maisel z"I's collection. Rae was a Jew of Bukharan descent. Bukharan Jews are an ethno-religious sub-group of Central Asia that historically spoke Bukharian. The lands comprising what was formerly known as the Central Asian Emirate of Bukhara is now primarily Uzbekistan, and once had a sizable Jewish population. Bukharan Jews are Mizrahi Jews, and the majority have immigrated to Israel or the United States.

Rae Maisel's own story traversed multiple continents. She was born in London in 1933 to parents Hezkiah and Batsheva Elias. They had left Bukhara after the Bolshevik revolution. They made their living from dealing in fur. Some of the family went to Jerusalem. Many of the rabbis who led the Bukharan Jewish community in Israel were Rae's family.

After WWII Rae's whole family moved to South Africa. Rae was extremely bright and graduated high school. Her mother only spoke Bukharian. The head of the school told her father that he must send her to college. It was not traditional in the Bukharian community to send girls to college. She was the first girl in her family to do so.

Rae and Harry met the day they were graduating from university. Harry's work brought them to Montreal and then ultimately to Wayne State University in Detroit. They joined Adat Shalom in 1962. Rae was a leader of our synagogue throughout her years here. One notable contribution was that she headed our Ritual Committee and moved the synagogue towards the policy changes that allowed for women to have aliyot.

Over the past two years, Harry has worked to find a place for Rae's extensive Bukharian Textile collection. Ultimately, with the indispensable support of the Jewish Historical Society of Michigan (JHSM) and their Executive Director Dr. Catherine Cangany, a partnership between Adat Shalom and JHSM came about, with Adat Shalom chosen as the ideal home for a permanent exhibit. JHSM is the steward of the collection and will be caring for the textiles and rotating them in our display case, highlighting Bukharian history, and Rae's contributions to our synagogue. Adat Shalom will use the exhibit for education about Rae's legacy, Bukharian, and world Jewry.

The exhibit is likely to open sometime after Pesach. As we sit around our tables for the yearly ritual of teaching about generations of Jewish people, I hope that Rae's story will become part of all our stories. Look near the coat rooms for the future home of our Bukharan Jewish Textile Exhibit, Dedicated by Dr. Harry Maisel in Loving Memory of Rachel Elias Maisel z"I. I leave you with the words of Rabbi Bergman from Rae's eulogy:

The righteous, even when they are not here with us, are still alive in profound ways. Rae's goodness and kindness and strength are eternal, and we are all better for it.



Bedikat Chametz The Search for Leaven

Bedikat Chametz (The Search for Leaven) will be held this year after nightfall on Sunday, April 21, 2024. By tradition, bread crumbs are placed conspicuously in rooms where food is ordinarily eaten or brought.

Using a candle for illumination, a "search" is made to find the remnants of *chametz*, which are then collected using a feather as a whisk.

Baruch atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech ha'olam, asher kidshanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu al biur chametz.

We praise You, O God, Sovereign of the Universe, Who hallows our lives with commandments, Who has commanded us to burn chametz.

"Selling" Your Chametz

The Torah prohibits Jews from owning chametz during Pesach. For those who wish to adhere to this tradition, Adat Shalom will be happy to arrange for the contractual (virtual) sale of your chametz to a non-Jew for the duration of the holiday. According to this contract, your ownership of your chametz will end at 9am on 14 Nisan (April 22) and will be restored at 9:20pm on 22 Nisan (April 30).

You may arrange to sell your chametz beginning Monday, April 8, through 9am on the morning of Monday, April 22.

To do so, complete the form on our website: adatshalom.org/chametz or email Rabbi Nosanwisch at bnosanwisch@adatshalom.org with your name and address to be added to the contract. Please call Rabbi Nosanwisch with any questions.

It is customary, but not necessary, to make a contribution to the synagogue for requesting that we act as the agent for the sale of your chametz. If you wish to do so, we suggest a \$20 donation to Adat Shalom's Minyan Breakfast Fund.

Post-Pesach Activities

Restoring your home to "chametz" is a simple matter, consisting mainly of putting away Pesach utensils and bringing back the chametz items to their regular places. Pesach is concluded by Havdalah said over wine. (The blessings over the candle and the spices are reserved for the conclusion of Shabbat).

Some families have a custom of eating a heavily *chametz* meal, such as pizza, or at least eating some foods that they sorely missed during Passover. For others, the transition back to *chametz* is a slow one, taking place during the omer period, a transition that goes from the Pesach meals of matzah and meat to the Shavuot meals of dairy foods and leavened bread.

