FROM RABBI AARON BERGMAN

I played Queen Esther in the 1980 Rose AZA Purim play. There are no pictures. Please do not ask. It was a lot of fun, at least for me. I cannot speak for anyone who witnessed it.

Putting on a costume is one of the best parts of Purim. It emerges out of a deeper and more

serious idea that often gets missed during all the eating and drinking on the holiday.

The origin of dressing in different costumes seems to be from the part of the story that tells us that Haman was obligated to dress Mordechai up in the king's clothing as a reward for saving Achashverosh's life. Mordechai then rises to the level of a great public leader, and the other people see him like that, as well. By using his imagination and sense of play, Mordechai becomes the person he had always wanted to be.

One of the most important ideas of the story of Purim is that we can become something else, something greater than we are. We do not have to be worried about who we are and live according to an image we constructed of ourselves, maybe from many years, ago that does not apply anymore.

People are so worried about the question "who am I" that they miss out on a lot of great things. They say, "I could not do that; that's not me." If you did try it, however, it would be you.

Life is unpredictable and you have to be open to surprise. Do not get stuck on how things are supposed to be. You will never react properly. Give yourself a chance to see what you could be. You might become the person you always wanted to be, but were afraid to try. Try different interesting things, maybe a career you never thought you could do, or just a style of music you think you hate. Pretend you are someone who likes it, and maybe you will. Think of it as putting on a costume. It is not about being fake, but about stimulating our imagination.

Doing so helps us from being stuck in our lives. Feeling stuck leads to boredom at best, and depression and violence at worst. You do not have to make a radical change. Even a small change can make your whole life better.

This is behind the idea of matanot levyonim, gifts to the poor which we give on Purim. The word gift here is important. It is not charity. These gifts are about helping people visualize who they could be, that being poor does not have to be a life sentence.

Judy Lutz wrote,

Throw off your mask

Throw off your facade

I am with you to help you have the courage to be who you are

May you be like Esther and not be afraid to reveal who you are

May you be like Vashti and not be afraid to speak out

May you defeat all of your Hamans

Life is work, but it is also play and imagination and visualizing the person you could be, but were afraid to try. This Purim, start being the person you were meant to be, the person you knew was always there. You and the world will be better for it.

THE VOICE

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FROM HAZZAN DANIEL GROSS

A few years back, I was in the stands watching my son's baseball game when, to my surprise, some fans on the opposite sideline were using very loud ratchet-style noisemakers that resembled giant groggers. I had never seen one so large, nor heard one so loud. I instantly started searching online because I just had to get one, and, thanks to eBay, I was able to find them. In my search for "large grogger," many listings came up with the words "wooden noisemaker" and "matraca." Matraca, the Spanish word for "rattle," is the ratchet noisemaker used in Mexican culture. (It so happened that the opposing team that day was comprised of players from Detroit's Mexicantown.) "Grogger" (sometimes pronounced "gregger") is also the Yiddish word for "rattle."

On Purim, groggers are used to make noise anytime the antagonist Haman's name is said aloud when reading Megillat Esther. Haman was an Amalekite whose descendants have been the People of Israel's perennial enemies. Deuteronomy 25:19 states, "you shall blot out the memory of Amalek from under heaven; never forget." This led to the custom of blotting out Haman's name, in a variety of ways, across history, whenever it is read aloud in the Purim story. Rabbi Abraham ben Nathan wrote of a French 13th-century custom in which young boys would take pebbles and write "Haman" on them and then knock the stones together while reciting Haman's name and his crimes. Rabbi David Abudraham (14th-century Spain) documented that children would draw a picture or write the name of Haman on wood or stones and then bang them together to "erase" Haman's representation. To this day, some people have the custom of writing Haman's name on the bottom of their shoes so that by the end of the evening the name has been worn off. In 17th-century Germany, firecrackers were used to drown out Haman's name, and this custom spread throughout Eastern Europe.

The common ratchet-style noisemaker that we call a grogger originated from Middle Ages Catholicism, and is called a "crotalus" in Latin, a liturgical rattle or clapper. Such noisemakers were used on various occasions such as weddings, storms, and Easter — when they were used to call worshipers to prayer as bells were not used during the mournful period of Lent. They were also used for exorcism rituals, which draws a familiar connection to how we use them on Purim, to obliterate the demonic Haman! The first evidence of groggers being used during Purim occurs in the 19th century.