Chametz may be eaten again after 9:14pm on Tuesday, April 30, 2024.

COSMETICS AND TOILETRIES

All varieties of body soaps, shampoos and stick deodorants are permitted for use on Pesach, regardless of ingredients. All types of ointments, creams, nail polish, hand lotions, eyeshadow, eyeliner, mascara, blush, foot and face powders, ink and paint may be used, regardless of their ingredients. Colognes, perfumes, hair spray, shaving lotions, and deodorants that have restorable, denatured alcohol should not be used. This applies only to products in a pure liquid state. Lipstick that contains *chametz* should not be used.

KITCHEN SINK

A metal sink can be kashered by thoroughly cleaning it, then leaving it unused for 24 hours, and then pouring boiling water into it. A porcelain sink should be cleaned and a sink rack used. If, however, dishes are to be soaked in a porcelain sink, a dish basin must be used.

KASHERING OF UTENSILS

The process of kashering utensils depends on how the utensils are used. According to halakah, leaven can be purged from a utensil by the same process in which it was absorbed in the utensil (*ke-voleo kakh poleto*). Therefore, utensils used in cooking are kashered by boiling, those used in broiling are kashered by fire and heat, and those used only for cold food are kashered by rinsing.

EARTHENWARE

Earthenware may not be kashered. However, fine translucent chinaware and earthenware which has not been used for more than a year may be used if scoured and cleaned in hot water.

METAL UTENSILS USED IN FIRE

Metal (wholly made of metal) utensils used in fire (spit, broiler) must first be thoroughly scrubbed and cleansed and then made hot until it glows. Those used for cooking or eating (silverware, pots) must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned and not used for 24 hours, then they are completely immersed in boiling water. Metal baking utensils cannot be kashered.

GLASSWARE

There are two different ways of kashering glassware. Glass cookware includes cookware made of modern materials that are non-porous, such as Pyrex®. If you don't have a dishwasher, you may soak the items in water for three days, changing the water every 24 hours. The other way requires only that they be put through a clean dishwasher with no other items.

TABLES, CLOSETS, AND COUNTERS

If used with chametz, they should be thoroughly cleaned and covered, and then they may be used. Note that the covering material should be made of material that is not easily torn.

CHAMETZ AND NON-PASSOVER UTENSILS

Non-Passover dishes, pots, and *chametz* whose ownership has been transferred to a non-Jew should be separated, locked up or covered, and marked in order to prevent accidental use.

Since the Torah prohibits the eating of *chametz* during Pesach, and since many common foods contain some admixture of *chametz*, guidance is necessary when shopping and preparing for Pesach.

During the eight days of Pesach, *chametz* cannot lose its identity in an admixture. Therefore the most minute amount of *chametz* renders the whole admixture *chametz*, and its use on Pesach is prohibited. However, during the rest of the year, *chametz* follows the normal rules of admixture, i.e. it loses its identity in an admixture of one part *chametz* and sixty parts of non-*chametz* (*batel beshishim*). **This affords us the opportunity to differentiate between foods purchased before and during Pesach.**

What follows are some general guidelines. However, our rabbis should be consulted when any doubt arises. *Kosher l'Pesach* items that do not bear the name of a rabbi or one of the recognized symbols of rabbinic supervision, or which are not integral to the package, should not be used without consulting our rabbis.

Prohibited foods include the following: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereal, coffee with cereal derivatives, wheat, barley, oats, spelt, rye, and all liquids containing ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol.

Permitted foods that require no kosher I'Pesach label if purchased prior to Pesach include: unopened packages or containers of natural coffee without cereal additives (be aware that coffees produced by General Foods are not kosher for Passover unless marked KP); sugar, pure tea (not herbal tea); salt (not iodized); pepper; natural spices; frozen fruit juices (with no additives); frozen (uncooked) vegetables; milk; butter; cottage cheese; cream cheese; ripened cheeses such as cheddar (hard), muenster (semi-soft) and Camembert (soft); frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives); baking soda.

Permitted foods that require no kosher l'Pesach label if purchased before or during Pesach include: fresh fruits and vegetables, eggs, fresh fish, and fresh meat.

Permitted foods that require a kosher l'Pesach label if purchased prior to Pesach include all baked products (matzah, cakes, matzah flour, farfel, matzah meal, and any products containing matzah); canned or bottled fruit juices; canned tuna; wine; vinegar; liquor; oils; dried fruits; candy; chocolate-flavored milk; ice cream; yogurt, and soda.

Detergents: If permitted during the year, powdered and liquid detergents do not require a kosher l'pesach label.

Medicine required for health-sustaining therapy may be used on Pesach. If not for health-sustaining therapy, consult one of our rabbis. In all cases, capsules are preferred to pills, with or without chametz binders. Before discontinuing any medication, consult a rabbi and your physician.



FROM OUR LEARNING COMMUNITY

FROM DR. MELISSA SER Director of Education mser@adatshalom.org

In our Learning Community, we focus on three major aspects of Israel Education: Eretz Yisrael (the land of Israel), Medinat Yisrael (the modern state of Israel), and Am Yisrael (the Jewish people, both in Israel and in the diaspora). All of these aspects of Israel are complex, and we attempt to think critically from a place of love and respect. For those of us who have been to or lived in Israel, we know that there is a sense of awe and wonder that we feel deeply when we traverse the paths our ancestors explored.

We wondered how we could create that wonder and joy from Farmington Hills, and so Sammi Shapiro and I set out to create a new space in our building. Our "Muscle Room" was outdated, with toys and climbing equipment that had seen better days. We envisioned a space that would engage children from birth through b'nai mitzvah age, with educational content, fine and gross motor skill development, areas for adults, and a theme: Israel.

With a grant from the Hermelin Davidson Fund for Congregation Excellence, an anonymous matching donor, the Epstein Family Foundation, artwork by Ian Mendel, design support from Arica Goldis, and the expertise and muscle of volunteers led by Paul Goldsmith, we are well under way to an anticipated ribbon-cutting before Rosh Hashanah.

What can you do in this Immersive Israel Playscape?

Climb Masada on our traverse climbing wall.

Jump into our foam pit and "float" in the Dead Sea.

Dig through sensory-friendly sand for pottery pieces and more.

Shop in the Shuk (market) and practice using Israeli currency.

Climb on a desert jeep (ages 2-6). Play soccer, Israel's most popular

sport. Try collaborative building in the kibbutz area: build a fort, create a Lego[™] or Duplo[™] village, and more.

Explore Jewish values through small-group initiatives that utilize a balance beam, stepping stones, an agility ladder, and more.

Run the kibbutz restaurant: will it be pita, shwarma, falafel, or salads?

Learn to cook Israeli foods (and more) in our brand-new kosher learning kitchen! Cooking classes and demonstrations will be part of our youth, teen, and adult offerings!



Spreading Kindness during our 10th Annual Volunteer Day

Thanks to the dedicated planning committee, project leaders, and volunteers (adults, teens, and kids) Volunteer Day was a huge success. I am also grateful for our partnerships with amazing organizations improving lives in Metro Detroit and Israel. Together we spread kindness in more ways than we could have ever imagined. Volunteer Day 2024 by number:

- 180 bags of dry ingredients to make soup were assembled and then distributed by Metro Food Rescue. Metro Food Rescue also donated the soup ingredients and food for other projects.
- 47 meaningful messages were written and decorated for Magen David Adom in Israel.
- 81 decorated notebooks will cheer up patients at Henry Ford Hospital West Bloomfield.
- 3 boxes of baby products and large toiletries, 50 decorated paper grocery bags, and 41 reusable t-shirt bags were donated to CARES of Farmington Hills.
- Over 100 decorated lunch bags filled with good food and 100 cheese sandwiches were made along with 123 bags of toiletries were packed for Hope Hospitality and Warming Center in Pontiac.
- 2 Baby Baskets were packed and 10 quarts of soup were made for Adat Shalom's Chesed (kindness) Committee.
- 100 SnackPax were decorated and filled with treats and 30+ balls of plastic yarn (plarn) were donated to Song and Spirit Institute of Peace. The balls will be crocheted into sleeping mats for people who are experiencing homelessness.
- 80 colorful fleece scarves will keep clients of Project Healthy Community warmer this winter.
- 85 bookmarks were decorated and donated to Pasteur Elementary in partnership with Friends of Pasteur School Detroit.
- Many Israeli flag pins were made as a make and take project.
- 143 fleece cat and dog toys made with fleece donated by National Council of Jewish Women's "Wrapped in Love" project and a box of items were donated to Michigan Animal Rescue League.
- 30 tissue flower bouquets were made for residents living at Fairmont Senior Living in Northville.

Our weekend of kindness continued during the MLK Jr. Tikkun Olam day for families. It was a partnership between Hillel Day School's PTO and Adat Shalom. Volunteers made 180 reusable t-shirt satchels and 160 meal kits for clients of CARES of Farmington Hills.