FROM RABBI BLAIR NOSANWISCH

When generations within families have different views, conversations can be difficult. While an older generation may be feeling their values are being rebuffed or rejected, a younger generation can feel belittled and dismissed. If we don't see the world in the same way, it can bring up so many challenging emotions - rejection, judgement, insecurity, and alienation, just to name a few.

In truth, we all too often feel these things but rarely find constructive ways to say them out loud. Also, we argue about the ideas we have that matter to us, instead of surfacing the emotions that are animating our hurts. Often these feelings fester and are left unaddressed, growing the gulf between us.

As we approach another Pesach, it is worth taking note of one particular part of the Haggadah through this lens. When we speak about the four children, the חכם the רשע the תם and לשאל יודע לשאל (the wise, the wicked, the simple, and the one who doesn't know how to ask), we are not just speaking about individual actors, but also the relationships between parents and children.

Wise relationships are characterized by a sense of honor. When we feel honor and mutual respect at the root of our relationship, we are more at ease to disagree with one another. Wise relationships can set one another at ease and create room for safe and healthy growth and differentiation. Wicked relationships are characterized by rejection. Rejection arouses fear, defensiveness, and anxiety. In relationships characterized by rejection, we all miss the opportunity to connect, engage, and grow. Simple relationships might be ones in which we avoid going deeper with one another in order to avoid our differences. While there can be peace in these relationships, there can also be a layer of depth we miss out on. For the relationships in which we don't know how to ask, we have the opportunity for a great gift. Both of us can arrive with honor and respect, putting aside our fears of rejection and finding new ways to communicate across our differences.

In each of these relationships, it is typical to get stuck. We often find ourselves at the seder retreating into the same behaviors we have known our whole lives. Our old behaviors are comfortable, even if they aren't always productive.

But the seder night is meant to be an exodus from the kind of narrowness that we suffered from in the ancient past. It is meant to be an expansive night where everything is framed as a question, and everything can be a discovery. With that possibility on the table, can we also use the seder to relate to one another in new and different ways?

Might we, this year, find our way to questions that we didn't know how to ask?

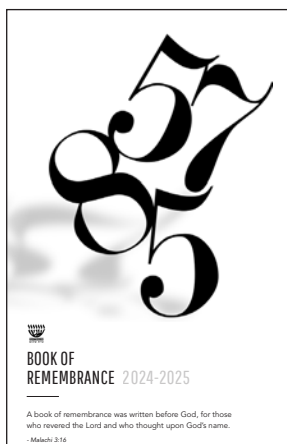

Jews commemorate the sparing of the Hebrew first-born sons in the Pesach story by concluding the study of a section of Jewish text the morning of the first Seder (or the previous day if the Seder falls on Shabbat). From the Middle Ages on, prominent rabbis have stated that first-born daughters should attend the siyum as well. At Adat Shalom, all members of your family, whatever their birth order, are invited to join in the siyum.

Bedikat Chametz The Search for Leaven

Bedikat Chametz (The Search for Leaven) will be held this year after nightfall on Thursday, April 10. By tradition, bread crumbs are placed conspicuously in rooms where food is ordinarily eaten or brought.

Using a candle for illumination, a “search” is made to find the remnants of *chametz*, which are then collected using a feather as a whisk.

Baruch atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech ha'olam, asher kidshanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu al biur chametz.

We praise You, O God, Sovereign of the Universe, Who hallows our lives with commandments, Who has commanded us to burn chametz.

“Selling” Your Chametz

The Torah prohibits Jews from owning chametz during Pesach. For those who wish to adhere to this tradition, Adat Shalom will be happy to arrange for the contractual (virtual) sale of your chametz to a non-Jew for the duration of the holiday. According to this contract, your ownership of your chametz will end at 9am on 14 Nisan (April 12) and will be restored at 9:20pm on 22 Nisan (April 22).

You may arrange to sell your chametz beginning Friday, March 28, through 9am on the morning of Friday, April 11.

It is customary, but not necessary, to make a contribution to the synagogue for requesting that we act as the agent for the sale of your chametz. ***If you wish to do so, we suggest a \$20 donation to Adat Shalom's Minyan Breakfast Fund.***

Post-Pesach Activities

Restoring your home to “*chametz*” is a simple matter, consisting mainly of putting away Pesach utensils and bringing back the *chametz* items to their regular places. Pesach is concluded by Havdalah said over wine. (The blessings over the candle and the spices are reserved for the conclusion of Shabbat.)

Some families have a custom of eating a heavily *chametz* meal, such as pizza, or eating foods that they sorely missed during Passover. For others, the transition back to *chametz* is a slow one, taking place during the omer period, a transition that goes from the Pesach meals of matzah and meat to the Shavuot meals of dairy foods and leavened bread.

Chametz may be eaten again after 9:14pm on Sunday, April 20, 2025.

PREPARING FOR PESACH

COSMETICS AND TOILETRIES

All varieties of body soaps, shampoos and stick deodorants are permitted for use on Pesach, regardless of ingredients. All types of ointments, creams, nail polish, hand lotions, eyeshadow, eyeliner, mascara, blush, foot and face powders, ink and paint may be used, regardless of their ingredients. Colognes, perfumes, hair spray, shaving lotions, and deodorants that have restorable, denatured alcohol should not be used. This applies only to products in a pure liquid state. Lipstick that contains *chametz* should not be used.

KITCHEN SINK

A metal sink can be kashered by thoroughly cleaning it, then leaving it unused for 24 hours, and then pouring boiling water into it. A porcelain sink should be cleaned and a sink rack used. If, however, dishes are to be soaked in a porcelain sink, a dish basin must be used.

KASHERING OF UTENSILS

The process of kashering utensils depends on how the utensils are used. According to halakha, leaven can be purged from a utensil by the same process in which it was absorbed in the utensil (*ke-voleo kakh polet*). Therefore, utensils used in cooking are kashered by boiling, those used in broiling are kashered by fire and heat, and those used only for cold food are kashered by rinsing.

EARTHENWARE

Earthenware may not be kashered. However, fine translucent chinaware and earthenware which has not been used for more than a year may be used if scoured and cleaned in hot water.

METAL UTENSILS USED IN FIRE

Metal (wholly made of metal) utensils used in fire (spit, broiler) must first be thoroughly scrubbed and cleansed and then made hot until it glows. Those used for cooking or eating (silverware, pots) must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned and not used for 24 hours, then they are completely immersed in boiling water. Metal baking utensils cannot be kashered.

GLASSWARE

There are two different ways of kashering glassware. Glass cookware includes cookware made of modern materials that are non-porous, such as Pyrex®. If you don't have a dishwasher, you may soak the items in water for three days, changing the water every 24 hours. The other way requires only that they be put through a clean dishwasher with no other items.

TABLES, CLOSETS, AND COUNTERS

If used with *chametz*, they should be thoroughly cleaned and covered, and then they may be used. Note that the covering material should be made of material that is not easily torn.

CHAMETZ AND NON-PASSOVER UTENSILS

Non-Passover dishes, pots, and *chametz* whose ownership has been transferred to a non-Jew should be separated, locked up or covered, and marked in order to prevent accidental use.

Since the Torah prohibits the eating of *chametz* during Pesach, and since many common foods contain some admixture of *chametz*, guidance is necessary when shopping and preparing for Pesach.

During the eight days of Pesach, *chametz* cannot lose its identity in an admixture. Therefore the most minute amount of *chametz* renders the whole admixture *chametz*, and its use on Pesach is prohibited. However, during the rest of the year, *chametz* follows the normal rules of admixture, i.e. it loses its identity in an admixture of one part *chametz* and sixty parts of non-*chametz* (*batel beshishim*). **This affords us the opportunity to differentiate between foods purchased before and during Pesach.**

What follows are some general guidelines. However, our rabbis should be consulted when any doubt arises. *Kosher l'Pesach* items that do not bear the name of a rabbi or one of the recognized symbols of rabbinic supervision, or which are not integral to the package, should not be used without consulting our rabbis.

Prohibited foods include the following: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereal, coffee with cereal derivatives, wheat, barley, oats, spelt, rye, and all liquids containing ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol.

Permitted foods that require no kosher l'Pesach label if purchased prior to Pesach include: unopened packages or containers of natural coffee without cereal additives (be aware that coffees produced by General Foods are not kosher for Passover unless marked KP), sugar, pure tea (not herbal tea), salt (not iodized), pepper, natural spices, frozen fruit juices (with no additives), frozen (uncooked) vegetables, milk, butter, cottage cheese, cream cheese, ripened cheeses such as cheddar (hard), muenster (semi-soft), and Camembert (soft), frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives), baking soda.

Permitted foods that require no kosher l'Pesach label if purchased before or during Pesach include: fresh fruits and vegetables, eggs, fresh fish, and fresh meat.

Permitted foods that require a kosher l'Pesach label if purchased prior to Pesach include all baked products (matzah, cakes, matzah flour, farfel, matzah meal, and any products containing matzah); canned or bottled fruit juices; canned tuna; wine; vinegar; liquor; oils; dried fruits; candy; chocolate-flavored milk; ice cream; yogurt, and soda.

Detergents: If permitted during the year, powdered and liquid detergents do not require a kosher l'pesach label.

Medicine required for health-sustaining therapy may be used on Pesach. If not for health-sustaining therapy, consult one of our rabbis. In all cases, capsules are preferred to pills, with or without *chametz* binders. Before discontinuing any medication, consult a rabbi and your physician.

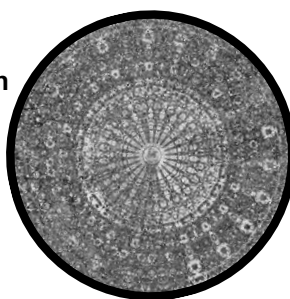

Martin Luther King Jr. said, "Life's most persistent and urgent question is: What are you doing for others?" He also stated, "Everybody can be great because everybody can serve."

Volunteer day reminds us to appreciate what we have and to remember that there are others who are less fortunate. I am also grateful for our partnerships with amazing organizations improving lives in Metro Detroit and Israel. Together we spread kindness in more ways than we could have ever imagined. Volunteer Day 2025 by numbers:

- **130 bags of dry soup ingredients** that will feed at least 520 people were packed and distributed in partnership with Metro Food Rescue to Eternal Light Organization. Metro Food Rescue donated the soup ingredients and food for other projects.

- **46 meaningful messages** were written and decorated for staff and volunteers of Magen David Adom in Israel.

- **50 decorated notebooks** will cheer up patients at Henry Ford Hospital West Bloomfield.

- **53 Misloach Manot (Purim gifts) boxes** were decorated in preparation for a Purim Parcel Project on March 9 during Chesed Fest. The gifts will be donated to persons served by JARC.

- **250 beeswax candles** were rolled with the help of Adat Shalom's Green Team committee. The candles were donated to Adat Shalom's Chesed Committee's Shabbat delivery program. Volunteers also had the option of taking a set home to light on Shabbat.

- **3 boxes of baby products and large toiletries, 39 decorated paper grocery bags, and 19 reusable t-shirt bags** were donated to CARES of Farmington Hills.

- **Over 100 decorated lunch bags filled with good food and 100 cheese sandwiches** were made along with **100 bags of toiletries** for Hope Hospitality and Warming Center in Pontiac.

- **5 Baby Baskets** were packed, **8 quarts of soup** were made, and **23 Shabbat Shalom cards** were decorated for Adat Shalom's Chesed (kindness) Committee meal delivery program.



- **90 SnackPax for kids** were decorated and filled with healthy treats and distributed by Song and Spirit Institute of Peace.
- **104 colorful fleece scarves and a box of donated new hats and gloves** will keep clients of Project Healthy Community warmer this winter.

- **100 bookmarks** were decorated and **15 boxes of books** donated to Pasteur Elementary in partnership with Friends of Pasteur School Detroit.

- **105 cat and dog toys** were made with fleece donated by the National Council of Jewish Women and **2 boxes of items** were donated to Michigan Animal Rescue League.

- **150 bags of tea** were packed in partnership with Repair the World and distributed to Yad Ezra.

- **72 tissue paper flowers** were made into colorful bouquets for Jewish Senior Life's The Dorothy & Peter Brown Adult Day Care Center.

- **50 pairs of new socks for kids** were donated to Foster Closet of Oakland County.

Adat Shalom's new Klezmer Band

Motown Mishpucha

Adat Shalom's new Klezmer Band, "Motown Mishpucha," will be sharing its first performance at the Purim Detroit event Thursday evening, March 13 hosted by Shaarey Zedek. The shared event among metro-Detroit's conservative congregations includes a creative shpiel featuring our own Adat Shalom clergy, a carnival, and the reading of the Megillah.

Klezmer is the music of Ashkenazi Jews who are the descendants of Jews from central and Eastern Europe and whose primary language was Yiddish. The word 'Klezmer' is a Yiddish contraction of the words for instrument (*kley*) and song (*zemer*). The traditional folk style was developed as dance music for celebrations and borrows inspiration from many genres, synagogue tunes, European folk tunes, and classical music. A distinguishing feature of Klezmer music is the bending of notes, which embellishes the tunes' emotional and improvisational components. When Klezmer was introduced in the United States in the early 1900's, musicians started meshing it with elements of jazz. Because of this patchwork of styles, there is often no actual composer attributed to each tune.
